- England imported five hundred thousand tons of wheat from India last year.
- The Toronto Corn Exchange have decided to establish a Cash Call Board.
- -Moneton Gas Works are to be commenced at once, and are to be built on the most approved plan.
- Work will shortly be commenced on the Sarnia, Chatham and Eric Railway between Oil City and Dresden.
- The herring fishing at the Magdalen Islands is reported to be a total failure, and most of the fleet has sailed for Anticosti.
- The North West Transportation Company has contracted to carry 30,000 tons of railway. iron from this port to Lake Superior.
- -Ship building in the Maritime Provinces is not so brisk as might be desired, but an occasional new vessel is floated.
- -Mr. P. S. Stephenson, for the past 16 years connected with the Grand Trunk, latterly as General Freight Agent, has resigned.
- The cargoe of the barque Lepreaux, from Antwerp, Belgium, consisting of glassware, and valued at over \$24,000, was seized in this port on Wednesday, for infraction of the revenue laws. The goods were entered on false invoices.
- A despatch from Havana says that it is generally admitted that the sugar crop will full short thirty to thirty-five per cent, compared with last year, or from 100,000 to 150,000 tons.

- The supplementary estimates contained a vote of \$57,000, to cover the expenses of the Halifax Commission, and also \$12,000 for services rendered by Sir A. T. Galt.

-Fish are unusually plentiful in the small streams this season, and large quantities of sturgeon, pike, bass and suckers are being brought to the city.

- John and James Grange, proprietors of a grist and saw mill at Tamworth, Ont., have dissolved partnership, the former retaining the grist mill and the latter the saw mill.

- The bankrupt stock of James Henderson, general merchant, Elora, valued at \$4,100, has been sold by the assignee to James Tait, of Minto, for 664 cents on the dollar.

—The Peterborough Real Estate Investment Company (Limited), with a capital of \$2,000,-000, has been incorporated for the purpose of lending money on real estate and debentures.

Fears are entertained for the safety of the brigantine Zerlina, of Prince Edward Island, which sailed for Liverpool with a cargo of copper ore last December, and which has not since been heard of.

— G. Preston, merchant tailor of Ottawa, has offered his creditors 33; cents on the dollar, unsecured, but his offer has not as yet been accepted. His liabilities are \$1,700, and his assets a triffe less.

— The Agricultural Mutual Assurance Association of Canada, with headquarters at London, is considering the advisability of changing is name to the London Mutual Fire Insurance Company of Canada.

— The profits of the Bank of Montreal for the year ended 30th April last, after deducting expenses of management and bad debts, amounted to \$1,430,903. The dividend paid was 12 per cent. or \$1,439,808.

— A new line of transatlantic steamships is to be established between Galveston, Texas, and Leading Wholesale Trade of Montreal.

Barrow-in-Furness, principally for the carriage of live stock. A new line of passenger steamships is also to be established between the latter place and some North American port.

— The Liverpool Courier, in an obituary notice of the late Hon. John Young, says:—
"The Dominion of Canada has just lost one of the worthiest of its sons, in the death of the Hon. John Young, whose labors in the cause of the commonwealth are fully appreciated by his fellow-citizens."

— A large deposit of asbestos has been discovered back of Sydenham, and will be worked. The present value of the mineral is \$100 per ton. The discovery is a most important one, and adds another to the list of articles which compose the mineral wealth of the county of Frontenac.

— Cutting of Marine Lasurance rates is going on at Chicago. Risks have been taken on Buffalo cargoes at 10 cents net on the \$100. Local Board agents hold firm at 20 cents, but it is probable the Board will suspend rates, when the members will be at liberty to write at any figure they choose.

The Ottawa Agricultural Insurance Company has made two calls of five per cent. each on the shares of the company, the first call payable on the 14th of June and the second in two instalments on the 14th of October and the 14th of December next.

— Mr. George N. Ahern, who is leaving the Royal Insurance Company to join the North British and Mercantile as inspector for the Maritime Provinces, was presented by the staff of the former with a handsome travelling valise, and an address expressive of their good wishes and desire for his future success.

—The value of the goods imported at St. John during April was \$1,123,624. For the corresponding month last year it was \$915,507

The exports for the same month this year amounted to \$184,780 and last year \$401,115. This year shows a considerable increase in imports and a falling off in exports.

— The trade in oranges and lemons has, during the present season, been larger than at any previous period. An Ottawa paper estimates that the retail trade in these fruits in that city has amounted to nearly \$10,000.

— The Jacques Cartier Bank has commenced a suit against the City and District Savings Bank, to recover \$41,000, balance of a running account. The sum actually in dispute is \$25,000, which was obtained on loan by Cotté, the former cashier of the Jacques Cartier Bank, and which plaintiff alleges was for himself individually.

— The suit against the Messrs. Allan, by J. W. D. McLagan, commercial traveller, of New York, for damages for injury sustained by falling through the hatchway of one of defendants' ressels, and which was carried in appeal to England, has been settled by the Messrs. Allan. The judgment with costs amounts to about \$16,000.

— According to the report of the Dominion Geological Survey, there are near the head of Grand Lake, in the Counties of Queen's and Sunbury, N.B., 153,000,000 tons of coal, or a supply of 150,000 tons per annum for a thousand years. The report also says that additional out-crops and openings may prove the quantity to be two or three times greater than that stated.

— The coal and lumber traffic of Vancouver Island and Burrard Inlet seems to be steadily increasing. Several ships have been chartered at San Francisco to proceed to Nanaimo and return with coal, the bulk of which is taken by the Pacific Mail Steamship Company. The coal from the Wellington Mine is largely used for household purposes.

- -The Canada Shipping Company has declared a dividend of five per cent.
- The shares of the Globe Printing Company are new regularly quoted on the Toronto Stock Exchange. The latest quotations are 130.
- Mr. Benjmain Tett, an old business man of Newboro, Oat., and for some time member of parliament for South Leeds, died on Wednesday last
- A writ of attachment has issued against Wm. Byrd, carpenter, of this city, who only obtained his discharge from the Insolvent Court six months ago. Liabilities small.
- The liabilities of Napoleon Pouliot, dry goods merchant of Quebec, whose fullure we reported last week, amount to \$5,343. We understand that creditors have decided to sell the stock and close out the estate.
- W. G. Leroy, of Bryson, a general merchant, having failed, his stock and real estate are to be sold by tender. Judging by the quantity of the latter advertised, he must have dealt in it pretty extensively for a small trader.
- The fears entertained last fall that the Hessian fly would cause serious damage to the wheat appear to be groundless, at least we have seen or heard nothing of it this spring. Possibly the early season and the very forward state of the crops may prevent its doing any harm.
- -Phelan, the contractor of No. 9 Section of the Lachine Canal, who absconded some time ago, leaving a large amount of debts, has made an arrangement with his creditors, paying them in full. The government has paid the men employed by him out of the money due him on his contract.
- As an evidence of the difficulty of finding employment, and the desire to go to the North West, we may state that for fifty vacancies in the North West police, for which recruits are wanted, there are six hundred applications.
- H. T. Sentenne, formerly of the wholesale crockery firm of Sentenne, Howison & Massue, who failed in June, 1876, and who since then

- We note the existence of a new wholesale grocery firm, that of Messrs. Matthewson & Patton, who continue the business of the late firm of II. Matthewson & Co. It is understood the firm is composed of Mr. Saml. Matthewson, formerly of II. M. & Co., and Mr. James Patton, until recently of George Childs & Co.
- Homer L. Lay, a storckeeper at South Stakely, of but a few months standing, has succumbed to a writ of attachment. Commencing without any experience of matters commercial his downfall was not unexpected, and should be a warning to any other ambitious farmer's sons who may be inclined to tempt fortune by keeping store. Liabilities about \$1,500.
- Fralick & Boyd, clothing and dry goods merchants, of Kingston, are in difficulties, and a representative of creditors is in possession and taking stock. Liabilities stated at about 510,000, with assets about equal. Have only been in business in Kingston a few months, having removed from Gananoque, and are apparently somewhat of the genus rolling stone.
- —T. W. Currier & Co., proprietors of an extensive sash and door factory and planing mill, in Ottawa, have been served with a demand of assignment. Their liabilities are about \$150,000. Mr. Currier is a brother of Mr. J. M. Currier, M.P., who is also extensively engaged in lumbering. The latter bad at one time an interest in the planing mills of his brother, but withdrew some time ago.

— The Board of Real Estate Agents have leased the premises on the corner of Place

The membership is to be restricted to persons whose business is confined to the purchase and sale of real estate, the renting and valuing of property, and the negotiating of loans on the security of real property.

The commission house of Thompson & Bligh, Halifax, have called a meeting of their creditors. Liabilities, \$25,000, assets estimated at \$20,000. — Another railway war has broken out between the Montreal, Portland and Boston Railway and the Central Vermont line. A contractor of the former and two employees have been arrested for obstructing the track of the latter, by laying a line across it. It is further reported that the Passumpsic Road has taken possession of the Montreal, Portland and Boston Road from West Farnham to Chambly. The trains between the former point and St. Lambert are still run by the Grand Trunk.

Canada, and active steps are being taken by the militia authorities to give them a warm reception if they should come. Four gunboats have been ordered from Halifax to the St Lawrence, and the forts along the frontier are being put in a state of readiness. Such demonstrations have always the effect of unsettling people's minds and interfering with the ordinary course of trade, but we do not think there is in the present instance any such imminent danger that it need cause any undue alarm.

- A recent report of the Marine and Fisheries Department for the Dominion, shows the value of the fisheries is every year improving. In 1876 they were worth \$11,147,590 and in 1877 \$12,-029,957, an increase of \$382,367. The value of fish exported in 1877 was \$7,000,402, being an increase of nearly a million and a half over the preceding year. About 50 per cent. of the exportation was to the United States. The amount imported was \$1,329,530, about 70 per cent. of which was from the United States, Increased facilities for shipping are likely to increase the trade considerably.

- An intelligent bard-working young farmer who went to California from Toronto about a year and a half ago writes :- " This is become a very poor country. There are hundreds here out of employment, men and women. Bookkeepers and clerks have to go to shovel and pick, and glad to get it. I have never wanted work since I came, but I would not advise any one to come here at present. I am thinking of going to Oregon or returning to Canada soon."

- The assignee's statement in the estate of Rodier, Hearn & Co., shows liabilities direct of \$21,803, of which \$761.92 are secured, privileged \$745.73, indirect, \$34,899.77, making a total of \$57.447. Assets nominally reach \$28,711, giving a nominal surplus of \$61,62 over direct liabilities, but, after making allowances for bad and doubtful debts, and for the bills under discount likely to rank against the estate, the result will be a considerable deficiency. The first meeting of creditors will be held on the 23rd

stock came off as advertised. The inventory price was \$14,000, and it was sold to Francis Kieran, a grocery jobber, for 70 cents on the dollar, cash. The same party bought the book debts, amounting to \$1300, for 324 cents on the dollar. These figures are much better than those usually realized for such estates, and shows the wisdom of the creditors in refusing the offer of 30 cents.

- The Smith & Elkins Manufacturing Co., of Sherbrooke, organized in 1874 with a capital of \$100,000, and continuing the business formerly carried on by Smith & Elkins, has assigned. The Company has been in a depressed shape for some time back and working along under a heavy load, business has been bad and thus have made losses. In May, 1876, they reduced the capital stock to \$65,000, and have been creating as few fresh liabilities as possible in the hopes of a revival of better times, but are apparently unable to continue longer. The works employ some 60 men, and their stoppage will be seriously felt. No statement of affairs yet made public.

- An insurance case of some interest has just been decided by the Court of Chancery at London, Ont. The Union Fire Insurance Company had an action brought against them for a claim of \$1000, which they resisted on the ground that, at the time the risk was effected, they were licensed under the Ontario Act, and therefore, not liable in law. The plea was held good and the bill dismissed, notwithstanding that the policy was issued in good faith by an authorised agent.

The assets are shown to be \$36,165, apparent. They attribute their failure to the general depression, the depreciation in a large stock and the large number of bankrupt stocks offered in Detroit, which affected their business materially, their trade being largely American. - There seems to be quite an exodus of late from some parts of the Eastern Townships to the free grant lands of the Muskoka district, already a number of families have taken up their abiding place there, and others intend following. Two parties from Cowansville passed through Montreal this week on their way to spy out the land, and, should their report prove favorable, no less than twenty families will leave the above locality to make for themselves a new home. These men as a rule belonging to the tenant farmers class, who find that where they are, they can never make more than a living on a rented farm, and seeing no prospect of leaving any thing for their families, are anxious to make themselves independent by hewing out for themselves a home in a new country.

RESULTS OF THE SESSION.

The last session of a parliament is almost proverbially barren of results, and the one which has just closed so unfortunately at Ottawa is certainly no exception to the rule. The rival statesmen were chiefly employed in preparing for the forthcoming election. Still the session has not been without results. The temperance party seem, on the whole, well satisfied with the Act respecting the traffic in intoxicating liquors, and it must be admitted that it is an improvement on the law known as the Dunkin Act. The Act for the better auditing of the public accounts is a valuable one, and we hope that the Amended Stamp" Act will be an improvement. The Act which is chiefly interesting to the citizens of Montreal is that "for the better prevention of crimes of violence in certain parts of Canada," and which is specially designed to restrain our over-excited population. The Act in question was first proposed by Mr. Blake, but was subsequently taken charge of by the Government, and carried without

serious opposition. The corporation has had the subject under consideration, and has agreed with tolerable unanimity to an increase of the police force. We should have been glad if the punishment for carrying firearms had been a smart fine, onehalf to go to the informer, by which means a detective police force would have been at once created, and parties would have been so apprehensive of detection that they would probably have ceased to violate the law. We confess that we have but little confidence in the efficacy of a local police in dealing with party quarrels. We have no intention whatever of disparaging the Montreal police force beyond that in other cities. Experience has proved that in the country, from which we have inherited our party feuds, the local police is not to be relied on for the effectual suppression of party conflicts. We have on more than one occasion pointed out the expediency of organizing a Dominion Police Force, and rather more than a year ago we observed with satisfaction that Chief Justice Harrison, in a charge to the grand jury at Ottawa, expressed a decided opinion in favor of such a measure. Mr. Blake, we were sorry to notice, adverted in his speech to the subject of a Government police, which he was of opinion was not a practicable measure. We shall copy his remarks on that subject:

The second question was that which had attracted attention some time previous to this. It was that of possible interference by this Parliament, by the formation of a police force by Canada. To that to day as in times past, he would decidedly ob-The preservation of the peace rested under the one reading and practice of the Constitution with the local authorities. It would be utterly impossible for Canada to undertake to organize a police force such as would be required in the considerable cities and in the rural places. There was no doubt that any city which, owing to exceptional circumstances, had to charge itself with the establishment of an exceptionally large police force would be glad to see a local burden discharged even by the Dominion of Canada. His opinion was that it devolved on the Local Governments and Legislatures to provide an adequate local force for the maintenance of the peace. (Hear, hear.)

One of the principal objections raised by Mr. Blake may be easily disposed of. The advocates of a Dominion police never contemplated that a "local burden should be discharged by the Dominion of Canada." Neither do they think that it should be defrayed by the Local Legislatures, unless when required for strictly provincial objects. In the counties, cities and towns of the Dominion, a very large aggregate force of police is required and maintained out of local funds. It would be most desirable, if it were possible, that

this force should be composed of men subjected to a common discipline, and wholly free from local feelings and preju dices. There is a force in existence which may be conveniently referred to as a model, viz., the Irish Constabulary. It is true that this force is independent of the local police, but there seems to be no good reason why it should not be enlarged up to the requirements of the various localities, and distributed among them. Already there is a system under which localities are compelled to bear the ex pense of military when required on occasions of emergency, and in Ireland instances have occurred where it has been found necessary to substitute the Constabulary for the local police at the cost of course of the community requiring its services. The scheme could only be successfully worked out in concert with the Provincial Legislatures and the Municipal Corporations, but there is no reason to doubt their co operation, and it would not be necessary for any province or municipality to be included, unless with its own consent. We have no doubt whatever that the advantages resulting from an efficient police force, free from local association, would be found so great that in a comparatively short time all the provinces and municipalities would give in their adhesion to the system. While in our opinion such a force would be superior at all times to a mere local police, the great advantage would be, that in periods of emergency, such, for instance, as the railroad strikes, a very large force could be detailed for service elsewhere. For this purpose, the reserve would be available, or in case a considerable body of men was needed, they could be withdrawn, and their places temporarily supplied by special constables. We are unable to concur in Mr. Blake's opinion that "it would be utterly impossible to undertake to organize a police force, such as would be required in the considerable cities and in the rural places." "Where there's a will, there's a way," and we fear it is the will that is wanting. We have adverted to the local ties of the police, but we may further observe that our volunteers are all subject to similar influences. The day may not be far distant when we may have to lament most bitterly that our sole reliance for the preservation of the peace, in a city so much under the control of the dangerous classes, as to have rendered the sudden intervention of Parliament absolutely necessary, is upon local forces imbued with the same prejudices as those very classes. It is most satisfactory to find that the bill introduced by Mr. Blake, and accepted by the Government, has not met with any party opposition in Parliament. In this city the members of the Corporation and the clergy, with hardly an exception, have acknowledged the necessity that exists for the employment of energetic measures for the preservation of the peace. Let us hope that the Act will be put strictly in force at once, and we may hope that the practice of carrying firearms will have been abandoned before our period of excitement arrives.

THE CROWN AND THE CABINET.

Such is the heading of an article in the Montreal Gazette of the 14th inst., the apparent object of which is to establish a similarity of views between those who have maintained the constitutionality of Lieutenant-Governor Letellier's recent dismissal of his ministers, and a writer in the London Quarterly Review, who has advocated a complete change in the constitution. There is an old adage "drowning men catch at straws," and there could scarcely be a better illustration of its truth than the article to which we have called attention. It is scarcely necessary to point out that there can be no possible analogy between the two cases, for the writer in the Quarterly confines his claim for a more extended exercise of the prerogative to matters." relating to foreign affairs" with which we Canadians have nothing to do. Even, therefore, on the very preposterous assumption that the writer in the Quarterly had any considerable following in support of his new theory, it could have no application whatever to our constitutional question. But the Gazette takes comfort in some remarks on the article in question by the London Spectator, which we shall copy, together with the introduction of our contemporary. "Our object is not to deal just now with the general question raised by this discussion. The importance which the discussion has for us is that it has evoked certain statements as to the true relations of the Crown with the Cabinet, which are calculated to disabuse people's minds of the extraordinary doctrines to which Sir Francis Hincks has not hesitated to give the sanction of his name." We quote first from the Spectator, of the 27th April, as follows :-

"The safety of the Throne, which, as we have so often argued, is essential to our moderated liberty, depends on its release from responsibility, on its relief from the burden of personal power, on the willingness of its occupant to confide in the Ministry which the people choose, and to support the policy which they, through their representatives, have accepted. That the King should remonstrate, and argue and influence, and do all these things with the force inseparable from ancient kingship, is most legitimate; but to oppose a Policy or dictate one is to emence from

THE SECLUSION IN WHICH ALONE OUR ENG-LISH OR ANY KINGS ARE SAFE, and to lower the Crown to its position in the countries where defeat implies, if not a revolution, at least an abdication of the throne."

To the Spectator's remarks, as we understand them, we give our entire assent, and they are consistent with every line that we have written on this question at issue. We should have been very glad to have had an explanation of the mode by which the King can "remonstrate and argue and influence" if the measures of his ministers are carefully concealed from him. We are quite certain that the Spectator would never for a moment deny the right of the Crown to appeal to the people under the circumstances which led to that appeal in the Province of Quebec. With regard to Mr. Bagehot's authority we shall merely observe, as we have already had occasion to do, that it is far safer to rely on the utterances of English Statesmen of practical experience as to the relations between the Sovereign and the ministers of State than on mere general statements by constitutional writers. No one has disputed the rule that the individual who exercises the regal power should "confide "in the ministry which the people choose, "and support the policy which they, "through their representatives, have ac-"cepted." Nor has any one proposed "the revival of its powers under the "Tudors or the Stuarts." We must add a word on "the bold constitutional innovation" of the veto. The veto has been rendered unconstitutional in England simply because all measures introduced into Parliament have had the previous sanction of the Crown. Instances have occurred, and have been quoted during the present discussion, in which the assent of the Crown was given with reluctance, and in which the Crown at a later stage endeavored to defeat the measure of its ministers. If it has been difficult to cite a precedent exactly in point for the Quebec case, it has simply been because no English minister has ventured during a period of nearly two centuries to treat the Crown or its representatives as the Quebec ex-ministers treated the Lieutenant-Governor. The absurdity of the reference to the veto is that the DeBoucherville Government was willing to have reserved their own railway bill to meet the Lieutenant-Governor's wishes, a proceeding for which we defy their admirers to cite a precedent. The Gazette chooses to misapprehend our remarks on the reservation of bills. He cannot imagine that we ever intended to maintain that bills might not be reserved by a subordinate government under instructions from a higher one, I re-

cisely as the four bills lately reserved by the Governor-General, and which of course "will become law, nevertheless." Had there been any instructions from the Governor General to the Lieutenant-Governor to reserve the railway bill on any special ground such as that it was beyond the powers of the Local Legislature, or for any other cause, then its reservation would have been a matter of course, and would have led to no difficulty. The proposed reservation by Mr. DeBoucherville was simply a mode of escape from a dilemma in which he and his colleagues found themselves, owing to their having introduced as ministers of the Crown a bill to which the Lieutenant Governor had not given his sanction. They proposed, and the Gazette supported them in doing so, the reservation of such a bill, knowing that the Lieutenant-Governor held it to be "contrary to law and justice." Why was it to be reserved? Was it contemplated that the Dominion Government was to act as umpire between the Lieutenant Governor and his ministers? It was simply absurd, and wholly in violation of the principle of responsible government, to which the Gazette is so much attached, for a ministry to advise the reservation of a bill introduced and carried by themselves. A new ministry might constitutionally and consistently advise such a course, and it did so. We will observe in conclusion that we are under no apprehension as to any satisfactory refutation of the views on this question which have been maintained in our columns.

CITY FINANCES, TORONTO.

The time has arrived, nay it has long since arrived, when it has become a necessity that in our city councils the financial management should be entrusted to some member of the council who is possessed of the ability, inclination, and leisure to devote himself to the subject. In our own city, Alderman Nelson has succeeded in obtaining the confidence of his colleagues, and has been for some years in succession placed at the head of the finance committee of the corporation. In the sister city of Toronto, Alderman Turner has devoted himself most assiduously to similar work, and we have had an opportunity of reading an elaborate exposition of the financial position of Toronto, made by him on the 6th instant, in a speech delivered at a special meeting of the city council. The figures dealt in are large, and it is rather startling to find that the city debt of Toronto is larger than that of the Province of Upper Canada at the period of the union in 1841. The entire revenue of Upper Canada was, at that

period, about \$400,000, and the charge at the present time for the interest and sinking fund of the Toronto debt is fully \$500,000. Alderman Turner's speech is well worthy of the perusal and attention of our city financiers. His object is to show the rapid increase in the debt, and the absolute necessity that exists for limiting the borrowing powers of the corporation, Alderman Turner's proposition is to consolidate the debt, and after, making provision for certain anticipated demands. which will increase it to \$7,500,000, to make that the limit of the general debt; further outlay for local improvements, such as sewers, roads, sidewalks, &c., being provided for by local improvement rates, leviable on the property in the streets benefited thereby. In order to satisfy the owners of property in new streets, Alderman Turner proposes to appropriate \$500,000 of the new loan to the improvement of streets which have not yet participated in the street expenditure, and he likewise provides \$400,000 for possible railway bonuses, \$150,000 for an exhibition building, and \$250,000 for a main sewer in front of the city. The government debt will thus be raised to about \$7,500,000, which is to be the amount of the new consolidated debt, and this is to be raised by the issue of sterling debentures, bearing interest at 41 or 5 per cent. There can be no doubt that it is wise to borrow at a lower rate of interest than 6 per cent., which is the present rate. English lenders very much prefer loaning on bonds which must be placed below par, and which are likely to increase in value. Alderman Turner suggests that the special sinking fund be abandoned, and that, instead, the special revenue derivable from the rents of the city property be appropriated as a sinking fund. The scheme involves a number of details, one of the principal of which is a provision for raising money for special improvements, chargeable on the streets benefited. One of the difficulties. indeed the principal one, is that the outstanding 6 per cent. debentures may not be presented for payment. Alderman Turner proposes that in future there shall be no sinking fund provided, except for the new loan, so that 6 per cent, will be the outside amount required, and that on the consolidated debt of \$7,500,000 would be \$450,000 or \$50,000 less than the present appropriation for the debt. Alderman Turner has invited criticism on his scheme, and our Toronto contemporaries have not received it with disfavor. Some of his views are applicable to our own city debt, and to our appropriations for local improvements. The taxation in Toronto

has reached 21-5 per cent, and we observe that the debt has increased in a much greater ratio than the value of assessable property. Alderman Turner's speech is well deserving of careful and thoughtful consideration.

GILT-EDGED BUTTER.

The old and true saying, that "Whatever is worth doing at all is worth doing well," applies more strongly to the making of butter than perhaps to any other article of industry, and more especially at the present day in Canada. The immense quantities of this important article of export which laid all last fall and winter in our warehouses, unmarketed because unmarketable, entailing heavy losses upon the trade and wrecking some of our most enterprising dealers, should be sufficient experience for the present generation, and induce them to guard against the recurrence of such a catastrophe. The trade as well as the consumers will recollect what high prices were procurable during last season for good, sweet butter, as high as 35 cents per 1b. being paid to the retailer for such an article, and for which he found it difficult to supply the demand at a time when the market was glutted with what should have been worth hundreds of thousands of dollars had reasonable precautions been taken by all parties concerned. We deem it our duty to set our readers a-thinking seriously on this subject, and to afford a few practical hints as to the method and possibility of always producing what is known as "gilt-edged" butter, as applicable to both creameries and farm dairies.

Let us begin at the beginning. Perhaps a few words as to the choice of stock may not be out of place. Mr. Geo. E. Waring, of Ogden Farm, New York, in his " Handy Book of Husbandry," recently issued. says:-" Much attention has been paid during a few years past to what is known as the Milk Mirror or Escutcheon. The relation between this and the capacity for milk was discovered by Mr. Guénon, a native of the south of France, whose early life was passed in the care of a herd of cows. Being a close observer of nature, an excellent judge of cattle, and a man of great natural sagacity, he established. after many years of investigation, a system by which he claimed to be able to determine the quantity of the yield, its duration, and the quality of the milk for the manufacture of butter, by what he called the "Escutcheon." He received a gold medal from the Agricultural Society of Bordeaux, as a recognition of the value of his discovery; and although many of the details of the intricate system established by him have failed of general adoption. the general principle on which his system is based is of so much value that it is often taken as an important criterion in the selection of dairy animals. The milk mirror is the upward-growing hair on the back part of the udder, and the inside of the hind legs. An examination of any cow will show that the line where this hair meets the downward-growing hair of the immediately adjacent parts of the body is well defined by what is called a "quirl." and the hair included within the ouirl and covered by the upward-growing hair is the Milk Mirror. The shape of the Mirror is very different in different races, and generally assumes one of two or three different forms. For details concerning this subject the reader is referred to well known publications in which it is set forth. For the present purpose it will be sufficient to say, in general terms, that, as a general rule, the size of the Mirror bears a pretty constant proportion to the amount of the yield of milk, and while it is true that this indication of great milking qualities, in those cases where it is a reliable indication, accompanies such other general characteristics as of themselves indicate good milkers, at the same time it is one which is so easily studied that it constitutes perhaps the simplest indication of the general dairy qualities of any individual animal.

The great value of Guenon's system depends on the fact that in calves which, either by the texture of their hides nor the conformation of their bodies, nor, indeed, by any of the general marks on which we depend in the selection of dairy animals, give any indication of their future tmilking qualities, it is possible, by a sole dependence on the character of the Escut. cheon to predict with considerable certainty their future usefulness for the dairy. Of course, owing to the slight development of the udder, the Escutcheon is always very much smaller even in proportion to the size of the animal, than in the milch cow; yet the different proportions that the escutcheons of two calves bear to their size are an excellent general indication of their future usefulness; and any farmer who will carefully study this pecu larity of his animals during the various stages of their growth, with the assistance of the plates laid down in Guenon's book (also to be found in Mr. Flint's work), will arrive at a tolerably accurate means of judging of the value of full-grown animals that it is contemplated to purchase, and of the calves that his own herd produces."

Those who have had experience in the care of cows need no hints from us as to the character of food which influences the

quantity as well as the quality of milk, and the effect certain weeds and plants growing in pastures have upon the butter product. Wild onions are well known to flavor the butter made from the milk of cows which graze where that plant grows; and the butter product of the Township of Osgood, Ontario, suffers from some such plant in a most remarkable manner at certain seasons. But it is during and after the milking process that the great differences are to be found. Those who have watched "the pretty girl milking her cow" cannot have failed to observe that the scrupulous cleanliness, which is the chief desideratum throughout the process of butter making, is already neglected at the very outset. The hands are not always free from sweat, and sufficient care is not taken to see that the teats are free from the dust which is raised by the hoofs along the cowpath. The first jet of milk is used to moisten the teats, and shortly after a grimy mixture of milk, sweat and dust is finding its way into the pail, contaminating the pure yield and laying the foundation for butter which will bring only 10 cents to 12 cents a pound, and no demand at that, until it finally fetches up in a glutted market whence the only hope for it is in the hands of the baker or the soap or axlegrease manufacturer. The remedy for this need scarcely be mentioned. The teats of the cow as well as the hands of the milker should be carefully washed in pure water at the outset and at intervals as often as necessary during the milking

In the setting of the milk, the shape and size of the vessels, the separation of the cream, the churning, the washing and the packing, there are many theories as to the best means. We should naturally look for the best plan from those who get the highest price for their butter. Danish butter sells in the London market at 3s.-6d. to 4s. sterling, equal to 85c. to \$1 per lb. The Danes learnt the process from their neighbors, the Holsteiners, a few years ago, and soon excelled their teachers.

ADULTERATION OF FOOD [2].

The circumstances referred to in our article under this heading last week has led to the imposition of a fine of \$100 upon the wholesale grocer who refused to hand over his goods to this modern Giafer, who could show no semblance of authority for his demand. We rejoice to learn that the merchant has already taken steps to appeal the matter, as it must result in the quashing of the conviction and should lead to a reprimand or dismissal of the

officer who is responsible for such a high handed proceeding. The very fact that the collector informed us, that in future his janizaries should go armed with a written order, was sufficient admission that his mode of procedure was not the less.

No merchant will deny that there are considerable quantities of colored, "faced," and lie teas brought into Canada from the United States, to which market we are now limited for our "cheap breakfast table," so far as tea is concerned. We doubt whether the "honest farmer" will relish the new found article as well as he did that of old, when ships laden with tea came direct to Halifax St. John, Quebec and Montreal from the country of growth, giving our people the worth of their money, and saving considerable of the latter from the doctors, who find their best friend in the fiscal policy of the government, in this respect- We have no wish to destroy the generally robust appetites of our agricultural friends; they need no warning at our hands; any person may observe this in the gradually diminishing consumption of tea, especially in Ontario, and those who are in favor of anti-liquor legislation may satisfy themselves that where there is a lessening demand for the "cup that cheers but not inebriates" there is sure to be an increase in the consumption of that which does.

It is worthy of remark that in the blue book under review nearly all of the whole. sale grocers of Toronto have been called upon for samples of tea, while in Montreal hitherto the attention of the officers has been directed principally to a few obscure dealers. Three out of eleven specimens obtained in Toronto were " faced with Prussian Blue," the others were genuine. Eighteen samples were examined in Montreal, the majority of which were genuine, pure teas of various qualities. A few were faced with gypsum and Prussian blue." W. R. Shroud " (sic) furnished three samples as follows:-(1) "Genuine Japan tea of low quality, but not adulterated." (2) "Damaged ten mixed with 20 per cent. exhausted tea leaves." "(3) A low description of Ping Sueys tea, highly faced with Prussian blue and gypsum, and mixed with leaves of camelia and chloranthus to the extent of 15 per cent." "I consider," says the analyst, " this tea adulterated and unfit for human consumption, and that it has been importcd in this state." The italics are ours. Of all the fourteen samples furnished in Quebec the analyst remarks, "not adulterated." Of the fifteen samples examined in Halfax, two showed a slight admix-

ture of foreign leaves, and one sample an admixture of "spent leaves."

It was stated in a highly respectable journal as long ago as 1855 that there was no such thing as pure green tea to be met with in England. It is adulterated in China. The pure green tea made from the most delicate green leaves grown upon manured soil, such as the Celestials use themselves, is, it is true, wholly unpainted; its beautiful bluish bloom, like that of a grape, is given by the third process of roasting which it undergoes. The enormous demand for green tea has led the Hong-Kong merchants to imitate this peculiar colour, and so well as to deceive ordinary judges of the article.

TORONTO NOTES.

The celebrated railway troubles in the Province of Quebec have no counterpart in Ontariobut the railway idea here is worth observing, The earliest gushing tones of the promoters of a new line or branch dwell on the immense advantages it will be to the farming communities through whose country the road will run. It has all been planned with a view to develop the resources, and facilitate the transportation of produce of the district, and the rural municipalities are bidden to be grateful for the aid extended by the cities in assisting this development. But this theory gets strained beyond all rational explanation sometimes. We had the Northern Railway and the Toronto, Grey and Bruce Railway running from Toronto to the north and north-west as far as the limits of civilization. The Hamilton people desired to develop still farther, and have run a line from this city, away round our north-west, till it strikes Barrie. This Hamilton and North Western Railway intersects the Great Western, Credit Valley, the Grand Trunk, the Toronto Grey and Bruce, and finally enters Barrie, the great northern stronghold of the Northern Ruilway. It was at first considered that the Hamilton merchants had achieved a success for the extension of trade coming to their city. However, Toronto men were not resigned sufferers. The Hamilton road crosses the Grand Trunk at Georgetown, and it has occurred that a great portion of the produce and passengers brought down from the Barrie direction by the Hamilton road is transferred to the Grand Trunk at the Georgetown junction, and reach Toronto by that route. It has come to be pretty generally entertained by all the people who are not engaged in trade that railways are now operated for the first advantage of commercial men, and there is a widespread suspicion among the municipal ratepayers, in cities as well as in the rural municipalities, that the benefit to be derived from railway interprise, as it is called, is only a partial benefit, and that falls to the minority of the assessed. Speaking of the diversion of trade which it was feared would be caused by this Hamilton and North Western road, Toronto has certainly not suffered anything; but the Northern and Toronto, Grey and Bruce Railways have lost a large amount of freight which the Grand Trunk has gained.

There is some force in the system of centralizing business, even in a city situated as Toronto is. It saves time and travelling expenses. when a buver can find his market for dealing within a radius of four blocks. But if the buyer can find as good a market within twentyfive miles to-day as could only be reached a few years ago by going fifty miles, then the remote market will be deserted. The railroad is the great decentralizer, with inland towns and cities. With lighter municipal burdens and lighter expenses, the cities of St. Catharines. Hamilton, London, and Stratford may compete successfully for the trade of their districts with the city of Toronto. It is a mere question of time when the tradition of Toronto being the commercial capital of the West will be weakened, and the West will have half a dozen districts with as many cities. One of the speakers at a meeting of the Property Owners' Association, the other night, stumbled on this idea, but approached it from an entirely different direction. He was denouncing the practice of the city in granting bonuses to railroads running out of Toronto, which had been the means of building up a dozen towns and numberless villages that were nourishing business and manufactures and industrious populations that should have been all gathered within our own limits. The situation and advantages of a sea-port are unchangeably different, and it is a grain of relief to our wholesale merchants to know that, in their competition with the traders of Montreal. they are contending not only against immense capital and men of judgment and experience, but against the peculiarly difficult navigation of the St. Lawrence River between Montreal and the foot of Lake Ontario. George Laidlaw, in an appeal to the city for a bonus of \$250,000 for the Credit Valley Railway (which he got), made the bold statement that the grand mistake in building the Grand Trunk was in having it taken one single mile east of Toronto. And it would seem that it was a grand mistake of Nature, still in the interests of Toronto, that the St. Lawrence had not a uniform depth, to the mitre sill, of fourteen feet, right up to the Thousand Islands.

The observation that the wholesale trade is dull at present has no peculiar significance in this connection; but the observation is made occasionally that there are plenty of premises vacant when any one may desire to embark in the wholesale line.

I think it is safe to say that underwriting is not profitable this season. Inland Marine Insurance has been reduced \(\frac{1}{2}\) per cent. Since the opening of navigation, that is on hulls, and there has also been made a reduction of 33\(\frac{1}{2}\) on carroes off last year's rates.

There is unmistakable leisure in business houses at present, but every trader is somewhat sustained by an opinion that got currency that the foundations of trade are firmer than they have been for years past. It is probable that any one of our merchants could give satisfactory proofs in support of this opinion which, it is still to be asserted, is largely made up of aspiration, outside of good argument. The country trade is not brisk vet, and the volume of business will not be probably any greater than it was last year. Farmers are not yet over the hurt of previous years of short produce from their fields. and people in cities and villages are not suddenly so much better that their outlay this year will be sensibly more than during the past. And all over the western part of this Province. the promise of another abundant harvest is a guarantee that merchants will be able to collect the values of their goods sent to the country. There has been an extra area of grain sown this spring, and the growth of all the crops is amazing. Vegetation is fully one month farther advanced than it was last year at this time, and farmers are speculating whether such an untimely maturity will not be marred by some unlooked for occurrence. If the harvest arrive as much earlier as the seeding has been done, the new crops will be on the market before the old crops has been nearly cleared out of thebarns and storehouses.

There was just a ripple of excitement here over the decline of Ontario stock. And the decline that did take place was not really demanded by the event, or a greater decline was demanded. It is not easy to account for the degree of surprise that followed the announcement that the half-yearly dividend was not greater than it turned out to be; and perhaps the feeling was more simulated than real. An exact knowledge of the interior affairs of such an institution is, even in the interests of those who dabble in stocks, wisely withheld. The managers of these concerns "move in a mysterious way" that satisfy all the requirements for speculations in stock jobbing, and give to transactions just that colour of uncertainty and hope of gainwhich constitute the charm of the Stock Exchange. This subject leads to the observation that the Corn Exchange here has suffered no abatement in the state of unrest that arises from waiting for events over which we have no from waiting for events over which we have no control. For many weeks the variations have been within a range of not over five or six cents, but the probabilities being so much greater the situation has rendered operators exceedingly nervous. If prices were going up it would bring into the market a large quantity of grain which, with a dull market and receding prices, will lie on the books for months to come, paying it therest and suffering depreciation, and ing interest and suffering depreciation, and clogging the wheels of trade.

MONTREAL GENERAL MARKETS.

There is comparatively little change to note in the general tone of business this week. The wharves are beginning to be crowded with shipping, and forwarders have all they can do. The wholesale dry goods people report a good number of sorting up orders coming in from travellers. Notwithstanding the coel weather of the past week, the retail trade has been good. Remittances have slacked off a little. The money market is unchanged.

Money receipts have slowed off slightly so far this week, comparing them with the several past dates of review.

As the market is glutted the make is to be reduced one-third for three months from the 29th April, such reductions to be based upon the maximum make of 450 boxes for each steam mill, and 350 for each water mill. A public accountant is to be appointed to see that this is done, and a deed is to be drawn up, binding each firm faithfully to conform to and carry out the arrangement, under a penalty of £500. There are 218 mills in the trade, and the consent of three-fourths is necessary to make the agreement binding.

LIVE STOCK. - The arrivals of live stock by rail at Point St. Charles were unusually large last week, being 73 carloads of cattle, 8 carloads (823) Chicago hogs; one carload of

Canadian hogs and three carloads mixed cattle and hogs; 100 sheep and a mixed load of cuttle and sheep. Besides the above there were about 300 calves brought to the city by rail. Twenty-nine carloads of the above cattle were for shipment to Britain and about five carloads which were sold on this market were bought to send to the British market. All the Chiengo hogs, except one carlond, belonged to city butchers. On Monday the market was crowded with cattle, yet prices of good animals have not declined to any extent; third class cattle are in larger supply and rather lower in price. The range of prices at this market was from 33c. to 5c. per 1b; a few were bought for the British 5c. per lb; a few were bought for the British market at rather higher rates. At the Viger Market there has been a good attendance, Milch cows were again plentiful, but none of them of extra quality. Good a simals were sold at from \$30 to \$32 ench; common ones brought from \$30 to \$36. Calves were in fair supply with a rather better demand. The general price was from \$2.50 to \$3.40 ench. Extra good ones brought \$6. Sheep sold from \$5.50 to \$9 ench, lambs from \$3 to \$4. A good many half-fatted steers and dry cows are being brought to market at present, that would be more profitable to their owners if put on good grass for a couple of months, as there are plenty of fat cattle to bring to market, at present, and it is not likely that the prices of good cattle will be less two months hence, than good cattle will be less two months hence, than they are at present. Shipments to England conthey are at present. Supponents to England continue brisk. A Belleville firm have just shipped 18 cattle, 280 sheep and 200 hogs and they send to-morrow a further shipment of 165 cattle and 600 hogs, 100 fine head of cattle are to be shipped in a few days by Messrs. Geo. Walker and Thos. Shipley, of North Middlesex. One day last week 2,000 head of cattle passed over the Creat Wastern Bailways bound. the Great Western Railway, bound for Great Britain. Lingham & Son shipped 185 cattle, 200 hogs and 280 sheep for England, and will ship next Saturday 600 hogs and 165 head of cattle. Lumber.—The Timber Trades Journal of 27th

ult, commenting on the English timber market, says,—Trade during the last fortnight has been almost at a standstill. The strike in Lancashire and the holidays, with fresh war rumours, have reduced commercial speculations to almost a nullity, and few transactions other than on the most limited scale have been negotiated since our last issue. Activity in war material has, of course, known no cessation; prepara-tions for transport of goods, men and horses to the east are being rapidly completed, but in general, trade affairs that are not affected by the Government bustle have been going on very indifferently, and we wish we could speak hopefully of the immediate future now that the time for the early spring arrivals is so close upon us; but it is no use ignoring the fact, which is brought prominently before us in the returns furnished by the Dock Companies, that there is a very large surplus stock of wood goods of all sorts on hand at the present time goods of all sorts on hand at the present time in London, much more in proportion than past years exhibited. Of course as time rolls on and the wants of the community enlarge the importations like the growth of the peoples increase pro ratio, but in ordinary times, when trade is flowing on in a genial sort of a way, half, if not two-thirds, of the stocks now on hand would have gone into circulation and thus have cleared the way for the fresh goods now so nearly due." The question of disposing of sawdust is again attracting attention among Ottawa lumberers. A Government officer has been inquiring into the matter, and recommends been inquiring into the matter, and recommends been inquiring into the matter, and recommends the erection of furnaces for burning it. Oils .- We have no change to note since our last report. The first cargo of new S. R. Seal is in port. We have not heard of any other lots on the way just yet, but presume some further shipments will be made. There is not much change, if any, anticipated in price. Other oils dull and unchanged. Naval Stares in fair demand, with rather lower prices for Turpentine.

Paints are in good demand.

Provisions .- Butter .- The market is quiet, and the business passing has been principally for local account; supplies being abundant and demand not at all brisk. Prices may be quoted at 13c to 16c for good to finest, and there is not likely to be any advance for the present. Old stock is difficult to sell, and moves very slowly at from 5c to 7c. The New York Bulletin of the 15th says:—On fine butter the tone of the market continues pretty firm, and former rates are sustained without much difficulty. The reccipts of State dairy have continued small and sold up pretty closely, and failing to obtain enough, half firkins buyers have through necessity gone into the creamery, of which the sales are larger. On prices, however, there does not appear to be any change, and indeed sellers claim nothing better on invoices, though an occasional single package selection has brought a little more. Of firkins we see very few around and the great of the package selection has brought a little more. a little more. Of firking we see very rewaroning and they are still wanted, with evidences that they will command about as much as anything else. Western dairy packed of fine quality and natural color sells very well at about quotations, natural color sells very well at about quotations, and some of the ladle-worked finds favor, with 1-le obtained for the best, but the milled stock seems to be pretty badly demoralized, and dealers say it can hardly be quoted low enough. About 12c is top rate, and this is not easily realized. From shippers there is no direct demand, but there is an impression that they are leading for a faw bundred packages of creamany. looking for a few hundred packages of creamery. At the close we hear of a sale of a car load of fresh Western factory worked from pier at 121c for export. Cheese,—Most of the April Cheese has been bought up for export at from 10c to 103c; but buyers are now holding off and do not seem inclined to operate further unless at some reduction in prices, and there will not likely be much done for a week or two, or until holders are willing to accept a price that will leave margin sufficient to induce shippers to operate to any extent. The state of the New York market is thus indexed by the Bulletin:-We make quite a sweeping reduction on quotations to-day, but the change appears to be fully warranted by the condition of the market, the tone of which is quite demoralized. Receipts were heavy for this portion of the week, and while a fair number of invoices have been sold. shippers were very particular to confine themselves to actual orders, and have been extremely fastidious over quality. On the closest selection, however, we learn of nothing exceeding 102c, and good full cream stock with only slight imperfections would not command above 10 to 104. Exporters' movements are somewhat trammelled by difficulty with workmen engaged in scaleboarding, &c.; but while this makes busi-ness a little slow, the weakness on value appears to come from independent causes. Some very good Ohio flat cheese are here, but more than the market requires, and 9½c is about all that can be obtained. For medium and common grades of cheese, the position is altogether too uncertain for positive quotations." At the Ingersoil cheese market Tuesday nineteen factories offered 4,236 boxes, all first half of May make.
