Mr. Owen, who was a graduate of Toronto University, was a man of great promise and a successful clergyman. 



Williams, another gentleman who cleaned up a fortune in the same bolanza; Forster & Wakefield, a prominent firm of attorneys, and other local gentlemen in the Gray Eagle mine, situated about five miles from the Deer Trail, in the same camp. 


