

Spring Wheat This Year Than Last in U. S. Washington, June 10.-Freiminary reports of the spring wheat acreage indicate a reduction of about 1,200,000 acres or 6.4 per cent. Of the 20 States reporting 10,000 acres or upwards in spring wheat,



(2) A majority of the electors in a polling sub-division having the right to prevent the renewal of a license in their sub-division at the end of any license year.

(3) Persons to whom liquor has been sold unlawfully ought not to be punished, as the present liability interferes seriously with law enforcement. (4) There ought to be a change in the law, which now makes a tavern license that has been makes a tavern license that has been issued unlawfully as valid and effective as if legally granted. (5) Inspectors and magistrates ought not to have unlimited power to keep on imposing only first-offence penalties upon offenders who have many times been convicted of law-breaking. (6) Provision ought to be made to prevent the continued renewal of licenses to persons who have been repeatedly con-victed of violating the law. (7) That Methodists use their powers in an en-Legislature such men as will favor a pro-hibitory law. 


