CONSECRATED ALTAR STONES.

Interesting Ceremony Performed in St. Michael's Cathedral.

An interesting ceremony took place in St. Michael's Cathedral on Thursday morning, when Archibshop O'Connor, assisted by a number of the church dignitaries, consecrated 26 altar stones. The ceremony lasted for nearly five hours and was carried on in the Latin language. A prayer was first read over the stones, followed by a sprinkling of holy water. This was followed by the anointing of them with oils and sealing up the relies. Then one of the stones was laid aside to be given to new churches and older churches that erect side altars.


