CLEVELAND, Ohio, May 19.-Rioting became more general and serious in the street railway strike late to-day. The first death, while not a part of the strike, but incident to it, occurred when Yetta Wolkinski, 4 years of age, was run over by a car operated by an quickly gathered and would have lynched the motorman had he not turned on full speed and escaped.

Kindergarten Workers Needed

"Wealthy women are everywhere seeking well educated, refined young women to give them intelligent assist-ince in bringing up their children, thereby supplanting the ignorant nurse maid," says Miss Mattison of the New York Women's Christian Association. "Educational agencies have long lists this of applications for teachers of this description, and the regular kindergar ten training schools are appealed to ten training schools are appealed to continually, but always unsuccessful-ly, for pupils who are willing to take such resident employment. The chief objection to a resident employment in the minds of most young girls is that it deprives them of the free evenings. Still there is the compensation of a good home, with practically no ex-

"While the girl who works in an office must often spend the greater part of her salary for board, the \$40 month which a resident kindergartener can command is almost all clear profit. Last week I even heard of two positions, in each of which \$60 was the

salary offered. "Even for dress the expenses of a nursery kindergartener would be small. She would need a really good suit or two in which to take the children out. For the house, when the profession is better established and known, I hope to establish a uniform for women holding our certificates of training, on the order of a trained uniform, which will be respected and carry dignity with it

wherever it is worn. "One term of four months entitles a student to a certificate as kindergartener in private families, while after the full course of eight months she to apply for work as assistant kinder-gartener iin secondary schools if she

"Kindergarten ideals, methods and work, form the chief study of the course, two afternoons a week being devoted to practice. One afternoon the class takes charge of one of the children's clubs, which meet at the association building, conducting it on the order of a regular kindergarten; with games, plays, songs and story telling. games, plays, songs and story telling.
"Another class session is devoted to

### Cellar Hole and the The **Sewer Hole**

By HERBERT KAUFMAN.

A coal cart stopped before an office building in Washington and the driver dismounted, removed the cover from a manhole, ran out his chute, and proceeded to empty the load. An old negro strolled over and stood watching him. Suddenly the black man glanced down and immediately burst into a fit of uncontrollable laughter, which continued for several minutes. The cart driver looked at him in amusement. "Say, uncle," he asked, "do you always laugh when you see coal going into a cellar?" The negro sputtered around for a few moments and then, holding his hands to his aching sides, managed to say, "No, sah, but I jest busts when I sees it goin' down a sewer."

The advertiser who displays lack of judgment in selecting the newspapers which carry his copy often confuses the sewer and the cellar.

All the money that is put into newspapers isn't taken out again by any means. The fact that all dailies possess a certain physical likeness deesn't by any means signify a similarity in character, and it's character in a newspaper that brings returns. The editor who conducts a journalistic sewer finds a different class of readers than the publisher who respects himself enough to respect his readers.

What goes into a newspaper largely determines the class of homes into which the newspaper goes. An irresponsible, scandal-mongering, muck-raking sheet is logically not supported by the buying classes of people. It may be perused by thousands of readers, but such readers are seldom purchasers of advertised goods.

It's the clean-cut, steady, normal-minded citizens who form the bone and sinew and muscle of the community. It's the sane, self-respecting, dependable newspaper that enters their homes, and it's the home sale that indicates the strength of an advertising medium.

No clean-minded father of a family wishes to have his wife and children brought in contact with the most maudlin and banal phases of life. He defends them from the sensational editor and the unpleasant advertiser. He subscribes to a newspaper which he does not fear to leave about the house.

Therefore, the respectable newspaper can always be counted upon to produce more sales than one which may even own a larger circulation but whose distribution is in ten editions among unprofitable citizens.

You can no more expect to sell goods to people who haven't money than you can hope to pluck oysters from bushes.

It isn't the number of readers reached but the number of readers whose purses can be reached that constitutes the value of circulation. It's one thing to arouse their attention, but it's a far different thing to get their money. The mind may be willing, but the pocketbook is weak.

If you had the choice of a thousand acres of desert land or a hundred acres of oasis, you'd select the fertile spot, realizing that the larger tract had less value because it would be less productive.

Just so the advertiser who really understands how he is spending his money does not measure by bulk alone. He counts productivity first. He takes care that he is not putting his money into a sewer.



# AT EVERY FLAG STATION

General Manager Appears Before Commission in Opposition to Winnipeg Shippers' Request

D. McNicholl, general manager of the Canadian Pacific Railway, was a witness before the Dominion Railway Commission yesterday. He addressed the commission in regard to the application of the Winnipeg Jobbers' and Shippers' Associations that facilities be provided at all flag stations for unloading and taking care of passengers and freight. Mr. McNicholl objected to a general order.

Conditions varied, he said, at dif-

ferent points, and were an order is-sued along the lines of the application of the Winnipeg Association, it would necessitate the appointment of an agent for every flag station and an enormous expenditure. The company wished to accommodate the public, but to ask it to keep an agent at every station where only an occasional passenger alighted was unfair.
