The Pontiff on this occasion spoke in French for perhaps the first time in a private audience. He asked Lady Macdonald to sit next to him, saying her visit was an honor for him.

The Pope said he knew how fairly her late husband treated the Canadian Catholics and presented the baroness with a medal bearing the Pope's head on one side and his arms on the other side. Afterwards Baroness Macdonald visited the famous Borghese apartment, which she said was the most perfect representation it was possible to imagine of an apartment of the middle ages.

Three-cent fares
Cleveland Electric Railway Will Try a New Experiment.

Cleveland, Ohio, Dec. 30.—The Cleveland Electric Railway Company will experiment in three-cent fares for a distance of two miles from the center of the city on the lines of that road. The three-cent cars will run only the three-cent fare distance. The regular five-cent fare cars will go the regular distance. The experiment is the first of its kind in the country and is of special interest in street car circles. No transfer will be given for a three-cent fare. The trial is the outcome of recent local agitation over the settlement of the street car question in this city, and is for the purpose of demonstrating the practicability of three-cent fares.

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BROCKTON SHOWS ITS HEART GOODERHAM'S FINAL RALLY

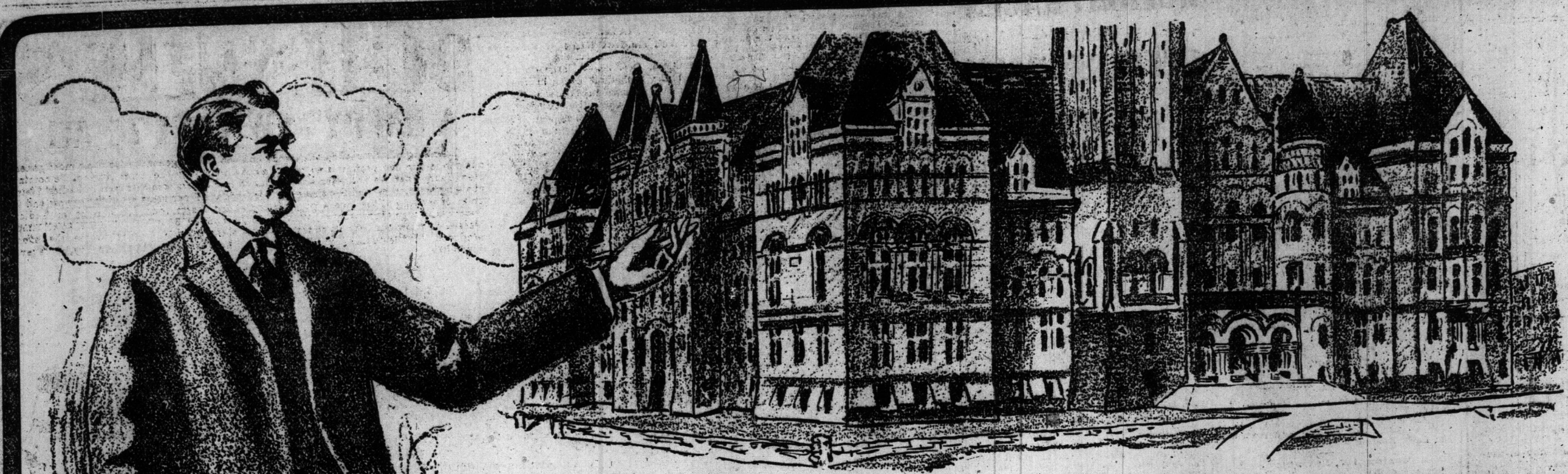

Electors of Toronto :-

Those who oppose my Election as Mayor of Toronto, have departed from the discussion of civic questions in favor of an appeal to your prejudice, instead of to your reason. You are urged to defeat me on account of my alleged campaign expenditure. It is true that I have opened committee rooms in every ward of the city. It is even true that I have put telephones in them. It is equally true that I have endeavored to bring myself to the notice of every individual voter by a personally addressed letter.

It is true that I have used more newspaper space than is usual in election campaigns in order to place my views before the people. In doing so I have simply applied to this election the same principles of business enterprise as I will, if elected, apply to the business of the city. But it is also true that I have done this at my sole personal expense, and not by means of party funds or the subscriptions of corporations which might afterwards demand favors in return.

The Mayoralty of Toronto is neither a "toy" nor a preserve for one class of men, but the heritage of any citizen who can secure the honest endorsement of his fellow electors. My personal interests are identical with those of every rate payer of Toronto in the securing of lower taxes, better service, and in determined opposition to corporate aggression.

If I am elected Mayor of this city, I will administer its affairs with economy and prudence, and will do my utmost to promote those uncompleted civic enterprises which are so absolutely necessary to the health, safety and prosperity of our citizens.

MUNICIPAL CAMPAIGN

Despite all the instructions that have been given, it is expected that there will be considerable confusion over the cumulative ballot. Many electors fail to understand that this system applies only to the candidate for the boards of control and education, and that they have votes for as many candidates as are to be elected.

Each elector may vote as follows: For mayor, once, for one candidate only; for aldermen, once only for one, two or three candidates; for controllers, once for each of four candidates, once for each of two candidates, once for each of two and twice for another, once for one and three times for another, or four times for the same candidate.

For the board of education, each elector may cast six votes, but he must not give more than three to one candidate. He may vote three times for each of two men, twice for each of three, once for one, twice for another, and three times for a third, once for each of four and three times for another, or once for each of six men. Of course it is not necessary to cast a plumper for his favorite in any class, but in order that he may not roll his vote, he must not make more than one cross on his municipal ballot, more than three on his aldermanic ballot, more than six on a board of education ballot, or more than four on a controller ballot. On the by-laws, of course, he simply makes a cross under the column marked "Yes" or "No," according to his opinion.

The retirement of Ald. Crane from the civic arena marks an event in the municipal life of Toronto. He has been so long one of the most highly respected and capable representatives of the city that his absence will be noted, perhaps, in a greater degree than that of any other member.

His colleague, Dr. Harrison, has also proved an able representative in the council. As chairman of the health board, his work has been largely due to his efforts. He also was chairman of the special committee on street numbering, the necessity for which is very evident. He devoted much time to it, and evolved a scheme which would be workable, and must be adopted, sooner or later. It was blocked by some aldermen, who thought what was good enough for a provincial town would do for a metropolis.

Ald. Jones has also been a hard worker in the council. His familiarity with the island made him a valued member of that committee, and he also did good work in the other committees. He contributed in no small degree to the progress that has been made in the fight against the Toronto Railway Company, and his project for a street railway across the York-street bridge to the wharves is one that the citizens would be highly pleased to see carried out. A loop will no doubt be formed there, when the Yonge-street bridge is built, but that that evanescent dream is realized, much relief would be accorded to

STREET RAILWAY INFLUENCE IS WORKING FOR URQUHART

Company Isn't Doing Any Visible Campaigning, But Employees Are "Given to Understand."

The position of the Toronto Railway Company in the present municipal contest has been a subject of much curious comment of late, but all endeavors to ascertain in what direction its efforts are directed have been futile. There are few men in the city with the reputation of being so wise as the manipulators of the secret service fund of the Mackenzie-Martin syndicate, and they are certainly no clever to show their hand at all openly. The recent accession to their political strength has not in any degree lessened the respect in which the combination is held as a factor in municipal affairs, and many local politicians do not hesitate to say that the new "machine" is already at work. The men in the service of the company on the cars say they have not been approached in any manner, but their desire to have a particular candidate supported, but some say that the influence is being worked from other sources.

A VOTER HAS

- One vote for Mayor.
- Four votes for Controllers.
- Three votes for Alderman in each Ward in which the voter is qualified to vote. Only one vote to be given to any candidate.
- Six votes for Members of the Board of Education.

A voter may distribute these votes among the candidates in any way desired, or may give them all to one candidate. Any ballot containing more than four votes will be rejected.

A voter may distribute these votes among the candidates in any way desired, provided that not more than three votes be given to any one candidate, and not more than six votes in all.

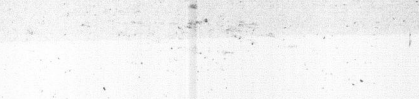

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WHEAT DRAWBACK NOT DECIDED. Matter Referred to Attorney General Moody, Who Will Be Busy Till Then.

Washington, Dec. 30.—Senator Hanborough called on Attorney-General Moody to-day to urge that the plea of the millers for a drawback on Canadian wheat be denied, the case having been referred to the attorney-general by Secretary Shaw for a legal opinion. The attorney-general informed the senator that he would be unable to decide the case until he had disposed of the arrangement in the Beer Trust case, in which he will appear before the supreme court on Jan. 3.

"I called the attention of the attorney-general to the fact that the law authorizing drawbacks provides that the imported materials shall be of the quality or measure thereof may be ascertained," said Senator Hanborough, "after his interview with Mr. Moody, I also called his attention to the fact that Attorney-General Olney had held that the materials must be of a certain quality. Later, Attorney-General Griggs reversed this decision, but his ruling was never passed by the courts."

"The ruling of Attorney-General Griggs referred to, which permitted drawbacks on Canadian wheat would mean that the entire crop of the Canadian North-west would be brought into competition with that of the American farmers. Our farmers would have to meet the competition of the Canadian wheat, which would supply to so large an extent that demand for feed would be increased. It is a very serious matter, and I assure the attorney-general that the farmers would be completely reversed if the purpose of Congress and the law were to be completely nullified. He promised to give my representations the most careful consideration when he came to decide the case."

STOCK MARKETS EASIER DECLINES ON WALL ST.

All Day Depression in New York Issues - Locals Irregular - Commerce Higher

The local stock market closed today for the year with a comparatively steady recovery. The week in New York was decidedly one of the most irregular in the history of the market. ROSS DESPAIRS OF RELIEF CAN'T LAST PAST DECEMBER

Capture of 203-Metre Hill by the Japs Means Fall of the Town.

Tokio, Dec. 30.—The navy department published tonight a letter written by a man on the battleship Sevastopol, which had fallen into the hands of the Japanese. The writer deplores the destruction wrought by Japanese shells. He says the Russians are resigned to their fate and are determined to fight to the finish rather than suffer the shame of surrender, owing to starvation. Following is the text of the letter:

WHAT JAPS GOT.
Tokio, Dec. 30.—(10.30 a.m.)—The headquarters of the army besieging Port Arthur telegraphed that on the night of Dec. 23, after the occupation of Rihlung fort, a small body of Russians still offered resistance in the passage between the siege gun line and the gorge. At 3 o'clock in the morning they were dislodged entirely and the occupation of the fort became secured. According to the statement of three prisoners, the trenches captured by the Japs include four large calibre guns, seven small calibre guns, thirty-seven machine guns, two machine guns and much property as yet unenumerated.

SOUTH OF SHANKE.
Shanghai, via Mukden, Dec. 30.—Russian artillery engaged in an action on Dec. 29, against the Japanese south of Shanke and near the railroad bridge, the firing continuing till 6 o'clock in the evening. The bombardment of the Japanese position was effective. The Japanese replied very slowly with sharp and shrimous shells and did very little damage.
