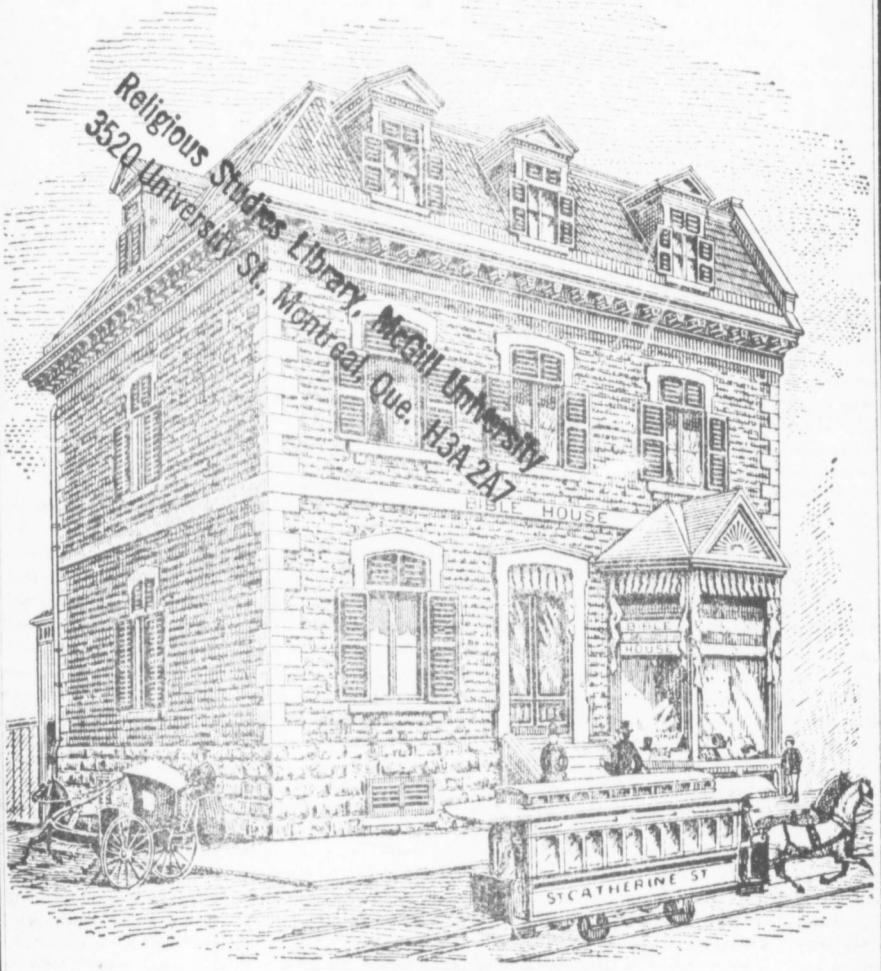

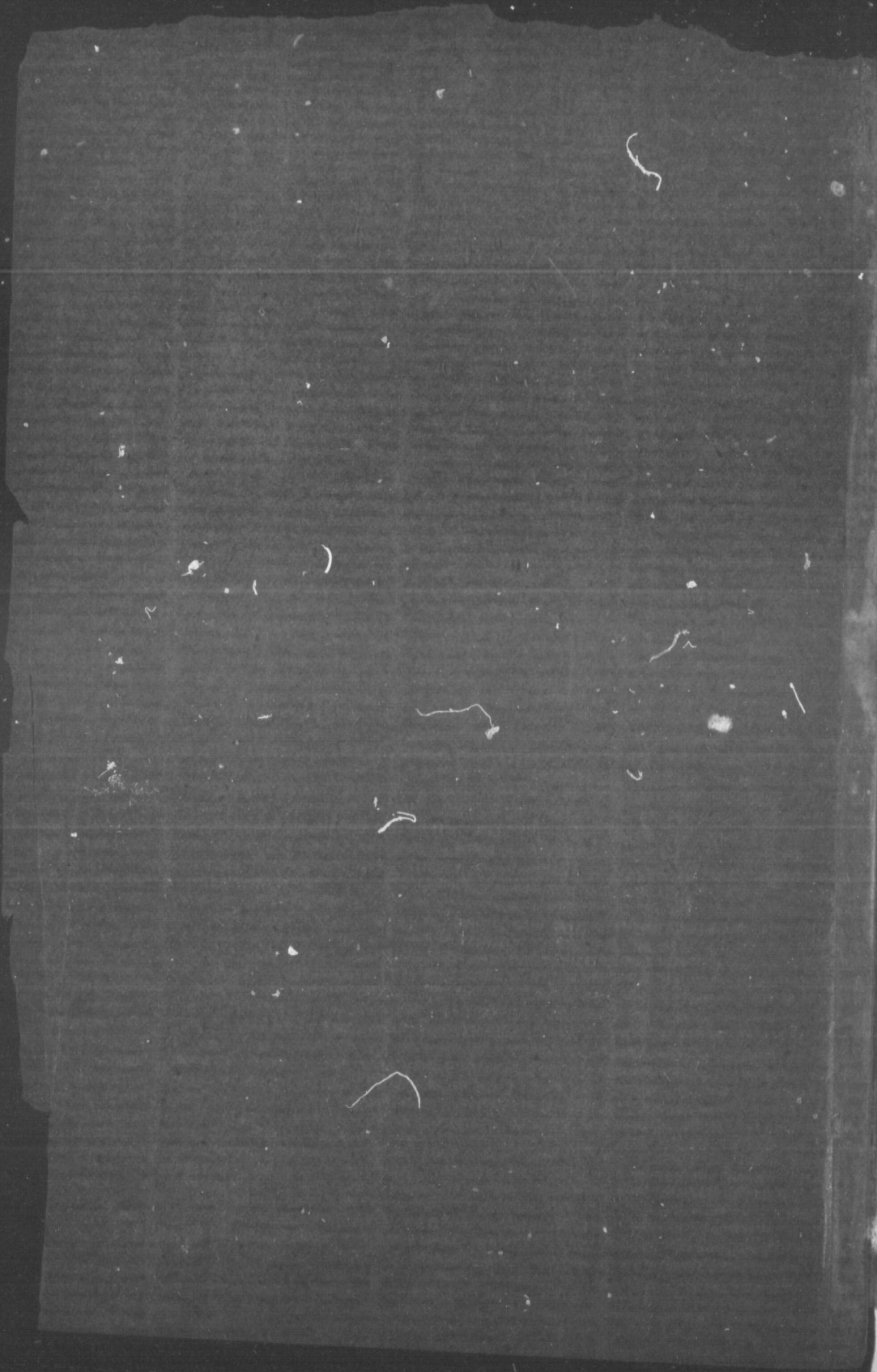

It is requested, when remittances are made, that it be specified whether the same are to be placed to Purchase Account, or are Free Contributions.

It is further particularly requested that Branches and Agencies will effect insurance on their stock. In many cases it may be made an item in the policy which the Depositary takes on his stock in trade; but where that cannot be done, if the stock of Bibles be of the value of \$100, special insurance must be effected.

## RULES AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

# Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society.

I. This Society shall be denominated THE MONTREAL AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY, the object of which shall be to co-operate with the BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY in promoting the distribution of the Holy Scriptures, both at home and abroad.

II. Conformably to the principles of the Parent Institution, the Bibles and Testaments circulated by this Society shall be without note or comment.

III. All persons subscribing two dollars or upwards, per annum, shall be members of this Society; or forty dollars at one time, shall be members for life.

IV. The business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, two Secretaries, and a Committee consisting of not less than twenty members, with power to add to their number. Five members of this Committee shall form a quorum.

V. No lay member of the Society shall be eligible as a member of the Committee, unless he is a Life-member, or pay an annual subscription of at least four dollars.

VI. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as shall have rendered essential services to the Society as Honorary Governors for life.

VII. The Committee shall meet once every month, or oftener, on some day to be fixed by themselves.

VIII. The whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Society, and not required for its own operations, shall from time to time be remitted to the Parent Society.

IX. For the purpose of giving full effect to the benevolent designs of the BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY, in their grants for the Scriptures for distribution among the poor, the Committee shall make it their business to inquire what families or individuals are in want of Bibles or Testaments; and it shall be the duty of the Committee to furnish them therewith at prime cost, reduced price, or gratis, according to their circumstances.

X. A general meeting of the Subscribers shall be held annually at Montreal, when the accounts shall be presented—the proceedings of the past year stated—a new Committee appointed—and a Report agreed upon to be printed under the direction of the Committee, and circulated among the members.

XI. No alterations shall be made in these Laws, except at a general meeting of the Society, called by special notice, to be advertised in two of the Montreal newspapers one month previously.

### FORM OF BEQUEST TO THE SOCIETY.

*I give and bequeath unto the Treasurer for the time being of the Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society, formed in Montreal in the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty, the sum of \_\_\_\_\_ to be paid with all convenient speed after my decease, and the receipt of the Treasurer for the time being of said Society shall be a sufficient and valid discharge of said legacy.*

REPORT FOR 1890.

The years come and go with institutions as with individual men ; **only**, in the case of the latter, after a certain limit has been reached there is loss of power and of resources for work. With the former, when they are based on right foundations and conducted with care and integrity, with the increase of years there comes larger power and experience for the work that remains. Notably has this been the case with the great Parent Society with which this Auxiliary is affiliated ; and so, too, let us hope, has it been with this Society, in some degree at least. Seventy years have passed away since it was organized, which is a long period in a young country. During this time this Society has seen great changes and progress in the political and material condition of the people among whom it lives and for whose benefit it labours. And it is matter for gratitude that it has seen progress in the moral and spiritual work it aims at doing, by the dissemination of the Word of God among the homes of the people throughout this Province. At the beginning of its history it stood forth single handed in this its noble work ; now, as we contemplate the numerous organizations, with their extensive operations, maintained by the several churches in our community, we can trace the growth of this work in the past and take courage for the time to come. And yet through the changing years the conditions amid which this work is prosecuted remain, in many essential particulars, unchanged and unchangeable : so that the boastful motto "Semper Eadem" is, in more than one sense, as applicable to these difficulties and obstacles as to the proud mother from whom they come. Hence, now as ever, the great need is for prayerful and patient perseverance in this well-doing, resting on the unfailing promise, "It shall not return unto me void."

The year of which a report has now to be presented has not been so conspicuous for its success as many of its predecessors. The permanent forces of hostility, on the one hand, have not been idle ; on the other, difficulties of a temporary character have been encountered, arising from unfavourable weather, short crops and low prices. The returns of the Branches are short some \$300, mostly in the Free Contributions ; whilst the receipts on account of Sales are only

some \$12 short as compared with last year. Some of the Branches, to guard against the threatened deficiency, put forth extra exertions and actually increased their contributions; but from the great majority there has been a shortage in returns, which in many instances has arisen from the fact, that owing to bad weather and other local causes the collections were not taken up at the proper times. Mr. Green reports further, that he has taken orders for about the same number of copies of Scriptures, and the number of the Branches remains the same as last year, and there have been no special changes. The cause is in a healthy state throughout the entire field; and with the return of better times we may look for increasing prosperity.

Your Committee have to report the death of the Rev. R. Lindsay, one of their regular attendants, and one who always took a warm interest in the work of the Society. A resolution of sympathy and condolence was sent to his widow and family, as an expression of his colleagues' appreciation of his character and work.

They also have to advert to another and more pleasing incident of the year, the celebration of the Jubilee of his Lordship Bishop Bond, than whom there is not a stancher friend of Bible-work among us, and who has taken an active interest therein, either in connection with this Society or elsewhere, throughout the long period of his public life. Your Committee took part in celebrating so auspicious an event by sending to his Lordship the following Resolution, of which a copy was also sent to the Committee of the Parent Society. It is the devout wish of all that a life so honoured for its usefulness and consistency may long be spared for larger labours and influence in the future.

"That we hereby record our gratitude to Almighty God for sparing the life of His Lordship Bishop Bond, for very many years past a member of this Committee, and one of the Vice-presidents of the Montreal Auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society; and for permitting him, in health and vigour, to see the jubilee of his ordination to the Christian Ministry. Further, in unison with thousands of all denominations in this community, we extend to him our cordial congratulations on his being permitted to witness the completion of half-a-century of faithful service in the cause of our common Master; and we gladly take this opportunity of placing on record

our profound esteem for him, both as a citizen and as a Christian minister, and our high appreciation of his valuable services as a warm and life long friend of the Bible Society."

The thanks of the Society are due to Messrs. Trenholme, Taylor & Buchan, for the remission of fees for professional services in connection with the purchase of the Bible House ; and also to Mr. D. T. Fraser for gratuitous auditing of the accounts.

The publication of the BIBLE REPORTER has been continued for another year, under the editorial care of Rev. John Nichols, which valuable service deserves grateful acknowledgment. Your Committee entertain the hope that the good effected by this publication, in the way of affording information and stimulus to our constituents, more than compensates for the expense and trouble involved therein.

The attention of your Committee has again been given to the important matter of the depreciation of stock lying in the depositories of the Branches, and they have received from the District Secretary a very careful and satisfactory report thereupon. Most of the depreciation arises from the varying styles of binding and external appearance, in order to greater attractiveness, that are so frequently resorted to by societies and publishers. Such stock when returned to headquarters is used for free grants, or sold at reduced rates, that the loss may be as small as possible.

The general statistics of the year do not present any special features, being much the same as in former years. Six Colporteurs have been employed for longer or shorter periods,—one for two months under the oversight of the Quebec Auxiliary ; of these, two have been English-speaking and four French. It is in this department of the Society's work that the greatest difficulties present themselves.

The Ladies' Bible Association have continued their operations during the year, of which the following general statement is presented by the president, Lady Dawson.

"The Bible Women's Mission, under the Committee of the Ladies' Association, has continued its useful work, and the reports given in at the monthly meetings have been gratifying, and even more encouraging than formerly, with reference to sales of Bibles and reading the Scriptures from house to house, as well as to other and incidental work.

Throughout the year, six Bible women have been employed,—one for the French population, another for the Hospital, and the others for the City Districts. The Parent Society has kindly continued to support the French Bible woman, who has proved herself eminently well qualified for the mission, and has found entrance to many houses, and sold a large number of Testaments and Portions. Another Bible woman is for the present sustained by special contributions collected privately by a devoted friend. This Bible woman works amongst the new manufacturing districts of Hochelaga and Maisonneuve, which were occupied over a year ago, and this proves to be a large and growing work. The ladies have received from the late Mrs. Papineau a legacy of \$200 for special use in the Hospital, to assist destitute patients with clothing, etc., on being dismissed. No Bible woman is at present employed among the German population, but the German lady so long connected with this mission continues successfully to carry on the Mothers' meetings, and visits in cases of sickness or other trouble."

The work of the Bible House has been conducted to the satisfaction of your Committee by Mr. Stacey, the general agent.

The total number of copies issued has been :—Bibles, 8941; Testaments, 6876; and Portions, 2342; total copies, 18,159, showing an increase of 339 Bibles, but a decrease of Portions on the previous year.

*The Gratuitous Distribution* for the year has been :—Bibles, 1366; Testaments, 824; Portions, 981; total copies, 3171; value, \$839.32.

The principal grants have been made to French missions; French institutes and schools; to mission-schools (English) in the city and country; Protestant Hospital for the Insane; Immigrants; General Hospital; Jail; Rescue Home; House of Refuge and Industrial Home; Protestant Infants Home; Hervey Institute; Fresh Air Home, Chambly; volunteers in camp; two embossed lettered volumes to a blind woman; and other grants through the agency of the Branches of this Auxiliary and by the colporteurs employed in the rural districts.

The abstract of the Treasurer's statement shows :—

*The Disbursements* amount to the sum of \$14,665.26: in which are included \$5853.50, paid for Scriptures; \$733.89, value of free grants of Scriptures; \$120, donation to the Quebec Auxiliary Bible Society; \$487.22, grant to the Parent Society; \$1809.75, paid for Colportage in French and English speaking districts; \$1055, paid Bible-women employed in the city of Montreal.

An abstract of the last Report of the Parent Society will be found in Appendix to this Report.

"The financial accounts show that the total of the Parent Society's income and outlay is, in both items, close on that of last year. But there was then a deficit of some thirteen thousand pounds, and there is a similar deficit now. There has also been an increase on the expenditure; but, considering the whole sum, it is very slight. The legacies are less than before by some five thousand pounds, but it is pleasant to know that the free contributions from auxiliaries are gradually but steadily rising. The home sales are less; but this is more than counterbalanced by a considerable increase of sales abroad.

"Looking broadly at the financial position, no one can be content with it: the Society's work has constantly moved forward, but the normal income has not equally advanced. Behind the Society's splendid opportunities and its achievements there must be a heart just as strong and generous as these are great, and a power which strides pace by pace alongside of the demands of the task. Until this equilibrium of powerful forces is attained, the friends of the Bible must not and they cannot rest.

"The ISSUES of the year have again been large—they rise to a total of over THREE MILLION SEVEN HUNDRED AND NINETY THOUSAND COPIES. This is an advance on those of last year by one hundred and fifteen thousand, and on those of ten years ago of a million of copies. The figures of recent years have been swollen by the special and temporary returns of the 'Penny Testament;' but when these are withdrawn, the normal issues show strong and rapid progress, and

give striking evidence of the immense and ever-widening tide of this river of the water of life.'

All which is respectfully submitted by your Committee.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SECRETARY FROM APRIL TO  
DECEMBER, 1890.

DEAR FRIENDS,

The summer roads were late in forming this season, but as soon as they were at all passable, I began my work of visitation. My first visit was to ST. LAMBERT on Sunday, May 10th. The Branch is not in good working order, somewhat disorganized by changes, but the Rev. W. From this point I crossed the St. Lawrence, and on the 28th attended the anniversary of the LYN Branch, held in the Methodist Church. James Cumming, Esq., in the chair. Rev. Mr. Wright and Rev. S. G. Phillips rendered able help. The gathering was good and the free contribution an average one. On the 29th, the Rev. WATERLOO, Oct. 6th.—The annual meeting was held in the Methodist Church,

CHATHAM, CUSHING is also doing well. The 30th annual meeting held in the Presbyterian Church, October 26, was a fine gathering. Rev. James Fraser with his usual ability conducted the meeting. The free contribution was an improvement on the past. This was the more gratifying, as some of the more prominent actors have left the place. J. B. Cushing, Esq., and family we especially and regretfully missed; but those who remained had worked the harder to keep up the standard of usefulness, and had been happily successful.

GREENVILLE, also, is flourishing. The 29th annual meeting, held in the Presbyterian Church, October 26, was large and pervaded by a good spirit. I had the assistance of the Rev. Mr. Robinson and Rev. Mr. Hamilton, and the secretary, Mr. Wilson, reported the best year's work this Branch ever made, as also did Dr. Prentiss, the depository.

On Sunday evening, 26th October, I had another meeting, 4 miles back of Grenville at the Baptist Church, where the congregation was good and full of interest. This is part of the Grenville branch and works with it.

VALLEYFIELD.—The meeting held in the Presbyterian Church on the 28th was the beginning of new life, I trust. The attendance was not large but fair, for a people whose time is so much occupied. Rev. J. A. Macfarlane and Rev. Thomas Bell laid the cause under much obligation by able and hearty support. The officers were reappointed and a new beginning made. From this point I crossed the St. Lawrence to visit those Branches in Ontario along the St. Lawrence from Cornwall to Brockville. We had some good meetings, and upon the whole it was really a prosperous time for the Society.

The report, the best ever made by the Society, was read by the secretary, J. P. Watson, Esq., who made mention of a large sale of Scriptures and \$158.00 free contributions. At *Moulinette* next night we had a good meeting, Mr. H. Hugh Thompson in the chair. Rev. Mr. Holmes was my assistant. Mr. E. O. Winters, the secretary, reported largely increased sales and improved free contributions. DICKINSON'S LANDING and WALES are also doing well. The sale of Bibles under the careful management of Mr. J. D. Calhoun reached nearly \$60, and the free contribution was greatly in advance. Rev. Mr. Cameron gave me good countenance and able assistance.

On Sunday, November 2, I met a good congregation at WOODLANDS, to whom I preached and gave some account of the Society's work; collection nearly \$6.00 to the funds of the FARRAN'S POINT and WOODLANDS Branch. In the afternoon Rev. Mr. Cameron drove me out to PLEASANT VALLEY, an out-station of his. We met a large congregation, who listened attentively to a statement of the Society's work, and gave a collection to its funds, and expressed a desire for a future visit. wet, darkness and mud all combined. The audience at Aultsville was small. I had good help from Rev. Mr. Crane and Rev. Mr. Cameron, but the work was far behind. John Croil, Esq., the secretary, had gone to his rest, and the work he had so ably done in former years had not devolved upon any one in particular, and hence the lack. Rev. Mr. Crane had assumed it at the eleventh hour, and to him we owe it that it was not neglected altogether.

Our late secretary we shall miss for all coming time. He was kind, gentle and active and a good friend of the cause, and we mourn his loss with a sorrow that will be as long as it is deeply and keenly felt.

PRESCOTT.—The 51st annual meeting was held in the Methodist Church, November 3rd, Andrew Greenhill, Esq., the able president, in the chair, and we had able help from Rev. Mr. Stewart and Rev. Mr. Reynolds. The report of the secretary, G. E. Johnston, Esq., showed the Branch entering upon its second half century of work with much spirit and vigor. The audience was good, and the able, well-trained choir as usual gave both pleasure and spirit to the occasion by some judicious selections nicely executed. Both sales and free contributions in advance, the former nearly double. BROCKVILLE.—The 57th annual meeting was held in the Methodist Church, November 4th, Justice Macdonald in the chair. Speakers, Rev. Mr. Mackenzie, Rev. M. Cairns and your district secretary, Rev. Mr. Elmsley and Rev. W. Chatham also took part, and Rev. A. McGillivray led the devotions. Both sales and free contributions were in advance. W. A. Schofield, Esq., whose name first appears in the report of 1865 as secretary, resigned having moved to Morrisburg, and suitable resolutions were passed by the meeting, expressive of appreciation of twenty-five years of faithful and able service, and regret at the loss of such, by his resignation. Thomas Patterson, Esq., was appointed in his place. EDWARDSBURG is moving ahead. Now for several years past it has reported creditable improvements in finances, and this year best of all, thanks to the faithfulness and zeal of the officers and collectors, and thanks also to the friendly countenance and help of the ministers. The annual meeting, held in the Methodist Church on the 5th, was well attended, James Thompson, Esq., the president, in the chair. Rev. Mr. MacArthur and Rev. Mr. Humphrey gave able help and cheerful countenance. Finances in advance; both sales and free contributions improved. The 6th of November being Thanksgiving day, from this point I had to return home.

ST. LAURENT and COTE DES NEIGES are doing well. The day of the annual meeting was unfavorable, and the gathering was small, but the lady collectors and officers had been active, and the free contribution was in advance. The Rev. Mr. Cromby gave me hearty and able help. COTE ST. PAUL the same evening, the 9th November, had also a small meeting, and the contribution was not quite up to the past, but better promises for the future. The EAST END Branch held its annual meeting in the Methodist Church on the evening of the 11th, Rev. A. McCann in the chair. Rev. Thos. Bennett took an active and efficient part. The collections were not all in, but those districts reported were quite in advance of the past. ST. LAMBERT, on the 17th, had a most unfavorable evening, and the meeting was

small and not much done. On the 19th I returned to the West to fill engagements with the Branches at Iroquois and Morrisburg which had been postponed. At IROQUOIS, the meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, T. S. Edwards, Esq., in the chair. Rev. Mr. MacAlister and Rev. Mr. Sparling gave good and hearty assistance. Mr. A. W. Short, the secretary, as usual read a full report, lamenting that the contribution was short of the past. At MORRISBURG, the meeting was in the Methodist Church, S. S. Cook, Esq., in the chair. The ministers helping were the Rev. Mr. Mavety and Rev. Mr. Genzmer, who did good service to the cause. The secretary and treasurer, Mr. Kilgour and Mr. Meikle, made a report of their respective offices, from which it appeared that the work was in a healthy and prosperous state. On the 22nd I returned to GRANBY, where I spent Sunday the 23rd, preaching in the morning in the Methodist, and in the afternoon in the Congregational Church, and in the evening we had a reunion meeting. All the gatherings were good. Rev. Mr. Hindly and Rev. Mr. Taylor both lent good countenance and gave able assistance. The lady collectors had done their part nobly, and the secretary, Mr. Horner, reported a good year's work. On the 25th I returned to RICHMOND, but was again most unfortunate in the day. Wet and gloomy, and the roads in a bad state, and the meeting was small. R. McKenzie, the president, was in the chair. Rev. J. MacLeod and Rev. W. W. Ryan gave all needful help, hearty and able. The work of collecting was not complete, but there were evidences of a reviving cause. ST. JOHNS on the 26th had a fairly good annual meeting in the Methodist Church. R. C. Montgomery, Esq., in the chair, ably and heartily assisted by the Rev. Mr. Reneaud, Rev. B. Lewis and Rev. Mr. Reandean. The report of the year's work was that of a full average of past years. On the 27th I tried for a meeting at COTE ST. ANTOINE, but it was at a time of surfeit of meetings, and the people of one congregation were much preoccupied with changes then taking place. However, the Rev. J. MacGilvray had started some young ladies in the work, and contributions will be reported in due time, and we are looking for a future day more favorable for a meeting.

#### CONCLUSION.

In bringing my report to a conclusion, not much remains to be said but to give a brief summary and offer a few suggestions for future improvement.

The summary is soon made, as I have reported fully from month to month as the time sped on. For a beginning I may premise that it has been the hardest and most difficult year of my experience. The weather has been bad and exceptionably unfavorable throughout, and this has been very seriously against the work. In the winter months at the beginning of the year the weather was so unsettled and so unlike our usual winters, that all parties were in a state of perplexity, and knew not what to do from day to day. All through the winter we were changing from wheels to runners, and back again from runners to wheels

every few days. This state of things, besides the perplexity and expense to which it put your district secretary, interrupted the collectors' work and largely interfered with the meetings. When Spring opened it was with rain and wet weather, that prevailed to an extent never known before, and had a blighting and in many instances a ruinous influence upon the crops and country, which never in my experience had been in so sad and straitened a state, getting more and more so as the time passed on. Though there has been a falling off in receipts, I am much surprised that it has not been to a greater extent.

The receipts, \$6948.87, paid directly to me, and a few small items paid at the depository, usually paid to me, bring up the total to \$7044.37, which is \$194.70 less than last year; of this sum \$2268.28 was paid on purchase account, which is \$24.60 in advance of the same item last year, and \$4776.09 free contributions, short of the same item last year by \$219.30. There is a slight discrepancy between this statement and the report first made to you, and from which the Secretary drew up his report, which arises from the fact that some remittances came in afterwards, which had to be passed to account of 1890.

Branches—These remain stationary, with the exception of a new one organized at Pleasant Valley, in the Township of Osnabruck, which escaped my memory at the time of my first report to the Secretary. They number 211, and have all been visited during the year except those named in my monthly report, which I had to pass by between Sawyerville and Lennoxville at the time of my temporary illness in October last, and they have been supplied with about the same number of Scriptures at last year.

In the course of a few months forty years will have fled away since the time of my first connection with the Society; and in consideration of the uncertainty of life, and also in consideration of the arduous nature of the calling and at my age, this may be the last report I may ever be privileged to make, so a short review may not be out of place. When I began we had 53 Branches and 3 or 4 depositories. We have now 211; and in 1857, by mutual agreement, 12 of our branches were transferred to Ottawa, and in 1867 they took 14 more, making in all 26, which, added to our present number, would make 237; take off the 53 original ones, and it leaves 184 which have been organized since then.

In 1851 the payments for Scriptures from the branches were \$1092.65 and contributions \$523.40; total \$1616.00. On purchase account the increase is 136 p.c., and on free contributions 913 per cent. Not so much perhaps as in some other parts of the country, but it is doubted by many if our Protestant population is as large as it was forty years ago outside the cities.

One thing is certain, we have had against us all the time a constant migration of the people to the South and West. Scarcely have we passed a year without losing numbers of our best supporters, and in not a few instances our branches in certain localities have been almost disorganized from this cause, and it has called for the greatest care and constant vigilance to reconstruct and keep on the work.

I do not make these remarks to excuse shortcomings, or to extol human agency for any measure of success we may have attained. Often have I been led

to exclaim : "*What great things God has done for us.*" No mere human agency, nor even the liberality of a Christian people, nor the best management of a society could have done what has been done ; but God was with us, guiding and directing all.

As the years pass on the work becomes more critical. All sorts of good societies and organizations, conventions and large gatherings of all sorts for temperance, agriculture, and even mere pleasure, are a growing and ever increasing feature of country life, all pushing their claims more and more exigently. Common efforts once sufficient to secure attention to a good cause are ineffectual now. I could not and would not advise the Bible Society to have recourse to some of the doubtful expedients resorted to at times for objects even good in themselves ; but there is one thing that might be done and ought to be done : a sermon should be preached in all the pulpits once a year on behalf of the Society, in every place where a branch exists, as far as practicable, just before the annual meeting in that place, and if the Committee of the Auxiliary could take the initiative and obtain the adoption of the practice in the City, it would help on the movement.

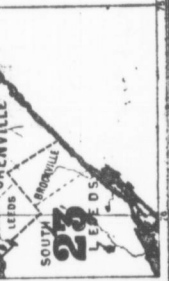

## II. REGULATIONS AND INSTRUCTIONS FOR AGENTS AND COLPORTEURS.

### (A)—THE DISTRICT SECRETARY.

1. The District Secretary is charged with the oversight of the various Branches, Depositories and Agencies of this Auxiliary.
2. He has to make periodic visits, once a year, if practicable, to the Branches, for the purpose, in conjunction with the Office-Bearers of the same, of holding public services, at which services special information touching the operations of the Parent Society and of this Auxiliary is given by him; and any necessary public business between the Branches and this Auxiliary is despatched. On such occasions he is also expected, in such ways as he may deem proper, to encourage and stimulate the people to greater zeal and effort in the work of Bible circulation.
3. He has to make annual visits to the several Depositories and Agencies connected with this Auxiliary for the purpose of inspecting the books or stock therein contained, and of taking account of the same with the Depositories.
4. He is authorized to receive, and to give receipt for the same, any moneys due to this Auxiliary on purchase account, or offered as free contributions.
5. He may take orders for supplies of Scriptures, should such be tendered him.
6. All receipts of money and orders for Scriptures are to be duly recorded by him, and reported to the General Agent.
7. Timely notice must be given by him to the General Agent of his intended visits to Branches or Agencies, in order to the preparation by the latter of the necessary statement of accounts for stock-taking and settlement with the Depositories.
8. Any omissions or discrepancies that may be found in the statement so furnished, and the books of the Depositories must be reported in writing to the General Agent, with a view to the immediate rectification of the same.
9. A monthly Report is to be prepared and sent by him to the General Committee, of the Branches and Depositories visited by him, of the public services held and of moneys received, and also of colportage operations, should these, in his judgment, call for special notice.
10. He is charged with the preparation of an Annual Report to the Committee, giving an account of the work and condition, during the year, of the various Branches, Depositories or Agencies that are comprised within the Society's field of operation; and also with preparation for publication in the Society's Annual Report, of the list of Branches, &c., with their Office-Bearers, together with the Subscription Lists of the same.
11. New Branches or Depositories may be organized or opened by him in or for such districts as may be found desirable to occupy as new centres of operation.

### (B)—THE GENERAL AGENT.

1. The General Agent is charged with the management of the business of the Society, as conducted in and from the Bible House of Montreal.
2. He has under his care the stock of Scriptures and other property belonging to the Society in the Bible House, and is held responsible for the safe keeping and good condition of the same.

3. It is his province to attend to the retail sales of Bibles at the Bible House, and to keep account of same.

4. A Monthly Report must be prepared by him and submitted to the General Committee at its regular Monthly Meeting of:—(a) the condition and amount of stock on hand, or required; of the number of copies sold during the month at the Bible House, with an account of cash received for the same, together with a statement of the same items in the corresponding month in the previous year; of the state of account between this Auxiliary and the Parent Society, or other parties; of applications for grants of Scripture; and, generally, of any other matters he may deem of importance to bring under the notice of the Committee. (b) Of receipts and disbursements made at the Bible House during the month.

5. Special Reports may be called for from him by the General Committee or any of the Sub-Committees.

6. Notices of all Meetings, whether of the General Committee or of the Sub-Committees, are issued by him; and he has charge of the place of meeting of the same.

7. On the receipt from the District Secretary of the programme of his intended visits to the Branches or Depositories, the General Agent is required to furnish him with the accounts of the several Branches set down on the programme, at least one week previous to his, the District Secretary's departure on his tour of visitation, in order that time may be afforded for examination of these accounts by both Agents together, if found necessary.

8. Copies of the Monthly Report and of the Abstract of the Annual Report of the Parent Society, as also copies of all other publications sent to the General Agent, which may contain information useful to the District Secretary in his visits among the Branches, are to be promptly and regularly sent forth from the Bible House to such places as he, the District Secretary, may designate.

9. All mistakes, omissions, or irregularities that may be reported by the District Secretary, as existing in the books or statements of accounts appertaining to any Branch or Depository, are required to be placed on file and promptly attended to; and such file may be called for at any meeting of the General Committee or Agency Committee.

10. Orders for supplies of Scriptures from the Branches, the District Secretary or Colporteurs, are to be carefully entered, and promptly executed; and in case of any unavoidable delay occurring, of the kind of books ordered not being in stock, notification of the same must at once be made to the persons sending the order, and further instruction sought from them.

11. An account current with each Colporteur employed by the Society is required to be kept, of all books sent to his order, of cash received from him, of time spent in the service of this Society reported by him, and of payments on account of stipend made to him.

12. The General Agent has to prepare for the Corresponding Secretary all statistics, or other details appertaining to the department of the General Agent that may be called for in the preparation of the Annual Report of the Society, or of any Special Report.

13. On the publication of the Annual Report, the General Agent is required to distribute, without unnecessary delay, copies of the same to subscribers entitled to receive them, both in the City and country districts.

14. The General Agent has the oversight of such Assistant or Assistants as may, with the sanction of the Committee, be employed in the Bible House.

---

#### RULES RECOMMENDED FOR BRANCH SOCIETIES AND BIBLE ASSOCIATIONS.

The following Constitution of a Branch Society and Bible Association is inserted for the purpose of facilitating the formation of those useful institutions. Persons in the country are particularly invited to form themselves into Auxiliary Societies. Besides discharging the duty of assisting in disseminating the Word of God (which is incumbent on every Christian) they would consult their private advantage, and *thereby be enabled to obtain Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices*, whereas at present they purchase from country merchants at a higher rate.

1. That the object and Constitution of the British and Foreign Bible Society have the cordial approbation of this meeting.

2. That a society be formed, to be called "The \_\_\_\_\_" Branch Bible Society, for the purpose of co-operating with the British and Foreign Bible Society, through the medium of the Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society, in promoting the distribution of the Holy Scriptures, both at home and abroad.

3. That, conformably to the principles of the British and Foreign Bible Society, the Bibles and Testaments to be circulated by the Society shall be without note or comment, and those in the language of the United Kingdom of the authorized version only.

4. That all persons subscribing one dollar *per annum* or upwards, or ten dollars or upwards at one time, shall be members of this Society.

5. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, Secretaries, and a Committee consisting of not less than three other members; and that three members of the Committee constitute a quorum.

6. That every clergyman or other minister who is a member of the Society shall be entitled to attend and vote at the meeting of the Committee.

7. That the Committee shall meet once a quarter or oftener, on some day to be fixed by themselves.

8. That the Committee divide this neighborhood into districts, and appoint collectors for each district, for the purpose of soliciting subscriptions and donations and collecting the annual fees of the members.

9. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by the Society shall be remitted yearly, after deducting incidental expenses, to the Auxiliary Bible Society of Montreal, on condition of the Society granting to this the same privileges which the Parent Institution grants, in such cases, to the Auxiliary Societies.

10. That the Committee shall make it their business to enquire what families or individuals, residing within the several districts, are in want of Bibles or Testaments and unable to procure them; and that it will be the duty of the Committee to furnish them therewith at prime cost, reduced prices, or gratis, according to their circumstances.

11. That a general meeting of the subscribers be held at \_\_\_\_\_ in the month of \_\_\_\_\_ each year, when the accounts shall be presented, the proceedings of the past year reported, and a Committee elected.

12. That these resolutions be published in such a manner as the Committee may direct; and a copy of them, signed by the chairman, transmitted to the President of the Auxiliary Bible Society of Montreal.

NOTE.—Branches or Depositories selling Scriptures on credit do so at their own risk and responsibility, as it is contrary to the rules of the Society. There is no need for it, as other provision is made for the poor.

#### COLPORTEURS.

1. The Classification of Colporteurs shall be as follows: To be known respectively and indicated on the Monthly Report as: Class I.—Class II.—and Class III. That promotion be made from one class to another only on account of fidelity, success or length of service, and by vote of the General Committee; that the Monthly Allowances be for Class I, \$40.—Class II, \$35.—Class III, \$30, with addition of fifteen dollars per month where the Colporteur, by direction of the General Committee, uses in his work a horse and a conveyance.

2. Colporteurs are required to carefully keep within the limits of the District assigned to them as their field of operations, and not to labor beyond them without the sanction of the Committee.

3. They are expected to visit, as far as practicable, every family within the limits of their field, in order to ascertain whether or not they are supplied with copies of the Scriptures, and, when these are found to be needed, to supply them at such prices, or on such terms as may from time to time be ordered by the Committee.

4. In the case of poor families or persons, Colporteurs may, in the exercise of due care, supply copies, either at reduced price, or by loan, or by gift; but all transactions must be recorded and reported to the Committee.

5. Sales on credit are made without the sanction of the Committee and at the sole risk of the Colporteur making them.

6. The Committee require that a *daily record* be kept of the places visited, of the number of copies sold, and of the moneys received for the same; and, further, that a *monthly report* of these and other matters properly belonging to their work be made by each Colporteur. For this purpose blank forms are supplied, which the Committee expect each Colporteur to carefully study and fill up.

7. All monthly reports shall be made up to the 25th of each month, and on that date mailed to the Corresponding Secretary for presentation to the ensuing Monthly Meeting of the General Committee.

8. All days that are not reported as spent in the service of the Society, due allowance being made for sickness or bad weather, will be deducted in the payment of the monthly stipend, unless leave of absence has been before obtained from the Committee.

9. When in the neighborhood of Branch Societies, Colporteurs are required to report themselves to the officers of the same, in order to receive from such co-operation and advice as they may be able to give; and, also, to report themselves to the District Secretary whenever he may visit any part of their district, that they may have the benefit of his suggestions, and may assist him in his public meetings, etc., should he need assistance.

10. Colporteurs when on duty for the Society are required to abstain from taking part in public political meetings or discussions, and also to avoid, as far as practicable, points of controversy between different Christian denominations or Churches.

11. The general work and duties of Colporteurs are, to circulate the Word of God among all classes and creeds of the community, and, as opportunity offers, to read the Scriptures, hold religious converse and prayer with families or individuals. When the great object of the Society can be promoted by religious services and addresses to public assemblies, these might be held. But in proceedings of this character the Committee desire that Colporteurs seek the countenance and co-operation of Ministers of the Gospel, without distinction of denomination.

MONTREAL LADIES' BIBLE ASSOCIATION

AND

BIBLE WOMEN'S EFFORT.

The Committee of the Bible Woman's Mission in connection with the Ladies' Association of the Montreal Bible Society thankfully record that the work of 1890 has been markedly successful. At its monthly meetings most satisfactory accounts have been given of the number of Bibles and Testaments sold by the Bible Women, of the hundreds of visits which they have made from week to week among those who know little of Divine truth, and of the sympathy and comfort they have been able to take into numberless homes, made dark and lonely by bereavement and sorrow. Each district has its special feature of interest. In the hospital Bible Woman the weary sufferer has a friend always ready to speak of Him who can and will give strength in time of need. In the other districts, the Word of God is read in every family not ordinarily attending any religious service, and in individual cases of intemperance or other evils its claims are urged, as the surest remedy. In the western district, where an unusually large number of copies of the Holy Scriptures have been sold, the home of the Bible Woman has become the mission house, where "Seekers after God" meet regularly, and where special opportunities are offered to those who can only give their evenings to obtaining religious instruction. Among the French-speaking population, the earnest desire manifested to know and possess the Scriptures is full of promise for the early future. There is no one at present employed by the Association to visit the Germans, but a German lady continues the Bible meetings where the serious, intelligent interest of the mothers proves the attraction and power of Living Truth.

A balance in hand of over \$400 early in 1889 led the Society to undertake, in addition to its other obligations, the entire expense of a Bible Woman for Hochelaga and Maisonneuve. In this new district, as in the old, the Mothers' Meetings, Clothing Club and Mission work are under the care and management of the Lady superintendent.

It is confidently hoped that the Committee will be enabled to continue its important work in Hochelaga and Maisonneuve, where a large population of strangers is rapidly gathering round the factories. It was commenced with sufficient funds to cover the expense, till the close of the current year. The whole sum required for its maintenance, as also the one half required for the Point St. Charles district (the rent of the mission rooms, including incidental expense of clothing clubs, etc.)

is being taken from an amount, liberally contributed in response to the earnest appeals of the unwearied friend of the Society, Mrs. Vanneck, together with a few subscriptions privately offered.

The French Bible Woman is maintained by the British and Foreign Bible Society; the salaries of those working in the city districts, partly as Colporteurs, are paid from an appropriation made by the Montreal Auxiliary. The \$200 bequeathed by the late Madame Papineau,—for many years a generous donor to the hospital mission,—is to aid “poor and destitute patients, on leaving the General Hospital.”

A monthly class attended by all the Bible Women is under the instruction of Lady Dawson, the General Superintendent.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SECRETARY FOR JANUARY,  
FEBRUARY AND MARCH, 1891.

I made a start at noon on the 3rd January, to begin the work for another year. I had neither rain nor wind like last year, nor bare ground and slush as for several years past. The weather was rather cold but exceptionally fine, and the sleighing splendid.

I had my first meeting, at night, at ST. EUSTACHE. It was pretty well attended, and the report of the officers was of finances just about the same as for several years past. On Sunday morning, the 4th, I was at GRANDE FRENIERE, where I met a good congregation and an attentive hearing. I was pleased also to find the Branch active and in a good state. The free contribution was a long way in advance of the past year.

At ST. ANDREWS the same evening we met in Congregational Church. A large audience and able assistance from Rev. D. Paterson and Rev. J. McAdie. The free contribution was a very creditable one, but a little short of the previous year, but the sales were in advance. NORTH WEST GLENGARRY is not doing quite so well as formerly, though the annual meeting in the Presbyterian Church on the 17th was well attended, and obviously pervaded by a good spirit. Rev. Mr. Cormick conducted the meeting. The sales were good, and the free contribution a little over \$60. The Rev. Mr. Brown was in the chair, and his energy, promptitude and timeliness contributed greatly to the success of the meeting. The Rev. Mr. Scott did his part nobly. Full of the spirit of the mission, and hearty goodwill for the spread of the Bible, and a happy effective way of expressing it, he helped us much, and Rev. Mr. Meikle, the evangelist, gave us a powerful selling address to clinch the whole, making it one of the best and most
