MARS.

Mars is generally known by its red appearance, and was named after Mars the Roman god of war. It will be an object of interest only for the first half of the year, as after that it will be so near the sun and so far from the earth as to be unnoticed. At the beginning of the year it will be a little east of the Pleiades or Seven Stars, and it passes eastward through Taurus and Gemini, and on the first of June will be in the nebula of Cancer. It will be an evening star until Nov. 11, and then morning star the rest of the year.

SATURN.

SATURN will be south of the equator the whole of this year, and its place in the heavens will be between Spica Virginis on the west, and Beta Libræ on the east. In December it will be only a short distance west of Alpha Libræ. On the 16th of April it is nearest the earth, brightest, and in opposition to the sun, and rises at about sunset. It will be 90° from the sun on Jan. 19th, when it crosses the meridian about 6 o'clock in the morning, and on the 16th of July, when it passes the meridian about 6 o'clock in the afternoon. It will be in conjunction with the sun Oct. 26th, being then farthest from the earth and rising and setting with the sun, and invisible. It will be morning star until Jan. 19th, then evening star until Oct. 26th; then morning star the rest of the year.

MERCURY.

FOR THIS ISSUE.

The planet Mercury is seldom seen, as it is never far from the Sun, and hence is much affected with the solar rays. Its density is greater than that of any other planet, being nearly that of lead. This planet is however visible at certain times, when near its greatest elongation east or west of the Sun. On the 8th of April, 7th of August, and 3d of December, it will be at its greatest brilliancy, being in the west soon after sunset. On the 3d of February, 1st of June, and 26th of September, it will be brightest again, and appear in the east before sunrise, the illuminated portion of the planet's disc always being towards the Sun.

VENUS.

Venus will be farthest east of the Sun February 25, and will increase in brightness until April 1, being then in the west as evening star. Its position in the heavens at that time will be very near and a little west of the Pleiades, or Seven Stars. Its splendor now begins to decline gradually, and on the 7th of May it will be in inferior conjunction with the Sun, and lost in its superior light. Its dark side is then towards the earth. It next appears as a morning star, exhibiting a long, slender crescent, which rapidly grows wider and brighter, and on the 18th of June it will again be brightest, being then a short distance south-west of the Seven Stars. It will be at its greatest elongation west of the Sun, July 16th. It then passes off towards the superior conjunction, and soen fades.

JUPITER.

JUPITEE will be morning star until March 18, then evening star until Dec. 31. It will be in the southern sky all the year, and at the most southern point on Nov. 19. It will not be at that place in the heavens again until 1877. It moves northward slowly after Nov. 19. From April 1, to Aug. 15, it moves backward, or towards the west. There are no conjunctions this year of Venus, Mars, or Saturn with Jupiter.

OBSERVATIONS ON THE MOON.

Our nearest neighbor in the heavens receives unremitting attention from astronomers, and its features have been more accurately mapped than some portions of our own globe. Its surface presents a wonderful scene of rugged grandeur: enormous craters enclosing vast volcanoes; isolated mountains far higher than any on the earth; broad plains, that look like the beds of former seas. Its changing aspects in its various positions with reference to the sun and us, are full of interest. Dr. Henry Draper, of the University of New York, has perfected a remarkably distinct and beautiful photographic picture of the moon, nearly two feet in diameter, made under a magnifying power of 320, which represents our satellite on a scale of 70 miles to an inch. His telescope has a silvered glass mirror, and is kept steady during the taking of a picture, while the little clock-work gives to the sensitized photograph-plate the motion necessary to keep it in focus.

It has long been known that the moon presents one and the same side to the earth all the time. Of late, the researches of a German astronomer named Hansen seem to have proved that this visible hemisphere of the moon is a sort of tower or crust, of a lighter and more porous substance than the rest of the moon, and projecting some 29 miles nearer to the earth than the average level of the lunar surface. If this be so, conjecture may take full possession of the furtherside of the moon, clothe it with an atmosphere, cover.

it with verdure, and people it with inhabitants.

DISTANCE OF THE STARS.

If a star be selected to-night, and its position on the background of the sky and with reference to other stars be carefully noted, and if the same thing be done six months hence — when the earth has reached the opposite extreme of its orbit — a minute change in its apparent position may perhaps be discovered. This is the star's annual parallax, and furnishes a means of estimating its distance in diameters of the earth's orbit. If a star has no parallax, it is immeasurably distant. Some of the nearest bright stars are Sirius, 130,000,000,000 miles, Arcturus, and the Pole-star; but recent observations show that some small stars of the 8th and 9th magnitude are nearer still, while some of the brightest stars in our sky have no sensible parallax.

ECLIPSES.

There will be four Eclipses this year, as follows:-

I. A partial Eclipse of the Moon April 10th, at midnight, visible in this Island. Eclipse commences 11h. 51m.; ends 1h. 87m. morning of the 11th. Size 2½ digits, or about one-fifth of the Moon's diameter.

II. A total Eclipse of the Sun April 25th, invisible in North America, but visible in most of South America and Africa.

III. A partial Eclipse of the Moon October 4th, in the evening, visible. The beginning of the Eclipse occurs before the Moon rises. The middle of the Eclipse will be at 6h. 46m. and ending at 7h. 47m. Size 4g digits, or about one-third of the Moon's diameter.

IV. An annular Eclipse of the Sun October 19, in the morning, visible throughout the Island as a partial eclipse, commencing at 9h. 51m., and ending at 1 o'clock.

ASTEROIDS.

Three new asteroidal planets were discovered in 1863, making the whole number now recognized 79. Six new comets, of no great interest, were also observed during the year.

OBSERVATIONS OF THE SUN.

The English optician Cooke has invented a mode of separating the heat of the solar rays from the luminous portion before they reach the focus in the telescope. This is effected by a prism in the eye-piece, by which the luminous and the calorific rays being differently refracted, the latter are turned aside from the eye and do not molest the observer.

Close and careful observation of the sun is maintained by astronomers, and daily photographs of his disc are taken at the Kew Observatory. England. It is believed that the intense light and heat of the sun are kept up by meteors and asteroids continually falling into its atmosphere. On September 1, 1859, two observers at different places saw a sudden outburst of light far exceeding the rest of the sun's surface in brightness, and sweeping like a cloud over a part of his disc. This was thought to be an asteroid falling into the sun. This phenomenon was accompanied, as changes on the sun's surface are often found to be, by magnetic disturbances on the earth's surface, and by auroras of great brilliancy.

INVISIBILITY OF LIGHT.

It is well known, though not at all appreciated by the public, that light is invisible unless the eye is in a line with the source of the light, or with some object that reflects that light. Let a strong beam of sunlight enter a darkened room and fall on a blackened opposite wall; the entire chamber will remain in darkness, and no object in it will be visible but the floating motes in the air and intercepting a few rays. In applying this on the large scale, we may consider what would be our condition if we could see only objects luminous in themselves—even the sun giving us no light except when looking directly at it; and hence we may conceive how essential are those laws of refraction and reflection which make the atmosphere with its clouds, etc., and every other object great and small a conveyer of light, rendering all nature radiant to the beholder's eyes.

The best time to cut hay is at the transition from flower to seed. The precise point, of course, cannot be generally attained in ordinary practice, where many days are required for securing a crop, but the nearer we come to it the better. The expedition accomplished by means of mowing machines, horse-rakes, and horse forks, have, however, greatly facilitated this object. Cutting grass early produces more readily a good after growth. If done too soon, it will lack substance; if too late, it will be hard and Celerity of operations woody. 20 French revolution begun, 1789 depends much on good management, and on having everything in full readiness.
