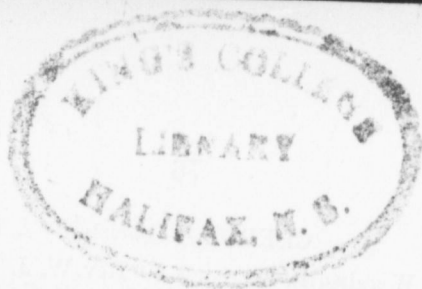

long as the Synod of the Diocese of Fredericton shall recog-  
nize King's College as the theological institution of the diocese,  
the Bishop of the diocese shall be *ex officio* a Governor of  
King's College, Windsor, and the Synod of the diocese shall  
be entitled to elect two members of the Board of Governors."

*Therefore Resolved*, In accordance with the said Act, this  
Synod hereby recognizes King's College, of Windsor, N. S.,  
as the theological institution of this diocese; and that a copy  
of this resolution under the Seal of the Synod be forwarded  
to the Secretary of the Board of Governors.

Moved in amendment by Hon. Chief Justice Allen, seconded  
by Hon. D. L. Hanington,

*Resolved*, That without having before this Synod the recent  
Act of Assembly of Nova Scotia in reference to King's College,  
Windsor, there is no sufficient information to enable the Synod  
to pass any resolution on the subject referred to.

After much discussion, the amendment being put, was, on  
division, *Lost. Yeas 28; Nays 44.*

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON REGISTERS.

TO THE RIGHT REVEREND THE LORD BISHOP OF FREDERICTON,  
AND THE MEMBERS OF THE DIOCESAN SYNOD.

Your Committee appointed at the thirteenth Session of the Synod have given the subject of registers their most careful consideration, and beg leave to report as follows :—

We find that in October, 1851, the Bishops of North America (of whom the Bishop of Fredericton was one), issued a declaration. In this declaration the clergy of this Diocese, with others, were earnestly recommended to keep accurate registers of Marriages, Baptisms, and Burials, in their several Parishes or Missions.

Notwithstanding this recommendation, which practically gives effect to the lxxth Canon of the Code of 1604 (to which the Bishops drew attention in their declaration) your Committee find that in this Diocese registers are not universally kept with accuracy. This is probably due to the fact that there is no particular form of register at present recommended or recognized in the Diocese; so that where careful record has been kept there is lack of uniformity; and when clergy remove from Parish to Parish the diversity has probably led to the absence of record in some places.

Your Committee therefore recommend that a Canon be passed requiring uniform registers to be kept in the various Parishes or Missions; such registers to be supplied by each Parish or Mission as they shall be required. They recommend that the Canon should extend to the following registers, specimens of which are scheduled with this report.

Your Committee are of opinion that it would be a great advantage, if the date of birth (on the authority of a parent, or nearest friend) of the child be inserted. In the case of adults this may be omitted, if desired, and only the word "adult" inserted under the heading "Date of Birth."

Your Committee strongly advise the adoption of a pocket certificate book for Baptisms, in the form set out in the schedule: part to be torn off and given to the parents as a certificate, or a reminder of Baptism: while the counterfoil would act as a reminder to the clergyman of the necessity of registering the Baptism, and, if properly filled up at the time, would supply all the information necessary for registration. Your Committee are of opinion that Country Missionaries would find such a book of very great value, especially where the Church is at some distance from the spot where the registers are kept; and in case of private or clinical Baptism.

While your Committee feel that this register is not of paramount necessity, yet it is of great advantage, and no properly ordered Church should be without one.

Your Committee are of opinion that a Certificate of Confirmation should be given to each person confirmed, but they are not prepared to recommend any particular form. A large variety has been published and the S. P. C. K. has issued several forms from which each clergyman may select for himself.

Your Committee earnestly urge the adoption of a Register of Services. To a clergyman newly entering upon the work of a Parish, the record of work done by his predecessor is a very great help. From this register it would be easy to make an accurate return to the Diocesan Church Society as desired.

To one column in the proposed form of register your Committee would wish to draw especial attention, that for the entry of the collection taken up at each service. In all money matters exactness is of great importance, and inexactitude is a fruitful cause of strife which should be avoided, if possible. It is earnestly recommended that the Canon should require that the money collected should be counted in the presence of the clergyman or churchwarden before it be removed from the Church, and that the amount be entered in the register of services, and be guaranteed by the initials of the clergyman or churchwarden.

Such a Canon has been adopted elsewhere with great advantage. A register of services should be kept in each Church.

In conclusion, your Committee would express a hope that soon there may be in connection with the Diocese, either at the Cathedral, or elsewhere, a fire-proof strong room, where the registers of the various Parishes and Missions, when full, and other records, may be kept in greater security than in wooden Rectories or Churches. They would also suggest that if the Registers recommended be adopted, previous records of the Parish, when written on loose sheets of note paper, or otherwise, should be carefully copied into the commencement of the register, and certified to be correct copies by the incumbent under his own hand.

*To the Diocesan Synod of Fredericton :*

In presenting their Ninth Annual Report, the Board of Foreign Missions are thankful to be able to state that an increased interest has been manifested throughout various parts of the Diocese in behalf of the important work of Missions to the Heathen and to the Jews.

In connection with the former, the Board, as on a former occasion, draw attention to the work of the two great sister Societies of the Church of England, which are engaged, side by side, all over the world, in carrying the glad tidings of the Gospel to the lost and perishing.

Both Societies, at their recent Annual Meetings, were presided over by the new occupant of the See of Canterbury, supported by the Metropolitan of India, and by a strong array of Bishops, embracing almost all those, at home, who are conspicuous for their interest in Missionary operations.

Frequent and appropriate tributes were paid, at both Anniversaries, to the late Archbishop, who had so long and faithfully worked with and for the S. P. G. and the C. M. S.

In presiding at the Annual Meeting of the latter, the new Archbishop expressed his great pleasure in seeing on the platform the Secretaries of the "Propagation Society," as "only the other day he had been accompanied, on the platform of this latter Society, by the Secretaries of the Church Missionary Society, observing that of all happy auguries, perhaps none could be more happy than to be able to say this,"—a statement which may well encourage our fellow Churchmen who take an interest in Mission Work in connection with either or both of the two great Societies.

It may seem strange to us in this Diocese to be looked upon as foreign, but it is under this name that we are now, and have so long been aided by the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts; but the fact is, as has been well observed, "no part of the world is now absolutely foreign to Englishmen." Still, we too have our Foreign and Domestic Missions, those which are domestic to us being foreign to our brethren in England, while all beside, which are foreign to them, are also so to us, but not so to our fellow Colonists in other parts of the world.

We learn from the last reports, that both the Societies referred to had, during the past year, been blessed with increased incomes, that of the S. P. G. being a gross total of £142,612 11s. 4d. Sterling, showing an increase in the two years past of £8,000 Sterling, or about 11 per cent. on the chief source of the Society's income — which stands higher by nearly £2,000 than in any previous year of the Society's existence.

The number of ordained Missionaries on its list is 527, of whom 311 are foreign, the remaining 216 are labouring in our own Dominion and the West Indies.

The increase in income placed the Society's Standing Committee in the happy position of being able to make new grants to the extent of £6,750, besides continuing those which come up for renewal to the extent of £73,270. Of the new grants it may be observed, that £2,725 has been given to what we know as our own Domestic Missions, and £4,025 to Foreign Missions.

While the Society was enabled to make these grants, such is the growth of the Church abroad, that appeals came in from various quarters of the world for new grants, to the extent of £30,000, which, had the funds permitted, they would have been only too glad to meet, and this fact may well stir up God's people to labour more earnestly in the cause, and to do all in their power to increase the fund at the Society's disposal.

The Church Missionary Society has also received a larger income than in any previous year of its history. Its gross receipts being £225,231 9s. 8d. Sterling, about £10,000 over that of the previous year, besides £72,193 in stock for China and Japan, the contribution of one individual. Still the expenditure of the Society grows faster than the income, for in the past year it reached £12,000 in excess, which was supplied from the reserved fund, and it is expected to be much larger in the current year, drawing still more largely upon the same fund, unless (as it is to be hoped) there should be a great increase in the yearly contributions.

The Church Missionary Society has 460 ordained Missionaries, more than one-half of whom are native Clergymen, preaching the Gospel to their heathen countrymen.

The reports of both Societies are most encouraging, showing that all round the world the work is going on and prospering. Reports from all quarters are coming in constantly to the head quarters of both, bringing intelligence of the steady advance in the Kingdom of Christ, notwithstanding the stormy opposition arising out of the malice and power of the great enemy.

Whether we turn to Africa, India, China, Japan, New Zealand, or elsewhere, we find abundant cause for thankfulness; evidences of the progress of Christianity are seen in the new ground broken up, station after station occupied, details of conversions given, congregations formed, new Churches established in the due line of Ecclesiastical order, and in the spirit of evangelical truth; still, as we look abroad at the densely populated areas, doors everywhere open for entrance and occupation, we cannot but feel that we are only as it were touching the borders of the great harvest field, calling for more earnest prayers, renewed exertions, more and greater self denial in carrying on a work which brings its own reward, and which he, who has but taken his share in, will rejoice and be glad, and his joy no man taketh from him.

But we must refer to the Mission work among the Jews, in whose behalf the Society for Promoting Christianity among the Jews has been established.

Their report opens with praise and thanksgiving to Almighty God, for increased means placed at their disposal for the furtherance of the spiritual and temporal good of God's people Israel. One encouraging feature of the work is the decline in Jewish prejudice, reported by the Society's agents, especially in England. The number of inquirers greatly increased, Mission Halls more frequented, and many Jews, after much preparation, received into the Church by baptism. Abroad, also, the strength of prejudice in many places appears to be wearing away. The wild expressions of fanaticism of former years are less frequent. In Holland and Germany the work had gained ground. The Missionaries there recorded with thankfulness a greater number of baptisms, as marking the character of the work, and that they had come into contact with larger numbers of Jews, distributed quantities of Scriptures, tracts, and books, making known the Gospel of Christ, and which were received willingly and thankfully, and with gratitude for the interest taken in their welfare. Many who before were timid in coming to a Missionary, now come forward with confidence and inquiry. At Jerusalem a large influx of Russian Jews had brought a very marked change in the work, still more forcibly impressing upon Christians the greater responsibility for renewed and increased efforts in the making known and spreading the knowledge of the Redeemer's Kingdom amongst God's ancient people; and calls for fervent and sustained

prayer, that many souls may be gathered in from among them by the means employed. The Bishopric of Jerusalem still remains vacant, it being yet a matter of negotiation with the German Government, but it is hoped that ere long a Bishop may be appointed; so that now, when Jews are flocking from so many parts and seeking an entrance into the Holy Land, they may find there a true and earnest representative of the Christian Church to whom they may resort and look for counsel, and who will extend to them fraternal advice and assistance.

*To the Lord Bishop of the Diocese,  
and Members of the Diocesan Synod:*

Your Board of Domestic Missions record, with pleasure, the increased interest that is taken in the Missionary Work of the Church in Canada, as manifested by the contributions during the past year; for whereas in the year 1881-2 they amounted to \$806.64, in the past year they reached the sum of \$1,704.86.

The number of Parishes or Missions which have contributed during the past year is twenty, leaving forty-eight which have had no collection. It is matter for much regret that so many Parishes fail to show sympathy with this branch of Missionary Work, and take no share in discharging the responsibilities to which the Church is pledged, especially as regards the Diocese of Algoma.

In accordance with the Resolution passed at the last Session, touching the assessment of three hundred dollars on this Diocese for the stipend of the Bishop of Algoma, steps were immediately taken for collecting the same, and, without difficulty, the above sum was subscribed by a few who have kindly undertaken to contribute a like sum annually for four more years. The due proportion has been punctually remitted each quarter to the Treasurer of the Diocese.

An "Algoma Aid Association" has been formed in connection with your Board, consisting of ladies in different parts of the Diocese, to receive parcels of clothing and any other gifts for Algoma, and forward the same. Two parcels of clothing have been sent, and money collected by the Association.

We received from the Board of Foreign Missions a communication requesting us to join them in recommending the Diocesan Synod to set apart certain seasons for making collections for various Missionary

objects. We heartily concur in that recommendation, and trust that the Synod at its present Session will carry it out.

From the Reports which have come to hand respecting the Diocese of Algoma, we have every reason to believe that the work of the Church in that extensive field is progressing favourably; it is nevertheless much retarded for want of men and means. The cry of spiritual destitution is heard on all sides. One zealous Missionary writes: "The results accruing from any previous reports have been to me apparently so small and discouraging, that I feel in very poor heart to sit down and pen another, when I have nothing but the old tale to tell of spiritual desolation on every side." The Bishop of Algoma recently put out an earnest appeal for men which, we trust, has met with some response.

The homes for Indian children have not been so full during the past winter, but it was expected that, with the approach of summer, the numbers would be again much increased. The Chapel which is being built at a cost of \$3,000, in connection with the Shingwauk Home, in memory of the late Bishop Fauquier, is fast progressing towards completion. It is expected to be ready for consecration in August.

The great North West presents an almost boundless field for the work of the Church. Emigrants from Great Britain and Ireland continue to pour into that vast region, and the resources of the Church in that great territory are totally unequal to meet the exigencies of the situation. We are well aware that much help cannot be expected from this Diocese towards increasing them, still the fact is worthy of notice that other Christian bodies in Canada are contributing largely towards the establishment of their respective organizations in that region, which may, at least, provoke us to emulate their laudable zeal.

In conclusion, we would remind you that the call to Missionary work is the call of the world's Redeemer, and as such we once again commend it to the prayers, sympathy, and liberality of the Churchmen and Church Women in the Diocese.

The Treasurer's accounts connected with the Board are submitted herewith.

## APPENDIX F.

### REPORT.

THE Committee to whom was referred the Memorial of the Rector, Church Wardens, and Vestry of St. Paul's Church, Portland, setting forth that certain persons claiming to be members of the Church of England, had recently erected a proprietary Chapel within the limits of the said Parish, and in the vicinity of the Parish Church, and services professedly in connection with the Church of England had been conducted therein by the Reverend John M. Davenport (who claimed to hold the license of the Bishop of the Diocese), contrary to the expressed dissent and protest of the Memorialists, and calling the attention of the Synod to the subject, and that it might be taken into consideration; and also the Committee were further instructed to ascertain and report whether a settlement satisfactory to all parties could not be arrived at—beg leave to submit the following Report:

Your Committee met on the eighth day of July last and organized, and thereupon directed that copies of the Memorial, and the resolutions of the Synod be forwarded to the Rev. John M. Davenport, and to the parties in whom the title of the said Chapel was vested, with a request

to furnish your Committee with any statement they might wish to make in reply thereto. Copies of the resolutions of the Synod, with a similar request of any statement, were also sent the Memorialists.

Your Committee met again on the twenty-sixth day of October last, and communications from the Vestry of St. Paul's, and the Rev. J. M. Davenport were laid before your Committee, and entered on the minutes of their proceedings. Copies of the several statements were again sent to the opposite parties, and your Committee also requested the proprietors of the said Chapel to furnish a copy of any declaration of trust in reference to the said Chapel.

Your Committee again met on the twenty-fourth day of November last, when further communications were received and entered on their minutes. No copy of the declaration of trust was furnished, but extracts therefrom were given by Rev. Mr. Davenport.

Your Committee again met on the third day of January last, and received a further communication from the Rev. J. M. Davenport, which was entered on their minutes. At this meeting, with a view to carry out the resolution of the Synod, and to ascertain if a satisfactory settlement could not be made, your Committee appointed a Sub-Committee to obtain full information, and with this view to confer with the respective parties, to examine the declaration of trust in reference to the said Chapel, if submitted to them, and to report back to your Committee.

Your Committee again met on the eighth day of February last, and the Sub-Committee, not being prepared to make any report, were requested to continue and report at the next meeting.

Your Committee again met on the seventh day of June last, when the Sub-Committee reported that after conference with the respective parties, they had failed to arrive at any basis upon which a settlement could be made; and they further reported that the declaration of trust in reference to the said Chapel had been submitted to them.

Your Committee having thus failed to their extreme regret to obtain an amicable settlement, proceeded to take into consideration the said Memorial, and the respective statements submitted by the Memorialists, and the Rev. J. M. Davenport, and submit the following statement of facts:

*First.*—That the Parish of St. Paul's, Portland, was erected by the Legislature of the Province as a Parish for ecclesiastical purposes, and its boundaries set forth and defined by law; and the Corporation of the said Parish is the Rector, Church Wardens, and Vestry of St. Paul's, Portland — the Memorialists.

*Secondly.*—That the Rev. William H. DeVeber was duly presented, instituted, and inducted as the Rector of the Parish several years ago, and still is the Rector.

*Thirdly.*—That in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-one, application was made to the said Rev. William H. DeVeber, as Rector of St. Paul's Parish, and the incumbent thereof, to give his consent to the erection of a proprietary Chapel within the limits of his Parish, which he, as also the Memorialists, not only declined to do, but protested against any such Chapel being erected within the limits of the Parish.

*Fourthly.*—That notwithstanding the withholding of such consent, and also of such protest, the proprietary Chapel referred to in the Memorial was erected within the limits of the said Parish of St. Paul's, Portland, vested in certain persons in trust, and in which Chapel services connected with the Church of England are held by the Rev. John M. Davenport, a clerk in Holy Orders, licensed by the Bishop of the Diocese.

These facts being admitted, the dispute arises as to the legal status of the respective parties, the Rector of St. Paul's, Portland, and his Vestry, on the one hand, and the Rev. J. M. Davenport, and the Trustees of the said Chapel, on the other; and in view of the importance of this question to the Church in the Diocese, and by the light of subsequent events, it is a matter of regret that this question had not been considered and settled before the erection of the said Chapel.

This legal question resolves itself into two propositions :

*First.*—The right involved in the erection of a proprietary Chapel, or Chapel of ease, within the limits of a Parish, and using the same for services in connection with the Church in the Diocese, not only without the consent of the Rector, or incumbent of the Parish, and the Vestry of such Parish, but contrary to their expressed wish and protest.

*Secondly.*—The right of the Bishop of the Diocese, notwithstanding such refusal, to consent to the erection of such proprietary Chapel, or Chapel of ease, and to authorize or permit a licensed Minister to officiate and conduct services in such Chapel.

Upon such important propositions, involving grave legal considerations, seriously affecting the rights of Rectors or incumbents of Parishes, and their position with their Diocesan, your Committee refrain from expressing any opinion.

A binding decision upon these propositions could only be obtained by an appeal to the judicial tribunals of the country, involving hostile legal proceedings; but your Committee most strongly deprecate the resort to any legal proceedings whatever, feeling that such proceedings would not only be entirely antagonistic to that spirit of love and charity which should animate every member of our Church, but also, irrespective of the result, could not fail to be highly detrimental to the interests of the Church in the Diocese.

In view of the difficulties that thus present themselves to your Committee, and also of the spirit of the resolution passed by the Synod, evincing the desire of the Synod of an amicable settlement, your Committee would therefore recommend that, for the information of the Synod, and under the direction of the Synod, the legal propositions involved in this question be submitted to some able Counsel, before whom the respective parties should be requested to lay their respective statements, and his opinion obtained thereon.

This course your Committee hope will lead to a solution of the difficulties, without the notoriety of an hostile suit in the Courts, which would only engender strife and widen the breach in the Church.

For reasons which are, upon consideration, apparent, your Committee would advise the selection of such Counsel outside the limits of the Diocese.

Your Committee would further recommend, in case their report and suggestions are adopted, that a Committee be appointed to carry out the same.
