Premier Robinson will continue as president of the executive council. A meeting of the government was afterwards held at which considerable routine business was transacted. All the members, except Allen, leave for St. John by the 10 o'clock train tomorrow.

The minister of education stated that cheaper school books in Ontario was brought about by putting the printing of the books up to public competition and not on account of any cut rate on a special lot. Premier Whitney's reply was as follows:

"No, there was no cut rate. Tenders were advertised for a number of weeks. A number of tenders were sent in and the lowest tender accepted. Instead of increased price in new issue of school books in Ontario, the government confidently hoped that reduction in prices of other books will result from the extension of the policy adopted."






