

Reports from the west say farmers are now face to face with the difficulty of obtaining men to assist in saving the crops. Laborers are urgently needed everywhere and it does not seem as though nearly enough would be obtained. An effort has been made by the Canadian Pacific Railway to bring help from Great Britain, having offered a cheap return fare, of which it was expected a great number would take advantage. 
