MISCELLANEA.

MONT ST. MICHEL.—The Edinburgh Observer gives the following account of the fortress of St. Michel, in Normandy, where Poignac is to remain for life:—

The state prison of Mont St. Michel stands on a lofty pyramidal rock, situated in a spacious bay bearing the same name, which separates Normandy from Brittany. Seen from a distance, especially from the sea, it greatly resembles the rock of Avisa in the Firth of Clyde. The channel that separates the mount from the main land may be crossed by pedestrians at low water, but numerous quick sands, and the rapidity with which the tide rises, render a guide necessary. The rock shoots up steeply on all sides, and round the base about one hundred houses are clustered within strong defensive works. Stairs cut in the rock, and carefully guarded, lead up to the prison, which is near its summit; and the extreme pinnacle is surmounted by a stately abbey, about seven hundred feet above the level of the sea. This edifice is reckoned a place of great sanctity, and is still a famous place of pilgrimage among the devotees of the Church of Rome.

As far back as the days of William the Conqueror, Mont St. Michel was a strong hold of note, and many distinguished men pined and perished in its dungeons. Ten thousand troops were assured, could find accommodation in the fortress and abbey alone; and the subterranean apartments, scooped in the entrails of the mountain, and of which many bloody and barbarous traditions are on record, form a labyrinth of which even the officials do not know the boundaries. At the time we speak of (1822) about eight hundred prisoners were reported to be immured in the fortress, part of them for crimes against the state, and part for common felonies. Among the horrible contrivances in this dreary retreat, there is an abyss called "Montgomery's Hole," of prodigious depth, which is supposed to have been an obligatory or concealed trap door, upon which, in barbarous times, criminals inimical to the state, and whose death it was deemed advisable to cover with mystery, were lured to step unwittingly, and so hurried into eternity. In one of the dungeons, so late as the end of last century, there was a huge cage, constructed of strong wooden bars, in which many eminent victims pined and suffered; and among others, Francis de Bretonniere, a printer of Leyden, who was clandestinely seized in Holland, for publishing a satire on Louis XIV., and who died in this horrible cell after a long and severe imprisonment.

Louis XI. one of the cruellest and meanest despots that ever disgraced the throne of France, had a great liking for Mont St. Michel, and made frequent pilgrimages to its shrine; and one of his improvements was, the formation of *whiffles*, (pits, or "forgotten holes," slanted like inverted cones,) in which the wretched beings immured in them could neither lie, sit, or stand, and into which they were lowered with the knowledge that they were left to die of starvation.

EXAMPLE.—Example, any act or word which disposes to imitation. ROBINSON CRUSOE.—Dupon.—His inimitable "Robinson Crusoe" has been translated into every continental language, and has even kindled the enthusiasm of the Arabs, as they listened out-side their tents to its incidents, rendered into the vernacular by the skill of the traveller Burkhardt. By more discriminating and fastidious judges it has been equally well received. It warmed the unsocial heart of Rousseau, and taught him to feel that there were other things in nature worthy consideration besides himself: relaxed the cynical frown of Johnson; delighted Blair and Beattie; and in our own days has received the unqualified commendation of such men as Scott, Lamb, and Hazlitt. Public opinion, split into a thousand nice distinctions on other literary topics, has been unanimous on the subject of "Robinson Crusoe." It has received the suffrages and interested the feelings of all ages and grades in society, of the schoolboy and the man—of the peer and the peasant.—The reason of this is obvious. Crusoe is nature herself speaking in her own language on her own most favourite and intelligible topics. Art is nowhere present, she is discarded for matters of higher and more general interest. While the poet and the scholar appeal to the select few, De-foe throws himself abroad on the sympathies of the world. His subject, he feels, will bear him out; the strongest instincts of humanity will plead trumpet-tongued in his favour. Despite the extraordinary moral and intellectual changes that a new fashion of society, a new mode of writing and thinking, have wrought in England, "Robinson Crusoe" still retains (though partially dimmed) his reputation, and the reader who can unmoved peruse his adventures, may assure himself that the fault of such indifference lies with him; De-foe is wholly guiltless. Will it be believed that this title, so perfect in its descriptions—so affecting in its simplicity—so entirely and incorruptly natural—was refused by almost every bookseller in the metropolis? Yet strange as it may seem, this was actually the fact. "Robinson Crusoe" was hawked about through the trade as a work of neither mark nor liveliness, and at last accepted, as a proof of especial condescension, by an obscure retail bookseller.—*Lon. Monthly Mag.* for Jan.

LORD HILL AT TALAVERA.—Hill was moving up to reinforce General Dinkins, and in the act of giving some orders to the colour of the 48th Regiment, when he was fired at from this summit; and not doubting that the shots proceeded from some British stragglers, who mistook the direction of their fire, he rode shortly up, accompanied by his brigade Major, Eurydice, to stop them. These two were immediately surrounded by the enemy, and were killed on the spot; and the hand of a French grenadier was already on the bridle of Hill's charger; but the general spurred his horse hard, broke away, and galloped off. Directing the wounded men downwards, he met a part of the 29th; and turning, led them up with uncalculating courage to the charge. The old 29th did not disappoint him; they went back the summit at the point of the bayonet. But scarcely had the general placed them in position by the side of Colonel Donkin's brigade, ere a heavy mass of French battalions again advanced; and a violent attack, of which the first was but a prelude, burst upon them. The fire flashed red upon the night; and was delivered close, that the combatants discerned each other's formation within a few paces. The British having poured in their deadly volleys, rushed on with their bayonets, broke the dark column, and drove it down.—*Dr. Lardner's Library*—*Memories of Wellington.*

It is this:—Newcastle coals are actually sold cheaper in Egypt than in London; and consequently, the inland manufactures of that country are in a better situation, in respect to the coals, than the manufactures of the metropolis of the Kingdom in which those coals are produced!—*N. In 1403, during the civil war in France, William Arnaud, Viscount Poignac raised the standard of rebellion, but was soon afterwards arrested. It was a General Lafayette whom the King sent against him, and who took possession of his chateau. Is it not strange that now, after three centuries and a half, a Lafayette should again have overthrown a Poignac.

The religious ceremonies at the Catholic Chapel, in Edinburgh, were conducted with unusual splendour and solemnity on Christmas day, and a large congregation were present.—High mass was celebrated in the morning and vespers commenced at half-past two o'clock in the afternoon, the Archbishop of Rheims (Cardinal Latini) presiding. This is the first instance since the days of Cardinal Beaton, of such a high dignitary of the Roman Church officiating at public worship in Scotland. What rendered the service still more interesting, was the presence of Charles X, the Duke and Duchess D'Angoulême, Duchess de Berri, Duke de Bordeaux, and his sister, and the different noble and distinguished personages composing their suites, who occupied, for the first time, the seats lately prepared for them, on the opposite side of the altar. On the royal party leaving the chapel an immense crowd assembled, the greater part of whom accompanied as his Majesty entered his carriage.

Orders have been given by the Duke of Hamilton to have his papers in readiness for the reception of their Majesties, who are to visit Scotland early in the summer, and will take up their residence, while in the west, at Hamilton Palace. By the death of the late Earl of Roxburgh, his Grace has an accession to his already great income of upwards of £8,000 a year, derived from a landed property, besides £100,000 in ready money.—*Glasgow F. Press.*

Phenepher of Lord Byron.—In his journal, under date of January 13, 1821, Lord Byron writes:—"Dined—News came—the Powers mean to war with the Peoples. The intelligence seems to be positive—let it be so—they will be beaten in the end. The Kings-ships are fast finishing. There will be blood shed like water, and tears like milk; but the Peoples will conquer in the end. I shall not wait to see it; but I foresee it."

SIMON BOLIVAR.
(From the New-York Observer.)
Simon Bolivar, was born at Caracas, (Venezuela) on the 24th of July, 1783. He was educated in his native city, at the time of his birth. He first distinguished himself by his military talents, at an early age, and in his sixteenth year was sent to Europe for his education. He made the tour of France and Italy; married at Madrid, and returned to Venezuela. He visited Europe two or three times, and was present at the coronation of Napoleon. His third voyage was made in a public capacity, in 1811, for the purpose of asking the protection of England against the mother country. From that moment he was engaged heart and hand in the great work of giving liberty to Spanish America; a work, which, though attended with immense difficulties and discouragements, he lived to see successfully accomplished. Our latest dates this week, have reached us via Halifax, and are from London down to the 25th, and Liverpool to the 26th. In contemplating the state of our home affairs, the eye painfully and reluctantly lingers on one of the fairest portions of the earth, in a natural point of view, but alas! one that continues to be sadly blighted by the perennial breath of a moral pestilence. We never regarded the settlement of Ireland, and were far from imagining as to the extent even of temporary quietude which it was expected to produce. And we are now more than ever convinced of the soundness of our views on the subject, with this additional conviction, that the disaffected party regarding the concession as having been the forced effect of a constrained and reluctant liberality, are thereby emboldened to rise in their demands. Their leader, it appears, has proceeded with too much unguarded violence in his career of agitation, and has, to his surprise and indignation, found himself in the hands of certain unmanly functionaries, who have very unceremoniously reported him to find bad! This is rather an awkward predicament for the Liberator of his country, and a member of the Imperial Parliament! It may well serve as a damper to his soaring expectations, unless he aims at a place in the Tower of London. Whatever may be the result in the particular case of G. CORWELL, we cannot but view with deep concern the general state of the country to which he belongs, and earnestly wish that we could see any thing which we might regard as the light of a safety valve, through which the floating vapours of discontent may find egress. In the meantime, measures are being taken in the proper quarter for giving greater efficiency to His Majesty's Government in Ireland, which we hope will be the precursors of some substantial and constitutional means of ensuring at once, satisfaction and relief.

From this gloomy and disheartening topic, it is our pleasing task to turn the thoughts of our readers to a subject of high congratulation to the inhabitants of these Colonies generally, and more especially to those of this Province. We refer to the settlement of the long pending Boundary Line Question.
