### \$12,000 Award In Cheesman Suit

The case of Cheesman vs. the Canadian Pacific Railway was concluded in the supreme court yesterday afternoon. In this case, Laura H. Cheesman, the plaintiff, brought an action for damages against the railway for loss of her husband's life, who was killed while working as an engineer in the employ of the company. In answer to questions submitted by Chief Justice McKeown the jury found that the accident was caused through the negligence of the defendant company in having a deficient brake on one of their cars, and at the same time found that there was no negligence on one of their cars, and at the same time found that there was no negligence on the part of any of the employes. Had there been negligence on the part of any of the fellow employes of the deceased, the case would have come under the Workmen's Compensation act, the maximal damages under the act being \$2,000. The case was tried in the alternative, D. Mullin, K. C., who appeared for the plaintiff, relying on both the Workmen's Compensation act and the common law procedure, in the latter case the damages not being limited. The jury, in their answer to the questions submitted by the chief justice brought the case within the scope of the common law, and awarded damages to the amount of \$12,-

The amendment is designed to put a summary stop to all the agitations against the enforcement of the bill once it becomes law, and to prevent any legal proceedings under the belong corpus or otherwise from der habeas corpus or otherwise from interfering with or delaying quick action once a man is conscripted.

Newspaper editors who allow in their

papers anything calculated to induce or papers anything calculated to induce or influence any person to resist or impede the execution of the act, will, under the new section, be liable, upon indictment or upon summary conviction, to from one to five years' imprisonment and their paper shall be summarily suppressed for the duration of the resistance. the duration of the war. Any person who speaks or writes against compliance with the conscription law shall be also liable to speedy incarceration for a like period. No tricks of the law can be invoked to protract legal proceedings in connection with appeals from the decisions of any of the conscription tribunals. The new section puts an effective clo sure on all anti-conscriptionists once the bill becomes law. Under it the province of Quebec and every other section or class in Canada would have to keep quiet and submit or else go to jail.

The solicitor-general merely read the amendment. He made no comment upon it beyond saying that the members of the house would have the text available for reference in tomorrow's Hansard.






