

The fighting this afternoon seems to be more vigorous along the northern part of the Hindenburg line than elsewhere. The British are sweeping along astride it from the point where it joined the Drocourt line at Queant. Considerable progress is reported and large numbers of Germans have been killed or taken prisoner. Thousands of prisoners are coming into the cages. One army had 6,000 Germans in its cages this afternoon.

GREAT NET IS SPREAD IN U.S. FOR SLACKERS

Gigantic Organization To Clean Out Delinquents

hose Failing to Report Having Hard Time—Ostracized by Fellows-Deserter Colonies Estab-

Washington, Sept. 4—It is announced by the war department that a great or-ganization, extending into every state, and with agents in other countries, has contracted to hunt down those who at-

and with agents in other countries, has contracted to hunt down those who attempt to evade the provisions of the new selective service law.

Much detail concerning the steps which the government already has taken to round up slackers is given for the first time, along with an estimate that nearly 25,000 who were subject to the original draft law but falled to register, had been arrested since June 5, 1917.

Facts are presented concerning the colonies which were formed in Canada, Mexico City, and other parts of Mexico, by the draft dodgers and the contempt in which these former citizens of the United States were held both by their own countrymen who are over the draft ages and by the natives. It is pointed out that Canada ceased to provide a safe haven for slackers when the British-American draft treaty was adopted.

While the provost-marshal general's office and the department of justice are satisfied that the great body of Americans will register and willingly offer themselves for service, the officials are determined that less patriotic men shall not be permitted to escape the full penalty of the law if any outlay of time and energy can be made to bring them to justice. 


