UKraine Rada Declares Itself.

Petrograd, Jan. 27—By a vote of 308 to 4, the Ukrainian central Rada has decided to proclaim the complete independence of the Ukraine republ.c. The proclamation reproaches the Petrograd commissioners for delaying peace and for invoking the so-called new holy war, and adds that the Ukraine wishes to live out terms of concord and a friendship, with Roumania, Turkey and the other neighboring powers.







are as follows: Boiled Haddock-Wash and scale thoroughly, wipe_the inside, and fasten the tail in the mouth with a skewer. Put 2 oz. salt into ½ gal. water, and when it is dissolved, put in the fish. Bring the water to a boil, remove the scum, then simmer gently (about ½ hour), until the flesh leaves the bones easily. Take it up as soon as it is sufficiently cooked or it will be hard and tasteless. Garnish with parsley, and serve with melted soutter.
