BALFOUR'S RETIREMENT

The retirement of Mr. Balfour from the leadership marks a very important change in the Conservative party in the United Kingdom.

Mr. Balfour has not been vigorous enough to please the hothouse of the party, and some of them have openly clamored for his resignation.

Nevertheless it will be no easy task to find a successor who will please the two factions into which the Conservative party is divided.

Mr. Balfour commanded respect and confidence, though unable in recent years to gain the support of a majority of the people.

The Liberals will not be disturbed by the change in the opposition camp. They have entertained kindly feelings toward Mr. Balfour, who is personally on the most friendly terms with Mr. Asquith.

Mr. Asquith has sprung another surprise with his manhood suffrage announcement. That policy will be bitterly opposed by the Conservatives, but they do not seem to be any good ground for the statement that it will meet with hostile criticism from the Liberal ranks.

Mr. Balfour will doubtless find some enjoyment in watching the tactics of his party under a new leader. He has never before disturbed the serenity of his life.

Speaking generally on the subject of the efficiency of workers of all classes, Mr. McCarthy made these further observations, which are worthy of thoughtful attention:

Just laws cannot come except from an intelligent working class of people who know their rights, who know what the ballot is, and who, by their training and the discipline and nobility of labor, are fitted to become citizens and manufacturers of that law."

STRUGGLE OF MOTHERS FOR A CROWN

Bitter Fight Will Be Precipitated When Old Franz Joseph Dies

A SERIOUS DILEMMA

The Question Can Be Settled Only by Setting Aside Either Austrian or Hungarian Law in Favor of Son or Nephew

Vienna, Oct. 25.—Austria-Hungary is preparing for trouble of a kind which Europe has not known for a couple of centuries. Who will be nominated heir to the oldest of European empires when tottering Franz Joseph dies, and martial, pragmatic Franz Ferdinand regains his throne? Will it be Franz Ferdinand's twenty-four-year-old nephew Archduke Karl Franz Josef, an Austrian constitutional and Habsburg family law both provide? Or will it be Franz Ferdinand's round-faced morganatic son, Prince Max of Hohenberg, an Hungarian constitutional law no less emphatically demands? Will Duchess Sophie of Hohenberg, daughter of a third-rate diplomat, be raised to Empress, and sit in the exalted throne of the divine Maria Theresa, a throne so proud that Austria legend declares it killed a presumptuous lackey who recklessly sat down in it?

On these momentous questions wise, forethoughtful Austrians are beginning to make up their minds and pick their choice. It is necessary, they feel, to be on the winning side. And all the myriad traditional interests, combinations, sentiments and calculations of profit which lurk in the gray shadows of the dynastic struggle, are being mobilized secretly, so that when the dynastic Armageddon comes to be fought every courier and soldier shall be in his appointed place.

The Austria Empire—bella grant alii, tu felix Austria, sub—was made by a fortunate marriage. It now threatens to be unmade by one. For there is not a single Austrian constitutional jurist who has succeeded in devising a way out of the dilemma which will arise on the day of Franz Joseph's death. Strictly speaking, the new Kaiser Franz Ferdinand, will have two absolutely legitimate heirs, one heir to the Austrian crown and the other to the ancient Kingdom of Hungary. The first is his nephew, Karl Franz Josef, son of his dead brother, Otto. The second is his nine-year-old son, Prince Max of Hohenberg, by his morganatic consort, Duchess Hohenberg, nee Cholek.

Laws at Odds

Austrian and Hungarian constitutional laws are flatly opposed here. According to Austrian law and Habsburg family law the next heir is Archduke Karl, since death of a morganatic marriage, though legitimate, have no royal status at all. The Hungarian constitutional law ignores altogether the theory of morganatic marriages and declares that all legal marriages are equally valid and that the wife and children take the husband's rank. According to Hungarian law, therefore, Sophie Hohenberg will be next Queen of Hungary and her son Max will be Crown Prince, and if Austrian law declares that Karl is Emperor of Austria that, as Hungarians, is Austria's concern. But this easy settlement is in fact quite impracticable, because the personal union of Austria and Hungary under one crown is an essential part of the compact entered into by the Hungarian agreement of 1867.

That was the reason why Franz Ferdinand's dogged decision to marry Countess

DUCHESS HOHENBERG'S MOST DANGEROUS ENEMY

Sophie met with strong opposition from the Kaiser. It meant dissolving the empire. Franz Ferdinand, however, was determined to keep his pledge to the attractive Sophie, and a compromise was made. A secret meeting was held in 1889 at the Hohenberg, and Archduke Franz Ferdinand solemnly vowed that he renounced all imperial or royal rights of his future wife and future children. This oath referred to Hungary, because in Austria there was no question of rights. It was assumed that the matter was settled; that after Franz Ferdinand's death both crowns would go to his nephew, and some even thought to facilitate his personal claims and that Archduke Karl would directly succeed the old Kaiser.

The settlement had a flaw from the first. The Hungarians were not inclined to accept the renunciation. "Franz Ferdinand," said their constitutional lawyers, "can renounce his own rights to the Hungarian throne, but he cannot renounce the rights of his unborn eldest son, as his son—if there is one—will be Hungary's lawful future sovereign. The fact that Austria won't have him at Kaiser doesn't concern us. He is our King, and nobody except himself when he grows up—can renounce his right to the succession. It is a paradox that while the Hungarians detest Franz Ferdinand, as he indeed detests them, they were thus in the position of supporting the claims of his heir. But the Hungarian independence party, which wants complete separation from Austria, sees in this divorce of crown and crown an admirable way of peacefully and legally attaining its end.

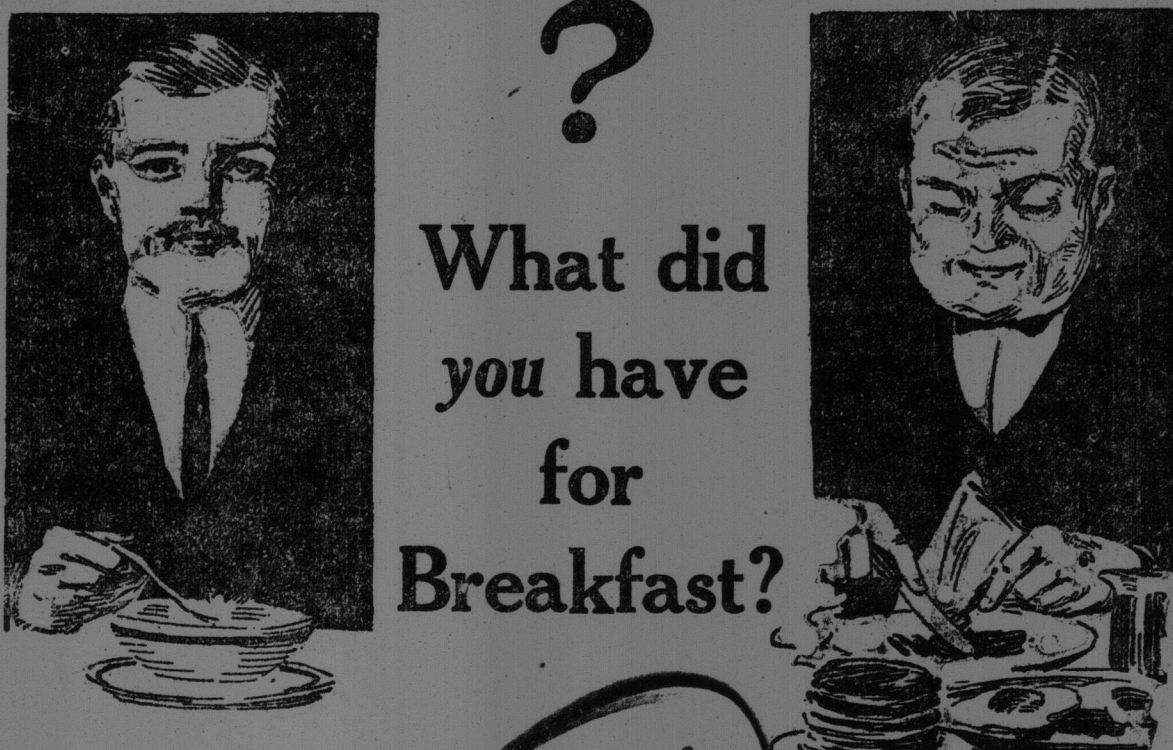
The issue That, however, is not the intent of Archduke Franz Ferdinand, who is an ambitious man of strong character, full of the proud tradition of Austria as heir of the Roman Empire, and immersed in ambitious projects for international prestige. So far from being willing to see the empire dissolve into two petty kingdoms, he is suspected of strong centralizing tendencies. Nobody, therefore, expects the dynastic quarrel to be solved at the expense of national unity. One of two very different things is one—will be Hungary's lawful future sovereign. The fact that Austria won't have him at Kaiser doesn't concern us. He is our King, and nobody except himself when he grows up—can renounce his right to the succession. It is a paradox that while the Hungarians detest Franz Ferdinand, as he indeed detests them, they were thus in the position of supporting the claims of his heir. But the Hungarian independence party, which wants complete separation from Austria, sees in this divorce of crown and crown an admirable way of peacefully and legally attaining its end.

When two years ago Kaiser Wilhelm visited Franz Ferdinand at Eckartsau, an agreement was made according to which Austria would build four Dreadnoughts in return for which Wilhelm II. would be the first sovereign to recognize the archduke's wife. When the Franz Ferdinands returned the visit at Berlin the duchess sat between the Kaiser and the crown prince, a position customarily reserved for a full royal; and she thus was given precedence of several Prussian princesses who were present. Next the duchess appeared for the first time at the Habsburg court ball, and when Kaiser Wilhelm and his family visited Vienna on their way to Corfu the Kaiser's daughter, Princess Victoria Louise, respectfully kissed her hand at the railway station. Such kissing of the hand by a princess is usual only in the case of empresses or crown princesses; and with that symbolic kiss the triumph of the Hohenbergs interest, seemed assured. The Austrian archduchesses were very angry, and suggest of all was the Archduchess Marie Jose, who happens to be mother of Archduke Karl, the rival heir.

The two hundred odd archdukes and archduchesses of the Habsburg-Habsburg-Tarcani and Habsburg-Medona families are nearly all solid in opposition to the Hohenzollerns. Some of them are near the throne, and might arrive at it if Karl dies childless; and the rest resent the prospect of the duchess standing above them. The partisans of Archduke Karl declare that he will not only insist on his right as heir to Austria, but will have Franz Ferdinand to have the army, the navy, and the machinery of civil government in his hands; and he probably will take care that his supporters are in all high command before he makes his momentous declaration. That is why many expect that the question will not be raised in any direct way after the present Kaiser's death.

German Tactician Urges His Country to Build Great Fleet—Sometimes Better Than Dreadnoughts. Berlin, Nov. 9.—Colonel Gullie, one of the foremost publicists on matters military and tactical, publishes an article in the "Berliner Tageblatt" under the title "Submarines to the Front," in which he advocates the building by Germany of a great fleet of submarines. His argument is that in a naval war between Great Britain and Germany the operations would be confined to the limited area of the North Sea, in which case submarines would play a more important part even than the giant Dreadnoughts. He says: "It is now impossible to imagine a naval war in which submarines would not play an important role. Immediately upon mobilization, each party, except in cases where their coasts lay too far apart, would send its submarines to watch the entrance of the enemy's harbors and prevent the departure of his big battleships. Submarines would be used for coast defense, to patrol harbor entrances and river mouths, and to blockade narrow waterways. Finally, working in conjunction with battleships, they would be used for coast defense, to weapons of offense upon the high seas. Against the submarine the large battleships, in spite of its heavy defense armor, mighty armament, and high speed, is in a very poor position. It is hardly able to see its enemy, whose small periscope is visible only intermittently above the water, and when it does discover a periscope its only chance is to run, and even this means of escape would often fail in case of a simultaneous attack from two or three submarines coming from different quarters."

British Steamer Ashore. Key West, Fla., Nov. 8.—The British steamer Conway, bound from New Orleans for Norfolk, Keweenaw, Copenhagen, etc., has gone ashore on Rebecca shoals. Wreckers have gone to render assistance.
