



They are not at all likely to believe that their loyalty will be sacrificed unless they let the wheat rot in the fields. They will feel that the best way to develop loyalty is to promote prosperity, and this in their case means reciprocity. Mr. Borden and his colleagues in London will receive the news from Saskatchewan with some dismay, for this is a provincial election which is of great federal significance. BISHOP PERRIN'S LONDON CHURCH

St. Andrew Undershaft is One of The Few That Survived the Great Fire May Be Checked by Using

(Times' Special Correspondence)
London, July 2—St. Andrew Undershaft, the church to which the Right Rev. William W. Perrin, late Bishop of British Columbia, has been inducted, is one of the clutch with a history stretching back to the reign of Queen Elizabeth. It is one of the few churches which survived the great fire of London. It takes its curious name from the fact that in the Efth century a shaft, or the old English Maypole, used to be erected outside the south door for the national holiday of May Day.

It is interesting to note that in 151. England protested against the foreign in cubus, and "Evil May Day" in that year was the last date on which the Maypole was permitted to be erected outside the church. The resentment of the English apprentices against the influx of foreigners, which had been simmering, culminated on that day in a riot against the commercial invader. Ottawa, July 12—An increase in revenue and expenditure is the showing in the Canadian financial statement for June and the first quarter of the fiscal year, just issued. In the three months the revenue aggregated \$37,838,110 as against \$29,239,646 in the corresponding period. The expenditure on consolidated account was \$12,481,931 as compared with \$8,935,732. Capital outlay totalling \$1,533,920 shows a decrease of half a million. At the present rate the year's revenue will total \$160,000,000.



KILLS TWO

Boston, July 12—Two severe electrical storms broke over Greater Boston yesterday, one shortly before 11 o'clock and the other three hours later. During the first one, which lasted for about half an hour, a girl was killed in Cambridge when she ran into a live wire which had been broken down, and a boy met death in Everett by being struck by a bolt.

All along the north side of Boston suburban places were treated to a good downpour of rain and to an electrical display such as they had not seen for manymonths. Limbs were broken off trees, buildings were damaged and many people were badly frightened. The city proper and south aide suburbs experienced about the same conditions.

One apartment house in the Back Bay was hit but_are damage was done, other than to give the occupants a network shock. In Cambridge the Inman Street Universalist church was struck, the bolt shattering the recently repaired asteple, causing several thousand dollars damage. Somerville had two still alarms, and other places had to turn out their firemen in the drenching rain, and several of the fires' caused considerable damage. The worst one was in Newton, where George Frost's home, one of the best houses in the city, suffered several thousand dollars' damage.

In Cambridge and some other places the second storm was even more severe than the first. In that city, Somerville and other places telephone service was more of less crippled, fire alarm circuits were burned out and other injury caused to wires and poles.
