THE CHOLERA SCOURGE IN SOUTH ITALY

Spread of the Disease Has Caused Break of Purposeful

FEARED FOR EXHIBITION

Conditions in Affected District Declared to be Bad and Much Needs be Done on Educational Lines-Recovery of Valuable Works in Statuary

(Times' Special Correspondence) Rome, Sept. 24-The tragedy of Verbiaro has had the effect of definitely liftcaro has had the effect of definitely litting the veil of silence that has been drawn over the subject of the cholera in Italy throughout the year. But it has done more than that. It has drawn more attention during the last few weeks to the conditions of life in a great part of Southern Italy than has been done by all the articles written on the subject during the last ten years.

the articles written on the subject during the last ten years.

It has been well known that the "brutto male" (cholera) has been in existence on the mainland and in Sicily for at least three months, but Italians have been content to follow the lead of their government and say that a public acknowledgement of the truth would jeopardize the success of the exhibition. Romans did not complain even when excursion trains at cheap fares were run to the capital from Naples; where they were well aware that cases had occurred. It is only lately, when the spread of the disease has been too evident to be denied, that they have

expressed openly their doubts as to the wisdom of the policy of silence on the part of the government.

It is a question if this unwillingness to confess the truth has not defeated its own object. The exhibition, in spite of its artistic excellence, is acknowledged to have resulted up to the present time in financial failure. The official "Journal of Public Works" has confessed to a deficit of a million francs, a figure which has been received generally with an expressive shrug of the shoulders. And the hope of converting the deficit into a favorable balance which rests on an expected big influx of Italians and foreigners into Rome during the autumn and winter and the ensuing spring, has been discounted by the supineness of the authorities.

The new invention has been applied not only to rifles, but to fowling pieces and other weapons. As regards rifles, Mr. Svenson has invented two kinds of appliances, one of which can be used as an ordianry rifle and another as a machine gun. He says that his weapon can at will be made to perform both functions without its weight in any way being increased. It can be loaded either at the breech or underneath by inserting the cartridge magazine.

A company of infantry, equipped with the new rifle and forming a front of fiften paces, can fire, it is said, seventy shots a second, or if fitted with a larger magazine 240 to 250 shots in three seconds. A battery of machine guns, consisting of four pieces served by sixteen men with their officers, would occupy a front of fiften paces and fire under the same conditions only thirty-two to ninety-five shots in the same space of time.

In addition to this, machine guns are difficult to transport, or to place in position, or to hide from the enemy, which is not the case with the rifle of the Svenson type.

The new weapon is about the same weight as the Mauser rifle, and has the same kind of barrel but its entire length is five centimetres shorter. Apother ad-


