PROCEEDINGS

—OF THE—

INCORPORATED SYNOD of the DIOCESE OF HURON

THIRTY-FOURTH SESSION.

(Being the Seventeenth under the Synod Act of Incorporation of 1874.)

FIRST DAY.

The Synod was convened at London, on Tuesday, June 16th, 1891.

Divine Service was held in St. Paul's Cathedral at 10 o'clock a.m.

The Holy Communion was administered to the Clergy and Lay Representatives by the Lord Bishop, assisted by the Very Rev. G. M. Innes, M. A., Dean of Huron; Ven. A. H. R. Mulholland, Archdeacon of Grey; and Revs. Canon Hincks, Hill and Davis.

The Sermon was preached by the Rev. H. G. Miller, M. A., Principal of Huron College, from Isaiah ix., 8.

The Synod assembled at 2.30 p. m., in the Chapter House, for business.

The Lord Bishop in the chair.

The appointed prayers were said by Ven. Archdeacon Mulholland.

In the unavoidable absence of Mr. John Ransford, Honorary Lay Secretary, Mr. Wilmot Swaisland was appointed by the Chairman to act as Honorary Lay Secretary *pro tem*.

The rolls of the Clergy and Lay Representatives were then called by their respective Secretaries, when 77 Clergymen and 72 Lay Representatives answered to their names.

The ballot papers were, in accordance with the Canon, distributed to the members of the Synod as their names were called.

THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS.

His Lordship then delivered his Annual Address to the Synod.

REVEREND BRETHREN AND BRETHREN OF THE LAITY:—

We meet again after all the mercies and vicissitudes of another year, only to realize that though apparently, yet not in fact, are we exactly the same Body as when we last assembled in this hall. Some old and familiar faces are missing from among us which no more shall greet us on earth. They are gazing now on brighter skies, and living amid happier scenes, for they are in the presence of the King at whose right hand there are pleasures for evermore. Yet we shall meet again in that glorious Synod, when the great sacramental host of the redeemed, having forever laid aside the body of its humiliation, and put on the body of its glory, shall assemble round the feet of the great Shepherd and Bishop of our souls. In the meantime we must all with gratitude confess that goodness and mercy have followed us throughout each day of the past year, and that whatever fresh experience the year may have brought us—whether of clouds or sunshine, joy or weeping, disappointment or success, our indebtedness to the God of all comfort and joy has only been vastly deepened and enlarged.

OBITUARY NOTICES.

Since last we met in Synod, the Lord has been pleased to call to Himself two old and highly valued members of our Diocese: The late Rev. William Davis, Rector of Woodhouse, and the late Rev. John Gemley, Rector of Simcoe. The Rev. William Davis, who fell asleep in December of last year, was ordained to the sacred ministry by the first Bishop of Huron; the Rt. Rev. Dr. Cronyn, in the year 1864. His ministry, which extended throughout 27 years, was an honourable record of unwearied industry and consecrated zeal. I may mention the faithfulness with which he preached, and the earnestness with which he upheld the principles of eternal truth. It was his earnest desire to die in harness, a wish which was strictly realized, for in the midst of duties and cares God called him to Himself, to rest forever in His love. He died lamented by all who knew him, and leaving to the Diocese the salutary lesson that a clergyman need not be young to enable him to perform a large amount of work, or retain the blush of early years to possess the affection and good-will of his people.

The late Rev. John Gemley, who had been an honoured minister of the Methodist communion, was admitted into the Diaconate in July, 1874, and ordained to the Priesthood in May, 1875. For some time he officiated as Assistant Minister in St. Paul's Cathedral, London, under the Very Rev. Dean Innes, but in

1880, on the demise of the Rev. Elliott Grasset, he was preferred to the Rectory of Simcoe, where he remained until the day of his death. A man of marked ability, genial manners and extraordinary freshness; he will long be remembered, at least by the elder men of the Diocese.

The Rev. Henry Banwell, whose death we have also to record, was admitted into the Diocese in October, 1881, and was stationed for a while in Essex, and subsequently in Port Stanley.

FINANCIAL REPORT.

The Financial Report of the Diocese, while in some respects very gratifying, calls for our serious solicitude and care. The total receipts for the year ending April 30th, 1890, were \$16,978.83, whereas the total receipts for the year ending at the same date, 1891, were \$18,005.97, being an actual increase of \$1,027.14 over the past year. The items composing these totals are as follows:—

MAINTENANCE AND MISSION FUND.

In connection with this fund, I must now draw your attention to a fact which requires our serious attention.

Owing to circumstance, which I hope presently to explain, this fund has been largely overdrawn.

On the 30th of April, 1889, the balance to its credit was \$2,467.33. In 1890, at the same date, the balance was only \$974.52, showing that in that year our expenditure had exceeded our receipts by \$1,492.81.

Having stated this, I will now compare the drafts on this fund in 1890 with those in 1891:—

In 1890 our missionaries received from this fund \$14,096.08, but in the year 1891 \$15,752.92, being an increase of \$1,656.84.

Outfits paid in 1890, \$200; outfits paid in 1891, \$1,200, being an increase of \$1,000 over the past year.

Charges on the Commutation and Superannuation Funds:—

Now, the whole amount available for the Secretary-Treasurer for the year ending April 30th, 1891, from which he was to pay all charges, was \$13,297.29, and this inclusive of the \$974 surplus from the previous year. The amount, however, which he actually paid out was \$17,312.73, being \$4,015.44 in excess of his receipts. When I say "in excess of his receipts", you are not to understand that this large amount has been paid out absolutely; on the contrary, a large portion of it has been placed to the credit of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund. Canon XXVIII. enacts as follows:—

"That the Synod shall and will put to the credit of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, yearly and every year, on the thirty-first day of March, a sum of money, equal to ten dollars for every clergyman in the Diocese, which sum shall be considered as part of the income of the said fund."

This clause of the Canon having been in abeyance for several years, was brought again into operation in 1890, when the sum of \$1,350 was placed to the credit of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, and in 1891 a still larger amount, viz., \$1,390. Thus in two years, \$2,740, which, under the old arrangement, would have been at the disposal of the Mission Fund, have been passed to the credit of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund. I state this not only to account for

some portion of the \$4,015, but also to show that in all our future calculations concerning the Mission Fund, this most important factor must be borne in mind.

Now this statement of our financial affairs, however painful, need not, I think, create any alarm, because it is only the operation of certain laws which the Diocese, as a whole, has not sufficiently weighed. Still, I must admit that the fact of there being such a deficit imperatively calls for our prompt and vigorous action.

In explanation of this over draft, I desire to draw your careful consideration to two important factors in the case:—

First. The operation of Canon XXIX. on the expenditure of the Clergy Maintenance and Mission Fund.

Secondly. The result of an analysis of our parochial returns.

First, Canon XXIX. If ever there was a Canon which deserved the well wishes and hearty support of the clergy of this Diocese, it is this, providing, as it does, for the augmentation of all their stipends according to a regular and graduated scale. Every five years each clergyman in active service receives an increase of \$100 up to \$1,000, at which point it becomes stationary. I am not aware that any diocese in the empire possesses a Canon of equal advantage to its clergy. For such a provision then the clergy at least should be grateful, inasmuch as it demonstrates the practical sympathy of the Diocese at large with them in their work, and also the admission of the great principle that the workman is worthy of his hire. While I am sure you will all acquiesce in the above, permit me to draw your attention to the extreme costliness of the Canon. Every year so many of our clergy are attaining their necessary seniorities and drawing so much more therefore from the funds. Last year, owing to this and other reasons, the amount paid to the clergy was \$1,656.84 in excess of the previous year. The increase this current year will no doubt be proportionately great, and, therefore, it is transcendently clear that unless there is an improvement all along the line, and the increase of the receipts correspond fully to the rising outlay, there must in the immediate future be a severe financial crisis, when this Canon, now so full of comfort and substantial aid to the clergy, will be found impracticable owing to the fact that its continued operation is beyond the capacity of the Fund.

Secondly:—An analysis of our parochial returns exhibits the most extraordinary carelessness on the part of many from whom one might fairly expect otherwise. Thirty-six places send in no Parochial Association subscriptions whatever, and in various stations neglect and apparent indifference are only too painfully manifest.

In some instances where returns are made, the offering is so small that one can hardly imagine that either the clergyman or his people exhausted themselves in the effort. Certainly if a subscription is small through the poverty of the people, all will as truly honor it as if it was ten times the amount from the rich, but if it be the result of neglect on the part of clergyman even to notify his people one cannot but deplore that such a state of things should exist.

I think it only fair to state, in this connection, that while many of our clergy omit the collections from the wrong impression that their people are being too frequently solicited, yet there is another view of this subject which they would do well to take, and that is the following: That, irrespective of the loyalty which every clergyman is bound to show toward his own Diocese, and which loyalty should ever lead him to say that "Where his Synod commands, his duty is to obey," irrespective, I say, wholly of this consideration, there is this thought, that there must be in every congregation some to whom it is a real pleasure to give, be the amount never so little which they have to bestow toward the offertory appointed by the Synod. They are therefore debarred, and, I think, wrongly debarred, by the non-action of their clergyman by giving toward an object which has enlisted their sympathy and support. In concluding this subject, I may say that, if a clergyman announces a collection and there is no response whatever, he at least has done his duty, it is the people who are indifferent to the cause, but if he himself absolutely fails to give out any notice whatever, then, I think, not only the Synod, but the people themselves, have a just cause of complaint.

INDIAN MISSIONS IN THE DIOCESE OF HURON.

I am anxious to bring before you a statement concerning the Indian department of the missionary work of this Diocese, but desire, first of all, to acknowledge my indebtedness to the Rev. Mr. Ashton, the able manager of the Mohawk Institute, for a very valuable paper of Indian statistics which he has kindly sent me. From this paper we learn that the total Indian population of the Diocese of Huron is 7,441. This really large number of Indians, which, as will presently appear, is in excess of those in the Diocese of Algoma, is divided as to faith in the following proportions:—

Total number in Huron, 7,441: Protestants, 5,870; Roman Catholics, 303; Pagan or unknown, 1,268. Total number in Algoma, 7,256: Protestants, 1,054; Roman Catholics, 6,043; Pagan or unknown, 158.

If now we turn to the Bands in which Diocesan Missions are carried on, we see what moneys each band receives as the interest on invested capital and rents:—

Our missionary stations among the Indians are as follows:—

(1) *The Six Nations on the Grand River.*—Here are no less than five churches and one station, supported by the New England Company since 1827. The Mohawk Institute, which is presided over by the Rev. Mr. Ashton with so much zeal and ability, is entirely supported by the New England Company. The pupils of the Institute form the congregation of the old Mohawk church, probably the oldest in the west. The Revds. D. J. Caswell and I. Bearfoot labor here, but the former is wholly supported by the Company, the latter mainly so. The Six Nations, however, contribute nothing toward the support of the ministry, though they expend on their secular schools about \$2,000.

(2) *Walpole Island.*—Here there is an excellent church and a minister in continual attendance, the Rev. John Jacobs. There is also one school which receives aid from the Diocese. The clergyman is in part supported by the Diocese.

(3) *The Munceytown Reservation.*—Here there are three churches and a resident minister, the Rev. A. Grassett Smith. There is also an excellent parsonage and three day schools, which are supported by the Band.

(4) *The Sarnia and Kettle Point Reserve.*—Here are two churches and two schools. This mission is not, I regret to say, in a healthy condition.

(5) *Moravian Town Mission.*—Here is an excellent church, the services of which are regularly maintained by Mr. Thomas Burnside, under the supervision of the Rev. Wm. Hinde, of Thamesville. At Moravian Town, with a population of 292, there are three churches (one of ours and two of other bodies), and though the people have an income of about \$25 per head, they contribute little or nothing towards the support of the ministry. The Indians are most assuredly a charge given us of God, and we are bound to do all in our power for their spiritual growth and development.

ANGLICAN CHURCH CONSOLIDATION.

You are aware that a conference was held at Winnipeg, on the 15th and 16th of August last, consisting of the representatives of the Provincial Synods of Canada and Rupert's Land, to consider and determine upon the best method for the consolidation of the Anglican Church in British North America. The meeting was convened by the Lord Bishop of Toronto, and the following was the scheme of union as proposed :—

OFFICIAL RECORD OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE CONFERENCE.

At a Conference held at the City of Winnipeg on the 15th and 16th days of the month of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety, composed of delegates from "the Provincial Synod of Canada," the several dioceses in said province, the Provincial Synod of Rupert's Land, and the Diocese of New Westminster, British Columbia, the following resolutions were adopted :—

I. That this Conference is of opinion that it is expedient to unite and consolidate the various branches of the Church of England in British and North America.

II. That in any scheme of union, the Conference affirms the necessity of the retention of Provinces under a General Synod.

III. Proposed basis of union :—

1. There shall be a General Synod, consisting of the Bishops of the Church of England in the Dominion of Canada and the Diocese of Newfoundland, and of Delegates chosen from the clergy and the laity.

The Delegates shall be chosen by the several Diocesan Synods according to such rules as they may adopt, or, in a diocese which has no synodical organization, may be appointed by the Bishop. The representation shall be as follows: Dioceses having fewer than 25 licensed clergymen, one delegate from each order; dioceses having 25 and fewer than 50 licensed clergymen, two of each order; dioceses having 50 and fewer than 100, three of each order; dioceses having 100 licensed clergymen and upward, four of each order.

2. Time and place of meeting.—The Synod shall meet for the first time in the City of Toronto on the second Wednesday of September, 1893, and shall be convened by the Metropolitan, senior by consecration.

3. The Synod shall consist of two Houses, the Bishops constituting the Upper and the clergy and laity together the Lower House.

The Houses shall sit separately, excepting at any time by the unanimous consent of both Houses.

4. The President of the General Synod, who shall be styled the Primate, shall be elected by the House of Bishops from among the Metropolitans.

The Primate shall hold office for life or so long as he is Bishop of any diocese of the General Synod; nevertheless he may resign any time.

5. The General Synod shall have power to deal with all matters affecting in any way the general interests and well-being of the Church within its jurisdiction, provided that no canons or resolutions of the General Synod of a coercive character or involving penalties or ecclesiastical disabilities shall be operative in any province or diocese not included in any ecclesiastical province until accepted by the Synod of such province or diocese.

The following or such like objects may be suggested as properly coming within the jurisdiction of the General Synod:—

- a. Matters of doctrine, worship, and discipline.
 - b. All agencies employed in the carrying on of the Church's work.
 - c. The missionary and educational work of the Church.
 - d. The adjustment of relations between dioceses in respect to widows and orphans of clergy and superannuation funds.
 - e. Regulations of transference of clergy from one diocese to another.
 - f. Education and training of candidates for Holy Orders.
 - g. Constitution and powers of an appellate tribunal.
 - h. The erection, division or rearrangement of dioceses and the appointment and consecration of bishops within a province shall be dealt with by the Synod of that province.
6. For the expenses of the Synod, including the necessary travelling expenses of the members, there shall be an annual assessment of the dioceses proportioned to their representation, excepting those which are entitled to send only one representative of each order.
7. The words "ecclesiastical province," heretofore used, shall mean a group of dioceses under the jurisdiction of a Provincial Synod.

IV. That the Secretaries of this Conference be instructed to make an approximate estimate of the expenses of the first Synod and to apportion the amount to be contributed by each diocese, and ask them to take such steps as they may think fit to provide their share of the said expenses.

We certify the foregoing to be a true extract from the minutes of said Conference, and a true copy of the resolutions by it adopted at Winnipeg, this 18th day of August, 1890.

Such is the plan proposed for the consolidation of the Church, but whether it is such as will commend itself to the judgment of our members generally, is at least an open question. Before asking you to take action in this matter I would submit the following:—

First. It is a self-evident proposition that we cannot create a new governing body without diminishing *tanto* the powers that already exist. All the powers of the new body must of necessity be a subtraction from the old. The only question, therefore, is, Are we fully prepared for the operation of this inevitable law? As at present constituted, the Provincial Synod is possessed of supreme legislative powers: the creation, therefore, of a superior Synod to be vested with the same functions, however jealously guarded, can only be the practical desiccation of the present provincial system, which in a while will need almost to apologize for its existence, and for its possession of powers, which, except in a negative way, it will be impotent to exercise. I would not, however, advocate the abolition of the Provincial system. In the Northwest, so far removed from the centre of our Church life, it is, and will ever continue to be, an absolute necessity, and even in old Canada, there will always be various minor purposes to which it can be successfully applied. Of this, however, we may be assured, that if this scheme of union be carried into effect, the Provincial Synod as at present constituted, must practically cease to exist.

Secondly. The unification of our Church is a grand and imposing result which will need far more than human reason to establish on any sound and enduring basis. Prayerfully should we seek the guidance of the great Head of the Church, and slowly should we proceed before making so vast and momentous a change. I cannot but think that a simpler and more efficient scheme might yet be elaborated, which, while reserving the rights for which many contend, will be better suited for the Church at large.

HURON COLLEGE.

It gives me pleasure to state that this most admirable institution is, with God's blessing, rapidly advancing in general utility and efficiency. On the resignation of the Rev. R. G. Fowell, M.A., the Rev. H. G. Miller, M.A., was appointed to the vacancy. Mr. Miller assumed charge of the College in September last, and has been laboring since then, in connection with our indefatigable and valued friend, Prof. Williams, with great acceptance to all. The College is now doing a vast amount of highly satisfactory work, that is, as far as its limited means will allow, but owing to the fact that it has outgrown its old dimensions, and is sorely in need of an enlarged staff, it is wholly prevented from making that necessary progress which its friends most earnestly desire. I cannot speak too highly of Huron College as being of vital importance to the growth and development of the Diocese at large. Indeed, mainly dependent as we are upon this institution for our clerical supply, I cannot see how the Diocese is to be successfully worked unless the College is fully and liberally maintained. If, too, we are anxious that our clergy should occupy a high spiritual and intellectual position among our people, it follows, as a necessary consequence, that our students should be supplied with all the advantages which a generously endowed College may reasonably be expected to convey.

There are now upwards of twenty students attending the College, a number which indicates growth and expansion on every side. The number, however, is too great for the present capacity of the building, which absolutely requires enlargement. The staff also, consisting only of two men, is numerically weak, and much needs to be strengthened. Most earnestly, therefore, do I commend this invaluable institution to your hearty sympathy and support, and trust that the laity throughout the Diocese will now extend to it their generous and much needed help. Should this appeal meet with anything like an adequate response, not only will the College be made far more efficient and capable for work, but we shall have reasonable grounds for hoping that ere long a teaching faculty in Arts may be supplied, when the advantages of a University Establishment will be added to the present possession of a Divinity School.

PATRONAGE.

As much is being said to-day on the vexed question of Patronage, a few remarks on this subject may not be out of place. I wish to say that I do not approve of some of the changes which are being so vigorously advocated at the present time. I do not approve, for instance, of all the power being vested in the Bishop alone. Such an arrangement is not only irritating to the people, who justly con-

sider that in a matter of such moment to themselves as the incumbency of their churches, they have a right to be consulted ; but it is also extremely trying for the Bishop. The service he is delighted to acknowledge, and the merit he is pleased to reward, too often constitute no dazzling charm in the eyes of a congregation urgently in need of a pastor. Whatever his merits, they are in search of another man. The clergyman may feel he has a right to the appointment, and the Bishop may equally desire to act, but he is between two fires—the strongly expressed antagonism of the congregation on the one hand, and the reasonable claim of the clergyman for promotion on the other. It is a position fraught with difficulty, and one from which a Bishop naturally shrinks. That merit in a clergyman is to be rewarded will be admitted by all, but it must not be by forcing him on a congregation where abrasion and antagonism will embitter his life, but by finding him, if possible, a place where the sympathies of the people will move in harmony with his own.

Neither do I approve of all the power being vested in the hands of the people themselves. The proposal seems to be liberal, and is attractive to many, but if such an arrangement were in force, the very last people to exercise their deliberate franchise would be the congregations themselves. Congregations, as a general rule, know very little of clergymen living at a distance ; and the result would be that designing men would manipulate them in their own interests, and in too many instances vestries would find that they had only made a change of masters, and that having freed themselves from the Bishop of the Diocese, they have now unconditionally to submit to the imperious dictum of some self constituted Bishop of the Parish. I cannot but think that in this land, however it may be elsewhere, in which the very highest premium is too often paid for youth and inexperience, Episcopal supervision can only constitute a wholesome and salutary restraint. In conclusion I wish to say, that our own Canon, requiring as it does, a conference and the mutual exchange of views, when fairly and judiciously worked, seems to present the very best solution of this most difficult problem. I do not mean that it is by any means perfect, but it offers apparently the fewest objections in the settlement of a question which has taxed the ingenuity and exhausted the skill of ages of thoughtful men.

THE WOMEN'S AUXILIARY.

You will hear with satisfaction that the Women's Auxiliary of this Diocese is growing in strength and efficiency. There are now 7 Branches in connection with the parent body, and all, more or less, actively engaged in various kinds of missionary work. The total receipts for the last year, including a balance of \$606 from the last year, were \$2,451.66. I cannot speak too highly of the noble

and self-denying work which this Society is, through the blessing of God, accomplishing; and I sincerely trust there will not be a parish ere long in the Diocese in which one of its branches will not form a happy feature of its Christian life.

LAY WORKERS' ASSOCIATION.

At a Conference of Lay Workers, held on the 23rd of April last, a constitution was adopted of which you have had a printed copy. A. H. Dymond, Esq., was unanimously chosen Chairman of Committee and Mr. Joseph Lea, Secretary-Treasurer. During the Conference it was resolved

That the Synod be respectfully requested formally to recognize by resolution the "Huron Anglican Lay Workers' Association" as an important agency for promoting the spiritual and temporal work of the church in the Diocese, and to sanction the payment, from time to time, of such necessary expenses connected therewith as the Executive Committee may, on the recommendation of the Bishop, approve.

To this prayer I have no doubt you will willingly accede, and thus the Association will go forth with the sanction and imprimatur of the Synod itself. It remains now for the Diocese at large to demonstrate its usefulness and efficiency. I commend it to your sympathy and prayers.

ORDINATIONS.

There have been two ordinations held since last we met. The first was held on the 8th of March last, when George Ross Beamish, B. A., and George Mark Franklin were admitted to the Diaconate. THE SPIRITUAL WANTS OF THE DIOCESE.

What are the great, the real pressing wants of the Diocese? Whatever they are, they constitute the answer to the question: What are the great pressing wants of the Church throughout the world?

It is not wealth. It was not gold—the wealth of Ormus or of Ind—that unpeopled Olympus, burnt up the images and dissipated the midnight gloom of man in the first three centuries of the Christian era. The primitive church could say: Silver and gold have I none. It is not human wisdom. The philosophers who taught amidst the porticos of Athens, or the learned sages of the thoughtful East might, as regards human wisdom, been the intellectual superiors of the men who from the receipt of customs or the waters of Galilee followed the lowly Jesus.

It is not human power. All the majesty and all the power of imperial Rome, all the bitterness and prejudice of the age were arranged against the primitive church, and yet she grew: persecutions seemed only to cradle her; leagues and combinations only to give her momentum and dynamic force until at last she could reckon an Emperor among her catechumens and proclaim her statutes to the Roman world. Whence gathered she her strength? From what cloud fetched she the lightning of her fire, or from what secret place issued forth the thunder of her power? It sprang from this fact alone, that being herself baptized by the Eternal Spirit, she shone forth in all the brightness of her Saviour's light, presenting to all alike; to cultured Greek, to warlike Roman, to Barbarian Scythian, bond and free the personal living Christ. Not only did she know, but most powerful did she demonstrate in her own experience that Christ was both the Power of God and the Wisdom of God, and if

He who understand ar open secret of

to-day her right hand has forgotten its cunning, and in any land or parish she is mournfully, hopelessly weak, it is not because gold is wanting from her coffers, or rank and influence from among her members, but because Christ is absent from her pulpits and His abiding Presence from the lives of her nominal saints. It is the glory of the Church of England that she is primitive. She states it: she can maintain it. Taking her articles and formularies of belief, and placing them by the side of the creeds of the great Councils of Nicœa, Constantinople, Ephesus and Chalcedon, she challenges the whole Christian world to say what dogma she has added to, or what awful mystery she has subtracted from the faith once delivered to the Saints. I do not for one moment affirm that these Councils are the touchstone by which truth is to be determined and error made known; the Bible and the Bible alone is our absolute and infallible guide as to what is and what is not truth, but I do say that amid all the divergencies of thought and creed these Councils afford a fair and indisputable index as to what were at least the main constituents of primitive faith.

Having then primitive faith, let us have primitive power. Let us prove our Apostolic faith by Apostolic power: that power was Christ. I speak especially to you, dear co-workers with me in the ministry of our blessed Lord:—Would you succeed in your parishes; in your life work? Then remember Christ must be all in all to you before you can go forth in power. You must be clothed with the Sun if you would illuminate the world. Be much alone with God in prayer. The pitcher that is half full cannot possibly overflow, and the minister only half in earnest is but a waterless cloud by which no vineyard can be nurtured into healthy life. Seek the rich baptism of God the Holy Ghost, and then in His power go forth among your people. Preach this personal living Christ to all—to the rich, to the poor, to the old and to the young. Let Him be your one great all-inspiring theme, and then wherever you are, in quite hamlet or crowded city, life will start up all about you, and the dry, dead bones of a hopeless, defunct parish become the members of a living host, inbreathed by the life of God.

RESOLUTION OF CONDOLENCE.

At such a moment as the present, when the whole country is profoundly moved by the death of her leading statesman, it cannot be but that this Synod will earnestly desire to extend its Christian sympathies to his sorrowing widow in this the hour of her supreme bereavement.

He who would know the meaning of his character—would understand aright the late Sir John A. Macdonald—would know the open secret of his power,—how he gained and how he held the love

and sympathy of the nation—must know this, that deep down amid the pulsations of his mighty heart was his profound and reverential love for the unity of the British Empire, and the integrity of her throne. For his country he lived and, I may say, died; not that she might live and reign by herself, or, amid the revolutions of time, be absorbed by others; but rather that, like some giant planet forever wheeling round the sun, she might throughout all time revolve around the throne and majesty of the Mother Land.

If Marlborough and Wellington, Clyde and Havelock, are enshrined in the gratitude of the nation, as men raised up by God in the supreme hour of trial to meet the foe and roll back the torrent of advancing war, how much more shall he be honored who by the gentler paths of peace united half a continent; bound its vast sides together with a clasp of steel, and then with Titanic hands labored with all his might to rivet the whole more firmly to the throne beyond the sea.

In Sir John, self and self-aggrandizement were forgotten. All his principles and convictions, like so many convergent beams of light in the focus of a powerful lens, united with each other in his own soul to form one tremendous passion, and that passion was devotion to his country and his Queen. Patriotism with him was not a preference, a sentiment, a dream. It was a quenchless fire that led him to gather up all the powers of his diversified mind, all the energies of his tireless nature, and to cast them for a lifetime down in largess at his country's feet. Let it be ours to maintain such principles and to keep inviolate such designs, remembering that the grandest, the most enduring monument to his praise will be the consolidation of the Empire and the unification, if such be possible, of the Anglo-Saxon race.

It is with great pleasure I add that there was in the inner life of the great statesman, that which, perchance, the outside world knew but little of. Who will not hear with joy that in the privacy of his own home he maintained the sanctities of family prayer; that in the house of God he was a constant attendant, and at the table of our blessed Redeemer a lowly, humble recipient? I doubt not that when the final summons came, which none can disobey, it found him resting by faith where the weary only can rest—on the bosom of his Saviour and his God.

And now, commending you to the Word of God, and the testimony of His grace, I trust that all the deliberations of this Synod may be for the promotion of the Redeemer's glory and the future welfare of His Church.

The Annual Report of the Executive Committee was then submitted, and being distributed in printed form the reading of it was dispensed with. The printed audited accounts had been previously placed in the hands of the members of the Synod.

The Synod adjourned at 5 o'clock.

Evening Session.

The Synod reassembled at 8 o'clock.

The Bishop in the chair.

Receiving Reports of Committees on Lay Workers.

To the Synod of the Diocese of Huron:—

The Committee of the Huron Anglican Lay Workers' Association beg to submit the following report of the proceedings of a Conference of Lay Workers (the Clergy being also invited), of the Diocese of Huron, as directed by the Synod, April 23rd, 1891.

At the meeting of the Huron Diocesan Synod, held in June, 1890, in the report of the Committee on Lay Help appointed in 1889, and which report was adopted by the Synod, will be found the following recommendations:—

That an association be formed of the male Lay Workers of the Diocese for the purpose of mutual correspondence and co-operation, to meet annually at such place or places as may hereafter be determined upon; that the Bishop be President *ex officio*, and that his Lordship be requested to call a meeting of the male Lay Workers of the Diocese in the fall of the present year, for the organization of such association, and the adoption of a constitution.

That the Bishop be respectfully requested to issue a pastoral expressive of his views and those of the Synod in respect of the subject matter of this report; inviting the active co-operation of the clergy and laity in furthering the object thereof; and giving such advice in regard to the selection and appointment of Lay Readers as his Lordship may see fit.

That a committee to be named by the Bishop be appointed to make the necessary arrangements for the meeting of Lay Workers as above provided.

The time suggested for calling the meeting of Lay Workers having been found inconvenient, his Lordship issued a pastoral circular naming the 2nd of April, 1891, which date was subsequently altered to April 23, 1891, when the proposed conference was held.

FIRST SESSION.

His Lordship, the Bishop of Huron, took the chair at 2.30 p. m.

His Lordship, on behalf of the Very Reverend Dean Innes, expressed the latter's regret at being prevented by illness from attending the Conference.

Letters of regret were also received from Revds. W. J. Taylor, St. Marys; W. Johnson, Forest; J. Edmunds, Haysville, and Sheriff Deedes, Simcoe.

Messrs. A. K. Bunnell, Brantford, and Joseph Lea, St. Thomas, were appointed Secretaries of the Conference.

On motion Mr. Frank Dumoulin, of Toronto, who with Mr. S. Woodroofe, of Woodstock, represented the St. Andrew's Brotherhood Council, was invited to a seat in the meeting.

A hymn having been sung, the Rev. Rural Dean Mackenzie conducted a brief liturgical service, followed by another hymn.

His Lordship then addressed the Conference.

He explained how the movement had been set on foot by a St. Thomas layman, Mr. Joseph Lea, on the floor of the Synod, and the committee dealing with the matter had labored assiduously to make the suggestion as effective as possible. Laymen's work, the Bishop held, was a divine order—a commission endowed with power. In Christ men were regenerated by the Holy Spirit, and were separated from the world; they were the true ecclesia; they were cut out of the world, and placed in communion with the living Head. The men to be put in the field must be permeated with the grace of God. They had lived in this world long enough to know that in the contrariety of the human heart the most inefficient, the most likely men to throw the work into confusion, were the most forward to offer themselves for the post for which they were least suited. They must seek for the Biblical qualities which were the

special benefaction of the glorious and indwelling power of the Spirit. The Bishop urged strongly the necessity of lay assistance, and of an awakening from the general lethargy of the past. "Only yesterday," said he, "I received a letter from a parish which has been in the sunshine of spiritual blessing for a great many years, and the Warden writes to say they have no one to read the lessons, no one to take the service, no one to stand up in public on behalf of his Lord and Master. I ask if it is honorable that when a congregation has been ministered to perhaps half a century, the fruit and product of that ministry cannot be seen in the bringing forward of one solitary Lay Worker who will fill the gap when the banner-bearer has fallen? We want a body of earnest people who will stand clearly before the church as those who are worthy of spiritual honor and willing to help, not merely in secret prayer, but by being ready with personal assistance in the day of need. There is one church in New York named the 'Church of the Heavenly Rest.' It seems to me that is the proper name for half the churches. Its an eternal rest with them." Continuing, the Bishop expressed his unqualified approval of an organization on the lines suggested, as an advancement in the individual welfare of the church.

The following resolution was then moved by Mr. Jas. Woods, and seconded by the Rev. Robert McCosh:—

That this Conference is deeply impressed with the conviction that the more general participation of the laity in the spiritual work of the church is demanded alike by her needs and the duty of her members to the Supreme Head.

Mr. Woods, in an earnest speech, expressed his pleasure in seeing an awakening in the Church of England in the direction of lay work.

Rev. Robert McCosh referred to the use made of the laity by other religious bodies, and urged the importance of male help in Sunday Schools.

The resolution was carried.

Mr. W. J. Imlach gave some interesting early experiences of lay work in connection with religious services in a newly settled district, and moved the following resolution:—

That it is expedient that in every parish where practicable youths and young men be associated together in guilds, brotherhoods or societies, and that such definite work be assigned to them by the clergyman or vestry as they may from time to time be suitably required to perform.

The Rev. J. C. Farthing seconded the motion, alluding particularly to the usefulness of the St. Andrew's Brotherhood.

Mr. Frank Dumoulin, son of the rector of St. James', Toronto, was then invited to speak, and addressed the meeting in favor of the proposal. In Canada they had about five hundred members of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew's Chapters, and he hoped there would be more after this convention. Each member in the brotherhood to which he belonged, pledged himself to daily prayer for the extension of Christ's Kingdom, and to endeavor to bring another young man to church every Sunday. He trusted the meeting would consider the St. Andrew's Brotherhood work, any information regarding which he would be glad to furnish.

Mr. Dymond, in answer to questions, explained that the resolutions had been prepared by the Synod's Committee, with the particular purpose of eliciting a full discussion from the gentlemen present on all points of interest connected with the subject of lay work. The sentiments and recommendations embodied in them had been substantially adopted by the Synod, and also by the Bishop in his pastoral. They contained no proposals contrary to well-established usage and the Canons of the church. He congratulated the meeting on Huron being the first diocese in Ontario to move in the direction of lay organization.

Mr. Jenkins believed the eyes of a great many people in the Diocese of Huron were upon the meeting. He desired to know what all these societies would lead to. The Methodist movement was formed as a society within the Church of England, and its founder had no idea of forming a separate body. If these agencies multiplied, and they continued to recognize the Apostolic oversight, then the Bishops must be multiplied too. If it was necessary for oversight to be exercised over the Clergy, much more was it necessary to oversee these lay workers, for whom it might be necessary to provide some mode of consecration or ordination. He was with Mr. Dymond in favor of holding on to the good we had, and reaching out to the good we needed but had not got.

Mr. Noble, of Petrolea, was of the opinion that assistance in the church services was perhaps the least valuable help that the laity could render. There was lots of other work for them—work in the Sunday school, in the musical service, missionary work, getting young men into the church, visiting, welcoming strangers, and financial work. He held that laymen could not preach or perform the services in a satisfactory manner, and a good many of them objected to wear the surplice. He urged that lay workers could do more to help the Wardens, who were overworked in most cases, so much so that he thought the American plan a good one of entrusting the temporal affairs of the church to a committee of six or more persons.

Mr. T. Burnside objected to anything that would make the society exclusive and tend to boycott any member of the Church of England. The Sunday school offered a grand opportunity for lay workers, and the laity ought also to show a friendly spirit to all strangers coming to the church. He referred to a prejudice that existed in some quarters against the Church of England people, which was so strong that it was sometimes difficult for a churchman to get employment.

Mr. Frank Leigh, of Romney, told of some of his experiences as a lay reader; he was one who had never worn the surplice.

The question was asked whether the members of the St. Andrew's Brotherhood were active in other branches of church work.

Rev. Rural Dean Mackenzie gave an emphatic reply in the affirmative. In his parish the Brotherhood provided the ushers, visited, were found in the choir, in the C. E. T. S., and wherever work was to be done.

The resolution was carried.

Mr. Charles Jenkins moved the following resolution:—

That an association be formed of the male lay workers of the diocese for the purpose of mutual correspondence and co-operation to meet annually at such place or places as may hereafter be determined upon.

Mr. Alfred J. Wilkes, Q. C., seconded the resolution. He referred to the admirable work done by the various chapters of the Church Guild in Brantford, where he resided.

Mr. Grey said he was a conservative in church matters and did not believe in a multiplicity of organizations. There was only one in the early days—that was the Church. Surely its work could be done without the guilds, St. Andrew's Brotherhood, and other societies. They might conflict with each other.

Rev. Rural Dean Mackenzie said he had held Mr. Grey's opinion once. He had not then much faith in temperance societies, in Freemasonry, Oddfellowship and other associations, but the necessities of the day made temperance organizations and brotherhoods necessary. There were some people who thought that a church could be run without a Sunday school or choir. They would soon find out their mistake. He thanked God for the new life spreading through the church, especially among the young men.

Rev. Wm. Hinde rejoiced to see that day. He told of the great need for lay help in the work of his parish, and said not only was there the difficulty of getting the helpers, but the people were opposed in some cases to receiving any ministry from a lay helper

except in Sunday school, and such a movement as this would have a great influence for good amongst the people, even if it even went not so far as its promoters desired.

Mr. W. J. Garside spoke of the excellent working of the Lay Helpers' Association in the Diocese of Ripon (England), where he had formerly lived. Not only did it supply lay readers who were licensed by the Bishop, but workers in every branch of church work. He assured the clergy that the lay helpers would be the most careful custodians of their rights. The work of the clergy would be lightened and made more effective. Great benefit to the Diocese of Huron would result by the organization of a lay association.

After Mr. Jenkins' resolution had been adopted, the meeting adjourned until the evening.

EVENING SESSION.

The Conference reassembled at 8 p. m.

After a hymn had been sung,

Mr. Dymond read a draft of the proposed Constitution of the Association, which was considered clause by clause.

Clause one, suggesting that the name of the Association be the "Huron Lay Workers' Association," was amended on the motion of Mr. Imlach by the insertion of the word "Anglican" after "Huron."

On clause two a long discussion arose as to the qualification for membership.

The Rev. J. C. Farthing strongly urged that communicants only should be eligible, and moved an amendment in that sense.

Other speakers coincided in this view, while some thought that, practically, no necessity existed for any restriction, as none but active churchmen would be likely to seek admission to an association of church workers.

His Lordship spoke forcibly and earnestly in favor of the amendment.

The amendment was then agreed to *nemine contradicente*, and the remaining clauses having been passed, it was

CONSTITUTION.

1. The name of the Association shall be THE HURON ANGLICAN LAY WORKERS' ASSOCIATION.
2. The following, being communicants, shall be eligible for membership :—
 - (a) All laymen acting as lay readers or assisting regularly or occasionally in the services of the church.
 - (b) All laymen acting as Bible Class or Sunday School teachers.
 - (c) Lay delegates to Synod.
 - (d) Churchwardens, sidesmen, and ushers.
 - (e) Members of St. Andrew's Brotherhood, Church Guilds, or other parochial associations of young men, and, generally, any laymen actively participating in church work.
3. The clergy shall (*ex officio*) be members.
4. The Bishop and Dean shall (*ex officio*) be respectively President and Vice-President of the Association.
5. With the exception of the Bishop and Dean the officers of the Association shall be laymen.
6. The officers of the Association shall form a committee of management, and in addition to the President and Vice-President, who shall be members of the committee *ex officio*, shall be as follows :
 - A Chairman.
 - A Secretary-Treasurer.
 - Thirteen Committee-men, one being chosen from each Rural Deanery.
7. The duties of the Committee of Management shall be more particularly as follows :
 - (1) To keep a register of members of the Association specifying the particular branch of church work in which they are severally engaged, and indicating who of the lay readers are licensed by the Bishop.
 - (2) To encourage, by correspondence or otherwise, the more general participation of the laity in the spiritual and temporal work of the church, and the formation of local societies having that end in view.
 - (3) To make a report annually to the Association.
 - (4) To arrange work for the Association at its annual meeting.
 - (5) To present a concise report of the work of the Association to the Synod.
8. The Committee shall meet in London in the months of March, June and October, and at such other times and places as may be necessary, at the call of the chair. Five shall form a quorum.
9. The Association shall meet in the month of October, annually, at such place as the Committee of Management may appoint, for the transaction, particularly, of the following business :

Consideration of Report of the Executive Committee.

The Annual Report of the Executive Committee was taken up for consideration.

Annual Report.

The Executive Committee beg to present herewith their Annual Report:—

It is with pleasure we report that the total free-will offerings during the past year show a marked improvement, there being an increase of \$1,027.14 over the previous year. The increase has, however, been more in the collections for objects outside the diocese than in those for our own diocesan purposes.

A collection was for the first time made on Thanksgiving Day for Huron College, which amounted to the sum of \$444.03.

CLERGY MAINTENANCE AND MISSION FUND.

The collections for this fund are about the same as in the previous year. The Parochial Association collections exceeded those of the previous year by \$205.29. The Quarterly Mission Fund collections, and collections at missionary meetings, however, show a falling off of about the same amount. Attention is called to the fact that in nearly every parish the collections for the Board of Domestic and Foreign Missions are much larger than those for diocesan purposes, and it is extremely desirable that some means be devised for increasing the latter.

Owing to the yearly increasing payments to missionaries there is no longer a balance to the credit of the Maintenance and Mission Fund. The credit balance, which amounted to \$2,467.33 in 1889 and \$974.52 in 1890, is this year reduced to a debit balance of \$4,015.44.

Besides the increased amount of Mission Fund grants, this deficiency is partly explained by the fact that there was transferred to the Widows and Orphans' Fund, under the Widows and Orphans' Fund Canon, in 1890, \$1,350, and at the end of the last financial year \$1,390, which moneys would heretofore have been placed to the credit of the Mission Fund.

The Committee, however, have the satisfaction of knowing that though there are still some vacancies, the Home Mission field has been more completely filled during the last year than ever before.

DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN MISSIONS.

It is gratifying to be able to report that the collections for these purposes show a very large increase over those of 1889-90.

Several of the Sunday Schools made special Lenten offerings for the Board of Domestic and Foreign Missions, which amounted to \$174.44. The names of the different Sunday Schools contributing will be found in the printed accounts.

The Women's Auxiliary Missionary Association's reports show an increase in the contributions amounting to \$82.23 over last year.

SUPERANNUATION.

Two clergymen were added to the list during the year The Rev. Thos. Watson, who had served 26 years in the Diocese, and the Rev. Edward Softley, who had served 28 years.

Pensions amounting to \$5,960 were paid during the year.

CONSOLIDATION OF TRUST FUNDS.

Your Committee are pleased to report that after a very full discussion a plan has been adopted for the consolidation of the various trust funds, and an Act was passed by the Local Legislature at its last session authorizing the same. A copy of the Act will be found printed in the appendix to the convening circular.

The Committee feel confident that this important measure will result in a more equitable and business-like way of carrying out the various trusts, and will at the same time prove of great benefit to the clergymen affected.

CANON XX.

Your Committee recommend that proposed Canon XX., as printed in the convening circular, be not adopted, but that Canon XX. be amended by adding a clause thereto providing that the Committee of Discipline therein referred to shall consist of the clerical members of the Executive Committee.

CANON XXII.

There will also be found printed in the convening circular certain proposed amendments to this Canon, which your Committee have considered, and recommend for adoption.

CONSOLIDATION OF CANONS.

The Committee on the Consolidation of the Canons have made substantial progress in the work, and your Committee recommend that they be reappointed in order that they may complete the work.

SECRETARY-TREASURER'S OFFICE.

Mr. E. Manigault has been appointed assistant to the Secretary-Treasurer in the place of Mr. Hunter, who resigned to accept a responsible position in Toronto.

ACCOUNTS.

The position of the various funds is shown by the printed accounts, which have been certified to by the Auditors.

The Synod assembled at the Chapter House at 10 o'clock.

Minutes.

The minutes of the previous day's proceedings were read by the Honorary Clerical Secretary, and, being approved by the Synod, were signed by the Chairman.

Adopting Minutes of 1890.

A corrected copy of the proceedings of the Synod held in June, 1890, printed under the direction of the Honorary Secretaries, was presented for the approval of the Synod, and such being approved by the Synod and the Bishop, and the seal of the Synod attached thereto, was then signed by the Bishop for preservation as the authentic minutes of the Synod for that session.

Receiving Reports of Committees.

The report of the Sunday School Committee was presented.

Report of the Diocesan Sunday School Committee.

- 1 The Committee begs to submit the following Report:—
- 2 A Sub-Committee was appointed to select and order books for the Depository, and have a catalogue prepared, printed, and sent to the clergy. The catalogue was prepared by Mr. Hunter, the late Accountant, under the direction of the Sub-Committee.
- 3 The Book of Common Prayer will be found on the shelves in a variety of styles, type, and binding, and ranges in price from 5 cents up to 90 cents per copy. The sales at the Depository have been equal to, if not beyond expectation, from which the Committee gathers, that the wants of our schools have been anticipated in the selection of books made. The Secretary-Treasurer and the Accountant have rendered very efficient service in attending to the sales, marking and arranging the books. The Depository is now well supplied in all the ordinary lines.
- 4 The Synod last year authorized the Committee to make arrangements with the Rev. D. J. Caswell to publish for general use in our Sunday Schools his charts for teaching the Church Catechism. The Committee endeavored to carry out the instructions of the Synod, but regrets it was unable to do so, because the expense of the undertaking was greater than it felt justified in incurring.
- 5 The Committee has obtained a good deal of interesting and very valuable information about the state and working of our Sunday Schools throughout the Diocese, since its last report.
- 6 The Teachers' Meetings, so strongly recommended, are now held in 71 parishes, or in about two out of every three in the Diocese. These meetings, in a few instances, are held only once a month, but they generally take place once a week.
- 7 The Inter-Diocesan and Evangelical Churchman Schemes of Lessons are used in nearly an equal number of parishes.

- 8 The Prayer Book is used in opening and closing the Sunday Schools in 44 parishes. The Committee would suggest that its former recommendation about the use of the Prayer Book, which was endorsed by the Synod of 1889, be carried out as far as possible, in order to familiarize the minds of our pupils with it.
- 9 The Committee rejoices to say that Special Children's Services are held in 74 parishes.
- 10 In 84 parishes the subject of Confirmation is kept prominently before the minds of the pupils. Twenty-four parishes do not state what efforts, if any, are put forth to lead the scholars to be confirmed.
- 11 It is gratifying to be able to state, that in 94 parishes, the scholars attend the services of the Church fairly well, and only 16 report the contrary. There is an impression abroad that Sunday School pupils generally neglect Divine Service. However true this may be in many cases, it is not so of the Sunday School pupils of the Diocese of Huron.
- 12 Bible Classes are held in 101 parishes, and in a few of the schools there are two, and even three.
- 13 In 50 parishes special means are used, both on Sundays and week days, to reach and influence the elder scholars, and interest them in Church work. A good proportion of the elder scholars become teachers.

- 15 The number of clergymen from whom, or from whose parishes, reports have been received, is 117. All the clergy in active duty, except one, have reported. The number of male teachers reported is 480; female, 1,285; total teachers, 1,766. Officers 404; number of teachers, once scholars, 857; number of pupils, boys, 7,796; girls, 10,096; total boys and girls, 17,906. Total teachers, officers and pupils, 20,076. There is an increase of pupils, over the number reported last year, of 951, and an increase of fifty-two teachers. The number of officers reported this year is less by nineteen than last year, which is accounted for by a defect in the reports. Two hundred and eleven Sunday Schools have been reported; their average attendance of the 17,906 pupils is 12,726. The number of scholars over fourteen years of age and Bible class members, is 3,444, which shows that the elder scholars are attending the Sunday School to a considerable extent, as they are about one-fifth of the whole.

16 The amount raised by the Sunday Schools last year, and expended for carrying on the work in their midst, was \$5,980.60; for parochial purposes, \$798.33; for purposes outside of the parish, including missions, \$1,635.20, or a total of \$8,414.13.

There is a gratifying increase in missionary contributions this year over last to the amount of \$195.61. The banner Sunday School of the Diocese, in contributing for missionary purposes, is that of Christ Church, Chatham, which gave \$200 last year, but all the rest of the County of Kent only reported \$11.94 for the same purpose. The County of Huron only reports the small sum of \$11.11 as given in this way. The Committee has, however, since heard that various further contributions have been made and sent direct to the Mission Field without being reported to this Committee, and they would earnestly request that all further contributions be reported to the Committee. The Sunday schools of the County of Middlesex, including London, raised \$432 last year for missionary purposes, or an average of about \$23 per parish. The Sunday schools of the County of Waterloo are the most liberal in the Diocese in giving for missionary purposes, as the average per parish was over \$69.

17 There are one stone, seven wood, and fourteen brick Sunday School houses in the Diocese. Value, \$56,225.

18 The largest Sunday School in the Diocese is that of Christ Church, Chatham. It numbers 532; but the Memorial Church parish, London, which has two Sunday Schools, taken as a parish, has the largest number, namely 687.

19 The veteran Sunday School worker of the Diocese is Mr. Jasper Golden, of Kingsville, who has been over 60 years continuously in the Sunday School as a pupil and teacher.

Rev. Jeffrey Hill has organized two new Sunday Schools in his mission. A young lady in the county of Bruce carries on a Sunday School single-handed, the love of the children and the work making it a pleasure to her; and a married lady in the county of Essex, who, on account of family cares, is unable to attend the parish Sunday School, conducts one at her own house, with an attendance of about 30.

20 A mass of very useful suggestions, for the more successful prosecution of the work, has been given by many devoted Sunday School workers throughout the Diocese, which would more properly come up in a Sunday School Convention than in this report.

21 The Committee would suggest that aggressive work might be done from some of the more important centres, in establishing new Sunday Schools or reviving lapsed ones in neglected places in their vicinity.

22 The Committee feels that there ought to be suitable Sunday School class books and Sunday School registers prepared for the Diocese, and kept for sale at the Depository.

23 The Committee would recommend the example of Mr. Matthew Wilson, Q. C., of Chatham, who has for many years presented a valuable book annually to the eldest scholar in every Sunday School in the county of Kent.

24 Successful Sunday School and Church Workers' Conventions have been held during the past year in Brant, Middlesex, Lambton, Grey, Oxford, and Waterloo.

25 The Committee wishes to have an expression of opinion from the Synod as to the advisability of establishing a Diocesan Book Room.

26 The Committee desires to express gratitude and deep obligation to those clergymen and Sunday School workers who have gone to the trouble of giving the information contained in this report. The clergy of this Diocese are exceptional in affording information about the state and working of our Sunday Schools, for, from enquiries made about other dioceses, the Diocese of Huron has the most complete returns of any in the country, and the teaching of its schools on the lines of the Catechism, Prayer Book, and the Bible is as uniform, if not more uniform, than anywhere else.

Consolidation of the Church of England in British North America.

The Bishop submitted the following for the consideration of the Synod:—

Scheme for the Consolidation of the Church of England in British North America, adopted for submission to the various Dioceses by a Conference of Delegates from such Dioceses, held in the City of Winnipeg, on the 15th and 16th of August, 1890.

1. CONSTITUTION.—There shall be a General Synod consisting of the Bishops of the Church of England in the Dominion of Canada and the Diocese of Newfoundland, and of delegates chosen from the Clergy and the Laity.

The delegates shall be chosen by the several Diocesan Synods according to such rules as they may adopt, or, in a Diocese which has no Synodical organization, may be appointed by the Bishop.

The representation shall be as follows:—Dioceses having fewer than twenty-five licensed Clergymen, one delegate from each order; Dioceses having twenty-five and fewer than fifty licensed Clergymen; two of each order; Dioceses having fifty and fewer than one hundred, three of each order; Dioceses having one hundred licensed Clergymen and upwards, four of each order.

2. TIME AND PLACE OF MEETING.—The Synod shall meet for the first time in the City of Toronto, on the second Wednesday in September, 1893, and shall be convened by the Metropolitan senior by consecration.
3. The Synod shall consist of two Houses; the Bishops constituting the Upper, and the Clergy and Laity together the Lower House.
4. The President of the General Synod, who shall be styled the Primate, shall be elected by the House of Bishops from among the Metropolitans.

The Primate shall hold office for life, or so long as he is Bishop of any Diocese of the General Synod; nevertheless, he may resign at any time.

5. The General Synod shall have power to deal with all matters affecting in any way the general interests and well-being of the Church within its jurisdiction. Provided, that no Canons or resolutions of a coercive character, or involving penalties or disabilities, shall be operative in any Ecclesiastical Province, or in any Diocese not included in an Ecclesiastical Province until accepted by the Synod of such Province or Diocese.

The following, or such-like objects, may be suggested as properly coming within the jurisdiction of the General Synod:—

- (a) Matters of doctrine, worship and discipline.
 - (b) All agencies employed in the carrying on of the Church's work.
 - (c) The missionary and educational work of the Church.
 - (d) The adjustment of relations between Dioceses in respect to Clergy Widows and Orphans' and Superannuation Funds.
 - (e) Regulations affecting the transfer of Clergy from one Diocese to another.
 - (f) Education and training of Candidates for Holy Orders.
 - (g) Constitution and powers of an Appellate Tribunal.
 - (h) The erection, division, or rearrangement of Provinces; but the erection, division, or rearrangement of Dioceses, and the appointment and consecration of Bishops, within a Province, shall be dealt with by the Synod of that Province.
6. For the expenses of the Synod, including the necessary travelling expenses of the members, there shall be an annual assessment of the Dioceses, proportioned to their representation, exempting those which are entitled to send only one representative of each order.
7. The words Ecclesiastical Province heretofore used shall mean any group of Dioceses under the jurisdiction of a Provincial Synod.

That every Clergyman entering the Diocese and receiving written license, and every person ordained in the Diocese under thirty years of age, shall receive all the benefits of the Widows and Orphans' Fund, on complying with the conditions of this Canon. But all others shall pay in addition to the requirements of Sec. 3 of this Canon an entrance fee according to the following scale:—When over 30 years and under 35 years, a fee of \$20; when over 35 years and under 40, a fee of \$30; when over 40 years and under 45, a fee of \$40; when over 45 years a fee of \$50; to be paid within six months of such entrance into the Diocese, in one payment, or, under the sanction of the Bishop, by annual instalments of five dollars; and in case such Clergyman shall decease before such instalments be paid, that then such instalments as they become due shall be deducted from the annuity payable to his widow and orphans. The same scale of payments according to the ages specified to apply to every Clergyman who remarries and is desirous of availing himself of the provisions of this Canon; said payment to be made within six months after such remarriage.

“But the widow and orphans (excepting those by a former marriage) of any Clergyman who shall hereafter marry after he has attained the age of 60 years, shall not be entitled under this Canon or otherwise to any benefit from the Widows and Orphans' Fund of the Diocese.”

APPENDIX.

BILL.

[1891.]

An Act to enable the Synod of Huron to consolidate and manage its Trust Funds.

WHEREAS the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Huron, at their meeting in the month of June, A. D. 1890, adopted a resolution for the consolidation of the trust funds of the said Synod, and referred the matter to the Executive Committee of the said Synod, to take such steps, including legislation by parliament, as might be necessary to carry the same into effect; and whereas pursuant thereto, the said Executive Committee, at their meeting in December last, adopted the following:—

1. That the several trust funds and securities now, or which shall at any time hereafter be held by the Synod, be consolidated into one fund, so as to form but one investment account, and that the profits derived therefrom, after payment of expenses, be distributed to those entitled, *pro rata*, according to the respective capital of each trust.
2. That for the purposes aforesaid, all securities for money held by the Synod upon any trust, and all income-producing real estate, vested in and managed by the Synod, on the 30th day of April, 1891, shall be valued as of that date (less any interest and rents past due at the time, and accrued interest and rents); and the amount of such value, together with any cash held by the Synod at that date, belonging to the capital of any of the trust funds of the Synod, shall form the capital of said consolidated fund, and the amount in value of the securities of any trust ascertained as aforesaid, together with any cash capital held by the Synod at that date for such trust, and the amount of the value of the real estate, if any, then belonging to that trust shall be deemed to be, and be treated as, the amount of the then total capital of such trust. Provided, always, that in valuing such real estate, the value thereof shall be taken to be such an amount as if invested at six per cent. per annum, would produce about, but not more than, the amount of the net income then being derived from such real estate. But in case of sale of such real estate by the Synod at any time thereafter, then the amount of the net proceeds of such sale shall be substituted in the capital of such trust, and in the capital of said consolidated fund, for the amount of the value of such real estate ascertained as aforesaid.
3. That the amount of all interest and rents past due, and all interest and rents accrued at said 30th day of April, 1891, upon all or any of the trust funds of the Synod shall immediately thereafter be ascertained, and the amount thereof, less expenses, be credited to the trusts to which they pertain respectively, and be paid to those entitled thereto in two equal payments, on the first days of August and November thereafter. Provided, nevertheless, that in case a loss should occur upon any of such securities, whereby any part of such past due interest or accrued interest or rents are lost, after the amount of same shall have been disbursed as aforesaid, then, and in such case, such loss shall be a charge upon the future income of the trust to which belonged the security upon which such loss occurred.
4. That immediately after the 30th day of April in each year, the net profits of said consolidated fund for the previous year, up to said 30th day of April, shall be ascertained and be carried to the credit of the income of the various trust funds forming said consolidated fund, *pro rata*, according to the amount of the

capital fund of each, ascertained as aforesaid. And the amount of the net profits of said consolidated fund for the coming year shall than be approximated, and each *cestui que trust*, entitled to receive the income of any of such trust funds, shall be paid quarterly, on the first day of August, November, February and May, (*pro rata*, according to his interest in the premises), a sum equal to such proportionate part of the amount of said approximated profits as the executive committee of Synod shall, from time to time, sanction. And on the first day of August following his *pro rata* share of the balance, if any, of the then past year's income, according to the profits of the said year, ascertained as hereinbefore provided. And such payment shall be a full discharge of the trust by the Synod as regards said year's income of such trust.

5. That the Legislature of Ontario be applied to for an Act enabling the Synod to carry the foregoing into effect.

And whereas the said Synod have petitioned for an Act accordingly, and have shown that such an Act will greatly facilitate the objects for which the several trusts to which the said funds belong were created; and whereas it is expedient to grant the prayer of the said petition;

Therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, enacts as follows:—

1. It shall be lawful for the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Huron to consolidate into one fund the trust funds and securities, including income-producing real estate, now or which shall at any time hereafter be held by the said Synod, so as to form but one investment account, and to distribute the income and profits derived therefrom, after payment of expenses, to and among those entitled, *pro rata*, according to the respective capital of each trust, and to do all things necessary for fully effectuating that object.

2. It shall be lawful for the said Synod, in the exercise of the powers conferred upon them by the preceding section of this Act, and in the carrying out of the said scheme of consolidation, to adopt and follow the details and provisions set out in the said report of the Executive Committee, which is hereby confirmed and declared to be valid with power, to vary the same from time to time in such manner as the said Synod may deem expedient, and the circumstances of the case may require.

3. It shall be lawful for the said Synod to pass canons or by-laws from time to time, as they shall see fit, for more fully effectuating the objects of this Act.
