REVOLUTION IN CONSTANTINOPLE

Troops Mutiny and Surround Parliament Building—Minister of War Has Fled

Frankfort, April 13—Constantinople has been in full revolution since early this morning," declares the Constantinople correspondent of the Frankfort Zeitung in a despatch from the Turkish capital dated today. "Two battalions of troops quartered in the ministry of war marched out at dawn headed by officers and proceeded via Divan and Jolu streets to the mosque of St. Sophia from which point they surrounded the building of parliament. The demonstrators demanded the resignation of the Grand Vizier the president of the chamber and minister of war.



FROZEN BODIES TELL OF TRAGEDY ON TRAIL

Starvation and Exhaustion Cause Death of Prospectors. (Victoria Colonist). Faced to rob caches in order to sustain life and only departed at the point of a gun from placing others in the same plight with themselves, the two prospectors, Charles Baker and J. McCurdy, whose frozen bodies were discovered on February 24 near the headwaters of the Goat River, sixty-six miles from Barkerville, were the principals in a tragedy of the trail in the north. The information of the death of the prospectors was conveyed to the provincial police department by Reginald Randall, who wrote on February 28 to Superintendent Hasey and was reported at the summit trail at a point near the mouth of the McLeod river, a tributary of the Goat river.

STEAL FROM CACHES.

Peden also reports that from "signs" and information supplied him by a trapper named Steinhoff, trapping along the Fraser river, the four prospectors had met with foul play. He came to the conclusion that both men met death within a few hours of each other on the summit trail at a point near the mouth of the McLeod river, a tributary of the Goat river.

PARTY SEPARATES.

One notice stated that McCurdy and Baker had set out for Barkerville on February 1, with sufficient provisions to last four or five days, which would have been ample time for them to reach their destination if they had been in fit condition. That they could not endure the long tramp and the cold weather is evident, for they perished en route. Another notice posted by Spittal and Henderson before they left their camp at the mouth of the Goat river stated that they had gone up the Fraser river in the direction of Tete Jaune Cache, the objective point of the party when it left Barkerville two months before. They took part of the stolen provisions with them, but whether they ever reached their destination, or what their fate could not be ascertained.

MAKES INVESTIGATION

On the day on which Constable Randall sent in his first report the three trappers were about to set out again on their return north with fresh supplies. Accordingly Peden was sworn in as a special constable and instructed to proceed to the spot where the bodies were first discovered, and make a careful examination of the remains, and if there appeared to be any signs of violence having been done to the two prospectors, to bring the bodies back to Barkerville, but if there was nothing to indicate a violent death, to bury the bodies where they lay

Delegates to the Synod—M. G. Teed, J. M. Robinson. Substitutes—H. H. Pickett, W. S. Fisher. The meeting was largely attended. The election of vestrymen was keenly contested, twenty-five names being put in nomination.

Provincial News. New Brunswick. Weather very much unlike Easter has prevailed along the valley of the St. Croix for several days, cold and high winds with snow and hail showers.

Receipts of Canadian potatoes at the Bangor Custom House for the quarter ending March 31 were 110,518 bushels. According to the customs officials, this time again a shortage of potatoes is expected. The U. S. government received 25 cents per bushel on these potatoes, giving total duties of \$27,623.

During the sale of last Thursday the Esport tug Ellen, which towed the big, three-masted schooner Childe Harold from Calais to the bay, had a picnic with her big tow while making the trip. The schooner was light, offering a broad surface to the wind, and it was with the greatest difficulty that the Ellen prevented her from being blown ashore.

The auction sale of the property of E. LeBeau, took place on Saturday at Sydney. There were a very large number of horsemen and other interested spectators present. The sale was conducted by Chief of Police Duncan McEachern. With but few exceptions the whole of the goods, consisting chiefly of harness, saddles, etc., were purchased by C. Ross. The chestnut mare Maggie was purchased by G. H. Vail for \$130.00.

An accident on the Halifax and South-Western railway Saturday morning, damaged considerable property and tied up traffic for eight hours. Two cars on the out-going express, which left Halifax at five o'clock, jumped the track at Bowser's.

The Middleton Clay Working company made a shipment of 100,000 bricks last week, 60,000 going to the iron mines at Torbrook.

Lawrence C. V. Wetmore, of Sydney, was in New Brunswick on business in connection with the Lepreux iron mines, and attended the legislature at Fredericton for the purpose of explaining the delay in operating these areas, the failure to develop being the inability of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company to proceed under the conditions brought about by the recent litigation. He stated that the rolling mill will be opened in Sydney soon.
