Halifax in 1830 were Henry H. Cogswell, George N. Russell, Joseph Allison, James H. Tidmarsh and James Tremain. They had been but a short time in office when they reported that they found the furds, applicable to the road service, were burthened with debt, and that the sum placed at their disposal was not more than sufficient to smooth the surface and form the level of a part of the streets. They ascertained, what indeed was obvious to a common observer, that the side lines of the streets had been greatly eneroached upon and much encumbered by porches, steps, etc., and the surface line of but a small part of them definitely formed. Owing to the moeritainty where such lines would be permanently fixed, persons who were erecting buildings were much at a loss to know how to form the entrances to accommodate any future alterations in the streets. The upper parts of the town were occupied by poor persons, closely crowded in small houses, and many were living in the midst of filth and stench. Offal and putrifying substances of various kinds were suffered to accumulate in the yards and outhouses, until, by heavy rains they were washed into the streets, and part was carried along the gutters into the harbor, while other parts were scattered over the surface of the streets, to the great annoyance of the inhabitants. well, George N. The Commissioners urged, in view of the convenience, health and comfort of the people of Halifax, that common sewers be made from the harbor up to the Hill, in a westwardly direction, and also on the western side of every street running north and south—that all offensive matter washed or thrown into the streets might be instantly received into sewers and conveyed underground into the harbor. The sum of ten thousand pounds, at least, was, in their judgment, necessary to perfect this plan. The people of Halifax, it was claimed, were subject to the payment of heavy taxes upon two great necessaries of life—bread and fuel—to which other parts of the province were but little exposed. The argument was that while the payment of those taxes rendered the people of Halifax less able to raise the necessary sums by an increase of taxation to results. of the people of Halifax, that commo

or those taxes rendered the people of Halifax less able to raise the necessary sums by an increase of taxation to repair the streets, it would appear to give them an equitable claim upon the proceeds of duties raised upon necessaries of life consumed in Halifax. It was the policy of almost all governments, however despotie, and where the liberal principle was not recognized as in Nova Scotia, that taxes should be applied to the benefit of those who paid them, to render bread as cheap, and streets as good and healthy as possible, in the metropolis. The Commissioners, therefore, recommend that \$25000 should be expended during the summer of 1881, in the making of sewers and in the repairs of the streets—and they claimed from the legislature a share in the distribution of the monies voted for the road service of the province.

Lawrence of the U. S. Chesqueake was interred in June, 1818. It was related that when the Shames and Chesqueake arrived in Halifax a generous concern was expressed for the fate of the brave Lawrence. The recollection of his humanity towards the crew of the British Peacock was still fresh in every mind. His obsequies were celebrated with appropriate ceremonials and an affecting solemnity. His pall was supported by the oldest captains in the British service that were in Halifax; and the naval officers crowded to yield the last sad honors to a man who was late their foe, but now their foe no longer. The group that gathered round the grave of Lawrence presented a seene worthy of the heroic days of chivalry. It was complete triumph of the nobler feelings over the savage passions of war.

The recollection of the two very striking events—the burial of Captain Lawrence and, a little over a year Lawrence and, a little over a year later, of General Ross, in old St. Paul's churchyard, could be vividly recalled until, full of years, the youngest member of the community who was able to appreciate the very peculiar significance of the ceremonies, had passed into the "valley of the shadow."

London, July 12.—The Saloniki correspondent of the Times gives a report transmitted by the King's order by Prince Nicholas, the Servian commander, that when he entered Demirhissar he was informed that the Bulgarians, prior to quitting the town, arrested a bishop, two priests and more than one hundred Greek notables and herded them in a yard of a Bulgarian school, where they were mercilessly butchered by order of a Bulgarian officer. The Servian commander had the bodies disinterred, the report says, and thus the crime was certified.

It is asserted that the Bulgarians employed a questionable ruse to get their artitlery across the Zietovo River in their retreat on July 1. They sent dielegates with a priest to the Servians positions, begging an armistice. The request was granted. In the meanting the guns were taken across. The Bulgarians opened with a heavy fire, without warning, causing terrible losses to the Servians.

Belfast, July 12.—Somewhat serious rioting occurred here early this morning at the opening of the celebration of the "Twelfth," the July festival of the Orangemen, in the course of which many windows were broken and a number of policemen and civilians were injured, two of them so severely that they had to be taken to the hospital. Rival factions of Nationalists and Unionists first fought each other furiously, and then when a large body of police appeared and endeavored to separate them joined forces and attacked the policemen. The fight raged along the streets for over an hour and a half. Sticks were freely used by the civilians, who also threw showers of stones, which were accompanied by an occasional revolver shot. The policemen drew their clubs and charged, and hand to hand fighting west on till about five o'clock, when the crowds dispersed. Only one arrest was made.
