

And Fully Five Hundred Others Have Been Injured---Half a Dozen Towns Wiped Out Destroyed---Tragic Incidents of the Tornado.

NEW ORLEANS, April 25—The dead more than two hundred, the injured at least 500. These were the grim facts that came to light today when a little of the wreckage of yesterday's tornado in Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama had been cleared away. The tornadoes lasted altogether 12 hours striking the town after the other from before daylight Friday until mid-afternoon. Many hours after they struck trains bearing nearly two hundred injured came crawling cautiously out of the tornado district leaving behind them one town, Purvis, Miss., utterly demolished, five others practically blown away and fifteen little villilages in more or less acute stages of ruins. With the wounded came the details of one of the worst wind disasters in the history of the gulf states.

GRAFT CHARGE

A BOOMERANG

Hodgins Must Face House Committee

Parent Demands Investigation of Charges Against N. T. R. Commission

OTTAWA, April 24.—The charges of graft and waste of public money in connection with the building of the National Transcontinental railway ntained in a statement sent out from Vancouver last week by Major Hodgirs, the engineer in charge of the Kenora division of the road, who was dismissed by the commission last August are likely to prove a boomer ang which will strike back at the major's professional reputation and at the same time emphasize the efficient and business-like manner in which the National Transcontinental commissioners are overseeing the construction of the road.

Over twenty million dollars has also

LONDON, April 24—Viscount Mountmorres, an Irish peer, has had an amusing adventure with a party of Moorish brigands, whom he outwitted very much in the same way as Raisuli outwitted Kaid Maclean.

Lord Mountmorres was cruising off Cape Juby in a sail schooner when a party of Bedouins came off in a dingy and told him that the "Baleine," a French steamer, had gone ashore twelve miles to the South, and that the captain and crew, to the number of nineteen, had been captured by wandering brigands. The local Kaid was well-disposed toward the prisoners, but he was helpless against the brigands, who threatened to kill the Frenchmen on the spot.

The Kaid sent a message to Mountmorres begging for help, but warning him that if he attempted to rescue the Frenchmen by force they would all be killed. Mountmorres thereupon set sail for Las Palmas, where he reported the affair to the British and French consuls, and the French cansul commissioned him to return to Cape Juby and negotiate for the release of the prisoners.

When Mountmorres got back, he

negotiate for the release of the prisoners.

When Mountmorres got back, he found that the brigands were divided into parties. One party claimed to own ten Frenchmen, the other party claimed nine. Those with the ten demanded a ransom of 20,000 Moorish dollars per head; the other held that their nine captives were worth 30,000 Moorish dollars each. The total ransom demanded was about \$300,000.

A debate ensued and Mountmorres offered \$1,000 for all nineteen prisoners, and added that it must be accepted before sundown, and that he would wait on board his ship for the answer. Next morning a boat put off from the shore carrying an emissary from the brigands rowed by three servants of the Kaid. Mountmorres took them on board, asked them politely after health, and told them they were his prisoners.

Leaving the brigand on board, he went ashore and met the brigands. "I am going to hang your man at once," was his salutation. The horrified brigands replied immediately that they would accept the \$1,000.

"It is too late now," said Mountmorres, "the negotiations are off.
