EASTERN S. S. MERGER.

Washington, Dec. 17.—Mr. Calvin Austin of Boston, president of the Eastern Steamship Company, a witness on the Seaman's Bill, Tuesday before the House Marine Committee told how the Eastern S. S. Co. had absorbed other steamship lines along the New England coast. He said that when the Maine and Metropolitan companies sold their ships to the Eastern they were paid \$7,125,000 for property which he did not regard as worth more than \$5,000,000. The remainder was credited to goodwill, He said his company bought the Yarmouth Steamship Line from the Canadian Pacific Railway for \$600,000 in stock and \$300,000 in bonds of a new corporation organized for the purpose.

Diary of Events

HISTORIC DAYS IN CANADA ALFRED E. McGINLEY, Editor.

James McGill, the Scotch-Canadian merchant and philanthropist who gave his fortune and his name to the great Montreal University, died a century ago today, Dec. 19, 1813. McGill was born in Glassow, and on reaching manhood came to British America. engaging in the fur trade in the Hudson's Bay territory, and later becoming a successful merchant in Montreal. His interest in education and the promotion of Protestant and British influences in Lower Canada led him to bequeath "a parcel of land for a site for a university or college," and in addition about \$50,000 in cash. For a time the project was under the direction of the Royal Institution for the Advancement of Learning, and in 1821, after many difficulties, that institution received a royal charter for the college. At first it was designed to make McGill a Church of England institution, but this plan was abandoned, and the governors were chosen with a view to the representation of all the principal Protestant denominations in Lower Canada. Repeated modifications and extensions of the charter have been made, consequent upon McGill's progress into a really great university, with a large and notable faculty and various departments, including law and medicine as well the arts and applied science. The donations to McGill since its foundation have amounted to millions, and its principals have included many famous men, among them Sir J. William Dawson, the geologist.


