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

INCE NEW.LAW REGARDING Y STEAMERS OF CANADIA REGISTER OVER 500 TON

Ottawa, Mar. 15—An order-in-coun-cli has been passed restricting steam-ers of Canadian register of over five hundred tons from engaging in any voyage except between Canadian ports or Canadian and American ports ex-

The order is effective from April 1, and the penalty for non-observance is the forfeiture of the vessel. The min-later of marine will appoint a board to issue the licenses.
