Montreal, June 10—Sir William Christopher MacDonald, chancellor of McGill University, director of the Bank of Montreal and the Royal Trust Company, and creator and head of the MacDonald Tobacco Company, died Saturday afternoon in his 86th year, after more than three years' illness. During the last six months he had kept to his bed.

Deceased was born in P. E. I. in 1831. He left there in his boyhood for Boston, but soon came to Montreal, first engaging in the commission business, and later turning his attention to the tobacco industry. His business had grown to such an extent in 1885 that he employed three thousand hands.

Capt. William Hoey Kearney Red-mond, Nationalist member of parlia-ment for the east division of County Clare, was one of the best known Irish leaders and was a brother of John Redmond. He was born in 1861, the second son of the late W. A. Red-mond, M. P. He was educated at Clongowes and studied law, passing the bar.

Member 34 Years

He entered politics in early-life. He was member of parliament for Wexford from 1883 to 1885 and for County Fermanah from 1885 to 1892 Since the latter date he was member for East Clare, completing a continuous sitting in the House of Commons of 34 years.

Shortly after the war broke out he took a company to the front. Last winter when the Irish party made a strong protest in the house over the delay in enacting Home Rule for Ireland Capt. Redmond, dressed in khaki made a notable speech which was recognized by all parties as a fair and temperate address.

Capt. Redmond and the entire Nationalist party which follow John Redmond walked out of the chamber as as protest against the government's treatment of the Irish question. He had visited America on several occasions and spoke in public in behalf of the Irish cause.

WHERE IS THE ECONOMY OF NEW ADMINISTRATION ASKS HON. MR. BAXTER IN REPLY TO BUDGET SPEECH

FORMER ATTORNEY GENERAL EXPOSES THE FALLACIOUS FINANCIAL STATEMENT MADE

New Administration Will Have Upwards of Three Quarters of a Million Dollars Revenue to Expend During their Portion of Current Year-Receipts Fall Short of Late Government's Expenditures Last Year by Only \$4,000, Yet Carterites Predict Deficit of \$148,000 — "Continue Your Investigations, the Farther You Go the Greater Financial Integrity of Late Government Will Be Established." Says Hon. Mr. Baxter - Challenges Government Members to Point to One Single Item in Public Debt Under Late Government that is Not Justifiable—Scathingly Criticizes Liberal Members for Putting Party Before Country on Transcontinental Railway Issue -Vigorously Defends Former Administration's Conduct of Affairs-No Carnival of Graft as Existed Under the Discredited Government that Went Out in 1908-Points the Way to New Administration to Increase Revenues by Advancing Stumpage Rates—The Alleged Over-Expenditure "Bomb" Exploded.

Hon. Mr. Baxter in opening expressed his appreciation of the address of Hon. Mr. Robinson, which he said was clear in expression and moderate in tone. It was not to be expected that the opposition would concur with the whole of the presentation of his honorable friend.

It contained many things that it was necessary to discuss and it was his duty to put before the house and through the house to the people of the country the views of the opposition with regard to some of the important questions involved. He thought he could assure the house and country that there was ample justification for every action of the late government and that investigation of conditions would find that the finances of the province had not suffered nor were the accounts imperfectly kept under the government which recently went out of office.



Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war, and has since continued to be, a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Dutles—Six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years. In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$3.00 per acre. Dutles—Reside six months in each of three years after earning homestead patent and cultivate 50 acres extra. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as residence dutles under certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agent's Office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.

Whereas, the growth and development of the western provinces of Canada have been much greater in the past than that of the Maritime Provinces and are likely to be still greater after the war;

And whereas, the representation of the Maritime Provinces in the Dominion Parliament is not likely to increase and possibly may be deed assed if the population of such provinces shall not increase proportionately to that of Canada as a whole;

And whereas, it is becoming more and more imortant that there shall be unity of aim and action among the representatives of the Maritime in the Dominion Parliament so that the said provinces may obtain from the development of Canada such advantages in commerce and transportation as will give them a fair share in the benefits accruing from the development of our country.

And whereas, the assembling together of representative men of the Maritime Provinces in the transaction of public business would tend to promote community of aim, unity of action and a wider understanding of the needs of these communities:

Therefore resolved, That this house would favorably regard any action which the government may be disposed to take for the purpose of ascertaining whether the Provinces of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island or either of them would be willing to consider the question of legislative union of the Maritime Provinces.
