The new week begins with the German counter-proposals still The subject of discussion. The Council of Four with Premier Orlando, of Italy, absent, again went over the proposals Suanday. While various days have been mentioned, unofficially for replying to the Germána, no agreement has as yet actually been reached by the council. It may be significant of an early impending agreement that the departure of President Wilson for the United States is reported as probable within ten days or two weeks.

Majority of Members Apparently Accept Budget—Opposition's Attitude.

Ottawa, June 7.—Western members await the usual avalanche of telegrams and letters which always follow any declaration on the economic policy. The first intimation they had of western sentiment is the statement of Premier Martin, of Saskatchewan. This is not alarming to Unionists, as Premier Martin was never a Unionist, and would oppose any economic policy formulated by a Unionist Government, even if such a policy gave absolute free trade in Canada. So far it is evident that a considerable majority of western members desire to support and will support the Government. Many are prepared to sacrifice their political future, if necessary, rather than create further dissension and instability in Canada. They believe that, when the western farmers realize the financial burden on the country, they will not permit the professional positions.

Plymouth, June 8.—Fifteen hundred British troops in General Allenby's force in Egypt and Palestine, who returned here tonight, after having served at Gallipoli ani Mesopotamia, Palestine and the Balkans, refused to entrain for an isolation camp. The order was given because six cases of susperded smallpox had been discovered during the voyage to England. The soldiers who had entrained left the cars and the others refused to enter. The authorities finally gave way and the men went to demobilization centres instead of the isolation camp.







Opportunities ▼ For New Business

Business Man Recently from England Say if Maritime Provinces Don't Get Busy Americans Will Capture Business in Great Britain.

"If the Maritime Provinces don't get busy our opportunities in Great Britain will be captured by Americans, eva-in face of the fact that the Britisi government is offering a customs pre-erence on products from the oversea dominions," remarked a local business man who returned from a trip to Ne

man who returned from a trip to New England last week.

"We regard Boston as a market for lumber, but now Boston is loading withing vessels with lumber and building materials of all kinds for England and the devastated areas in France and Belgium. All the steamers leaving Boston for the other side are loaded with farm produce, flour, steel, woodwares, leather and rubber manufactures. A large part of this business is on orders for the allied governments either for their own use, or to be delivered as required (v) Germany, Poland, or other European countries. But a good deal of it is private business, opening new markets.

"An interesting development is that many of the new ships built on the Pacific Coast during the war are now being used to bring lumber and railway bies to Atlarzic ports, and others are carrying these commodities direct to Europe.

"Meanwhile lumber operators and manufacturers in this province appear to be unable to get shipping to move their goods. Offers of business from British firms are being turned down, because of the difficulty of securing shipping, and this will not impress the British merchant with the enterprise of the Maritime Provinces. If the Boards of Trade of these Provinces had developed a co-operative system for opening trade in the British market, arrangements might have been made for space in the big ships now bringling troops to Hallfax. But the manufacturers and exporters of the Maritime Provinces are only beginning to organize in trade groups, and such groups, having done no advertising in Great Britain or France and being only likely to get small orders at the outset, are not in a position to deal with the shipping problem as they ment if it can do anything to relieve the shipping situation. 



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

"It is the intention of Nova Scotla to have a bonfire on the Citadel, Halifax, and at many other high places to celebrate peace night. When the Halifax signal fire fiames up into the night the watchers on the nearest heights will light their fire, and so the signal will run over the province as the watch fires did over England when the Armada was sighted. Only in this case it will summon the people to rejoice and thanksgiving that the long night of war is over.

"In England a great chain of peace bonfires is to be lit on the night of the August bank holiday, or at any rate this is the provisional arrangement in view of the anticipation that the official peace celebrations will be fixed for the first days of August.

"A parlamentary committee is in charge of the arrangements and it is intended that there will be bonfires in over seven hundred places in the British Isles."
