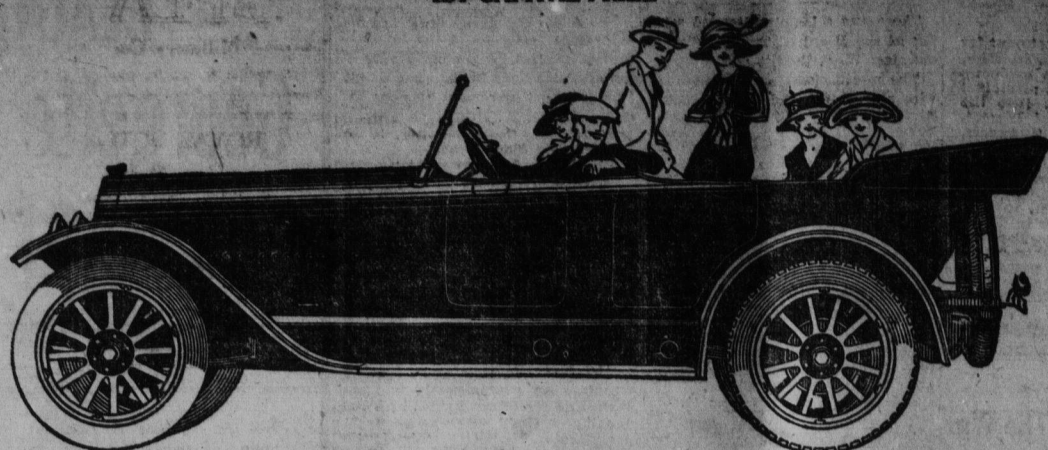

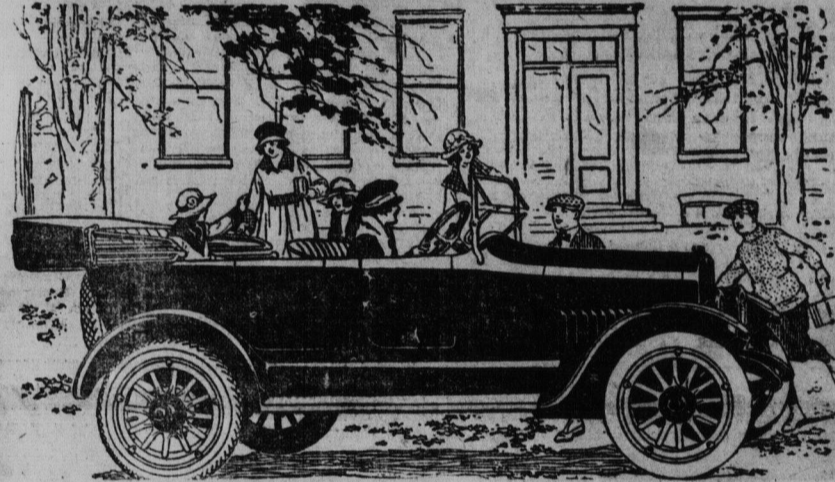

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AROUND THE WORLD'S NEWS

Baltic Liner In Hurricane. Arrived at New York Yesterday Shipped With Ice and in Damaged Condition.

New York, Jan. 20.—The New Baltic, one of the Baltic line, after battling with hurricanes for 16 days, arrived from Danzig and Havre yesterday, shipped with ice and in damaged condition.

GIOLITTI IS EASY PERSON TO APPROACH. Is One of Hardest to Get a Real Interview Out of Though.

HAS FAITH IN ITALY'S FUTURE. Believes That Russia Will Eventually Come to Her Senses and Turn Them Out.

By PIERMARINI. (Copyright, 1921, by Cross-Atlantic) London, Jan. 20.—Few politicians have more accessible to anybody who wishes to talk to them, and few more eager to say so than to their Italian visitor as Giovanni Giolitti, the Italian premier.

Not a Traitor. "They have depicted me as a traitor, German, as a traitor, an enemy, who wished to sell Italy," he said to me recently while taking his very fragrant mid-day meal at a modest restaurant at Turin.

Things Will Come Right. "The international situation? Even at this point I am very optimistic. My policy will consist mainly in smoothing over any rough points that may exist, and in removing all reasons of antagonism Italy needs both for former allies and her former enemies."

I consider Bolshevism in Russia no nothing more than a very dangerous but passing adventure. We shall see Russia come out of this ordeal completely transformed. As a result of it, one of the greatest reasons of Russia's weakness, the enormous land property owned by a few, will disappear. Now eighty per cent. of Russia's population holds the land.

Russia will be once more a great united country more intensely agricultural than in pre-war days. Its fields will be cultivated by a vast class of peasantry each of whom will be the owner of the soil he tills.

Reports Received at Annual Meeting and Board of Directors Elected. The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Glen Holmes Steamship Company was held yesterday afternoon in the Board of Trade rooms.

Submerged Wreck. A submerged wreck, evidently of some fair-sized vessel, was sighted by the officers of the Leyland line steamer Oronan, Captain Parry, reaching Boston from Liverpool, 12 latitude 43 north, longitude 92.58 west, the lookout Saturday called the attention of the navigating officers to a vessel's gear, projecting 10 or 12 feet out of water, apparently attached to a sunken wreck. It was directly in the steamship track, and constitutes a dangerous obstruction to navigation.
