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### Proceedings of the first Day.

BRANTFORD, TUESDAY, February 21st, 1865.

At the hour of 2 o'clock, p. m., Brother and Companion Thomas Mayne Daly, Right Worshipful Grand Master, took the chair.

The Companions being robed in Scarlet Regalia, and the Grand Officers at their respective stations, the Brethren were tested in the Illustrious Degree of Royal Scarlet. Prayer was then offered by Companion the Rev. Robert Arnold, Grand Chaplain, after which the Right Worshipful the Grand Master, declared the Sixth Annual Session of the Provincial Grand Lodge of Western Canada, open in due form.

The Lecture on the illustrious Degree was repeated by Companions N. C. Gowan and Thomas Keyes.

No. 2.—"That each and every County Master in Western Canada do forthwith address a circular to every Private Lodge in his County, informing it of the change made in the mode of paying the Grand Lodge Dues,—requiring strict compliance therewith, and informing such Lodge of the certain consequences of non-compliance."

No. 3.—"That the existing forms of Annual Returns are inconsistent and inexpedient, inasmuch as the District Return embraces heads which the Private Lodge Return does not give information about, and in many instances of large Districts, the District Master is not possessed of the information required to be given by him to the County Master; and some of the heads in Private Lodge Returns are troublesome and unnecessary, such as "Joined by Certificate,"

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### MORNING SESSION.

Brantford, Wednesday, February 22nd, 1865.

At 10 a. m., the Chair was taken by the Right Worshipful the Grand Master, and the business of the Grand Lodge resumed.

The Minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read and adopted.

The hour for attending Divine Service having arrived, the Grand Lodge adjourned, and the Grand Director of Ceremonies marshalled the Brethren in order, when they proceeded to Grace Church, where the following impressive and eloquent discourse was delivered by the Rev. R. Arnold, Grand Chaplain:—

#### SERMON.

"Beloved, if God so loved us, we ought also to love one another."
I. John, iv. 11.

It is reported, that when the Apostle John was grown old, and past preaching, he used to be led to the Church at Ephesus, and only say these words to the people: "Little children, love one another." And what more befitting theme can occupy our attention tion this morning,—by what grace should we be more distinguished, than that of Brotherly love; and what argument more powerful than that by which the Apostle enforces its exercise, in the language of the text: "Beloved, if God so loved us, we ought also to love one another?"

What more, it might be asked, can be needed now, than simply to remind the Brethren of this cft-repeated injunction and exhort to its exercise? Alas! beloved, what subject is there, upon which, however important its principle—however glorious its end, it is not necessary continuall, to stir up the minds even of the devoted followers of Jesus, by way of remembrance? Who can have failed to mark the sad and painful tendency even of Christian love to wax cold, and to observe the solemn proof of our nature's fall—the proneness to selfish ease, and the indifference to others' wants, which so readily, so rapidly overgrows the once loveliest plant of Heaven's planting, the love of the Brethren?

The warmest-hearted servants of the Lord, need to be continually pressed upon the great principles which they avow, and urged and exhorted to the endcavour to show forth the power of those principles in the amenities and intercourse of life; and how much more, then, must they, whose hearts are dull, and whose affections cold, be appealed to, again and again, upon the claims which the Lord has upon them, and stirred up—if the Lord bless the attem; t—to the exertions which his love demands of them?

In considering, first of all, the broad and general principle of Christian love, the brief inference of the Apostle in the text, may

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suggest to us, 1st—The motive to the exercise of that love; and, 2nd—The measure in which it should be manifested.

I. And first, the motive for the exercise of mutual love and tenderness among the Brethren, is the love of God for us. And who can contemplate that leve? Who can dwell upon the manner in which it has been manifested towards himself, and not recognize the claim thus urged upon his best affections-his most ardent love !-The love of God for us! O who can estimate it? Trace we the varied mercies that surround us-the care, the bounty, and the blessing that from infancy to youth, from youth to age, have been bestowed upon us: where have they their origin, but in the love of God ?-Whence comes that instinctive fondness of the parent for his offspring, which has insured for our years of helplessness, the tenderness of parental care? Whence come those bounties of the hand of Providence, that have strewn our path, in our advancing years, with varied goodness? Whence come the health, the strength, the capacities of enjoyment, the power of bodily and mental vigour. which have, in greater or in less degree, been our continued portion? Where is their source but in the love of God?-a love which measures not its gifts by the deservings or the gratitude of His creatures, but by his own unbounded tenderness and never-failing perfection. And yet, when we should have gathered together into one view the varied, the unnumbered bounties of God's loving Providence—when we should have accumulated into one mass of bounty, the ceaseless blessings that flow forth from his goodness upon the millions of His thankless creatures, how infinitely does this fall short of the wonders of His love for sinners in Christ Jesus! View this love with regard to the objects towards which it is displayedsinful, rebellious, vile, presumptuous man, who by sin had forfeited God's favour, and by continued transgression, went on provoking Him to wrath! Consider this love, as regards the amazing gift by which it has been manifested, the gift of His own dear Son,-the brightness of his glory, and the express image of His person,-to scorn and misery, insult and persecution; and, at last, to death upon the cross.

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Look upon this love as regards the blessings it unfolds and opens upon the view, and places within the reach of all that will but accept its terms-deliverance from the curse of a broken law, a place and a name among the sons and the daughters of the Lord Almighty; an inheritance glorious and eternal in the kingdom of heavenly blessedness. Contemplate the love of God in Christ for sinners, and say can anything more be needed to commend you to His love?

Behold! if God hath so loved us, ought we not also to love one another? If He, on whom we have no claim for anything but wrath, hath treated us with nothing but love, ought we not to manifest something of His spirit towards our Brethren, upon whom we are mutually dependant? If He, whose happiness need not have been one whit diminished though we had been cast out forever from His smile, hath yet condescended in a manner to link His happiness with ours, and to find delight in our salvation, ought not we to show our sense of this unbounded goodness, in the exercise of mutual love and tenderness towards the Brethren?

II. This love of God for us, let us secondly remark, is proposed not only as the motive, but as the measure, also, of our love to others. The Gospel enjoins upon us the duty of loving one another, not only because God has loved us, but also as He has loved us. And is this love of God, beloved, to be a pattern of your kindness, your compassion, your love for the Brethren? O how unlike it is to the selfish spirit of the world! The people of the world love those who love them, and do good to those from whom they expect good in return. The worldly throng think it quite sufficient, if they only come up to the mark of mere honesty in their dealings with their fellow-men. A poet has said, and the world has applauded the saying: "An honest man is the noblest work of God." Out upon the sentiment-it is false. Sure I am, no well-instructed Orangeman could have been the author of it. Orangeism, like the Gospel, teaches us that mere honesty is little to boast of-Orangeism, like the Gospel, teaches us to render to all their due; but more than this-

There is a story told of the great I. Howe, who lived in the time of Oliver Cromwell, and was a great favorite with him. Cromwell observing that he asked many favours for others, but none for himself, remarked to him: "And when will your own turn come?" "Ah!" said Howe, "My time is always come, whenever I can do good to others." This was the spirit of the Gospel,—this, Brethren, is the spirit of your Order.

Once more, in considering God's love as a pattern of what ours should be, observe how persevering it is. How do men abuse his mercies, how do they trifle with his goodness, how do they slight his love, and still He bears with them, still He is gracious to them, still He loves them! Oh, did men but remember this, did they but realize what has been the long suffering, the patient kindness of God's love for them, what a different world would this be, what a different code of honor would prevail among men. Have you ever examined, Brethren, the code of honor which the men of the world have set up and worship? If you examine it, you will find it in its every detail, opposed to the laws of God-the Gospel of Jesus. The Gospel says, "let not the sun go down on your wrath,-if thy Brother trespass against thee, forgive him,"-it says, "it is good to retaliate, if thy Brother trespass against thee have thy revenge." The law of God says, "thou shalt not commit murder," this law of man says honor requires that you shall. The Gospel teaches not to be selfish, but to love one another, to bear one another's burdens, and mutually to consult for each others honor, happiness and virture, and say, Brethren have you not subscribed to a code of honor, breathing the same noble spirit? If there is one thing about our Institution which I like above all others, it is the obligation which it imposes upon each, to be his Brother's keeper and his friend.

But excellent as is the Institution of which we are members, and fully as it breathes the spirit of the Gospel, yet do we find it spoken

against, and when nothing can be said against its regulations or its laws, then its traducers adopt another course,—they take the faults of the few and ascribed them to the entire body. The blemishes and the failings of unworthy members are magnified and held up to view, and it is said—surely the tree must be bad, that produces such corrupt fruit?

We reply, this is an unfair test. No Institution could stand, if judged of in this way. Such a test would be found too severe, even for Christianity itself: because, in the primitive times, out of twelve professing members, one was a hypocrite and an impostor; and in every age of the Church, false brethren have, more or less, been numbered among the true, and recreants to their profession have borne the name of true disciples.

To claim for Orangeism, that all its members should be good men and true, would be to place it above Christianity itself. Still, let it be our endeavour, Brethren, to stop the mouths of gainsayers—so to order our walk and conversation, that/our good may not be spoken evil of—to live in the exercise of kindness, gentleness, and love, not only towards the Brethren, but also to those who are not of us; and then our Institution will be what its founders intended it should be,—a bond of affection, uniting us as Brethren on earth,—a means of mutual encouragement and support as we journey onwards to eternity.

But finally, and above all, let us never forget, that Orangeism will not save us; that if any stop short, content with being simply an Orangeman, he will assuredly come short of the kingdom of Heaven. No, Brethren; however excellent this Institution may be, to bind men together in love, and call into exercise the graces of benevolence and charity, it can never save us—it can never fill that place in the heart which none but Jesus can fill.

I love an Orangeman because he is a friend, and it is good to have a friend when trouble comes upon us. I love him because he is a brother, and it is good to have a brother in adversity. But still I want more than this—a friend that sticketh closer than a brother.—

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t is good to have because he is a ity. But still I han a brother,— that will not forsake me in life—that will not desert me at death, but will carry me in safety over the dark waters of the Jordan.

And now, Brethren, the object I have had in view in the selection and illustration of this subject, is to interest your sympathies in behalf of that most excellent Institution, the *Protestant Orphan's Home*. If God hath so loved us, we ought to show our gratitude by helping these helpless Orphans, whom he has especially entrusted to our care and keeping.

It would be an offence against good taste, to occupy your time by dwelling at any length on the claims of this noble charity. You know its history,—you know its objects. You have adopted it as your own, and have wisely concluded to foster it and cherish it yourselves; and not only so, but to commend it to your children, and your children's children, so that generations yet unborn may bless the Lord for putting it into the hearts of its founders to establish it, and for putting it into your hearts, Brother Orangemen, generously to contribute to its support.

With God's help and blessing we will perpetuate this Orphan's Home. We will not weary in its support. In aiding it we do honor to ourselves; and in time to come it will be a sufficient reply to all gainsayers who may querulously ask "What good has Orangeism done in Canada?" to point to this Institution and say, "behold the Orphans Home."

After service a collection in aid of the Protestant Orphans Home, Toronto, was taken up.

The Brethren again formed in procession, and returned through the principal streets to the Town Hall, when the Grand Lodge was further adjourned, to meet again at 2 o'clock, p. m.

That the Provincial Grand Treasurer do immediately on receipt thereof, send a receipt for the same, and that the Annual be not given by any District Master to a Private Lodge, except on production of such receipt, and on being satisfied that all County and District Dues and Fines have been paid by such Private Lodge And that every County Master be, and is hereby required immediately after each Provincial Grand Lodge meeting, to notify every Private Lodge in his County, of the name and post-office address of the Provincial Grand Treasurer, for the current year."

No. 2.—"That each and every County Master in Western Canada do forthwith address a circular to every Private Lodge in his County, informing it of the change made in the mode of paying the Grand Lodge Dues,—requiring strict compliance therewith, and informing such Lodge of the certain consequences of pon-compliance."

No. 3.—"That the existing forms of Annual Returns are inconsistent and inexpedient, inasmuch as the District Return embraces heads which the Private Lodge Return does not give information about, and in many instances of large Districts, the District Master is not possessed of the information required to be given by him to the County Master; and some of the heads in Private Lodge Returns are troublesome and unnecessary, such as "Joined by Certificate," "Out on Certificate," "Amount Collected," "Amount Expended," "Municipal Elector," &c., and that the Provincial Grand Secretary be and is hereby instructed to condense the Private Lodge Returns, by omitting these unnecessary headings, and to bring the Private and District Returns into harmony with each other."
