

The War in Egypt. ALEXANDRIA, July 24, 10.50 a. m .-An engagement at the outposts be-tween a British force of rifles and mounted infantry and the enemy's companion's face. The soft sweet cavalry is now going on at Ramleh.

The rifles and mounted infantry occupied Ramleh early this morning with a Gatling gun at the railway bridge over the canal.
