and even then she was not being pushed to her full speed. She passed quite close to the Tonic, on which I was. She flashed along with marvellous speed and smoothness.

"I must say, however, that I felt more secure on the Tonic than I should have felt on the Turbinia, for you know they have not yet surmounted the difficulty of reversing the engine. She can go about forty miles an hour but can only reverse at less than four.

"If Parsons can make a similar turbine engine practicable for big craft with proper reversing power, he will open a new era in the history of steam motors. But, although he has carried the economizing of steam to a great pitch for a turbine engine, still from my observation the waste of both steam and fuel under his system if applied on a large scale would be almost fatal. That there is a big future before his turbine engine for launches and other small craft I do not doubt, provided that he can get over the reversing difficulty.

William Allan, M. P. for Gateshead, one of the great captains of the ship and engine building industry on the Tyne, where at his Atlas works he constructs steamers and ironclads, said:

"I consider that Mr. Parsons, whose electrical works on the Tyne are well known to me, has made an immense stride towards realizing that ideal of scientific mechanism, a perfect rotary engine. He has, to my knowledge, overcome appalling discouragements, and seeing what he has already done, there is no reason why he should not attain complete success."

The speed of the Turbinia is undoubted. She is easily the fastest craft ever launched. Vibration is reduced to the vanishing point. Her turbine engine is said to develop the same horse power as a torpedo boat engine of seven or eight times its weight. Her machinery is simple to a degree. In all respects she is unique.

She cannot reverse worth speaking of. If she cannot do that without putting in a separate reversing engine, then the weight and mechanical complications become very serious. The consumption of coal is also a serious defect, as is the waste of steam.

"It has been the experience of every inventor that a model may work perfectly, but when you come to apply the principle of the model on a large scale you encounter insuperable difficulties. I do not say that is the case with the Parsons turbine engine, but we have not yet seen on a big ship, and without adequate reversing gear it cannot be safely applied to a big ship. I agree with Mr. Wolf, who is as good an authority as you could have, that the Turbinia, as she floats is a marvel, and marks an immense advance in the attempt to supplant the present reciprocating engine."

TURBINIA A MARVEL.

SWIFTEST CRAFT EVER LAUNCHED—MAKES FORTY MILES AN HOUR.

LONDON, July 15.—The record-breaking 100-foot torpedo boat Turbinia has interested the public here generally, and experts in marine engineering in particular. It is admitted that if the principle of the steam turbine invented by Charles Parsons and fitted in the Turbinia can be extended to large ships it will mark the greatest revolution in mechanics since the invention of the steam engine itself.

FISHERY DEPARTMENT FORCED BY PUBLIC OPINION

TO PUT ON MORE GUARDIANS ON THE NORTH WEST AND SOUTH WEST MIRAMICHI.

BONESTOWN, July 26.—The fishery department has been at last obliged to put forth an effort to prevent a further slaughter of the salmon in the Miramichi. Through the looseness in the department's administration, the law as to net fishing was permitted to be openly violated and salmon destroyed by wholesale while on their way to the upper waters. What fish chanced to escape the nets were scared and dumpy when they reached the pools above. Fishermen from the larger cities who annually visit the Miramichi and spend hundreds of dollars in the sport, say, and are so advising their friends abroad, that salmon are not only very scarce in the stretches where they were in other years quite plentiful, but that what few fish are to be found to take the fly give little or no sport for the reason that they have been half killed before they reached the pools. Now, when it is almost too late

in the season, the department has given orders to put on six Guardians on the South-West Miramichi and five on the North-West. This will probably result in preventing further wholesale violation of the fishery laws, and salmon will be permitted to reach the upper waters; but had the guardians been put on about the fifteenth of June, and visitors would have had reason to say that the late Government annually called them to do duty, salmon would now have been plentiful and lively, and visitors would have had reason to say to their friends abroad that the Miramichi is still maintaining its reputation as one of the best fishing streams in the eastern provinces. It is to be hoped by next year the present Government at Ottawa will know what their duty is in such matters.—Gleaner.

TARTE DEBATES THE BOLLERS.

TORONTO, July 23.—A Despatch to the World from Montreal says: It is stated here that Mr. Madore of Hochelaga has resigned as a member of the House of Commons. The story goes that Mr. Madore, who is one of the violent lickspoons against Hon. Mr. Tarte's management of the party's affairs in this district had at first decided to place his resignation in the hands of Mr. Speaker, but that he has since decided to forward it to Sir Wilfrid Laurier which counsel was acted upon. It now appears that Hon. C. A. Geoffrion, who is looked upon as a sort of patcher up of party troubles, took with him to England not only Mr. Madore's resignation, but also a protest signed by a dozen or more of Sir Wilfrid's supporters. This grave move was referred to today by a friend of the Minister of Public Works, in conversation with the latter, and Mr. Tarte said he did not care a snap of the finger for the whole crowd of bollers, and again repeated the threat that if he fell the whole ship at Ottawa would tumble as well.

THE OTHER SIDE.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., July 21.—Mr. Floerheim, one of the largest operators in the coal trade here, has advised to time he can buy west Virginia coal at the mines for 60 cts. a ton and then sell it to the market for 85 cts. a ton. He has a large stock of coal on hand and expects to compete against them and pay 60 cts. for mining. Of course the quality is poorer, but when it is coal and will do nicely in a pinch.

Some small fortunes are being made during the strike and one of them will be by the Monongahela Coal Co. For a year almost all of their slack has been dumped into immense tanks and there it has remained while other operators throughout the district were selling at from 25 to 35 cents per ton. To-day, the market price for it is in the neighborhood of \$1.15 per ton and the co's has an almost exhaustless supply in front of their mines at Willock station.

Bye-Law.

At a meeting of the County Council of the Municipality of Northumberland, held at the Council Chamber, Newcastle, on Tuesday, the sixth day of July, 1897:—

Resolved, That the following bye-law be made and established for the government of the said Municipality:—

A Bye-Law relating to PUBLIC EXHIBITIONS, Etc.

Be it ordained by the Municipal Council of the County of Northumberland.

1. Before any circus, show, menagerie, merry-go-round, concert, play or other public exhibition, of which the managers or proprietors are non-residents of the County, to which an admission fee is charged, be allowed to exhibit or act, they shall pay to the Collector of Rates for the District in which the same is held, the following fees viz:—

For Circus and Menagerie combined \$40.00 a day.
For Circus Menagerie or Merry-go-round 40.00 a day.
For any other outside show 40.00 a day.

Residents of the County being proprietors or managers of such public exhibitions etc. shall be required to pay three-fourths of above rates for permission to exhibit such circus, menagerie or merry-go-round or other outside show or exhibition, viz \$30.00 per day.

For any show, exhibition, play or concert, in a public hall 82.00 a day.

For each continued repetition thereof 1.00 a day.

2. The above mentioned fees when collected in the Parishes of Chatham and Newcastle, shall be paid by the Collectors into the Police Fund; and when collected in the other Parishes shall be paid to the County Treasurer, and placed to the credit of the Contingent Fund on account of the Parishes wherein the same are collected.

3. Any Bye-Law heretofore passed by the County Council, repugnant or inconsistent with the foregoing provisions is hereby repealed.
