FRENCH DRIVE GERMANS BACK BY BRILLIANT BAYONET CHARGE

WAR NEWS HAS BEEN VERY MEAGRE

Censorship Very Strict on News From Seat of War.—Armies Massing

During the past week very little has been received in the way of real war news. The Graphic bulletin boards, which contain the latest news, are posted at the Post Office each day as received and are eagerly read by all. When news of sufficient importance is published and sold on the streets, meeting with a ready demand. As no news of importance has been received since Saturday, none has been published, but they will be resumed as soon as anything of importance comes through. The Graphic is also supplying outside parties with the latest news by phone. Anyone outside Campbellton, wishing to get the latest news should call up the Graphic Office between 4 and 5 o'clock each afternoon.

NEWS OF BIG BATTLE HOURLY EXPECTED

News From Alsace Is Conflicting But Seems to Indicate French Hold Meulhausen

(Special to the Graphic). New York, Aug. 12.—A special cable brings the news of the concentration of the opposing armies on the continent in the vicinity of Namur and the outcome of a battle would be very momentous.

The news from Alsace-Lorraine is conflicting, but the last word is that the French have succeeded in holding Meulhausen. In this direction the fighting so far has not been of a serious nature.

OCEAN ROUTE NOW CLEAR TO LIVERPOOL

(Special to the Graphic). Ottawa, Aug. 12.—An announcement of significance was authorized by the Canadian Government. This was that the ocean was clear from Montreal to Liverpool, which is taken to mean that the German cruisers not accounted for have either been located, safely bottled up or have been destroyed.

The North sea is now clear for shipping and that steamship services have been resumed. The British cruiser Drake has entered the St. Lawrence for protection of the Canadian shipping.

NAVAL ENGAGEMENT IN THE FAR EAST

A Tein-Tain despatch says the Russian battleship Admiral and the German

Entire German Battery Captured in Alsace. Allies Still Hold Leige Forts—Admiral Jellicoe Now Commands Fleet.

GREAT BRITAIN'S SEA COMMANDER



Admiral Jellicoe is commander in chief of the British navy. He will lead Britain's sea fighters against those of the Kaiser.

(Special War Despatch) St. John, Aug. 13th.—Matters in the North Sea are still shrouded in mystery and no news of any kind has been issued to the press. From an authoritative source it is learned that a big naval battle is expected hourly in the Adriatic sea, where the British and French warships are making a demonstration against the Austrian fleet. Success still attends the Belgian arms, their forces still holding the forts at Liege. Yesterday the Germans were decisively defeated by the Belgian forces at Halen (which is thought to be Herstal), in a pitched battle.

The French army has resumed the offensive in Alsace and captured a German battery there driving the Germans back by brilliant bayonet charges. Admiral Jellicoe has taken command of the British ships in the North Sea.

GERMAN ARMY CORPS ARE LOCATED

London, Aug. 12.—The British war office information bureau says that the majority of the twenty six German army corps have been located, and that the mass of the German troops are concentrated between Liege and Luxemburg.

Fifty Thousand People Sing Hymns Before Buckingham Palace

Last Sunday saw England in prayer. Fifty thousand people on Sunday evening assembled around Buckingham Palace singing "Oh God Our Help in Ages Past" with wonderful solemnity, before the King and Queen on the balcony. The scene as the troops passed the front is inspiring, particularly in the county district. "You didn't try to keep him back" said a friend who witnessed a girl laughingly bid her lover good-bye, "Never" came the reply. "He'd never marry me if he didn't fight for the King now." Mothers assemble in the market places cheering their sons as they march off. "Do your duty my lads," they shout in farewell. The tears are kept back until the lads are gone. This is the universal spirit.

GERMAN REPORT VICTORY AT MEULHAUSEN

(Special to the Graphic). London, Aug. 11.—The latest despatches indicate that the Germans have crossed the Belgian frontier into France at one point are strongly entrenched. A Berlin paper reports a considerable German victory at Meulhausen of which news is available from no other source.

WAR BUDGET PASSED IN HOUSE OF COMMONS

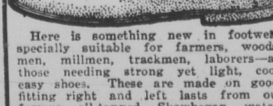
The passage of a war budget of \$500,000,000 in the House of Commons today without a dissenting voice and the granting of an arm increase of 500,000 men, in accordance with the plans of Lord Kitchener, the new War Minister, shows that Great Britain has put her hand to the plow. A call to arms issued by the War Office tonight says an addition of 100,000 men to the regular army is needed immediately and that "Lord Kitchener is confident this appeal will at once be responded to by all who have the safety of our empire at heart."

The term of service for the new men is to be three years, or until the war is concluded. The age of enlistment will be between 19 and 30. The naval estimates provide for 67,000 additional officers and men, which will make the navy's strength 218,000 men.

FRANCE MASSING HER TROOPS ON FRONTIER

London, Aug. 7.—France has 400,000 troops along the frontier and men and officers show a cheerful and determined spirit. A defeat of a Bavarian corps by a French raiding party is also reported.

NEWS OF THE WAR FROM DAY TO DAY

Special Despatches Received by the Graphic Tell of Heavy Fighting.

(Special to the Graphic)

Brussels, Aug. 6.—The real battle of Liege began at day break today and still continues. The German forces are now said to number nearly 100,000 men under the command of the Crown Prince in person, aided by several of the highest of the general staff.

Up to the present the Belgian advantage has been maintained and the loss to the enemy is enormous. The German attacking forces are displaying desperate courage but their efforts are useless in the face of the withering fire that the Belgian garrisons are able to maintain from their almost impregnable fortifications.

For siege purposes the new Krupp guns of heavy calibre, are being used and an enormous number of them are already in action. The advice received by the war offices fail to estimate the German dead and wounded, but it is known to be in the neighborhood of 10,000.

Rome, Aug. 6.—It is reported that the Italian government has notified Germany that Italy will remain neutral because Germany started the war.

Calais, France, Aug. 6.—The big German tank steamer, Czar Nicholas II, was brought into port here today by a French destroyer.

Brussels, Aug. 6.—Two thousand Boy Scouts have been mobilized in Brussels and have been assigned for employment in the different government ministries, taking the places of the employees who have been called to the front.

Brussels, Aug. 6.—The second spectacular battle of the air in the great world war was fought there today.

Paris, Aug. 6.—The Admiralty has advised that German warships which attempted a hostile movement against the French seacoast on the Mediterranean has been engaged by the French.

A German aviator scouting as part of the advance of the 50,000 invading Germans, who were attacking Liege, was engaged, by a Belgian airman in an exchange of shots in which each tried to hit the rival aviator, his engine or his propeller. Suddenly while at a height of 500 meters, the Belgian abandoned his course and dashed straight for the German flying machine. The German tried to evade the attack by lowering his planes, but with a swoop the Belgian was upon him and struck the enemy's aeroplane in the centre, cutting it in two. Both machines were hurled to the ground together in a tangled mass of steel rods, wire and canvas. Both aviators were reported killed.

Antwerp, Belgium, Aug. 6.—During an anti-German demonstration today several Germans fired into the crowd. Four German steamers in the port were seized today by the Belgium authorities.

London, Aug. 6.—When Earl Kitchener drove to today's meeting of the cabinet he was greeted with enthusiastic applause everywhere. The appointment of the Earl to be Minister of War was a great popular stroke by Premier Asquith.

Conservatives and Liberals alike endorse the move as making for an intelligent administration of the army during the war.

London, Aug. 7.—The British fleet has engaged the German fleet on the high seas. The British warships are reported to be driving the Germans toward the Dutch coast.

No particulars from the Associated Press followed this bulletin, which was received at St. John before midnight but soon afterwards report was circulated in Halifax, Montreal and New York to the effect that a naval battle in the North Sea had resulted in the sinking of nine German vessels and the capture of six German vessels by British fleet, and that one British ship had been sunk. No confirmation of this was received up to noon.

AUSTRIANS RETIRE FROM SERBIAN ARTILLERY
London, Aug. 7.—A despatch from Nish, Serbia, says that the Austrian artillery opened fire on the Serbian forces at Obrenostatz, Serbia Thursday night. The Serbian artillery responded and a long distance duel that lasted some time was finally ended by the Austrians retiring, abandoning two of their guns.

GOOD PROGRESS IN CANADIAN ENLISTMENT.
Ottawa, Aug. 7.—Reports received by the Militia department this evening indicate the enlistment all over Canada is progressing smoothly and the numbers who are applying are far more than the total number actually required.

HOSPITAL AUTHORITIES ORDERED TO PREPARE.
Hull, England, Aug. 7.—The hospital authorities here have been notified to prepare to receive 250 persons wounded in the North Sea engagement.

London, Aug. 8.—A despatch from Brussels says that the Belgians have granted the armistice for twenty-four hours requested by the Germans and that the latter are now collecting their wounded and burying their dead. The Germans have withdrawn to a less exposed position, where they can recuperate.

German casualties in the battle around Liege number 25,000 according to their own admission. An official statement issued from Berlin described the attempt on Liege fortress as unsuccessful and the assault of the Germans as "A Vigue act of heroism" and that it would have not the slightest influence on the larger operations of the German army.

German diplomats have been using their utmost effort to win Italy to the German side by negotiations and a direct appeal to King Victor Emmanuel but without success. The Italian ambassador at London in thanking a great assembly, including several persons and members of parliament which gathered in front of the embassy, said that Italy had declared her neutrality and would adhere to it.

Paris, Aug. 9.—An official report by the French of the Village of Altkirch in Alsace, says that the French advance guard arrived before that place before night fall Friday. The town was defended by strong earthworks and occupied by a German brigade. The French is about carrying the breastwork bayonet charge.

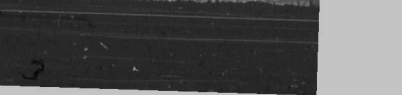
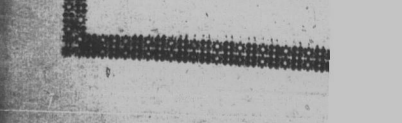
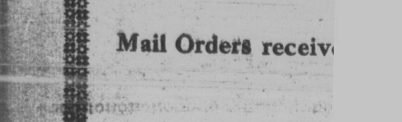
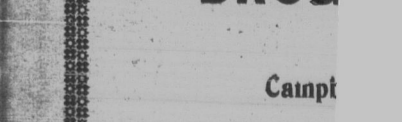
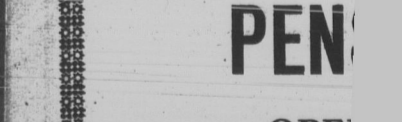
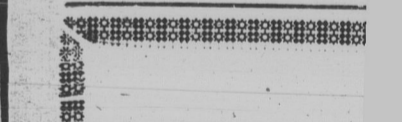
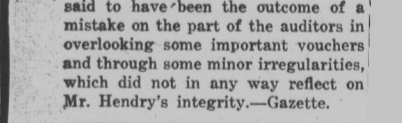
SMALL FIRES

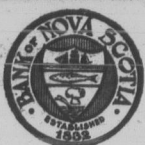
OFF THE TRACK

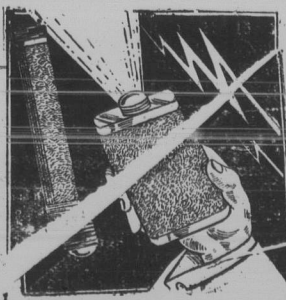

THE OPEN OCEAN
Germany continues to play a waiting game with her great fleet. Safe beneath the sheltering guns of the huge forts in the North Sea, and with the ocean mined to destroy foe and friend, the dreadnoughts and the cruisers are held in leash, while with torpedo boats and submarine attempts are made to damage the waiting British squadron and so reduce its fighting power. Meanwhile, the world's commerce is checked, and the world's industry paralyzed. This condition must continue until there comes the test of sea power for which all the world is waiting and it is made clear that the ways of the ocean are safe. The German policy evidently is to avoid a decisive battle at sea. Therefore she awaits the turn of events in the seven months' safety in the north, while British cruisers ranging the seas are picking up, one by one, the ships of Germany's merchant marine and should some day come in touch with the few German cruisers that are at sea and can nowhere find safety. Their home ports are closed and the neutrality laws permit them to remain but a few hours in the port of any nation not engaged in the conflict. That Britain is making every effort to quickly clear the ocean of these menaces to her commerce the presence in Canadian waters of the battleship Drake and the reported activity of other war vessels of her great navy makes clear. Ships flying the British flag and ships of friendly powers continue to cross the western ocean, but until the few hostile craft now on the seas are captured or sunk traffic is attended with considerable risk. Britain and France must have supplies. Canada and the United States are the natural sources from which to draw them, and British sail-

EDITOR'S MAIL BAG
To the Editor "Campbellton Graphic"
Dear Sir:
The present war being carried on in Europe by the most powerful nations on sea and land, and with the best of modern and up-to-date equipment is still, we hope, a long way from us here. True, there are rumors of marauding German cruisers hanging around our maritime ports, but we have confidence in those whose duty it is to deal with such that they will be looked after. Should it come to the worst, however, and a German regiment take it into its head to pay us a visit, we would be reasonably immune from attack—our town not being fortified—but there are other local matters which were not provided for by International Law and which might be liable to endanger our supposed security.

No doubt the Officers, after landing at the lower wharf, would proceed to Jimmy Louden's and command his best car for the purpose of paying a visit to Ward 3, but, in rounding the wharf, should they be run into by another car taking the wrong side of the roadway and whose youthful driver had no license, might they not be apt to start something?
The rank and file would probably keep to the side-walks, but dangers threaten them even there. Many of the stores on our main street are using sun-blinds, which are at just such a height as would make them bow their haughty heads or run the risk of having their helmets damaged. What would they be apt to do should they happen to strike some of those beautiful spring-boards which would throw them out of their goose-step? or should a worn out plank give way beneath them, might they not think it was the first of a series of traps prepared for their benefit, and be apt to start something? Intoxicated with recent victories, they might be inclined to treat these as small matters, but another danger is still ahead of them. What might happen if they were run into by a cyclist or ordered to take the roadway—which in places would mean quite a jump—because he wanted the use of the sidewalk?
It may be some time before we are honored by a visit from the Uhlans, but the above are matters which ought to have the attention of the proper authorities so that their visit, when it does come, may be made as pleasant as possible.

CRANE AND BRIDGE WENT OVER THE BANK

Mishap at Coal Branch Blocked Traffic on the I.C.R. For Eight Hours on Tuesday

Traffic on the Northern Division of the I.C.R. was blocked about eight hours Tuesday as the result of a bad mishap at Coal Creek, about 28 miles west of Moncton, where a new bridge was being put in. A new span is being put in at Coal Creek and the Alist-Chalmers Bridge Company has charge of the work. Tuesday morning while at work, the crane picked up one of the old spans and carried it about 200 feet from the bridge, when the operator of the crane seemed to lose control and the crane and old bridge went down over the bank. Fortunately no one was hurt, but there were some narrow escapes.

When word of the accident was received in Moncton, General Manager Guelius and Chief Engineer Brown, with a train wrecking outfit, left at once for Coal Creek. With the I.C.R. crane the new span was picked up and put in place, and at 8.30 last evening the line was clear for traffic. The bridge consists of a forty-foot span over an opening about fifty feet deep, and the placing of the new span was done in remarkably quick time, considering the disadvantages under which the I. C. R. crew worked.

GERMANS SUFFER GREAT LOSS ON SATURDAY

Paris, Aug. 9.—Only news to-day is the defeat of the Germans by the French at Altkirch, a fortified city in Alsace, near the German-France boundary. It is reported that the Germans lost 30,000 killed and wounded, and the French 15,000.

GERMAN SUBMARINES ATTACK BRITISH FLEET

London, Aug. 10.—The Admiralty has announced that one of the cruisers of the main fleet was attacked yesterday by German submarines. None of British ships were damaged. One German submarine boat was sunk.

REPORTED ENGAGEMENT IN ADRIATIC SEA

London, Aug. 9.—A steamer which has arrived at Trieste reports an engagement in the Adriatic sea. One hundred wounded according to this report have been taken to Pola, the great naval port of Austria.

LIEGE HAS BEEN OCCUPIED BY GERMANS

The occupation of Liege by the Germans is confirmed in a despatch received from Brussels early this morning.

BRITISH AND FRENCH TROOPS FROM JUNCTION

A junction of Belgian, British and French troops in Belgium is reported to have been effected and a clash between German and French cavalry south of Namur is said to have taken place.

JAPAN MAY ATTACK GERMANY CHINA STATION

A cablegram from Peking says serious "conversations" are proceeding between the Tokyo and London governments concerning whether Japan will participate in an attack on the German colony of Tsing Tau.

GERMAN TROOPS SHORT OF FOOD AND AMMUNITION

It is reported from Paris that the Germans in Belgium are short of provisions.

GERMANY AND AUSTRIA ARE THREATENING ITALY

Rome, Aug. 9.—Germany and Austria threaten Italy with the declaration that if the latter persists in its stand of neutrality, they will consider themselves free to declare war, and Austria will invade Italy.

GERMAN ADVANCE HAS BEEN STOPPED BY FRENCH

Brussels, Aug. 10.—The following statements have been issued by the General staff: German troops have partly changed since Saturday. The advance guards are retiring under the irrepressible pressure of the French troops who are in considerable force in all the country south of the Meuse, which they are clearing of German troops. The enemy's offensive movement has been completely stopped.

CONGRATULATION TO BELGIAN FORCES FROM CZAR OF RUSSIA

The Russian emperor has telegraphed to King Albert his congratulations and best wishes for the continued success of the Belgian arms.

SURRENDER OF SEVEN GERMAN REGIMENTS.

A Brussels despatch which was considered authoritative states that seven German regiments have surrendered to the Belgians. This is thought to be part of the German Army Corps which was investing Liege.

ENGLAND IS NOW CALMLY CONFIDENT.

That the government in the home land has the full confidence of the people is shown in a dispatch today which states that "England is calm and confident". The strain in commercial operations has now eased off and the Bank of England rate has been reduced from 6 to 5 per cent, which will do much to restore confidence in the financial institutions.

BELGIAN FORCES GUARD APPROACHES TO BRUSSELS

Diplomatic relations between France and Austria have been broken and the Ambassadors have left the capitals. The French are advancing in Alsace, but against what opposition is not known. The Germans occupy the city of Liege, while the Belgian troops hold the forts. The Belgian official view is that the situation is quite satisfactory. Strong forces guard all the approaches to Brussels. The Austrians before Serbia are still bombarding Belgrade, while part of the Serbian army is taking the offensive in Bosnia.

ENGLISH TROOPS ON FRENCH SOIL.

A Paris despatch which is not confirmed, states that English troops are disembarking on French soil. This report can not be authenticated owing to the strict censorship imposed on the English press.

ITALY MAY BREAK WITH AUSTRIA

London, Aug. 11.—Relations between Austria and Italy are strained.

NO GREAT BATTLE HAS YET BEEN FOUGHT

No great battle has yet been fought on land or sea unless the German assault on the forts at Liege eventually assumes the proportion of a battle in history. Both combatants claim the victory there with the Belgians still holding the forts and the Germans occupying the city. The situation is an unique one. There is no confirmation of the report that the French have engaged the Germans and cut off their retreat.

WHOLESALE SLAUGHTER OF BELGIAN CIVILIANS

Dark reports come in of the wholesale slaughter of defenceless civilians in Belgian villages, and of the execution of prominent residents in a French town. Paris is inflamed over the sworn statement of a youth, relating the murder by German soldiers of several French non-combatants, several days before the Declaration of the war. In the far east the smouldering ashes left from the Balkan war are springing into flames again and Montenegro has already seized Scutari in Albania and entered Austrian territory. Turkey and possibly Bulgaria may come to aid of Germany and Austria and the battlefields of two recent wars still reeking with the blood of thousands may again be drenched. All Germans and Austrians in Belgium must declare themselves within twenty four hours, or they will be arrested as spies.

THE NORTH SEA IS CLOSED TO FISHING FLEET

The North sea is again closed to the fishing fleets, which is regarded as significant, in view of the fact that there are large British and German fleets in that water. The German cruiser Karlaruke, which arrived at San Juan, Porto Rico, reported an engagement Friday night off the Bahamas with four British and French cruisers. Already there is evidence that the war will be prosecuted with the bitterest feeling, and on the part of the Germans, at least with great brutality.
