Shoots Graft Prosecutor at Frisco.

MORRIS HAAS, JEW JEWELER AND AN EX-CONVICT FIRED THE FATAL SHOT-EXCITEMENT IN COURT WAS INTENSE-ARREST OF CRIMINAL.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 13-Francis J. Heney, graft prosecutor was shot, and it is believed fatally wounded, in the court room today by a jeweler, who is a member of the Reuf jury. Heney is still alive but is believed to

of the trial of Abraham Reuf on the Heney, was still unconscious but med ical assistance had not then arrived. Mr. Heney was shot by Morris Haas, who was a venire man in a former graft trial. Haas, who was taken immediately into custody, gave as a reason for the shooting that Heney had

The court had taken a recess for ten minutes and the jury had left the room. Heney and Renf's attorneys Ash and Dozier, had just returned from judge Lawlor's chambers where they had been summoned by the judge for a conference. After the conference Ash and Dozier returned to the court room and Heney returned to his customary seat. He was talking with former sup-ervisor Gallagher, who had just preervisor Gallagher, who had just previously undergone a severe cross-examination by Reuf's attorneys when Haas rushed up out of the audience. Haas approached Heney, placed a revolver against the prosecutor's right temple and fired. Heney fell ower on the desk, blood streaming from the wound. Haas was immediately seized

by bystanders and thrown into the empty jury box, where he was put on his back until the police came.

Haas, while a venire man in the second Reuf bribery trial, was put to a severe examination by Heney while he was being examined for jury duty. He asserts that the information brought out by Heney in his questions resulted in the ruin of his business. resulted in the ruin of his business.

When Heney fell, shot through the when Heney rell, shot through the temple, there was an immediate rush for the assassin who was quickly subdued. Dr. Hafink, who was in the building at the time rushed to Heney's assistance. Hency was taken to the central emergency hospital in an am-

Though the bodyguards, who have been constantly employed to protect Heney, were within six feet of him, Haas drew a revolver and fired the ealized what was going on.

Haas is a Jewish saloon keeper and a former convict. In the second Reuf trial he had been passed as a juror. Then one day in court Heney dramatically produced a photograph of Haas taken at San Quentin penitentiary in convict garb and with cropped head, with his number across his breast. He with his number across his breast. He collapsed in court, admitting he had been a convict and was immediately

discharged from the jury.

Haas stated, after the shooting: "Hency exposed my record in court and ruined my business. I am even with him now and I do not care what harrows to me."

A large force of police headed by chief Biggs surrounded the building in which the court was held and kept the crowd back. Rodolphe Lemieux today had a long interview regarding the Japanese question with sir Edward Grey, foreign secretary, who expressed the satisfaction of the imperial authorities at the way in which Canada had handled the matter. Serious complaints have been received at Stockholm regarding Swedish immigrants to Canada working on railways being ill-treated, and the Swedish government has asked the Dominion government for an investigation. Senator Dandurand was one of the principal speakers at a meeting of the British group of the intar-parliamentary union for peace, held last night at Westminster. On this occasion the British group lord Weardale presiding, discussed the advisability of holding the next congress in Canada. A meeting of the council of the union will be held in January at which delegates from all European parliaments will be present European parliaments will be present and will be able to state what time the prorogations of their respective parliaments will take place, so as to enable them to go to Canada. The British members of the union are very anxious to visit the Dominion.

cHicago, Nov. 13.—The large grain shipping interests of the Chicago board of trade decided yesterday to join forces with the eastern grain exchanges in opposing the interstate commerce commission prohibiting the payment by the railroads of an allowance for the transfer and electron. matter, being content to have the allowance removed provided it is removed at all other points. Fifteen of twenty of the large companies owning extensive elevator facilities are de cidedly opposed to having their revenues decreased in this way, which practically amounts to an increase in the rates on grain, and will send a protest to the individual railroads and to the to the individual railroads and to the interstate commerce commission asking that the allowance charges be not cancelled while the litigation involving the case as applied to the Missouri river cities shall have been settled.

The regular allowance that has been paid at Chicago for many years amounts to one-fourth of a cent a bushel, and it is stated that if it were eliminated the saving of one large eastern road

GERMAN CHANCELLOR WILL NOT

OFFICIAL PARTY GOMING

BERLIN, Nov. 13.—Chancellor von Buelow is to meet emperor William at Kiel next Monday. If the chancellor and his sovereign are in agreement in the matter of future policies, and if the chancellor is to remain in office, the German people will at once be informed that his majesty accepts the spirit of the declaration made in the reichstag by the chancellor last Tuesday. These statements were that neither prince von Buelow, nor any succeeding chancellor, would remain in office unless his majesty is more reserved in his utter-

Buelow and his friends are so preparing the political situation that if the chan-cellor should retire after his audience

cellor should retire after his audience at Kiel on Monday next with emperor William, it will be because his majesty was not willing to concur in the declaration made in the Reichstag by the chancellor on Tuesday that it was essential that the emperor be more reserted in his utterances in future. Prince von Buelow has taken the position that he represents the entire people on this question and because of this he is bound to interpret the national will to the sovereign, standing or falling by his decision. While it cannot be said that prince von Buelow has taken counsel with all the imperial ministers he has been in consultation with some of them and they support

taken counsel with all the imperial ministers he has been in consultation with some of them and they support him actively.

The chancellor submitted the question whether he should reply further to the criticisms of the emperor and himself to the Prussian cabinet, which was in session in the Reichstag building during yesterday. His colleagues wish him not to do this but to rest upon his speech of the previous day.

Referring to his utterances of Tuesday the chancellor said, privately to a friend: "Those who cannot comprehend what I said are not to be helped."

The impression among the intimates of the chancellor is that he has no great desire to remain in office. His wife, since his illness of 1906, has often urged upon him the necessity of retiring to private life and his physician Prof. Renwers, constantly has advised him not to work so hard. 

TARIFF REDUCTIONS

Republicans and Democrats Satsfied

on Tobacco Duties.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13-From the attitude by both republican and democratic members of the house ways and means committee at today's hearing on the proposed restrictions of the tariff, it became evident that there is general satisfaction with the present duties on tobacco. The democrats appear satisfied with the present tariff on the ground that the tobacco is a product of which this government should derive revenue while the republicar's favor the present rates because they offer the protection desired by the American tobacco interests.

Representatives of the tobacco growers of New England, Florida and Georgia opposed any change for higher or lower rates, contending that such action would disturb the conditions of the trade.

White Floyo, chairman of the tobacco board of the Connecticut valley, was giving the committee information with regard to the various phases of the American tobacco industry and representative Griggs of Georgia, agent of the growers, said that they were afraid of free trade with the Philipines.

"They certainly are," was Mr. Floyd's on Tobacco Duties.

"They certainly are," was Mr. Floyd's reply: "Borneo and Sumatra, where the to-bacco industry is in the hands of the Dutch are so near the Phillipines that the Dutch tobacco growers would be able to take their coolle labor to the Phillipines and raise tobacco with labor that costs but eighteen cents per day, which would compete with our tobacco when our labor costs from \$1.50 to \$2.50 a day. It would take our standing army to keep the same growers of Sumatra from smuggling tobaco into one or more of the Phillipine slands," he added, "where he could' ship it to this country free of duty.

HAVE NO PREJUDICES

LORD MILNER INTERVIEWED ON CANADIAN TOUR WITH BRITAIN

DOMINION DESIRES TO TRADE

(Canadian Associated Press)
LONDON, Nov. 13—Lord Milner interviewed today stated that he had not discovered any prejudice against English emigrants in Canada. If it did exist the explanation must be that cer-tain English immigrants make themselves unpopular there as there was nothing like a general feeling of dislike on the part of Canadians for immigration from the mother country. In respecting to preferential trade there was an universal feeling in Canada in favor of it and this was not due so much to any calculation of the particu-lar benefits which might arise to Canada as to the general sentiment in favor of trade with Britain rather than with foreign countries, especially other European countries. Canadians would not object to a duty on their imports if at a lower rate than corresponding foreign imports. However, the preference movement in Canada had receded slightly since the present government ing that Canada should do more garding imperial defence but it had not vet been taken up as a practical ques tion. 
