AIR "TRAINS" RUSH BETWEEN CITIES

TWENTY-SIX LINES FROM LONDON.

Service is Constantly Being Improved and Safety is Unchallenged.

A new time table of the aerial routes has been issued by the Aerial Travel Bureau, and it is now possible for one to look up air connections with most parts of Europe and North Africa, just as one would decide on a train. cessful service has made the time

There are twenty-six regular routes airdrome, eighteen of which are con-ducted by Great Britain, four by France and four by Holland. Daily there are nine services to and from Paris, two scheduled to Brussels and two from Brussels and the same for

The guide gives a graphic idea of the extension of aerial transportation on the Continent. Under Belgrade one reads: "Leave Croydon 4 in the afternoon, reach Paris at 6, leave following morning at 6, arrive Prague at 2, wait half an hour, depart again and reach Budapest 6 in the evening, reach Belgrade at 10"—which makes about forty hours of travel. This ser-vice is available daily and beginning in June will be further extended to In June will be further extended to Bucharest and Constantinople. Pas-sengers leaving London later in the afternoon can fly to Warsaw via Paris in twenty-six hours.

Another interesting route outlined in the guide includes stops in Spain and Morocco. It is possible to fly to Parls, take a train to Toulouse, catching an airplane at 9 in the morning. rive at Casablanca at 10 the next


