

THE WOMEN OF INDIA

The Indignities Offered Unfortunate Widowhood.

Ten Million Unhappy Creatures Driven to Lives of Shame—Rev. J. Smith's Instructive and Stirring

The lecture in Victoria Hall last evening was fairly well attended, the body of the hall being filled. On the platform were the Bishop of Huron (chairman), Very Rev. Dean Innes, Rev. Principal Fowell, Rev. Mr. Rowe, Rev. M. Seaborn, Rev. G. B. Sage, Rev. Canon Smith and Rev. Mr. Porter. The Bishop of Huron opened the meeting with a short address delivered in that earnest manner so peculiarly his own and in which he paid tribute to the ability

and energy of Rev. J. Smith, the lecturer

Rev. Mr. Smith, who is a missionary from India, was then introduced, and was received with applause. He said: I will confine myself to one subject and shall conne myselt to one subject and snail speak of the women of India, as I notice that the great majority of the audience is composed of women, as has been the case in the course of all my lectures in the Province. It is not to be wondered at, as women have reaped more from Christianity, and have been rescued from greater depths of degredation than men. The condition of women in heathen India is much as the men make it, and they occupy just such po-

women in heathen India is much as the men make it, and they occupy just such positions as men are pleased to assign them. It is, I wever, chiefly due to the Brahma writer, Menai, who was the organizer of their code of religion and who lived 800 B. C. According to the rules of their religion the woman when a child is subject to her father; when a wife to her husband, and when a widow to her oldest son. She knows no life but that

male child is a bundle of snakes, because they say you cannot tell what a girl may develop, into, and as a snake is untrust-worthy they think it a very appropriate appelation. Hindoo authorities claim that one girl in every 500 is educated. Fifty per cent. of the girls are taken away from the schools before they know the alphabet, and they then have all the education that they can ever expect to have. That it is

the schools before they know the alphabet, and they then have all the education that they can ever expect to have. That is the Hindoo higher education for women.

The wife's duties, owing to her ignorance, must be very menial. She is not allowed to speak to her husband in the presence of the family. Occasionally a man will take the wife out for a walk, and she will follow him about ten feet behind. When a man dies his wife is held to be directly responsible for his death. She has committed some sin that has been thus visited upon the man's family. She is then stripped of her raiment and her head is shaved. She is compelled to fast once a week and sometimes twice a week. She is wrapped in a single garment and is forced to sleep on the bare ground; is despised and treated with contempt, and is made a hewer of wood and a drawer of water.

There are 20,000,000 widows in India, and I have known five to be in the same house. Many of them are driven to commit suicide. The lowest estimate I have ever seen in print, and made by men who were trying to defend the rites of Hindooism, was that one-half of the widows of India were leading immoral lives, which means 10,000,000.

I had a teacher in the school, a young man; he was married, and in a short time

I had a teacher in the school, a young man; he was married, and in a short time he died. His wife was visiting at her parents' and came home the day after he died. She was immediately seized and her head shaved, her raiment torn off, and the handles on her wrists broken with head shaved, her raiment torn off, and the bangles on her wrists broken, which latter operation symbolized that the widow's pride was crushed, that her pride was shattered and her spirit broken, which was considered necessary that she could not re tain her charms for an immoral purpose. The condition of affairs in India, the custom of seclusion of the women, render it necessary that we should have women to enter the missionary work there. It would

necessary that we should have women to enter the missionary work there. It would be necessary to have medical women. It is impossible to imagine the condition of the women of India without medical aid; there is the largest possible amount of suffering there. Women would also be required for the Zenana work, the teaching of young girls of 7 and 8 years.

The speaker concluded with a short review of the work of the high school, which had been started eight years ago, and for which he hoped great things. When he had finished, Rev. Principal Fowell moved a vote of thanks, which was seconded by Dean Innes.

David Mills and his associates had been followed in Northwest affairs prior to 1885 the Northwest rebellion could have been averted. At the eleventh hour the Tory leaders become less mulish. We congratulate them. Let them continue to heed the counsels of such experienced statesmen as Mr. Mills, and they may in some measure atone for their past disastrous maladminis-tration of Northwest affairs.

THE London Times has paid \$25,000 to Mr. Parnell rather than risk a continuance of the libel suit founded on the "Parnellism and Crime" letters which were manufact tured out of whole cloth by Suicide Pigott sold to Mr. Houston, the Irish landlords apologist, and worked off on the great Lon don daily by that individual. This is a significant victory for the Irish leader, and a complete vindication of his career as a public man, The greatest in-terest has been taken in this suit, not alone because of the malignity with which Parnell was pursued by the enemies of Home Rule, but in consequence of the Tory leaders making common cause with their organ, and adopting the whole Lord Salisbury even went the length of granting the slanderers the assistance of the Irish detective department, the use of secret correspondence that had come into the hands of the Government, and the counsel of the Attorney-General, The money payment is a small matter to the credit and humiliation which attend the acknowledgment of their wrongdoing.

THE Dresden Times complains that the Ridgetown Plaindealer would like to make its readers believe that the power press of the Times had been seized by the Sheriff. For the information and gatification of the Plaindealer and its friends the Times says: A New York firm shipped us a press 25 per cent. less list price in accordance with a special arrangement made with the Minister of Customs, which arrangement was notknown to the authorities at Chatham or Windsor.

From which we gather that the Times has a friend at court in the person of the Minister of Customs, who is the sole judge of when goods are sold and imported in or under any unusual or peculiar manner or conditions and who for that reason may determine the value of said goods upon which the duty shall be computed and levicd. We rather think the Minister is able to justify himself under section 15 of the Customs Amendment Act of 1888. We freely admit that there was a special arrangement made by the Times, because had it been done in the usual official manner the authorities at Windson and Chatham would have been the medium through whom the honorable the Minister of Customs should have been apprised of the unusual or peculiar manner or conditions and through whom he should have given his decision. The Plaindealer will have this in mind when it requires a new power press, so that the transaction may not appear to be illegal and otherwise of a suspicious character, but have the seeming virtue of being duly authorized by the statute in such cases made and provided.

THE GOVERNMENT PRINTING BUREAU. The Ottawa Government having gone into the printing business on its own acount is likely to experience something of he perils of that business. From all acounts the new Bureau is being run as a political machine, and naturally enough hose who can bring most influence to hear apon Senecal, the superintendent, and Chapleau, the Minister, are the ones who get most of the plums in the pudding. It is charged that the bureau has been managed from the first on partisan lines. Printers not friendly to the Government vere only taken on at all when urgency demanded their employment, and when busiess slackened they were the first to go. Perhaps this is not a cause of complaint inder the spoils system, and we do not hear that either Senecal or Chapleau are much censured for practicing this kind of discrimination. The loudest complaints ome from men who are their political supporters, and who charge that employes are not dealt with upon their merits but by favor. Poor sticks who hardly know how o hold a "stick" are given the best places and the highest rate of wages, while firstclass printers who are without political influence, or who are not personally acceptable to Mons. Senecal, have to take what chance gives them. These are a large najority of the whole, and they are naturally indignant at the systematic favoritism which distinguishes the management. Whether they are adequately paid for their services or not is not the important ques-tion, but are all paid according to their nerits? In a private office this may not be proper subject of grievance, for if an mployer choses out of his own means to pay one man a higher rate of wages than another he may say he has a right to do as he likes

with his own. As a matter of fact, however, there are very few employers who will make this invidious distinction; for although they may do as they please with though they may do as they please with Tory organ and to the Government which has been backing it compared with the discourse which will subject them to endless the same that the same requisitions for similar favors, and which will make a discontented man of every one to whom the favor is denied. The Value of Milking Tubes.

We have frequently alluded to the value of milking tubes, to be used only, however, when the teats are so sore that they will not bear the unusual pressure of the fingers when drawing milk, without great pain and of times intense pain. It was only a few weeks ago we had a cow in our herd whose under and teats were infested with-sores and she could not bear to be milked without exhibiting a restlessness that was itself painful to witness. We secured a milk tube and used it upon her until the teats were well and no soreness perceptible. We are using one now upon a cow that has one very sore teat, and with satisfaction. We have used the tube in cases where cows had injured the teats on barb wire; always with happy results. Every farmer ought to keep one tube at least in cases of emergency. Most people know where the new building is being erected. As the traveler passes along the Boro' road towards Newington Caussway he sees on his left hand a high shaft, in front of which are the magic words "Day & Martin." At present he cannot see what has been or is being built behind the boarding, but we can tell him. The land acquired by Day & Martin is no less than 3,000 square yards, and the floorage alone comprises two and a half acres. The factory, which lies farthest from the Boro' road, is built in the form of a hollow square—that is.

comprises two and a half acres. The factory, which lies farthest from the Boro' road, is built in the form of a hollow square—that is, as near the center of the building as possible a vacant space is left by which means light is admitted to parts of the factory to which it could not otherwise penetrate. In front a roadway is being made where the vans will load up or stand whilst waiting to be dispatched; and again in front of this roadway, and running right on to the footpath in the Boro' road, will be erected the administrative offices of the concern.

The building, over which we had the privilege of being conducted, is rapidly approaching completion, and is a vast structure. Five stories rise up to the height of 80 feet, and on these the tower looks down from an altitude of an additional 70 feet. Portland cement has been used throughout the buildings. Very little old machinery will be transferred from Holborn. Already in one part of the basement may be seen a new 100 horse-power engine, and two steel boilers 7 feet 6 inches in length. Other parts of the basement will be used for storage and for the shafting which will supply the power to work the machinery throughout the building. Here, too, can be seen the ingenious principle on which the shaft is built. Circular in shape, it rises up phrough a square space. It will thus be parent that where the sides of the square meet there are vacant spaces. Apertures are mede in the wall on each floor, and



Apertures are made in the wall on each floor, and through them the vitiated air from the building will find its way and be carried out at the roof—a most ingenious arrangement. Above the basement is a fireproof floor, and as one ascends from story to story he sees successive spacious rooms, with double iron sliding doors, all well lighted, and with lofty ceilings. Another fireproof floor divides the fourth from the fifth story.

The building has two main characteristics—solidity and safety from fire. The idea of solidity is given by the massive nature of the walls, and the heavy joists and malleable iron coldmns met at every turn; the safety from fire is as nearly as possible ensured by the absence of any great quantity of inflammable material used in the construction of the building, the several cement floors, the iron doors, and the provision on the west side of a double iron staircase running outside the building from roof to ground.

KICKED BY A HORSE.

Verdict of the Coroner's Jury in the

McColl-Blanchard Case. The inquest was continued in Parkhill last night as to the death of Chas. Blanchard, before Dr. Caw, coroner, Mr. McKillop, of London, appeared for the Crown, and the interests of Dan McColl were looked after by Mr. E. Meredith, Q.C., of London. Some fifteen witnesses were examined. The evidence given showed that deceased went into McColl's Hotel in a state of intoxication. He got nothing to drink in the hotel, and on his becoming noisy McColl asked him to be quiet. He refused, and McColl put him outside the door. After getting outside it was asserted that he went down the steps in a blundering fashion, and reeling across the sidewalk fell against a horse standing there. The horse kicked him in the head, fracturing his skull and driving a piece of the bone into his brain, causing his subsequent death. The jury returned the following verdict: coroner, Mr. McKillop, of London, ap-

We, your jury, find that the late Chas. Blanchard died from injuries to the brain caused by the kick of a horse, against which he stumbled while being put out of the Franklin House by Donald McColl, one of the projectors, on Monday, Jan. 27, and this jury exonerate the said Donald McColl from blame, believing that he used no unnecessary force in sjecting him from his hotel. owing verdict:

McColl was bailed last night, and will be released after the necessary formalities.




