## THE BRAKEMAN'S STORY.

How the Terrible Affair at Hastings Happened.

Herrick Puts a Statement in His Father's Hands.

NEWYORK, Dec. 30 .- Railroad Detectives

Six Lives Lost in a Collision on the Hannibal and St. Joe Railway.

New York, Dec. 30.—Railroad Detectives have so far been unable to find Albert Herrick, the brakeman whose negligence caused the Christmas Eve wreck at Hastings, on the New York Central road. He was in New York Sunday, however, and was met here by his father, Timothy Herrick. Mr. Herrick urged his son to go to the railroad efficials, but he refused on the ground that he deemed it unsafe to make his whereabouts known till public opinion became calm, so that he can be fairly heard. He, however, wrote out a statement to be given to Supt. McCoy. It read as follows:

Dear Sir,—I would say, in reference to the accident north of Hastings, Christmas Eve, that when our train slowed up, but while yet moving, I dropped off and placed two terpedoes on the rail and then ran back to the train, which was still moving; but as it slowed up more I took my lights and started dewy the brack to stop the Croton-Jocal, then nearly due. When half way down I placed one torpedo on the rail and then walked on down to the station, thinking it better to notify the engineer thous before he was fairly under way scalin. When I gut to the station I placed my lights on the platform with the red light showing south, and then stepped to the door and arquired of the agent how the loss was He said he did not know, and I sat down and remained there three to five minutes, when I heard the train zoning, and started for the door, believing it to be the local. But soon as I saw the train I know it was the express, and I grabbed my light and tried to attract the myinser's attention, but it was too late. It is understood, to be sure, that these meats are slaughtered, handled, and stored in such a manner as to prevent insects from having access to them. As spring approaches the smoked parts can be canvassed and white-washed or packed away in bran, oats, shelled corn, or dry ashes, or hung in a dark dry seller or smoke-house. For amily use a swinging shelf protected with wire cloth in which the meat is laid or hung is very convenient, as well as secure against rats, mice and inesects.

Sir Adam W. Wilson, ex-chief justice of the Ontario Court of Common Pleas, was a Scotchman, having been born in Edinburgh, on Sept. 22, 1814. AN INCIDENT OF THE FOG.

Samaritans to Many People.

London, Dec. 30.—To make matters still more unendurable during the prevalence of the recent fog in this neighborhood intense cold, or what Londoners regard as intense cold, ruled throughout. The imagination can only feebly attempt to grasp what the poor of London must suffer. As if to point these terrors some unknown landlord seized this particular time to evict some 50 families of indigent people from the squalid rookeries they inhabited in Leather Lane. They were all bundled out, young and old alike, with their wretched belongings, and forced to camp on the pavement of a narrow street, huddled about fires built by compassionate policemen. This awful spectacle was visible in the very center of London, within five Samaritans to Many People.

minutes' walk of the law courts, for two days and nights.

Then the Salvation Army heard of it, and sent big vans to carry these houseless fugitives away to army shelters, where they were warmed lodged and fed, and where they still remain. It seems incredible that this should have happened and been for two days fully exploited in the papers without stirring any other agency into action toward relief. But it is worth noticing that only a few hours before General Booth's lieutenants came to the rescue one of the Tory papers contained a long article full of insulting abuse of the Salvation Army.

It may be safely said that this terrible object lesson will do more to awaken Londoners to sympathy with the movement against metropolitan landlordism than

against metropolitan landlordism than years of propaganda by speeches and the press. It will be remembered and most effectively used when a Reform Parliament finally takes up the huge hydra-headed subject of the social condition of London's proper.

Had Been Locked Up and Whipped But Escaped and Ran Away With Her Lover.

HOPKINTON, Mass., Dec. 31.—Pretty Almy J. Wood, the 17-year-old daugiter of Mr. G. P. Wood and a relative of ex-Governor Claffin, has married the man of her choice, in spite of horsewhippings and imprisonments which were inflicted with a view to breaking up the match. On Saturday morning, long before daylight, she escaped from her father's house and eloped with William H. McCormick, a shoemaker, and in a few hours they were married at Millville by Justice of the Peace James O'Reilly. The bride was not as richly dressed for the occasion as she would have wished, the exigencies of the elopement preventing her Irom securing her best bibs and tuckers when leaving her father's house, and she was forced to put up with a gingham gown. After the ceremony the young couple went to Blackstone.

The tale Mr. McCormick tells of the trials and tribulations which he and his bride have suffered at the hands of the bride's father sounds like a romance. McCormick is a Catholic, and Mr. Woods is a Protestant, and therein lay the father's objection to his daughter's lover. He forbade a continuance of the intimacy, and in order to separate the couple Miss Wood was sent away to school, where she remained a year. She had been home a short time only when another attempt was made to break up the intimacy, and Miss Wood was

She had been home a short time only when another attempt was made to break up the intimacy, and Miss Wood was locked up in the attic of her father's house, where she was kept for four days. She found a piece of twine in the attic, which she used to get notes to and from McCormick. After four days she was released from her imprisonment. Some two months ago McCormick says that Mr. Wood called on him and took him to his house, seating him in his parlor. He then stepped outside for a moment and returned with a horsewhip. He told McCormick that he could have his choice of going to a justice and getting married or taking a horse-whipping. McCormick would take neither. He left the house and matters went on as usual for a short time. The girl was again confined to her room for three days, but she escaped with a shawl thrown over her head and went to her lover, who secreted her among friends. He refused to disclose her whereabouts until her father would come to an agreement allowing him to visit her at her home and promising that she chould not he abused. A truce was declared, but as soon as the father reached home he locked his daughter in the attic and kept her a prisoner for two weeks.



The Medical Health Officer Points Out Defects in the City Schools.

Medical Health Officer Hutchinson has submitted his annual report regarding the city schools as follows:

To the Chairman and Members of the London School Board:

Gerilomen,—In accordance with your request I have made a careful examination of the public schools of the city, In general the children were clean and healthy. One pupil in the Waterloo north school was found with a contagious skin disease and sent home. In the playground of the Maple avenue is school, South London, there is a pool of water which lies there for weeks at a time. It should be removed and could be done with very little expense, there being a good fall to the creek running through a corner of the lot. Ten additional seats are needed in Miss Gesson's room, and some of those which are there now are very uncomfortable, being too low in the backs. Miss Ingram's room requires five new seats. In the Askin street school, in Miss Westland's room, the light is insufficient and the ventilation bad. In Miss Westland's room, the light is insufficient and the ventilation bad. In Miss Watt's room the hot air enters by a passage through the wall, side by side with another for the exit. The consequence of this is that the children suffer from cold during the winter. In this school there are two children subject to epilepsy, which is likely to have a bad effect upon the other pupils, the disease being sometimes acquired by seeing it in others. I may also add that the ancient pianoforte in Miss McKenzie's kindergarten is not calculated to cultivate a love of music in the pupils. In the Colborne street school, in Miss Coyne's and Miss Yates' room, the east are too high, and one-half the children cannot rest their feet upon the floor. This is also the case in Miss Baxter's, Miss Fleming's and Miss Hayes' room. This is more serious than might appear to a casual observer, giving rise to swelled limbs and varioose veins. The report of the inspector was adopted, and Miss Colquhoun will be at Simcoc street school.
