New York, July 25.—Dispatches from various parts of the State say to-day was the hottest in many years. In many places outdoor work was suspended.

PHILATELPHIA, Pla., July 25.—Just before noon a violent thunder storm broke over this city. The duration of the storm was not above 40 minutes, but in that time it did nearly \$200,-000 worth of damage. A wide swath of demolished and roofless houses marked the path of the storm. At Twenty-Ninth and York streets a row of 25 three-story houses, in course of construction, were leveled to the ground. In the manufacturing districts of Kensington and Richmond its greatest fury was vented. The mond its greatest fury was vented. FARMERS who use steam engines for threshing should examine their insurance policies and see if the necessary permit or license is attached to or written thereon. THE ADVERTISER learns that the New York Central Railway Company made as indirect bid for the control of the Inter-colonial Railway. This move had the effect of hastening the action of the Canadian Pacific Company, which is now almost certain to get control of the line. It is even now understood to be negotiating fo the purchase of the Springhill coal mines in Nova Scotia, the key to which is the Intercolonial.

FOUR ELECTRIC RA'LWAY BAR GAINS AND THE OFFER OF THE NEW LONDON COMPANY.

London City Council may or may not have before it, when it next meets, full particulars regarding the electric railway agreements with other cities. It may aid the aldermen in some measure, as well as be instructive to the taxpayers, to contrast he offer of the new company in this city with the bargains arrived at in Hamilton, Toronto and elsewhere. The Ottawa Journal recently compiled an instructive comparison of the contracts agreed to in Toronto, Montreal and Ottawa. In the first-named two places, the old street railway company obtained the contract. In Ottawa the horse cars still run independ-intly of the electric company. To clearly set forth the conditions of the four contracts completed and the one yet to be considered in this city, they are here given under seven principal headings, these being the points with which the public is most concerned, viz.:

1. Passenger fares.

- 2. Time regulations.
- Revenue to the city.
- 5. Rights of employes.6. Incidental civic advantages.7. Expiry of charter.
- Readers will bear in mind in comparing the facts that London cannot expect to get in size, where the traffic will be correspond-

ingly profitable. In Montreal, Toronto and Ottawa the ordinary single fare is 5 cents, entitling to transfers to any part of the city, and 25

tickets are sold for \$1. The special concessions are as follows:

Toronto—Tickets good between 5:30 and 3 a.m., and between 5 and 6:30 p.m., to be sold at the rate of 8 for 25 cents. Tickets for school children, 10 for 25 cents.

Montreal—Tickets good between 6 and 8

a.m., and between 5 and 7 p.m., to be sold 8 for 25 cents. Tickets for school children, 10 for 25 cents.

Ottawa-No concessions.

Hamilton-Tickets good between 6:30 and 8 a.m., between 11:50 a.m. and 1:30 p.m., and between 5:15 and 6:30 p.m., to be sold at the rate of 8 for 25 cents. Children from 5 to 12 years, 3 cents, or 1 tickets for 25 cents.

London (offer of new company)—Ticket

good between 6 and 8 a.m., 11 a.m. and 1:30 p.m., and 5:15 p.m. to 6:30 p.m., to be sold 8 for 25 cents.

THE EXODUS CONTINUES. How Canadian Farmers Are Hurt by the High Tax and Trade Re-

How Canadian Farmers Are Hurt by the High Tax and Trade Restriction System.

Montreal, July 26.—The Canadien prints another list of families who have left Temiscounts county for the United States, showing this time the exodus from the parishes of St. Clement and St. Paul de la Croix. Twenty-one farmers, with from one to eight children each, a total of 144 souls, have since 1886 left St. Clement, whose entire population is only 850 souls. In the same period seven farmers, with their families, a total of 52 persons, left St. Paul de la Croix, whose population is only 550 souls. These parishes are described as having good soil and as being healthy.

The Canadien, in editorially discussing the exodus, which it calls "the great evil," describes it as the result of a long succession of national dieasters. These have led to the ruin of the farmers, who can no longer make a living from the soil. Butter and cheese are the only articles that it pays to produce. Others do not pay, owing to the absence of a market at home and the prohibitive duties imposed by the United States. The attempt to open the American market failed through the unwillingness of our Governmentto admit American mannfactures, because Canadian manufacturers feared that to do so would diminish their profits. Our monopoliste, organized for the defense of their fortunes and the maintenance of the existing order of things, are prepared, when necessary, to subscribe millions of dollars to carry elections. Thus the evils of the situation were intensified and perpetuated. Now, the question before us is not on the abstract merits of protection and free trade, but how we can open the American market to our farmers, It is possible to arrive at a favorable solution of this problem, Mr. Tarte believes, without the sacrifice of any industrial interests which have a legitimate existence.

In Re Retaliation.

The Situation a Grave One for Canada.

How Railway Interests May be Affected.

Views of Preminent Canadian News papers—The Procrastinating Policy of the Dominion Government Cordemned.

A Washington dispatch says: The threat of the Canadian Ministry, which was telegraphed here yesterday morning, was not without effect in Congress yesterday. Mr. Hitt called the attention of Speaker Crisp to what was printed, and the Speaker offered to recognize him at the very earliest moment after the General Deficiency Bill was disposed of. When the time came Mr. Hitt was ready and the resolution was read. It happened that several gentlemen interested in the Canadian Pacific Railroad were not in the House, and the resolution was adopted without a word of debate. MONTREAL WITNESS.

While the passage of the Retaliation Bill by Congress has brought us face to face with a grave international difficulty. Throughout the whole series of events, which have led up to this action, the course the Government of the Dominion has been such as to cast grave doubts upon its sincerity. While it has kept up the pretense of striving to secure improved commercial relations with the United States it has pursued a policy plainly opposed to that end. Canada is not in position to coerce her great neighbor even with the great interests of the Western States and of New England largely allied with hers in matters of transportation, nor need we look for any change in the attitude of the Washington Government from the possible advent of the Domocrats to power. Both parties are a untit in the dislike they entertain for the present Government of the Dominion, and will vie with each other in putting difficulties in its way. On this side the impression seems to prevail that the President will not exercise the extreme power with which he is now invested. The position is, however, that a rude awakening from this fool's paradise may occur at any moment."

Over 500 veterinary surgeons have signed a paper condemning tight check reins as painful to horses and productive of disease, causing distortion to the windpipe to such a degree as to impede respiration. They mention paralysis of the muscles of the face, megims, apoplexy, coma and inflammation as some of the results of its use. The over-check rein will often cause a horse to become knee-sprung. It destroys the mation as some of the results of its use. The over-check rein will often cause a horse to become knee-sprung. It destroys the delicate sensitiveness to the bit which is most desirable in guiding a horse. Dr. Kitching says: "If a horse pulling a load has his head held in hy a check rein he cannot throw his weight into his collar, and is hindered from giving his body that position which is most natural and effective." He goes on to speak of the consequent strain of his limbs and muscles, and the injury caused by the constrained position of the head, whereby the breathing and circulation are affected, and the horse made restless, irritable and uncomfortable. He says: "The check rein inflicts unceasing torture upon the animal in another way. By holding the head upwards it puts the muscles of the ueck on a constant strain. They become painfully unceas and tired. If the horse cannot bear it he resis the weight of his head upon the rein, and his mouth is violently stretched. Thus he only eachanges one torment for another. To sum up in a word, the check rem lessens a horse's strength, brings on disease, keeps him in pain, frets and injures his mouth and spoits his temper."





THE KILLING HEAT!

The Hottest Day in New York for Many Years.

Three Victims of the Torrid Tem perature in Cincinnati.

A Terrific Storm Visits Philadelphia-Blocks of Houses Blown Down.

CINCINNATI, O., July 26.—Yesterday and to-day were about equal as to intense heat. The thermometer registered 94° at 1 o'clock this afternoon. Three deaths from heat have been reported.

New York, July 25.—Dispatches from various parts of the State say to-day was the hottest in many years. In many places outdoor work was suspended.

Philadelphia, Pa., July 25.—Just before noon a violent thunder storm broke over this city. The duration of the storm was not above 40 minutes, but in that time it did nearly \$200, 060 worth of damage. A wide swath of demolished and roofless houses marked the path of the storm. At Twenty-Ninth and York streets a row of 25 three-story houses, in course of construction, were leveled to the ground. In the manufacturing districts of Kensington and Richmond its greatest for was vented. The tall mill buildings furnished a good mark and a score of them were stripped of their roofs.

At Clearfield street wharf, one of the repair shops of the Philadelphia and Reading was located. The building was 400 (feet long, 70 feet wide and 50 feet high. At the time the storm broke the 120 men employed in it were eating dinner. As the wind struck the exposed side of the structure it began to sway to and fro. One of the men cried out, "The building is going—down under the trucks of the cars, boys." The frightened men had barely time to get out when, with a crash, the whole mass of brick and wood that formed the building fell. With the exception of six men who were cut and bruised all escaped. The cars beneath which they took refuge were reduced to kindling. There were 70 cars in the building being repaired, and the loss upon them and the There were 70 cars in the building sellig repaired, and the loss upon them and the structure itself is estimated at \$50,000. In addition to the above damage, nearly fifty dwelling houses in the two districts are unroofed and partly demolished.

Is it well that a body of armed mercenaries shall be held thus at the service of whomsoever has money with which to hire them? The reply usually made is that the owners of threatened property have a right to hire men to defend it. But where the defense is likely to involve actual war, as in this case it was certain to do, where the defense is likely to involve actual war, as in this case it was certain to do, there may be doubt of the justice of that reply. There is no doubt of its injustice in any case in which private force is employed before the necessity arises and used before the orderly, legal resources of defer.

CANADA CHEESE IN ENGLAND.

The prompt manner in which the recent heavy exports of cheese from Canada and the United States have been absorbed on the other side of the Atlantic has been remarkable, showing that the consumptive demand in Great Britain has been very keen, owing, no doubt, to the clearance effected in old stocks at the beginning of the season. From the opening of navigation to July 16, says the Trade Bulletin, the shipments of cheese from Montreal amounted to 453,000 boxes againts 362,000 boxes for the corresponding period last year, showing the large increase of 91,000 boxes. The total exports from New York up to July 16 were 462,000 boxes againts 384,000 boxes for the same period in 1891, being an increase of 78,000 boxes. The aggregate shipments from Montreal and New York from May 1 to July 16 were 915,889 boxes against 747,322 boxes for the same period in 1891, and the same period in 1891, showing a total increase from both ports of 168,567 boxes. About a year ago the exports from Montreal had fallen behind those of the year previous by 108,000 boxes, and notwithstanding the largely augmented shipments this year, the markets in Great Britain appear to have been less oversupplied than at this time last year. Of course it may be that owing to the excellent quality of the June make holders on the other side have been induced to put a large proportion into store, although some advices by mail indicate that the consumption has been fully equal to the immense landing on the other side. 

In Ottawa the horse cars still run independantly of the electric company. To clearly set forth the conditions of the four contracts completed and the one yet to be considered in this city, they are here given under seven principal headings, these being the points with which the pablic is most concerned, viz.:

1. Passenger fares.
2. Time regulations.
3. Civic control.
4. Revenue to the city.
5. Rights of employes.
6. Incidental civic advantages.
7. Expiry of charter.
Readers will bear in mind in comparing the facts that London cannot expect to get a favorable terms as places much greater in size, where the traffic will be correspondingly profitable.

Twenty-one farmers, with from one to eight children each, a total of 144 souls, have since 1886 left St. Clement, whose entire population is only \$50 souls. In the same period seven farmers, with their families, a total of 52 persons, left St. Paul de la Croix, whose population is only \$50 souls. These parishes are described as having good soil and as being healthy.

How Railway Interests May be Affected.

Views of Prominent Canadian News-papers-The Procrastinating Policy of the Dominion Government Cordemned.

A Washington dispatch says: The threat of the Canadian Ministry, which was telegraphed here yesterday morning, was not without effect in Congress yesterday. Mr. Hitt called the attention of Speaker Crisp to what was printed, and the Speaker offered to recognize him at the very earliest moment after the General Deficiency Bill was disposed of. When the time came Mr. Hitt was ready and the resolution was read. It happened that several gentlemen interested in the Canadian Pacific Railroad were not in the House, and the resolution was adopted without a word of debate. It ran as follows: "Resolved, that the President be requested to inform the House, if not incompatible with the public interests, what regulations are now in force concerning the transportation of imported merchandise in bond or duty paid, and products or manufactures of the United States, from one port in the United States, from one port in the United States over, Canadian territory to another port therein, under the provisions of section 30,006 of the revised statutes; whether further legislation thereon is necessary or advisable, and especially whether a careful inspection of such merchandise should not be had at the frontiers of the United States upon the departure and arrival of such merchandise; and whether the interests of the United States do not require that each car containing such merchandise, while in Canadian territory, be in the custody and under the surveillance of an inspector of the Customs Department, the cost of such surveillance to be paid by the foreign carrier transporting such merchandise."

The statistical information of the magnitude of the trade carried on between the Pacific coast and the Eastern cities by way of the Canadian Pacific can readily be furnished by the Treasury Department. In fact it was prepared for use when the Canadian commissioners were here, and no delay is expected.

A MILLION DOLLAR BLAZE.


