THE VICE-REGAL VISIT

The Earl of Aberdeen visited London for the second time yesterday and to-day When he last came to the city, three years ago, it was in the capacity of a private citizen of the realm, temporarily sojourning in the Dominion, and intent on learning as much as possible of our people and their institutions. Necessarily the time at his disposal on that occasion was short, but his admiration for our beautiful city and surroundings, and the friendships he then formed, have moved his Lordship to embrace the first available opportunity to revisit London, accompanied by his good wife, who, owing to illness, was unable to come with him on his initial journey to this city. The distinguished visitors come to us in Queen's weather, and we speak for the citizens of London when we express the hope that they may thoroughly enjoy their sojourn. From all appearances they will be fully engaged from the time of their arrival till their departure,

Lord Aberdeen, though not yet 50 years of age, has occupied a prominent position in public life for many years. He is a Liberal of the democratic stamp, and a firm believer in the principle of extending a full measure of home rule to Ireland. In private life, like his honored father before him, who was at one time Prime Minister of Britain, he has always been noted philanthropic efforts on behalf of the masses. He is recognized as one of the best landowners in the United Kingdom, and when he left for Canada there was general regret at his contemplated absence from the scene of his labors. The same remark may be applied to Lady Aberdeen, whose many endeavors for promoting the welfare of the people have endeared her to millions in England and Ireland as well as in Scotland. The Countess, who is a daughter of the first Baron Tweedmouth, is a strong supporter of woman suffrage, and has pronounced Liberal views on public affairs generally. She is the president of the Women's National Liberal Federation of Great Britain. Her efforts in promoting domestic manufacturing in Ireland, as a means of advancing the interests of the peasantry, have endeared no matter the portion of the globe in which they are found. An equally good work set on fact by her is the association of the domestic servants of Scotland with their employers, which has accomplished wonders in the field at first regarded as far from promising.

It is a matter with which the public has little to do, but it may be mentioned that the participation in these good works by Lady Aberdeen has in no way impaired the homestic side of her character. These who know her say that she is a model wife and mother, and that she is indeed a helpmeet to the husband of whom she is proud. They were married in 1877, and have a family of four pretty children, the eldest being Lord Haddo, aged 13.

The news that coal is coming from America has some effect on the situation, but it is not yet being shipped in sufficient quantities to change prices. Many pitiful stories of destitute, starving miners' families fill columns of the newspapers. The funds for the relief of distress already reach large sums.



A WOMAN'S LONG WALK. Madamo Lavalle, Widowed in San Fran-cisce, Wall's to Montreal, and Is Found There, Dying.

MONTREAL, Oct. 23,—After a walk of 3,500 miles from San Francisco to Montreal, Mmc. Leda Lavalle lies in a cot in the Notre Dame Hospital, dying from the hardships suffered during her unprecedented tramp. She reached here Saturday night, having been several months on the road, and was on Sunday morning picked up on the wharf in an unconscious condition. She was worn to a shadow and so weak that she could not raise her wasted arm from the coverlet of her bed in the hospital.

Mme. Lavalle told the following stery: Iwelve years ago she emigrated from Montreal to San Francisco with her husband. They had three children and managed to eke out a bare living. A year ago ber husband died and then her three children were carried off by smallpox. Friendlers and without money she determined to return to Montreal, where she was born, if only to die there. With a horse and buggy she started out, depending on the charity of the people she met for food.

After traveling 700 miles her horse gave cut, and she had to sell it for \$20. She then started bravely out on foot, tramping from town to town. She suffered greatly from hunger and weakness. Sometimes for a day she would be without food. Her hoots were worn cut and she had to tie strips of her dress around her feet, but still the tramped on. Once in a while a friendly man would give her a lift, and several times train hands permitted her to ride on freight trains. Some few little trinkets she had were sold to buy food, hungenerally she begged from door to door. Often she slept by the roadside when night came on and there was no farmhoose near.

She reached Detroit almost dead and rested several days in an institution there, after which she resumed her weary tramp. Saturday night she slept at Paquette's Hotel, a few miles out of Montreal, but insisted upon starting again in the morning, saying she had a pfigrimage to perform.




