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Topics of Today.

It is expected that Hon. Mr. Fielding, Finance Minister for the Dominion, will deliver his budget speech tomorrow.

St. Thomas City Council has resolved that an inquest must be held into the cause of the late fire at the opera house there.

The number of letters, cards and newspapers delivered by the postoffice in this city last year was 2,708,970. In all, 125,550,000 letters were carried in Canada.

Today, says a Toronto telegram, another protest was filed. The seat of H. G. Leckner, Conservative member-elect for North Waterloo, is attacked. This brings the total number up to 42.

Premier Turner of British Columbia has telegraphed Sir Wilfrid Laurier the regrets of the Government of the Pacific Province at the difficulties raised against an all-Canadian route. The Senate majority is the only difficulty.

In the late Provincial elections, 434,000 votes were polled—an increase of 56,000, compared with the election of 1894. The Liberals polled 7,208 more votes than the Conservatives, and the supporters of Premier Hardy number 51 to 42 for the Opposition leader.

Sir John Carling will propose that a committee be appointed by the Senate to inquire into the feasibility and probable cost of opening up direct communication between the railway systems of Canada and the navigable waters of the Yukon, and also as to the advantages which would flow therefrom to the trade of Canada.

FAIR—LOCAL SNOW FLURRIES.

Toronto, April 3—11 p.m.—An important storm since yesterday has developed over the Southwest States, and the present indications are that it will move to the lake region on Tuesday. Cold northwestern winds have been prevalent in Ontario and Quebec, and local snow flurries have occurred. There has been a slight rise of temperature, but the weather is still cold and wintry. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Kamloops, 38-52; Battleford, 14-33; Qu'Appelle, 18-26; Winnipeg, 8 below-28; Port Arthur, 4-30; Parry Sound, 10-30; Toronto, 18-34; Ottawa, 12-28; Montreal, 14-24; Quebec, 14-28; Halifax, 26-33.

Forecast: Toronto, April 4—4 a.m.—Lower lakes: Fair; but much change in temperature, with local snow flurries. Increasing northwest winds tonight. Local Temperatures: The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory on Saturday were 38 and 23.5 above; on Sunday, 35 and 15.5 above.

—Mr. T. J. O'Brien, who for many years has conducted a confectionery business at Stratford, has sold out to Wm. G. Brown, of Detroit, formerly of this city, who has taken possession.

—Thomas Hogg, of London township, was fined \$5 and \$3 costs by Squire R. F. Lacey on Saturday for cruelty to animals. The act of cruelty was driving a horse with a broken leg for three miles.

—Mr. James Crawford, formerly electrician to the London fair, departed, and who is now a resident of Vancouver, is renewing his acquaintances in London, while Mrs. Crawford has gone to New York.

—Mrs. Cranville Brooks was on Saturday tried before Squire J. B. Smyth for assaulting Mr. Munich, of the Hamilton road. Mrs. Brooks was fined \$1, and the costs amounted to \$10.50. She went down for 18 hours in the cells.

—The Grand Trunk Railway has issued an Easter card of handsome appearance. The first page has an embossed Easter lily, with the seal of the road in the left hand corner. On the inside the rates for the Easter holidays are printed.

—At the police court this morning W. B. Edwards was before Magistrate Parke for illegally selling medicine on the market. —Rev. A. C. Courties, editor of the Christian Guardian, Toronto, and formerly pastor of the old Dundas Street Central Church, preached to a large congregation in the handsome edifice that has supplanted the one in which he formerly preached. In the evening Rev. Dr. Potts, of Toronto, the latter gentleman preached at Askin Street Methodist Church, Rev. A. C. Courties occupying the pulpit of that church in the evening.

—Mr. Henry Varley, one of the most noted English evangelists of the day, delivered an address in the Auditorium yesterday to young men on "The Curse of Manhood." The place was packed to the doors at an early hour, and many were compelled to go away, not even standing room being obtainable. The lecture was a very impressive one. WEST LONDON ANNIVERSARY.
Special services marked the anniversary of the Sunday school in connection with the West London Methodist Church yesterday afternoon.

Reverend W. J. Ford preached a special sermon to children, and a feature of the service was that the center of the church was devoted to the children of the congregation. An open house was held in the afternoon, at which addresses were delivered by Rev. Messrs. Lloyd, Sawyer, and G. B. Harris, the pastor, and Mr. R. A. Greene, the superintendent. Rev. A. L. Russell occupied the pulpit in the evening. Very good music was provided at each of the services by the Sunday school choir, under the leadership of Mr. Will Spence, and in the evening the quartet, Messrs. Mansell and Harris, and Messrs. C. Berry and W. Spence, sang very acceptably. This celebration will be continued at the church by the appearance of John R. Clarke, in his capacity of pastor and Fro in London, and tomorrow night the children's entertainment will be given.

THE NEWS IN BRANTFORD.
Brantford Courier: The first intimation received when the telephone in the American Hotel rang, George Hawkins, the hotel clerk, answered the summons, and was told that Tuttle had been shot dead. Jack Barber was speaking from London. Hawkins did not wish to alarm the house until making sure of the facts, which he could not credit, and so walked over to the Central Telephone office, where he found the facts. Mr. Tuttle and Dr. Fyle, a son-in-law, was sent for, and he and Mr. Tuttle drove immediately to Paris, and took the midnight train for London.

The news soon spread around, and a large number repaired to the American House, unwilling to believe that the terrible story could be true. Here it was confirmed.

Brantford Expressor: "The deepest sympathy of the community will go out to the sadly bereaved father and mother, and of the other members of the family in the dreadful misfortune that has overtaken them. James Tuttle was a good son to his father and mother, and a deep affection always subsisted between them. The news known on Friday night, and this morning, James was widely known in the city and country, and his tragic death will be sincerely felt by a wide circle of friends."

Five sets of plans for a new city hospital were explained in detail to the hospital committee on Saturday night. Other interested parties in attendance were Mrs. English, Moore, Niven, Roome, James Wilson, Geo. Wilson, and Architects A. Bodley, G. Roddick, H. Matthews, H. C. McBride, J. M. Moore and Fred Hogg.

At the outset considerable discussion arose over an invitation from the faculty of the Medical School, requesting the presence of the committee at a convocation, which was being held on Saturday evening.

Ald. Wilkey strongly favored adjournment, but the mayor held that the doctors should have had convocation on another night. They knew the committee was to meet, and they could not allow any more delay, but should view that effect had been withdrawn.

The mayor urged that the architect be named. Then they could consult with the medical men before the decision was made by the committee.

Ald. Wilkey's motion to accept the invitation and adjourn was lost. On motion of Ald. Jolly the communication was filed.

About fifteen minutes were then spent by each architect in explaining his plans. They were called in alphabetical order, and each in his turn was freed to explain his plans to the committee, and by the doctors, and the plans were all closely examined.
