





THE PENALTY OF FAILURE

Comments on the Dismissal of Storer.

London, Dec. 11.-An attache at the Forgign Office was asked this afternoon what would happen if a dismissed British ambassador should publish confidential correspondence between himself and the head of the Government.

"It would depend," the attache answerwhat the letters showed. If they showed that the ambassador's post had wrongfully been taken from him, and that he was the victim of gross injustice, the public would give him its warmest sympathy and condemn the Prime Minister. But if the correspondence showed he had made a silly ass of himself, and proved himself phenomenally unfit to hold a diplomatic post, the public, before it was through with him would make him regret exceedingly that he had not burned his letters and sowed the ashes on the winds. The public would amply justify the publication of the letters in the former case, because it would hold man no man was under obligation to respect the confidence of another who was persistently wronging him. In the other case, the public would doubly condemn the man, first for breach of confidence, and, second, for making a

fool of himself." "And what would your public say about Storer, if his case was theirs?"



and labeling, and more energy thrown

into the effort to capture the market. The afternoon proceedings opened with the report on co-operative experiments with small fruit, presented by Prof. H. L. Hutt. There was probably, he said, no feature of the work undertaken by the horticultural department of the college of more value than the co-operative testing of fruit. Professor Hays presented figures to show that the improvement, both on the experimental plots and on Ontario's entire acreage ranged between 10 and 25 per cent. The leading field crops of the Province showed a profit of \$40,000,000 in the ten years just passed. The cost, moreover, which could be properly charged to improvement, during this period, was under \$40,000, which was clearly within the one-tenth of 1 per cent he had claimed. Hon. John Dryden said he believed that the organization had done more than anything else to increase the traffic of the railways and the deposits

in the banks. Professor' L. S. Klinck spoke of the interest which had been awakened in the work of the union. He warned his hearers, however, that those appointed to conduct it must not be changed frequently. There was a necessity that they should have a long tenure of office or the progress of agricultural science would be stayed.


