

PROPORTIONAL REPRESENTA-TION.

In a speech in the House of Commons a few days ago, Mr. F. D. Monk, member for Jacques Cartier, argued strongly in favor of reform of the electoral law by the adoption of an improved method of proportional representation, whereby, as his resolution put it, "the House of Commons may become the faithful expression of the will of the electors, as manifested by

The Government, while not committing itself to the principle of proportional representation, considers the subject one worthy of study and investigation, and has consented to the appointment of a select standing committee to inquire into the various systems of voting.

Mr. Monk quoted figures to show that in Great Britain, upon several occasions during the past twenty-five or thirty years, a minority of the electors has secured a majority in the House of Commons. He maintained that the present method almost invariably produced a grave disparity between the popular majority and the parliamentary majority. The question is one which has engaged the attention of public men in every country enjoying representative institutions, and many different plans have been suggested. Cumulative voting, which gives the elector as many votes as there are representatives to be elected, is the system in vogue in Illinois, but while some advantages are claimed for it, it does not give full proportional representation. France has tried the general-ticket or scrutin de liste, but abandoned it, and today the method followed in that country is exactly the same as in Canada. But recently a Government commission reported in favor of the adoption of a proportional system similar to that which exists in Belgium, Denmark and Switzerland.

Franchise for Women. Mr. Jared Vining brought in the motion to grant the franchise to women. He pointed out that women had the same legal rigths as men. They could own property; they paid taxes, and performed other duties as citizens. This, he considered, should entitle them to a full voice in the afmoral tone to political life, and would do much to improve conditions in the




