GERMANS, THROWING BACK GIANT RUSH Crown Prince Pushes Foch's Centre Back A Little In New Blow To

London, June 10.—(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency).—Reuter's correspondent at French headquarters telegraphed last night as follows

Latest reports from the battlefield are encouraging. The French are fighting bravely and with great tenacity. On the right and left of the battle area the enemy, despite his most powerful efforts, has been unable to make progress beyond the advanced positions, the covering zone of which is swept by the fire of his minenwerfers.

In the centre, the Germans succeeded in cutting an obtuse salient out of our line, with its furthest point at Ressons-Sur-Matz. Their gain consists of a belt of ground 1,200 yards deep, which they were able to batter with heavy trench artillery.

Vice-Chancellor Talks of Permanent Economic and Military Union.

Amsterdam, June 10. — Permanent economic and military union between Germany and Austria-Hungary, "with the gradual disappearance of customs duties and frontiers" is proposed by Friedrich von Payer, Imperial vice-chancellor of Germany, in a statement published in the Neue Freie Presse of Vienna and quoted in the Vossische Zeitung of Berlin. Included in this scheme of a middle Europa under the domination of the central powers are Russia, Poland, Bulgaria and Turkey. 


"I feel I have not a sufficient gift of language to adequately convey that feeling which is the predominating feeling of the Old Country today, which is to thank the dominions which in our hour of need willingly sent their men. 

7,135 Casualties Among Americans In France To Date

WASHINGTON, June 9 .- The first official summary of casualties to date in the American expeditionary forces announced today shows a total of 7,135. announced today shows a total of 7,185. Killed in action numbered 1,033, including 291 lost at sea; died of wounds, 310; died of disease, 1,192; died of accident and other causes, 392; wounded in action, 4,046, and missing in action, including prisoners, 342. The casualty list today contained 198 names, the largest number thus far reported in a single day.

E. N. Hart entered action to recover \$250 damages from John Brooks, as the result of a collision between motor cars driven by the plaintiff and defendant on the Proof Line road. Brooks entered a counter-claim for \$90, and his counsel, J. B. McKillop, showed the jury that the collision was really due to Hart being on the wrong side of the road at the time the attempt was made to turn around.

In dismissing the case of Hart, the plaintiff, the jury was guided to a large extent by expert evidence given by Charles Talbot, Middlesex County engineer. The county engineer was taken to the scene of the collision early the next morning by Brooks and the road measured. The engineer stated at the point where the collision occurred the road was 24 feet wide.

According to evidence given by Brooks and the measurements of the county engineer, Hart was occupying 16 feet 3 inches of this roadway, and Brooks 7 feet 9 inches at that portion of the highway where the motor car wheels locked.

Hart claimed that the collision was due to negligence on the part of Brooks, and Brooks counter-claimed and endeavored to show that the accident was due to the lack of caution on the part of Hart.

Judge Macbeth dismissed the last of the jurors at the conclusion of this case.

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
