## PRESIDENT WILSON LEAVES PARIS AND STARTS TRIP HOME

PROSECUTIONS UNDER M. **OFFSET** 

THE ALLIES' RIGHT ARM

BRITISH PRESS HAILS LEAGUE COVENANT WITH GREATEST JOY; FRENCH NOT ALL SATISFIED. U.S. PAPERS APPROVE AND WARN DEMOBILIZATION

Paris Newspapers Declare That Draft Does Not Provide Any German Foreign Secretary Definite Guarantee Against Future Attack Except "Moral Force"—U. S. Editors See Need For Drastic Revision of the Text of Proposed Constitution.

THREE DELEGATES DISSENT. Paris, Feb. 14.-Delegates to the peace conference gathered at the foreign office this afternoon feeling that a historic moment had arrived. It was the third plenary session of the peace conference, and there was the same setting of distinguished personages and solemn dignity that marked previous gatherings of the allied delegations. President Wilson, in presenting the covenant, spoke in a calm, even tone, without gesture or emphasis, except twice, when he referred to "armed forces in the background" and "to exploitation of helpless

There was a ring in his voice when he uttered the warnings which would have brought applause, but for the staid procedure of the conference which ferbids all demonstrations EVIDENCES OF DISSENT. Lord Robert Cecil of Great Britain, and Premier Orlando of Italy, voiced their approval of the covenant, but Leon Bourgeois of France,

while expressing his general satisfaction, made reservations which indi cated that his proposals for an international military force will be heard again when the debate proceeds further. Another slight evidence of dissent was noticed in the remarks of W. M. Hughes of Australia, who Inquired, with some show of feeling, if ample opportunity to discuss the scheme would be given. The Arabian delegation also sounded a minor note of discord in calling attention

Declares He Will Resist Entente Plans.

REPULSED ALL ATTEMPTS

Germany's Voluntary Disarmament Has Not Softened Allies, Declares Official.

Basle, Switzerland, Feb. 15.—Count von Brockdorff-Rantheo, the German foreign secretary, in discussing Germany's foreign policy—in the new National Assembly at Weimar yesterday, declared he had resisted, and would continue to resist, Allied attempts to make Germany demobilize all her military forces.

The task of the German nation as regards foreign affairs might be summed The task of the German nation as regards foreign affairs might be summed up under two heads, he said, of which the first was the ending of the state of war, and the second the establishment of normal relations with other peoples. "Unfortunately," he continued, "Germany's voluntary disarmament has not softened our enemies, who recently attempted to settle on the basis of disarms." oftened our enemies, who recently at empted to settle on the basis of disarm nent questions undoubtedly ining to the peace conference. these attempts looking to the dissolu-tion of all our old military forces and the substitution of new republican troops for the old peace army, which could be used in the east. "Germany has shouldered the consequences of defeat, and is determined to observe the conditions agreed upon with her adversaries. These conditions imply the complete renunciation of the principal aims of the old Germany. We are ready to accept restrictions on our sovereignty, the compulsory submission of our differences with other states to an international court of arbitration and the renunciation of our armament, if our old adversaries and future neighbors submit to the same restrictions.

### Graduated Increases For Western Ontario Towns and Cities.

OTTAWA, Feb. 14.-There were a couple of new developments in the telephone rates case before the railway board this morning. As soon as the sitting resumed I. L. Fairty put in an application on behalf of Toronto, Hamilton and Brantford for a 10 per cent reduction in the existing local rates, and asked that it be made a part of the present hearing. Then Mr. McFarlane, counsel for the telephone company, filed with the board a new and increased schedule of rates, which the company is willing to have adopted instead of the 20 per cent general increase asked for in the original application. This new schedule, it was stated on behalf of the company, would yield an additional revenue of \$1,173,351, or about the same amount of money as the company figures would be earned by a general increase of 20 per cent.

Wants Rates Reduced. Wants Rates Reduced.

In making application for a reduction in the local rates for Toronto, Hamilton and Brantford, Mr. Fairty, said it was the intention of these municipalities to present evidence to justify their claim for better treatment. They would have no objection, if they established their case, to have the lower rates apply everywhere within the jurisdiction of the company. While prepared to admit that the company is entitled to a reasonable return, Mr. Fairty asserted that as a result of the application made by the company for a general increase, it has been demonstrated that its earnings are grossly excessive. Mr. McFarlane said that the Bell Telephone Company would not object to the new application, provided it was treated as an incident of the present application. Mr. Fairty replied that the municipalities were simply making a counter-claim to the application put in by the company.

PARIS, Feb. 14.—President Wilson was the central figure of the plenary peace conference today when in person he read the covenant establishing a League of Nations. There was added interest in the session, as it was the last gathering of the delegates prior to the United States president's departure, as well as being the occasion of presenting the document with which its name is identified.



## BELL TELEPHONE SHOOTS ANOTHER RATE PROPOSAL

Graduated Increases For Western Ontario Towns and Cities.

OTTAWA, Feb. 14.—There were a couple of new developments in the tele phone rates case before the railway board this morning. As soon as the sitting resumed I. L. Fairty put in an application on behalf of Toronto, Ham-Iton and Brantford for a 10 per cent reduction in the existing local rates. and asked that it be made a part of the present hearing. Then Mr. McFarlane, counsel for the telephone company, filed with the board a new and ncreased schedule of rates, which the company is willing to have adopted instead of the 20 per cent general increase asked for in the original application. This new schedule, it was stated on behalf of the company, would yield an additional revenue of \$1,173,351, or about the same amount of money as

Wants Rates Reduced.

In making application for a reduction in the local rates for Toronto, Hamilton and Brantford, Mr. Fairty said it was the intention of these municipalities to present evidence to justify their claim for better treatment. They would have no objection, if they established their case, to have the lower rates apply everywhere within the jurisdiction of the company. While prepared to admit that the company is entitled to a reasonable return, Mr. Fairty asserted that as a result of the application made by the company for a general increase, it has been demonstrated that its earnings are grossly excessive. Mr. McFarlane said that the Bell Telephone Company would not object to the new application, provided it was treated as an incident of the present application. Mr. Fairty replied that the municipalities were simply making a counter-claim to the application put in by the company. Wants Rates Reduced. The Newest Schedule.

I predict that in the coming years there will be several communal Mausoleums in our beautiful Prospect Hill Cemetery, the care of which is under the direction of the trustees of the congregation which I have the honor to serve as minister. I count it a privilege to write these words of commendation.

Sir,—I would like to commend to the thoughtful consideration of our people the plan to erect a Communal Mausoleum in our experience at funeral services I welcome with profound gratitude this movement to provide a process of burial for our dead that will remove the sad distress that now holds us. 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


