# LONDON WOMAN ENDED LIFE DROWNED HERSELF IN HAMILTON WAS ON HUNT FOR HUSBAND

Tragic Suicide Carried Out by Mrs. Charles Lancaster, Despite the Fact That a Couple of Men Attempted to Prevent It.

"NO ONE CARES FOR ME, I'LL END IT ALL"

Said She Had Come From London to Seek Her Husband-Man Is Said To Be Living in Toronto Now, But Couple at One Time Resided in This City.

[G. N. W. Dispatch.] Hamilton, Ont., Sept. 23.—The young woman who committed suicide this morning by jumping off the revetment wall was Mrs. Lancaster, of London, Ontario. Her body was identified by J. Pritchard, John street north, who said she was his housekeeper.

The dead woman is supposed to be the wife of Charles Lancaster, otherwise known as "Sloppy" Lancaster among his associates in the city.

She was known in police court circles, having appeared against her husband on several occasions when he was charged with non-support and unspeakable crimes against her. They lived a very unhappy life, and disagreements and quarrels were frequent.

A little over a year ago, Mrs. Lancaster went to Hamilton, where she has since resided. Nothing is known of her life there. Lancaster has also left the city. He was seen here during the Fair, and worked on the grounds. Since then he has disappeared, and it is not known at the present time where he is. Mrs. Lancaster's maiden name was Powell, and she came to London from Woodstock. She has a sister, it is understood, residing

#### **BISHOP FALLON EXPLODES** WIDESPREAD FICTION AS TO THE SCHOOL QUESTION

In regard to the assertions made by the press of the country and by some public men concerning his attitude towards the French language and the interests of the French-Canadian people, the Rt. Rev. Bishop Fallon requests the publication of the following

"This agitation in as far as my name is connected with it was begun by the publication of a dispatch in the Detroit Free Press on June 5th last, when I was not yet quite five weeks Bishop of London. This article was a falsehood on its face, for while, for evident reasons, purporting to come from Ottawa, it was really concocted in Toronto by two gentlemen, one of whom occupies a position in the Ontario civil service, and the other is on the staff of a Toronto morning

'The assertions in this article were not only false but malicious, and the treachery of its fabricators was discovered and privately exposed at the time. An equally false and libellous article appeared in a Toronto paper last Sunday morning, and a cu in thought and language leads to the conclusion that it received its inspiration from the same source. "I have never been by word or

deed, by intent or desire, unfriendly to the interests of the French-Canadian people, and I never shall be unfriendly to them at any time or place, no matter what the provocation. A number of them live within the limits of my own diocese, and I am as solicitous for their welfare, whether spiritual or temporal, as I am for that of any other portion of the flock confided to my care.

"I have never issued nor caused to be issued, directly or indirectly, verbally, by writing, or in any other way, any order or mandate or even expression of opinion concerning the teaching of French or of any other language in the Separate schools, or in any other schools in the Diocese of London or anywhere

"I have not, and I never have, had any objection to the teaching of French, or of ony other language in accordance with the laws of the province of Ontario, and the regulations of the provincial department of education.

"This whole agitation, therefore, as far as I am concerned, is not only utterly baseless, but is also supremely unjust.

### WINDSOR MAY HAVE POWER

Supply Must Be Under Control of the Niagara Power Commission.

CANNOT HAVE PROFITS

Municipalities Yesterday Voted Favor ably on the Application of the Border City .- The Discussion.

"Moved by Controller Spence, Toronto, seconded by Mayor Guest, of St. Thomas, that this meeting records its desire that the city of Windsor should be granted a supply of electrical energy from the hydro-electric commission at whatever rate it can be equitably supplied in view of the other ser-vice given by the transmission line serving Windsor, and that it be affirmed as a principle that any power which the commission supplies to be used outside of this province, should be supplied only on condition that such service should be terminable on reasonable notice, and that all profit on such service should be appropriated so as to be equitably advantageous to all Ontario municipalities supplied by the commission's Niagara Falls transmission system, and that such supply be entirely under the control of the commission."

The above resolution epitomizes the opinion of the representatives of the different municipalities in the Niagara power zone, who convened here yesterday afternoon to hear the request of the city of Windsor for 15,000horrepower.

#### OVER DEAD MAN TO REACH THE BAR

#### Had to Step Across Murdered Man to Get Drinks, But Nobody Cared.

New York, Sept. 23 .- In the Harbor Bar, on the ground floor of 12 South treet, whither sea-scarred men from all over the world drift in these days. when the cost of drinking is high, a sailorman without a ship, Pat Donarue, from Ireland originally, but lat-terly from almost anywhere, was shot dead yesterday by John Johnson, a South street watchman, Scandinavian by birth, who once followed the sea himself. Most drinks in the Harbor Bar are 5 cents, including gin, Jamaica rum, whiskey and brandy; but they have a superior quality of brandy for 10 cents which is occasionally transients. The comes in schooners.

Since he gave up seafaring Johnson who is 67 years old, has been employ ed by Hoesen & Bros., night watch-men, of 667 South street. On his way to cover his job on a pier he dropped into the Harbor Bar. He found gathered there a group of 5-cent drinkers. He smoked an old pipe between the period of his contribution to the sustenance of the proprietor of the Har-bor Bar, Isidor Grabschrift.

How the Row Started. Donahue lounged in and added to his internal combustion some of the fine old stock of the Harbor Bar. He was a man of middle age, apparently, and a countenance that fitted the Harbor Bar environment. The police say he wanted to sell some clothing to the Scandinavian, and that the latter told him to leave him alone. Men in the saloon, who had only a dim memory of what happened, said that was an "argument" between Donahue and the night watch that ended in Donahue striking him in the left eye, sending him reeling along the

The watchman pulled his gun and blazed away, hitting Donahue in the left eye. The bullet went through the sailor's brain and he fell at the head of the bar across the doorway. The Harbor Bar customers looked at one another and went on drinking. The barkeep came out, made a few remarks condemnatory of the habits of night watchmen who killed rsons in a respectable place, and proceeded to lay newspapers over the body.

The customers who were in were made to stay by Policeman Guy E. Sager, of traffic squad A, who had heard the shot and had run into the saloon. A few others in search of 5cent refreshment walked in over the body and lined up for theirs. Lieut. Hoffman, of traffic squad A, and several men under him, came along, and practically closed the place before it uld realize any more profit on the

Meanwhile, Johnson, the night watchman, puffed placidly on his pipe as he sat in a chair in the back part of the saloon, glancing without emotion at the paper-covered body. He ent to the Oak street station placid-He had dropped in for a beer, he said, before going to work, and was not a drinker of stronger 5-cent pre-parations. He had never met Donahue efore and had shot him in self-de-ence. The police say their learned nat Donahue was in his twenties, but e looked much older; it was the first apression of the policemen who saw the body that he was at least 40. who lodged at 10 South street, where Donahue also put up, said the dispute was caused by Johnson's refusal to buy clothing from Donahue. Coroner Winterbottom held Johnson in \$10,000 bail, which he is not likely to fur-

### A NEW CONTINENT IN THE MAKING

#### Further Upheaval of No Great Relative Importance Would Mark Birth of Continent.

London, Sept. 22.-Among the most nteresting features of the annual meeting of the British Association, still sitting at Sheffield, is the report of the committee on earthquake investigations. The committee has completed down to 1900 a catalogue of all the destructive earthquakes recorded in history. They date from A. D. 1 and they number more than 4,000. record refers only to earthquakes which have been accompanied by destruction or by changes of the earth's surface or which have extended over large areas. In many instances these disturbances have resulted in adjustments in the earth's crust of geological importance. The sources from which materials have been drawn include Japanese and Chinese cata-

The report says that although the periods of seismic activity in Italy and apan were separated by irregular intervals of time, the years in which there had been marked activity in one these countries closely corresponded with the years when there had been marked activity in the other. Should further analysis confirm this conclusion, the suggestion is that the relief of seismic strain in one part of the world brings about relief in some other part, or that relief is governed some general internal or external

agency.
The most startling features of the eport is the suggestion that at the resent time a new continent is in the naking. It is pointed out that the activity today is along a band running from the southern extremity of the Philippine Islands and Java, in an east-southeast direction toward the middle of the Pacific. 

Spread the paste out so that it is not over a quarter of an inch in thickness. Let the mixture dry slowly in an oven.

A board, well greased, may be used instead of the plates. Sometimes the board with the peach leather is put outdoors in the sunshine to dry. If not dry enough in one day it is taken in at night, and the next day put back into the sunshine again. It should be allowed to dry until it has ceased to be sticky, when it can be rolled up like leather.
