### HON. JAMES BRYCE

The Hon. James Bryce, D. C. L. LL. D., who will address the Canadian Clubs of this city on Saturday afternoon in the Normal School, distinguished himself in early life by publishing, at the age of 24 years, the "History of the Holy Roman Em He was born in 1838, and is son of the late Dr. James Bryce of Glasgow. He was educated at the high school and University of Glasgow, going from there to Oxford, where in 1862, the same year in which his epoch-making history was published, he was made a scholar of Trinity College and a Fellow of Oriel College. Entering the bar of Lincon's Inn in 1867, he practiced law till 1882. He was appointed regius professor of civil law at Oxford in 870, which hopor he resigned in 1893. He was first elected a member of parliament for Tower Hamlets in 1880, and in 1885 he was appointed Under-Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs. In 1892 he was made Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, with a seat in the Cabinet, two years later becoming president of the board of trade. In 1824, he was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society, and later to membership in the national institutes and academies of France, Belgium, Italy and other foreign countries. He has also been showered with honorary degrees by the universities of Edinburgh, Michigan, Glasgow, St. Andrew's, Buda Pest, Trin-ity (Toronto), Victoria and Cam-






