Dear Dorothy Dix-Everything I pick up lately regarding the increased

number of divorces seems to be pretty much the same—that is, placing the blame on the wives for neglecting their husbands. We are told that a woman should pal with her husband, that she should keep herself looking neat and attractive, that she should be a good cook and housekeeper; but how is the ordinary woman to do all of this? 




