Sessions Held In The Central School

afternoon session of the Teachers' Convention was largely attended, and several very instructive

Miss A. B. Angus, of the Central School staff, was the first to be called upon, and gave an excellent paper on "Methodizing Mechanical Arithmetic."

Mr. D. S. McPherson also gave an interesting address on the same subject, after which a discussion by the teachers was given. Next came the lesson on Grammar

Next came the lesson on Grammar, with a tiass, by Prof. J. J. Tilley, Director of Teachers' Institute. Mr. Tilley brought in a class of young students and taught an excellent lesson on Analysis. He made very favorable comments on the attention and discipline and mental attitude of the class toward their teacher, saying that it was a credit to the school and Mr. Plewes.

J. Dearness, M. A., of the London Normal School, again addressed the audience. His subject for discussion was, "Distinction Between Nature Study and Elementary Science." He

Study and Elementary Science." He said: Nature study will make the learner strong. He gets the fresh air and required exercise when out making a study of plants, trees, etc. It fills the mind with knowledge, and the child is made the in-

He spoke of sense knowledge and symbol knowledge. The sense knowledge is the knowledge a child learns around home, etc., and the symbolic knowledge is what he learns at school. He spoke very much in favor of the sense knowledge, saying that the child should have much more than he gets. He showed the points in the study of nature which helps the child in such a way. The child gets to see and study for himself, and experience is the world's

The chird gets to see and study for himself, and experience is the world's greatest teacher.

By means of a synopsis he showed how nature study should be studied. Nature study is the progressive training to the action of a child's own environment. The child learns own environment. The child learns to discover knowledge for himself. He also stated that nature study was not a new study, but a new name, and said that the study of nature was taught before we were born. The results from the study are, information derived, memory exercised, power to enjoy knowledge of general principles and good training in inductive reasoning.

inductive reasoning. A discussion among the teachers was then held, and a vote of thanks tendered Mr. Dearness for his two valuable and instructive lessons. Mr. Dearness expressed his thanks and said that he was glad to be present to meet the new teachers, also for the excellent papers he had heard, and said that he was well

Ottawa, March 28.—The fact that
Hon. James Bryce occupied a seat upon the floor of the House gave additional interest to a discussion upon
the coming colonial conference, and
the general questions that group about
imperialism and the upbuilding of
the Empire.

The Premier distinctly intimated
that he would attend the conference.
An echo from yesterday was a notice by Mr. Bourassa that on Thursday, April 4, he would move that Mr.

Wednesday.

Mr. Bourassa desired a vote. The

Wants Beddee Cemmitted.

the membership of the North Atlantic
Trading Co. He gave notice that on
April 4 he would file and discuss a

the Bar of the House and show cause

CHILD LABOR IN SHOPS

Instructive And Interesting Premier Announces He Committee Recommends At The Commissioners Who Fourteen Years Of Age As Limit

Toronto, March 28.—Mr. Thos. Crawford (West Toronto) was chosen at yesterday's session of the Legislature as Speaker for the House for the balance of the session, and will henceforth don the robes, hat and gloves of that functionary. Hon. Mr. Whitney, who submitted the resolution for his appointment, assured the House that the news from the Speaker's bedside was now encouraging.

Hon: Nelson Monteith presented
the report of the special committee
appointed to consider the question
of child labor, and it was ordered on
his motion to provide for the printing and distribution of the report. It
recommends the uniform age for
shops, factories and the truancy act
of 14 years. The report will probably
be followed by legislation on the lines
of the report.

We Serious Statistics.
Speaking of the report Mr. T. H.
Preston (Brant) directed attention to
the serious statistics it recorded. They
showed the total enrollment of children under 14 years of age in the
Province to be 327,000, while the
average attendance was only 232,000.
Of the 250 municipalities whence the
report of the truancy officers were ob-

Of the 250 municipalities whence the report of the truancy officers were obligatory under the statute only 75 had reported. He (Mr. Preston) hoped the report would have the early consideration of the House.

Mr. E. Dunlop (North Renfrew) moved the second reading of his bill to amend the Ontario Insurance Act. In a brief address Mr. Dunlop set forth the advantages of his measure, which provided that on the expiration of a policy the company is required to provided that on the expiration of a policy the company is required to keep it in force by borrowing against the cash surrender value of the policy. The bill found endorsement from Hon. Mr. Graham, the Opposition leader, and Col. Hugh Clark and on the auggestion of Hon. Mr. Foy got its reading, and was sent on to the legal committee.

Hon. Dr. Pyne presented a measure "to amend the Department of Education." This bill, the Minister of Education explained, was designed simply to give the department power to dispense the increased grant to the rural schools which is provided for

Hon. Col. Matheson made an important: announcement relative to what is known as "the Sco loan". The Government guarantee for the \$1,000,000 still outstanding falls due on Monday, April 1st. Owing to the condition of the money market the Canadian Improvement Company had been unable to carry out the sale or arrangement which had been planned to relieve the Government. Accordingly they had been granted a six months' extension, the parties who signed the bonds all consenting to renewal of the loan.

THAW GETS

Will Decide His Fate

VALUABLE ADDRESSES BOURASSA ON WARPATH STARTLING STATISTICS PRIVATE CONFERENCE

New York, March 28.—After the Thaw jury was excused yesterday until next Monday morning and the members of the lunacy commission selected Tuesday by Justice Fitzgerald to enquire into Thaw's present state of mind had been sworn in, it was suddenly announced that ex-Supreme Court Justice Morgan J. O'Brien, chairman of the commission, had resigned.

In a letter to Justice Fitzgerald, Mr. O'Brien explained that he was forced by the condition of his health and his professional engagements to decline to serve.

Justice Fitzgerald made a new order, appointing David McClure, a member of ex-Police Commissioner McAdoo's advisory committee of citizens, to fill the vacancy.

After Justice Fitzgerald administered the oath of office, Thaw was brought into court and found all the members of his family there.

He looks exceedingly well, and smiled a greeting to his mother, his wife and his sisters and brothers. He then turned to where the three commissioners sat and gazed fixedly at them for several minutes.

NO HOME RULE FOR IRELAND. Lord Rosebery Says Irish Are Dis-loyal People.

London, March 27.—Presiding at a meeting of the council of the Liberal League, held here yesterday, Lord Rosebery said Great Britain would never tolerate a separate Irish Parliament. Such a proposal went far beyond anything the late Mr. Gladstone intended.

"A system suitable for Canada and Australia," Lord Rosebery added, "would be different in a contiguous island, which, in its public declarations, prided itself on its disloyalty." Continuing, the speaker said he doubted if the Government's promised measures for Ireland would go to extremes, but it was a pity the Government's principal men were making speeches leading the country to believe that something radical was intended.

He, Lord Rosebery, owed no allegiance to the present Government, nevertheless he congratulated it on its success thus far.

He feared, however, it was promising too much. If it made any general attack on property, as was threatened, its existence would be speedily ended.



New York, March 27.—Justice Fitzgerald yesterday unexpectedly handed down a decision ordering a commission in lunacy to enquire into the present state of mind of Harry K. Thaw. The decision of the three disinterested men named to conduct the enquiry will guide the future action of the court as to ordering Thaw to an asylum for the insane or directing that the indefinitely interrupted trial for his life shall proceed.

Justice Fitzgerald announced the appointment of the commission privately in his chambers. Evelyn Nesbit Thaw was there with the lawyers, and it became her task to break the news to her husband in the Tombs. Tearful when she left the judge's rooms in the criminal courts buildings, the young woman, who has been such a conspicuous figure in the trial from first to last, was smiling and cheerful when Thaw was brought from his cell to the hospital ward of the prison to meet her.

Thaw accepted the court's decision philosophically and once more declared he had no doubt the commission would declare him a sane man.

The personnel of the commission named by Justice Fitzgerald lends a new distinction to this already notable case.





INDIANS IN FAR NORTH ARE RAPIDLY DISAPPLARING.

Consumption Works Ravages Among Them-Is the White Man Responsible?-Tragedies Due to Wanton Cruelty-Villianies of Fur-Traders -Barbarities of Trappers-Canada's Obligation to the Indian.

Obligation to the Indian.

Mr. E. Stewart, Dominion Superintendent of Forestry, in a report given in Ottawa a few days ago, said that the Indians of the far north are dying off very rapidly. He instanced Fort Simpson, an important post, which had in 1887 an Indian population of over eight hundred, but which has now been reduced to less than three hundred souls. The cause of this excessive mortality, Mr. Stewart says, is consumption. The Indian builds a small house, which he keeps excessively hot and altogether unventilated during the winter, and he does nothing in the way of guarding against infection, so that the White Plague with him becomes in many instances a veritable scourge. The suggestion is made that physicians be sent among these Indians in the north, not only to give them medical treatment, but also to instruct them in sanitary laws. That suggestion is certainly an excellent one, and should be acted upon at once, to prevent the extinction of whole tribes of the red-men of Canada.

This announcement of Mr. Stewart's has, we doubt not, given a very real feeling of source to many who have no particular reasons for having an interest in the Indian or his welfare. The majority of Canadians cannot, if they would, shut out the Indian from their thoughts altogether, or quite escape the conviction that the white man, as his supplanter over the broad stretches of our fair land, is in some degree responsible for him. They realize that the Indian is a problem, a problem that it would be much more comfortable to be rid of, but they have never been able either to shift him or to solve the problem that his presence makes. And we believe there are thousands of Canadians to-day who can never think of the Indian of to-day without a keen sense of regret. But the problem of the Indian is only a part of that larger problem of the adolescent races in general. These make up, it is estimated, nearly one-third of the human race and occupy nearly two-fifths of the land surface of the globe. They are not inferior races in every particular. In fact, in many ways they may be naturally superior to those who have conquered and hold sway over them. But there is a something lacking that makes their subserviency, in the struggle for life and life's good, a foregone conclusion. They are the child races, attractive and interesting from many points of view, but to a large degree unequal to the full burdens and responsibilities of life. They ought to be treated in some measure as children, but unfortunately the dominating races have not always understood their responsibility, and the history of many of these so-called adolescent races has been marked by some of the most pitiable tragedies ever shown upon the world's stage.

We have not wished to do badly by the Indian; in fact, we have done much in an effort to help him. But the conditions, both from the moral and the physical point of view, that our civilization has brought to him have, in many ways not intended, hampered and hurt him. The barbarities of trappers, the villanies of fur-traders, and the vices of borderers are mainly responsible for the present bad moral character ascribed to the Indian. Some of these might have been prevented, but it was not possible, as the white man sees it, to prevent the conditions and surroundings in which our civilization has placed the Indian, and for which he has suffered much, both from the physical and the moral point of view. The question of the dominant race's responsibility to the subject race is a serious one, demanding careful thought and consideration. The question of Canada's obligation to her adolescent race, the Indian, is one that must be continually and honestly faced. Some people grow impatient over the smallness of returns from all the effort made on his behalf, but this must be borne in mind, be is in many ways a child still, and our child, too, and nothing so becomes us in dealing with him as an infinite patience.

THE ADOLESCENT RACES JOYS OF SKEE JUMPING

FLYING MACHINES ON A LIMIT-ED SCALE.

Norwegian Sport Is Becoming Popular -Introduced by Pioneers-Method of Taking the Jump -- Over One

Hundred Feet Can Be Covered at a Time-Accidents Seldom Happen -Regular Skee Regiments.

Regular Skee Regiments.

The Norwegian sport of skeeing is becoming popular in those parts of the Dominion where there is enough snow. Skees are elongated and narrowed snowshoes. They are intended for carrying the traveler more rapidly over the snow than he could go on the ordinary snowshoe used by some of the northern American Indians. As a matter of fact, skees are used also as flying machines on a limited scale. That is where the fun comes in. Skee jumping it is called.

The Norwegians and Swedes who were pioneers introduced the skee. They had been used to it at home. They found plenty of deep snow and the necessary hills for the sport in their adopted country and gradually taught their neighbors, the usefulness and the joys of skeeing.

For skee jumping a steep, long hill is selected, where the snow is several feet deep. If no satisfactory hill be found, a sort of toboggan slide is rigged up for use as the first and



steepest part of the course. The skeesteepest part of the course. The skeemen climb to the top of this on ladders or walk up along the side of the snow covered track. Far down the course is the bump or take-off, which is an obstruction built of wood and covered with snow. The runner strikes this and leaps into the air. That is where the jump begins. The skillful jumper will make a hundred feet or more before landing.

The world's record jump was made four years ago in Norway. It is 134 feet 6 inches. That is almost phenomenal. But a number of Americans most of them of Scandinavian extraotion, however, have made better than a hundred feet. It is said that at a tournament where a hundred men are in competition the jumps will average

A Timber Valuator writes regarding: the pulpwood situation: "In view of the growing scarcity of forest products many substitutes have been offered and suggested to take the place of wood for building material, yet, notwithstanding the near approach to a timber and lumber famine, and the high prices now being paid for lumber, it is still the cheapest, safest and best building material. Brick, co ent and steel have been experimented with to a considerable extent, but nothing has yet been discovered or invented that will serve to check the increasing demand for lumber as a building material. When I was a boy rags were used almost exclusively for making all kinds of paper, but to-day I have it from good authority that 85 per cent. of all the paper manufactured is mader from wood pulp, chieffy spruce. I was recently given a list of ten newspapers the daily issue of each of which required the product of a well-timbered acre of spruce. To one that knows opproximately the total amount of raw material available it does not require much of a mathematician for figure out how long it will require the present rate of consumption.

I would sug-gest that the Forestry Associations-give some attention to the reforestry of spruce pulpwood as well as to the reforestation of pine, or some day we may be short of "news" paper.

Distinguished Leader Commenced Edu cation in Industrial Indian School.

But Oronhyatekha was Canadian by ancestry. In this double sense of birth and ancestry he was a unique representative of his country, perhaps the greatest Canadian of his time.

The life of Oronhyatekha has left its memorials in clothing for children who would be naked, in food for orphans who would be in want if the genius of this Indian chief had not carried the blessings of insurance into lives and homes that would have never been reached by the activity of the old line companies.

Great Boon' In Trade.

Mr. J. S. Larke, Canadian Trade Commissioner to New South Wales, reports to the Trade and Commerce Department that there is a great boom in trade in Australia. The total trade of the Commonwealth for 1906 was £112,250,000, as compared with £95,187,768 in 1905. The imports were £44,600,000 in 1906, as against £38,346,781, while the exports grew from £56,841,035 in 1905 to £68,250,000 last year. The prospects for 1907 are good. The harvest of New South Wales alone produced 24,000,000 bushels of wheat which will allow of 13,000,000 bushels being exported.

Mr. Larke says he is distributing catalogues furnished by the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, especially as regards rubber goods, saddlery and carriage materials, engines, machinery, brushes, glassware and brass goods. He, however, does not expect much result unless Canadian firms appoint direct agents.

Britain's treaty obligations to foreign countries. When approached on the subject of imperial defence Sir Wilfrid's reply to the imperial authorities had been that Canada was establishing a local naval force in the waters of Canada. Mr. Borden would like to know how far the Government had progressed with its naval scheme.

The Cattle Embargo.

He would like to have known what He would like to have known what was Canada's attitude on the cattle embarge? It was known the embarge had been instituted and maintained, not because of disease in Canadian cattle, but as a measure of protection to the British farmer. The British Government could protect as they liked, but it was not fair that that protection should be effected by an embargo which casts discredit on Canadian cattle.

bargo which casts discredit on Canadian cattle.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in reply, said the very fact that Canada had offered no suggestions to the conference was the best evidence that the relations between Canada and the Empire were so satisfactory that they could not be improved. He was ready to go to London, not to make suggestions, but to receive those of the Home Government and the sister colonies.

He did not view with favor a permanent imperial council. The only question in which Canada was particularly interested was the trade question, and in this Canada had nothing to offer.

Her position had been laid down at

to offer.

Her position had been laid down at the conference of 1902, namely that Canada had already given a preference, and if the British people would reciprocate, Canada would go one step.

reciprocate, Canada would go one step further than she had done. But this policy had not found favor with the British people, and it was for them to make up their own mind without dictation from Canada.

The British Empire could only be maintained upon the principle that every one of the nations which compose it shall be allowed to determine for itself what is best for it. Sir Wilfrid's own view was that the ideal condition would be to have free trade between all parts of the British Empire. But at present that was not possible.

possible.

Will Not Consent.

As for imperial defence, he did not know that existing conditions could be improved upon. Certainly Canada would never consent to be drawn into the vortex of European militarism. In the way of immigration he thought the present policy a good one. Owing to it an increasing number of immigrants were coming from the British Iales.

When in London he could take up

When in London he could take up with Premier Deakin the question of preferential trade with Australia, and would doubtless occomplish an ar-

rangement.

The cattle embargo did not seem to be a proper matter for the conference, but the Government would continue to press upon the imperial authorities the advisability of its withdrawal.
