The Old Number.

Mr. Baldwin has richly earned the appellation of an "old Hunter" and an old Humbag. For years he crept upwards on the road to popularity as a sincere and faithful friend of the people; his soft and oily manner, his assumed philanthropy, his affectation of money, and his undoubted wealth, all contributed to invest him with qualities which elevated him by degrees to the prominent position of leader of the Upper Canada Liberals. He had it in his power to confer substantial blessings upon the country, had he not remained true to his former professions of faith. He has thought proper to repudiate those maxims of constitutional liberty by advocating which, in earlier days, he acquired a reputation and attained political power. The sudden conversion of such a man to circumstances, reveals additional evidence of the demoralizing influence of our form of government. It emboldens every renegade to quarrel himself upon the public purse, and it may now be accepted as a truism, that whenever a Cabinet Minister struts upon the stage in the masquerade of a Colonel "Barks," and rants about independence of electoral control, he has previously selected as his secretary some fat appointment, and that the face will soon be played out by his quarreling himself on the Civil List, ostensibly for the sake of the public interests. We feel neither surprise nor regret at the recent transmutation of Baldwin from a patriot to a place-hunter; in truth, we sincerely wish the whole batch of Ministers, with one or two worthy exceptions, would gratify their secret aspirations in the same way. Some of them must trade the mantle of independence pretty well worn out by this time—it fits awkwardly and galls them. Hence, look for a Collectorship, Lafontaine to the Black, Baldwin to a Chief Justice, and one of the large sharks to have the Post Office in the midst of this unwholesome corruption, this chaffering in the Cabinet about place, this hawking over the public purse, a solemn humbug like Baldwin compare himself and his confederates to the high-minded Statesmen of England—verily Responsible Government is a marvellous wonder! To one class it is the incarnation of the British Constitution; to another it is more Democratic than the Federal Government. It centralises all the patronage and power of the Colony in the hands of a dozen men; yea, the official journals assert, that it will well direct the wishes of the people's direct application to a Governor who is supposed to represent the dignity, honor, and power of the Crown. Yet in practice he is consigned to obscurity, or only permitted to excuse some flagrant wrong, or father some folly like the flight of the Parliament from Montreal; skillfully contrived insinuations impute to him whatever is odious, tyrannical, or cowardly. The ignorant are amused with the tales of the valiant conduct on the part of the Cabinet to resist the encroachments of the Crown, when Canadian Governors are but puppets in the hands of political impostors—that they are powerless to protect the oppressed or recompense the injured—and that, under Responsible Government, the Ministry have usurped the prerogative of the Crown, and plundered the people of their electoral rights. Such is the bastard form of Government their journals have the cool assurance to proclaim as superior to the American Constitution; and such are the necessary mountebanks, the model Pitts and Chatham's of the Colonial School, who are to be the arbiters of the people's political modesty when he instituted a comparison between himself and the representative of Bristol. Whatever importance we may attach to the abstract proposition embodied in the British speech, it was not then pretended, nor is it now, that a member of Parliament, who is elected as the advocate of a particular set of opinions, can repudiate them when the election has terminated. Mr. Baldwin's selection of a model was anything but felicitous; he appears to the great "Burke"—he is himself the great Burke, to the great Coligny at his election. He was an advocate of all these things, and suggested of something more a few years since, and he was elected implicitly upon such grounds. The law may not distinguish between a blasphemer and the suppressor of the truth; but his own conscience must tell him that he is playing false for some private purpose, and the Colony will remember him as the inventor of the "order of the Bears."

THE TERRY LAW.

When public men say anything particularly spiteful or ridiculous, it is perfectly fair for the public papers to gibbet their sayings for the amusement of the following Members of Parliament, the names of the following Members of Parliament of Anglo-Saxon origin, or usually acting with a view of their origin, who voted to rein in the Canadian Statute Book that rule of the ignorance and superstition of the dark ages usually designated "Terry Law." They are, ANASTASIO, CHATELAIN, DE WIT, DUMAS, GOY, HAZEN, MACDONALD, M'CONNELL, ROBINSON, SCOTT, SEMOUR, SMITH and STEVENSON.

Representation.

The Representation Bill is defeated; the vote, as announced by telegram in our journal yesterday, being 97 to 21. There was not a concurrent vote of two-thirds of the House as required by the Union Act, consequently this pestilent measure is shelved for one more year at any rate; many events may occur before it can again be brought before Parliament.

Sanctifying a Lunatic.

We understand that Mr. Rossin was yesterday introduced to the further management of his affairs. Mr. Rossin is alleged to labor under a delusion, a fact which he admitted and discussed when before the Court, in the case of the subject, but the one, his language was lucid, argumentative, and calm; his suggestions as to the proper management of his affairs would do credit to the sanest man living; and those who were present at the examination marvelled at the self-possession, cool deliberation of Mr. Rossin, especially when he turned to the Jury, and said:—"Gentlemen, I am ignorant of the laws of this Colony, but by the law is, that when seven men declare me a Lunatic, I am to be interdicted. I suppose I must believe that I am a Lunatic." The proceedings were assuredly strange and uncommon, though, with Mr. Rossin, we must presume he is a Lunatic.
