

TO PREVENT GREAT CALAMITOUS WAR

Meanwhile the Various Great Powers are Making all Necessary Preparations for War and Armies are Being Massed in Strategic Positions

London, July 29 .- Reports of the massing of armies in strategic positons came from all parts of Europe today, but no actual clashes are registered. Diplomats have concentrated their attention on efforts to confine the war to Austria and Servia. The attitude of the Germna and Russian Emperors has been closely watched. It is learned that telegrams have been exchanged between them. Attention has been strained to obtain the nature of their contents, but it was the general conviction that the salvation of Europe from a great calamitous war was in the hands of these two monarchs.
