**Former Canard Boy Has Two Sons in American Army.**

**Rev. Austin T. Kempton and Family One Hundred Per Cent Patriotic.**

(From Boston Record)  
 The family of Rev. Austin T. Kempton, pastor of the Broadway Baptist Church, Cambridge, is certainly 100 per cent patriotic for the two sons Bradford S. Kempton and Lawrence R. Kempton are in United States uniforms, Rev. Kempton himself is a special speaker for the Y. M. C. A. and in this capacity delivers addresses all over New England at the various camps and cantonments, while Mrs. Kempton is constantly busy with Red Cross, Y. M. C. A. and other worthy war works, and at the same time knitting for the boys and practising conservation in her household affairs.  
 The eldest son Bradford enlisted June 1917 in the United States Ambulance Service and was sent to England last January. Since March he has been in France driving a convoy automobile ambulance, which is attached to a French regiment. He is 23 years old and at the time of his enlistment had finished his second year of study at Colgate University.  
 The other son Lawrence enlisted last May and is a member of Battery C. 3rd Field Artillery, U. S. A. He was sent to Oklahoma for training at Camp Donovan but is now at Hempstead, L. I.  
 His mother was intending to go to New York to visit him, but a telegram received from him yesterday told her not to go as he was expecting to sail immediately for foreign service.  
 He graduated from Harvard Grammar School Cambridge and at the time of his enlistment was studying at the Huntington School, Boston. He is 19 years old.  
 Mr. and Mrs. Kempton are extremely proud of their soldier boys, but it is a great trial to have both gone so far from home with the attendant dangers and privations.  
 Rev. Austin T. Kempton mentioned above spent his early life at Canard with his parents Rev. S. Bradford and Mrs. Kempton. Dr. Kempton is now at Dartmouth but he spent the best quarter of a century of his life in laboring with the 1st Cornwallis Baptist Church. His consecrated and devoted life is well exemplified in that of his Austin T. and his grandsons now in their country's service

**TOURIST TRAFFIC**

The volume of tourist traffic from  
the United States this year has been  
considerably lessened by misleading  
press dispatches appearing in Ameri-  
can and Canadian papers regarding  
the Canadian Registration Act. It  
was unwarrantably stated that  
visitors to Canada from the United  
States would be compelled to re-  
gister at a post office before they  
could secure accommodations at a  
hotel, that passports were absolutely  
necessary, and more recently the ab-  
surd rumor was widely circulated  
that women from the United States,  
would not be allowed to retrace home.  
This latter ridiculous report is speci-  
fically denied by Mr. W. D. Scott,  
Superintendent of Immigration, who  
officially designated it as "absolutely  
without any foundation in fact."

Senator Gideon Robertson, a member  
of the Dominion Cabinet, and Chair-  
man of the Registration Board, is  
equally positive in his denials of the  
other mischievous reports. The  
actual facts are, according to the  
official statement of the Registration  
Board, that the Registration Act  
applies only to people permanently  
resident in Canada and does not  
affect even remotely anyone living in  
the United States; that no registra-  
tion at a post office is necessary, and  
that no passports are required. The  
possession of papers showing the  
holders to be American citizens is  
all that is necessary to cross into  
Canada. At the International bound-  
ary line the holders of these papers  
are given an identification card by  
the Canadian Immigration Officials,  
which enables the visitors to travel  
freely where they wish without any  
interference on the part of Canadian  
officials.

Senator Robertson, Chairman of  
the Registration Board, has an-  
nounced that "neither in the in-  
structions issued, nor the regulations  
for Canadian registration is there  
anything that would indicate desire  
or intention to impose restrictions  
upon Americans or aliens, entering,  
travelling in, or leaving Canada."  
The experience of those American  
visitors who have already come to  
Canada verifies Senator Robertson's  
statement, but unfortunately there  
are many across the border who have  
not read this announcement, and may  
still be influenced by the false re-  
ports to stay at home, spoil their  
vacation, and cause a mutual loss to  
themselves and to Canada.

### Gala Day at Aldershot

On Wednesday Lieut. Col. H. Flowers and the officers and men at Camp Aldershot of the 1st Depot Battalion and Canadian Overseas Drafts entertained Lieut. Col. Brooke and the officers and men of the National Army United States of America.

A full day of recreation and entertainment was given from 9 a. m. to 10 p. m. In the morning a parade of the troops was held, about 6000 men were in the procession. Col. Brooke and his 2300 men of the National U. S. Army led by their magnificent band made a fine showing. The Nova Scotia, Ontario, Quebec and British Columbia troops also showed up magnificently.

It was an impressive sight as they marched through the town. In the afternoon sports were held at Aldershot which were attended by a great number of people. The contests were keen and well conducted, British Columbia showed up well in the running races, Canada defeated United States in the exciting base ball game 3-2.

The evening was given up to a boxing tournament and open air concert on the parade grounds.

### A Word of Appreciation

At the time of its publication I received a copy of the report on Human Institutions for the Province of Nova Scotia, in which the condition of the Biltown, Alms-house, among others of Kings Co, was reported. I cannot speak of the conditions existing at the time this report was made, for the year ending Sept 30th 1916 but after several visits to this institution, including one of careful and unrestricted examination of present conditions, I am moved to write this word of appreciation of the splendid work done by the present Superintendent Mr. J. S. Slaucowitz and his capable wife, Dr. Hattie, in the report above referred to stated that it would be difficult to conceive of more discreditably conducted institution and among many deficiencies found plaster broken in nearly every bed room and vermin flourishing abundantly.

This condition does not exist to day the plaster, save in one place covers the walls and is as smooth and as free from holes as it can be made without removing it entirely and putting on new.

The building is of course altogether inadequate in nearly every respect but it would seem that with the chance afforded most praise worthy work is being done by the mistress of the house. Every room and its contents is bright clean and tidy. The walls and ceilings are snowwhite throughout. The building is clean of vermin, or as nearly so as it is possible for it to be in the face of the conditions under which such institutions are run. The inmates are as well dressed as one would expect to find them and are cleanly and tidy in their appearance, and in the absence of their mistress speak in the highest terms of the food provided and treatment given. I believe that the people of this county are at least passively interested in the treatment given the poor within our borders would deprecate the perpetuation of any such treatment as the inspector of Asylum Institutions reported two years ago.

I write these things without any suggestion from any person in the most indirect way connected with the management of the institution in question.

As a minister I have always taken an interest in such matters and have never met more courteous and prompt response to requests in behalf of the poor under my notice than by the overseers and Superintendent of this almshouse.

A new building, built upon a more modern plan, would of course improve conditions but, I believe, under the present circumstances the poor are being cared for in as satisfactory a way as is reasonably possible.

### Prices One Hundred Years Ago

From an old account-book of a Kentville, merchant we give our readers some of the prices prevailing one hundred years ago, the names of some of our early citizens and the kind of goods they purchased.

On April 16th 1918 Nathan Harris bot "11 yds of Bead Tik" at 2 shillings 10 pence a yard. "John Nucum," bot a set of knives and forks at 11 s. 3d. and sold 9 bus. "ots" at 1s. 7d. per bushel. Compare oats one hundred years ago at less than 40 cents per bushel with the present price of \$1.25 Mr. Hivan Eagles, bot 1 lb tea at 7 s. 6. d. about \$1.85 per lb, one half pound snuff 2 s. 6 d. 1/2 lb of tobacco 1-6. Joseph Johnston bot 1/4 lb "peper" at 10 1/2 d., 1/2 lb ginger 3-3, 2 lbs soap 2-2, 1 gal. rum 6-6. This rum which then cost about \$1.60 per gallon is now worth from \$16.00 to \$20.00 per gallon for the genuine overproof, an advance in price of over one thousand per cent. About fifty years ago it is stated that rum was brought here from Halifax by traders returning from the city at from \$1.25 to \$1.50 per gallon. This old ledger shows that one hundred years ago rum and spirits was a more common purchase than sugar and molasses.

Other prices were as follows 1 lb 10 penny nails 9 d., pair boots 6 s. boot laces 9 d. 22 1/2 lbs butter sold for £1 5 s. 1 1/2 d. A yard of muslin 1 shilling, a hat 4 shillings, Indian cotton at a shilling a yard, 2 shillings for a pound of raisins, pair silk gloves 5 shillings, "pair stockings" 3-3 molasses 5 shillings, 1 lb writing paper 2 shillings 1 lb powder 3 shillings and 4 lb of shot at the same price.

Here is a simple account of one customer by the name of Pagsley, showing all the goods purchase from July to November 1918 1 lb tea 1 qt. rum, 4 yds Indian cotton handkerchief 1 gal. rum, 1/2 lb tea 1 qt. rum 1 lb. tea. The rum was evidently used in the haying season and the tea was used as mild substitute for the women folk.

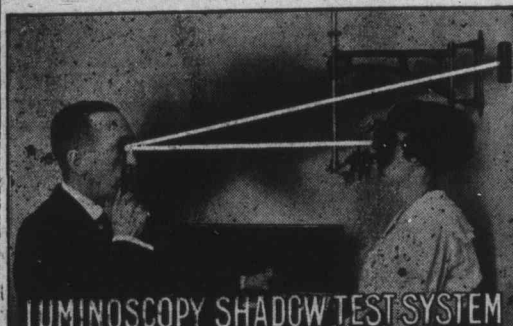

No Germans South of Marne Except Captives or Dead.

London, July 21—No Germans remain south of the Marne except prisoners and dead. This message is sent from Reuter's correspondent at Headquarters and is timed Saturday.

COMPULLED TO RETREAT ACROSS MARNE RIVER.

Paris, July 20th.—The Germans, violently attacked on their right flank and south of the Marne, says the War Office tonight, have been compelled to retreat and recross the river. The French hold the entire southern bank of the Marne. More than 20,000 prisoners and 400 guns have been captured.

The text of the statement reads:—We have not had long to wait for the result of our victorious counter-offensive. The Germans violently attacked on their right flank and south of the Marne, have been compelled to retreat and re-cross the river. We hold the whole south bank of the Marne.

Between the Aisne and the Marne, Franco-American troops continue to progress and have driven back the enemy, who is resisting stubbornly.

We have reached Ploisy and Percy Tigny and have passed beyond St. Remy—Blenzy and Rose—St. Ablin. Further south we hold the general line of the Priez Plateau, northeast of Courchamps.

The number of prisoners we have taken since July 18 exceeds 20,000. Over 400 guns have been captured.

AVIATORS BOMBED MARNE CROSSINGS

Our aviators, redoubling their activity in the day and night of the 19th., multiplied their raids and engaged in the severest battles against enemy forces. Franco British bombing squadrons, taking the Marne crossings as their principal objective have ceaselessly hampered, and at certain points, completely stopped the enemy supply service, thus playing an important role in the conflict which was about to provoke the retreat of the German troops.

Attacking with machine guns and bombs concentrations of troops which the enemy was preparing for counter attack, and on his columns of convoys, our aviators inflicted heavy losses on the enemy.

Peace on Allied Terms by Jan. 1st, Say Financiers.

(Boston Globe)

New York, July 15th.—It became known in Wall Street today that one of the leading exporting corporations in the United States had received a cable from its London agent advising it not to make marine insurance contracts at prevailing high rates on overseas tonnage beyond the first of the new year.

The correspondent informed his American principals that positive opinion was held in London banking and commercial circles that hostilities would cease before that date and the Allies would be victorious.

As this information was disclosed to certain financial interests in the greatest confidence, the name of the corporation was withheld.

Enemy Lost 3,856 Aircraft in Year.

During Same Period British Lost Only 1,994 Machines—Superiority Increasing.

London, July 15th.—In one year on the British western front the Royal Air Force has accounted for 3,233 enemy airplanes. In the same period the naval airmen shot down 623 a total of 3,856.

Former Czar Has Been Shot.

London, July 20th.—Former Emperor Nicholas of Russia has been shot, a Russian wireless statement today announces.

The former Emperor's correspondence including letters from the Monk Rasputin, who was killed shortly before the revolution, written to the then Emperor and his family, will be published in the near future, the wireless message declares.

A despatch from Ottawa dated July 15th states:—

Because of the limited supplies of substitutes for wheat flour at present available in Canada in comparison to the demand which would result from the operation of the recent order of the Canada Food Board requiring the use of substitutes in certain proportions by bakers, confectioners, public eating places and private houses, the Canada Food Board has deferred, until a date to be fixed, the operation of certain sections of that order.

Bakers, confectioners, public eating places and private households will not, for the present, have to use one pound of substitutes to every four pounds of wheat flour in baking. They must, however use one pound of substitutes to every nine pounds of wheat flour, as provided in the law now operative. Dealers in eastern Canada, as well as in western Canada, for the present will be required to sell one pound of substitutes with only every four pounds of standard flour.

News Must Not be Unnecessarily Lengthened.

In Europe the authorities have compelled newspapers to issue smaller pages or less in number on account of saving paper. This has also affected the United States and Canada where the large advertising issues of former years have been done away and more condensed news is now demanded by the public.

We find it necessary to make our war news and other items as brief as possible and ask everyone sending in news not to lengthen same by unnecessary adjectives or wordy paragraphs. When events are of sufficient importance we wish to have a full report.

First Enemy Shells to Land in America

German U-Boat Operating Off Cape Cod.

Sank Three Barges, Set Tug on Fire and dropped Four Shells on Mainland.

Orleans, Mass., July 21st.—An enemy submarine attacked a tow off the easternmost point of Cape Cod today sank three barges, set a fourth and their tug on fire and dropped four shells on the mainland.

The action lasted an hour and was unchallenged except for two hydroplanes from the Chatham aviation station which circled over the U-boat causing her to submerge for a short time, only to reappear and resume firing. The crews of the tow, numbering forty-one and including three women and five children escaped amid the shell fire in life boats. Several was wounded but only one seriously. This happened to be John Stovich; an Australian of the crew of the tug. His right arm near the shoulder was torn away by a fragment of shell. The minor injuries of the others were from shell splinters. The one-sided fight took place three miles south of the Orleans coast guard station which is located midway between Chatham, at the elbow, and Highland light at the extreme tip of the Cape. The firing line was heard for miles and brought thousands to the beach from which the flashes of the guns and outline of the U-boat were plainly visible.

Possible danger to the onlookers was not thought of until a shell whizzed over their heads and splashed in a pond a mile inland. Three other shells buried themselves in the sands of the beach.

Air Raider Driven Back From Kent.

London, July 20—A German airplane crossed the Kentish coast this morning and was driven back by the fire of anti-aircraft guns, according to an official announcement.

### Picked British Troops are on Fighting Line.

They Have Taken the Same Positions as When May Offensive Opened.

Paris, July 22—When the Bavarian Crown Prince answered the German Crown Prince's appeal for help and sent some of his divisions from the Picardy front to aid the Germans in the Marne salient an equal number of British divisions was detached from the northern front and moved to the battle sector southwest of Rheims. The British divisions are composed of picked troops.

It is interesting to note that the British divisions on the front southwest of Rheims have again taken the same place in the battle order which the British occupied when they were driven back in the May offensive. Their transport from the British front to the Champagne front was executed in a most skilful manner.

With the American Army on the Aisne-Marne front, July 22nd.—The Germans are clinging desperately to the line south of Soissons, in an effort to protect their flank.

The Americans fighting on the front, have completed the cutting of the narrow gauge railway to Chateau Thierry.

The pounding process is being continued by the American and their Allies in this sector, keeping the German uncertain from moment to moment regarding the Allied intentions.

Prisoners taken by the Americans say that if the strenuous offensive of the Allies continue, the Germans will withdraw much further north, where they will fight for their lives. The Allied heavy artillery is hammering military objectives in the Soissons area.
