The Reviewer.

Many of the higher critics so called tell us that at least the earlier narratives of Genesis are myth and legend. Jesus believed them to be facts. Paul believed them to be facts and based upon them his great teaching regarding salvation and the resurrection of the dead, and did not build on myth and legend. In the New Testament there are eighty-nine references to or quotations from the Pentateuch alone. Jesus quoted from twenty-one books of the Old Testament. Of the thirty-nine books Paul quotes from thirty-four. In the gospels alone there are three hundred references to the Old Testament. Our Lord repeatedly gave his testimony to the Old Testament and his seal to the story of the creation of man, the death of Abel, the deluge, the brazen serpent, Sodom's destruction, Jonah and the great fish. Did Jesus make a mistake when he endorsed all these?

One of these higher critics has recently said, 'Surely the time has come when lies and hypocrisy should be swept out from the temple of the Lord.' He means such lies as are told by Bunyan, Knox, Luther, Calvin, Chalmers, Spurgeon, Wesley, Whitefield and Edwards. Such lies as taught by sainted parents, pastors and teachers who led us to the house of God and guided us in the ways of life. These so called higher critics have swept from the word of the Lord, the Pentateuch, the pre-incarnate state of Jesus, the Virgin Birth, the Deity of Christ. The atonement is swept out, the resurrection has gone, the ascension has gone and Christ's return will never be. What have we left in the old bible.

Verily the preposterous and silly absurdities of some of these higher critics are so wild and blasphemous that any pulpit wherein they had preached should be fumigated as sacrilegious. They build a straw religion of their own and then take pains to try and knock it out again.

Voltaire was confident that Christianity would be overthrown by the discovery of the law of gravitation and would not survive a century. He said there would not be a bible in a hundred years and that while it took twelve men to establish Christianity he would overthrow it. Voltaire died in 1778. In about twenty six years the British and Foreign Bible Society furnished in the account of the D. B. C. DEAR SIR:—Kindly allow me a few lines to inquire how the voters lists are prepared in this county. Can anyone tell me who the revisors are and how they do their work. This is the prophecy of a man still calling himself a Baptist and a preacher of the gospel. How different is the teaching of God's word. Yet notwithstanding all these deplorable criticisms an unfailing remedy can be found in the restoration and exaltation of the bible to its former place and power. Let the bible be our critic and reveal to us whatever in doctrine or practice may make the word of God of none effect and may the precious truths of that hallowed bible lead us to a consecration of life to the service of Him who loved us and gave Himself for us. May we ever delight in the study of that blessed book which to unnumbered millions doubt has never dimmed and controversy never soiled.

In the opinion of 'the man on the street' the time has now arrived when the new government should pass an ordinance governing the construction of buildings on Main street at least. The Gadfly.

That the giving of two Dreadnoughts to the British navy would be agreeable to the sentiments of the great mass of the Canadian people is beyond question. British sentiment in Canada is strong. It will not be restrained by any politician nor satisfied with any make believe concession. To analyze this sentiment would be nothing to the purpose. One element in it would be found to be the feeling of gratitude to the mother country for her tutelage care of Canada from the beginning of our history down to these days of our greatness. Politicians can talk pompously and illogically about her autonomy but there would have been little 'autonomy' for her had she been neglected by the parent state in times gone by. Our commerce has always had the protection of the greatest sea power in the world. The people of Canada do not forget. They keenly realize that they owe the mother country the gratitude of the giving of \$50,000 to the sufferers from the Paris floods the defence contribution of two Dreadnoughts should be easy.

The attitude assumed by the autonomy party in Canada reminds one forcibly of the pose of the young man who sees himself for the first time in trousers. Having discarded knickerbockers and put on his first pair of long pants it is not an uncommon thing for the fledgling to imagine for the moment that he is really a man and entitled to all the rights and privileges that the state of manhood brings with it. In this exalted notion for the time being he is past the restraint period of life and considers himself independent and responsible.

Our friends of the autonomy party have said that Canada is a nation and to make good their claim they are demanding the rights of independent nationhood neglecting at the same time to note that if by any unfortunate chance Canada was called for to undertake the responsibilities attached to independent nationhood she would quickly wish herself in short dependency pants again.

As a matter of fact the men who are shouting autonomy fail to convince us of their sincerity. Only in certain directions do they really want to be free to do as they please without reference to Great Britain, in other directions they are well content to leave things as they are, letting the mother country play the part of adviser and protector. The argument has been introduced 'no political effect but it is doubtful if it will prove potent in politics while it is almost sure to have a damaging effect in many other ways. The day may come when Canada will be entitled to demand a full measure of autonomy; just now, however, to talk seriously of such a thing is to talk pure poppycock.

As one of the several states in the great empire partnership Canada intends to reserve to herself the right to do at all times just as she pleases when questions involving the partnership interest arise she will be of little real assistance to the empire company. If there is to be a successful partnership it can be successful only as others are successful. The decision of each to abide by the majority decision. Such a spirit of wise reasonableness might not be at all times agreeable to our friends of the Canadian autonomy party and if their navy view is to prevail Canada might as well be counted out of the partnership bargain. If we are to support the empire cause it is war only when it suits us as a cold blooded business proposition we will be as un-British as a horde of mercenaries who for a price would be willing to hire themselves out to the highest bidder as a fighting unit.

This is a time when the people of Canada should rise in the majesty of their might, voicing the true sentiments of the Anglo-Saxon race and silence the angry voices of political turmoil. It is a time for the people to offer up thanksgiving for the years of peace, protection and honor maintained by Britain's fleets. It is a question between blood and blood, between loyalty and disloyalty. Our politics for the time being should be draped in crape. The question should be our empire, our whole empire and nothing but the empire. We should show the nations that we are a great people giving gratitude for a mother's love. To-day by political madmen we are plunged in distress and threatened with the silent contempt of a mighty people. While we would build a navy becoming a rich daughter we would first protect the mother's threshold with our dreadnoughts. We will stand by our country as long as the maple lasts but when the chain of empire shall break, when our enemies humiliate us and the roar of mighty guns is heard at our very gates and the ship of empire goes down and the empire perishes we would rather die with it than survive its destruction or everlasting humiliation.

### Black and Green Tea.

MAY BE MADE INDISCRIMINATELY FROM EITHER PLANT.

Early writers speak of tea as having two varieties. One, Theobomb, they supposed to be the source of the black and the other, Thea viridis, of the green tea. But Robert Fortune established the fact in 1843 that while these two varieties existed, black and green were made indifferently from both.

The tea flower is small, single, white and has no smell. The seeds are three small nuts, like filberts, and have an oily and bitter taste. The leaves only are used.

In China there are about three crops annually, the first being gathered as soon as the leaves break in the spring, April to May, and the latter as new flushes (buds), are made by the plants which have been stripped of their foliage, this harvest beginning in June or July and lasting as late as September or October.

An almond eyed Oriental, Lo Yi, the earliest Chinese writer, pronounces this eulogium on tea:

"It tempers the spirits and harmonizes the mind, dispels lassitude and relieves fatigue, awakens thought and prevents drowsiness, lightens and refreshes the body and clears the perceptive faculties."

### An Ancient People.

RECENTLY DISCOVERED FACTS ABOUT THE HITITES.

Some interesting details are given by Prof. John Garstang of the ancient race of people mentioned in the Bible as the Hitites. He said there could be nothing more romantic than the finding of the Hitites' country in Southern Syria. A few years ago the surface of this once famous city which belonged to the great Hitite king who fought the Pharaohs.

The land of the Hitites had been discovered by the finding of a whole series of monuments, carvings, and rock sculpture. As early as B. C. 2000 they were a force in Southern Syria, and we could learn that they were an extremely mixed race, with a touch of the Mongolian.

About B. C. 1300 the Hitite, Babylonian and Egyptian people held the balance of power in Western Asia. One thing of striking interest was the recent discovery of a message which the King of Babylon sent to the King of the Hitites, which read: "I hear you are carrying on with the King of Egypt. What does this mean?"

The Hitite king then made an extract from the treaty he had just concluded with a Pharaoh and sent it to the Babylonian king, at the same time keeping a copy of his letter. That copy had now come down to us. Other letters, too, had been found.

### British Columbia.

The temperance people of British Columbia endeavored to get local option legislation. Large petitions were presented to the Government and Legislature praying for it. The Government agreed to submit the matter to the electors. At the general election a few weeks ago, the question was voted on. It was stipulated that to succeed those voting in favor of a local option law must equal fifty per cent of the total registered vote. The result of the voting, just announced, shows that, while local option had a majority of 3,000 of the votes polled, not having secured fifty per cent of the total vote, no district in the Province will be allowed to say whether it wants license or no license, but must submit to the legalized intensity in its midst. Just as more than fifty municipalities in Ontario, which gave large majorities in favor of local prohibition, are left in the grip of the licensed drink traffic because they failed by a few votes to get a three-fifths majority, so the British Columbia people, with a majority of 3,000, ther-
